

I want to tell you a story

It all started when we first decided to buy 'Higher Grawley'. Sallie, who had lived there, had some sheep which she couldn't take with her when she moved. Much against David's better judgement we inherited 2 sheep and a goat.

Things went along quite smoothly those first 6 months, then sadly we lost the ewe, leaving us with Sid the goat and Larry the wether.

Earlier that year we had gone along to our first Holsworthy Show and had been drawn to the sheep pens. There I met and fell in love with the Hampshire Down sheep. David's better judgement was still in control at this time so I could just look but not have!

Early the next year lambing time came round at 'Buttermoor'. I had mentioned that I wouldn't mind bottle feeding any orphans that came along, so my stable was slowly being turned into and orphanage, filled with the dulcet tones of several lambs. Eventually they grew up and the lads were returned to where they came from but the girls stayed.

As I now had a few more sheep I had managed to persuade David that a couple of Hampshire Downs wouldn't look out of place. With the help of Dave Kirby, our neighbour at 'Buttermoor', we started looking for some. This was quite easy as he knew of two ladies who were selling a couple of Hamps'. We left it to him to make the arrangements to go and see them.

The day arrived and off we went. When we got there we were taken to the barn by Margaret and Sheila, and shown the two ewe's that were for sale. Once again we relied on DK to advise us, he thought they were nice ewes but not as nice as the one he'd spied further back in the barn, unfortunately she was not for sale as she was a special pet of Sheila's. We were well satisfied with what we had, but did say if Concepta (that was the other ewe's name), ever needed a new home to let us know. Back home with our girls we spent a quiet summer. We registered the new ewes, and found out as much as we could about the breed.

July came and we needed the services of a ram for the two Hamps'. I found one I could borrow near Taunton, so arranged that David would pick him up on his return from one of his trips to the Midlands. He duly arrived; I will leave the tale of unloading him for another day! (needless to say we could have made 'You've Been Framed' if I'd had the video camera handy), after a lot of hilarity he was introduced to the girls.

I had been back in touch with Margaret and Sheila to see if they had changed their minds about Concepta. Eventually I had a phone call to say yes and to offer me another ewe as well.

Things were getting exciting I decided we needed our own ram as I couldn't be sure of always being able to borrow one when I needed one. So off we went to Exeter ram sales, with instructions from DK as to what to look for and what to do.

Mother was visiting at the time. Has anyone ever tried taking a cantankerous elderly lady round a sheep sale in a wheel chair? All she wanted to do was get out and walk! imagine trying to get her out of the way when the sheep came through. In the end she was banished to the car with her book and zimmer frame, where she still managed to wreak havoc and almost lost her zimmer when David drove off not realizing it wasn't in the car. The site of a zimmer frame left standing in the middle of a field with nothing else around it was quite amusing !!!

I had picked out 2 ram lambs I was interested in. The first went through and sold for a lot more than I'd set myself. I just hoped the second one didn't. In he came, not as nice as the first one but not bad. Bidding started and slowly crept up. I was determined to have him so kept bidding. He was getting very close to my limit when suddenly the bidding stopped and it was with me. What a relief! I still had a ticking off from David as my limit had been for the first ram. He didn't think I should have gone so high for this one! Anyway the ram lamb was mine and duly named 'Henry'. After collecting Mum and her Zimmer frame from the car park we loaded the ram and set off for home.

The borrowed ram was returned to Taunton and Henry was turned out with the four girls.

I wonder if we had known what was ahead would we have trod this path? I think yes.

January 2001 our first lambs arrived. February 2001 Foot and Mouth left it's trail of destruction across the SW. There is no need to dwell on that year, it was awful for all of us, those that lost everything and those that didn't. So we will draw a veil over it. I bought two more ewe lambs to join the four ewe lambs that had been born that year and was slowly getting together a flock of Hampshires to be proud of. New Years Eve 2001 our first set of triplets and the promise of better things. The lambs born in January of 2002 were nice too.

Come the show season the shows were not allowed to have sheep classes. This was very disappointing as I had some nice lambs but no where to show them. Eventually the rules were changed and sheep

were allowed, I think the Royal Show at Stoneleigh was the turning point.

My first show was Mid Devon and although I didn't do any good I throughly enjoyed myself. Next came Holsworthy Show, my home show, here I won a first with my ram lamb and a third with my ewe lamb, you could say I was walking on air! I was so proud of my lambs and they seemed to be getting a great deal of attention from the public as well. My final show was Honiton, once again I didn't win but what a lovely show and we really enjoyed the day.

Now we are into 2003 and I have a new lot of lambs to think about. Henry was in with the ewes in July last year, so we had some lambs earlier in December, one or two of which show promise, but we will see. Last years lambs have grown into nice shearlings, so it looks like we may be doing the rounds

again in the show rings.

So thank you Dave Kirby for putting us on the right road with our sheep, and oh Sallie if only you'd realised what you were starting leaving those 2 sheep and a goat called Sid!!!!!!!!

Arnica the wonderpill!

Having brought up two children (now young adults!) I have been most grateful on many occasions for the magic of Arnica.

One evening, many years ago, when my daughter was just four years old, she tell down a flight of polished wood stairs - on her back. Amid the screaming and crying I checked her spine and saw the expected reddened area, about three inches across, with a small area of broken skin in the centre.

Limmediately gave her one dose of Arnica 30 and applied Arnica cream to the unbroken skin on her back.


She soon settled and the following morning. I had one happy little girlwith a small area of broken skin, but no pain, no bruising, no swelling what a wonderpill!

Arnica Montana, a bright yellow mountain flower, is a wonderful mainstay in homeopathy for use after any accident or injury. It helps with bruising or pain and can prevent shock. It can also be used after traumatic events such as surgery. childbirth or dental treatment.

Arnica will speed up the healing process. reduce swelling and, if given quickly enough prevent bruising by controlling the bleeding.

Researchers from the University of Exeter were recently reported to have tested Amica



The surgical procedure undertaken involves the division of the strong wrist ligament to free pressure on the median nerve of the hand. Although Amica would be beneficial if taken immediately before and after the operation to eleviate the shock, the involvement of ligaments and nerves would indicate different remedies such as Hypericum, Staphisagria or Symphytum.

Unfortunately in the trial, participants were given three Arnica tablets a day for a week before their operations and for two weeks afterwards!

One of the first principles of homeopathy is that you only take a remedy if you need it. When you have symptoms then an appropriate remedy can be chosen to assist your healing.

Taking a remedy for any length of time unnecessarily can stimulate the symptoms that the remedy was meant to treat - in the case of Arnica - feeling bruised!

HAYFEVER

Hayfever (also called seasonal allergic rhinitis) is caused by an allergy to pollens or moulds. Grass pollen is the most common cause (May to July). Less common causes are tree pollens (March to May), and moulds (July to September). Symptoms are due to the immune system 'over-reacting' to the pollen or mould. Cells of the immune system in your nose and eyes release' histamine and other chemicals when they come in contact with pollen. This causes inflammation in the nose (rhinitis) and eyes (conjunctivitis).

Who gets havfever?

At least 1 in 10 people in the UK have hayfever. Usually it starts to develop before the age of 20.

What are the symptoms of havfever?

Common symptoms - a runny and itchy nose, blocked nose, sneezing, itchy and watery red eyes, and sore throat. Sometimes only nose symptoms, or only eye symptoms occur,

Less common symptoms - loss of smell, facial pains, sweats, headache and asthma symptoms such as wheeze and breathlessness.

Avoiding havfever

- ~ Avoid grassy places
- ~ Sleep with windows shut
- ~ Don't go out in the early evening when the pollen count is highest
- ~ If driving, keep the windows up
- ~ Wear dark glasses

Some Homeopathic remedies for hayfever

Hayfever is an unpleasant complaint and one that conventional medicine treats with drugs like antihistamine that tend to make you sleepy. Homeopathic remedies can be of great benifit. Try taking one of the remedies below if your hayfever symptoms match.

Allium Cepa (red onion) - Profuse watery tears, red eyes, burning in the nose and inflammation of the throat. Worse in a warm room.

Apis (honey bee) - Redness and swelling of the face, red and burning eyelids.

Arsen Alb - Eyes burning hot with a flow of hot burning tears. Sneezing with no relief. Very restless.

Euphrasia (eyebright) - Profuse nasal discharge during the day, nose blocked at night. Sensation of having sand in the eyes with a copious flow of burning tears.

Natrum Muriaticum (sodium chloride) - Red and dry eyes, worse for being in the hot sun.

Pulsatilla (wind flower) - Inflammation of eyes and the eyelids. Profuse discharge of thick yellow mucus. Itching and burning of the eyes compels rubbing and scratching.

If you suffer from long term hayfever, a visit to a qualified homeopath before the onset of symptoms will help to slow down your reaction to allergens/pollen.

Useful Tips

- at least 3 months before the start of your hayfever season have a daily helping of one tablespoon of locally produced honey to acclimatise yourself to local pollens. Live culture yoghurt caten daily can also be beneficial
- eat 'mucus moving' foods eg chilli peppers, curries, garlic, horseradish
- avoid or cut down milk and other dairy produce as they suppress natural secretions that otherwise would liquefy mucus
- eat blackcurrants which are not only rich in vitamin C but also have a natural anti-inflammatory action
- eat plenty of raw foods and fruit, but not tomatoes and oranges
- bathe sore eyes with cold tea bags
- shower your head in cold water after exposure to pollen or other irritants

Everything that needs to be said about the morals of war have already been well aired in the visual and audible media. One small thing however niggles the mind - that is, where were the thousands of protesters against war when the Iraqi regime was responsible for a million deaths, including innocent civilians, when it waged war with Iran? Where were they when the same regime gassed 50,000 Kurds in northern Iraq and slaughtered more in the south?

Whilst any death is a tragedy, the figures for this current conflict probably will not exceed 4,000 at most - far, far short of the figure for just the gassings in the north by the regime. Perhaps the marchers and protesters would claim that it was because their own country was involved or that the 'west' should keep out of the affairs of others. John Donne in the 14th Century wrote 'No man is an island entire of itself. Every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. Any man's death diminishes me because I am involved in mankind and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee'.

Maybe the protesters would do well to understand this and while continuing to protest if they wish (something that would cause their deaths in other, less free countries!) at least being consistent in every situation would give their cause some credibility.

One other thing, am I alone in thinking that 24-hour wall to wall coverage of war's blood and thunder, together with regular murder and mayhem in the usual programs on television is mind damaging? I am reminded of something from William Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, 'death and destruction shall be so in use, mothers will but smile when they see their children butchered by the hands of men.'

Agroforestry is solutions by trees

In March 2000 I set up camp singly in Holsworthy for the first time and dedicated myself to environmental enhancement.

My history is briefly like many men who help raise a family with the usual struggles in a job I hated. Then when the children grew up new not what to do with my life, so decided to go to university. At the age of 58 managed to graduate with a second class degree in agroforestry, but remained unemployable.

My passion for trees began from childhood when the garden sycamore was climbed at every opportunity to scan the horizons. Then followed the normal progression into adulthood and working in the printing industries.

It was in 1987 when the great storm hit the UK and devastated millions of trees in many, many counties.

Just to make life more interesting leukaemia was contracted after moving to a new home in Caterham, Surrey.

Luck was on my side and thanks to some brilliant oncologists it actually cured within a few years. However it left me with no working balance mechanism and a career was curtailed.

Never forgetting those wind thrown trees after leaving hospital I vowed to find some way of replacing them in a more fruitful form. It was then I discovered agroforestry, which is a new science of trees combining with vegetables, cereals, fruit, grazing and general agriculture. Later I learnt it can resolve environmental problems of water logging, flood plain management and many other issues.

Although retired from working life it is important for me to remain active either mentally or physically. Due to various disabilities I chose the former and remain active in spreading the gospel of trees.

West country life is rapidly changing and farming is dwindling to the point of re-examining the whole structure of industry. Forests in the South West will become productive in 60 years and lifestyles on farm are to become more bio-diverse. This means trees will become even more significant to the public.

My role is to facilitate education, especially to young people and help the public improve their environment. So if any of the readers need trees to address a particular function, whether it be for parks or schools. I will gladly support their cause.

Even if you have a waterlogged garden there is a solution using special species of tree to solve it.

If you go to the show please look in!




