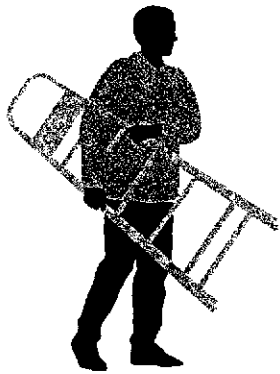

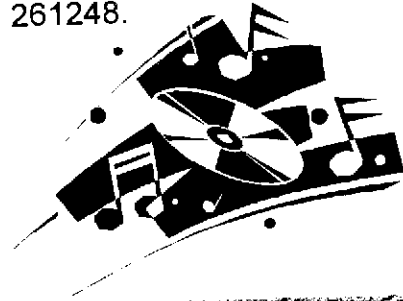

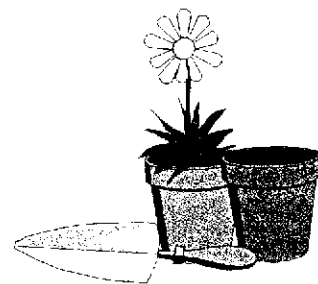

## VARIEGATED THOUGHTS

I suggested sometime ago that the prominence given to some items of news against others in our dreadful press was reprehensible. In the last week we have seen massive coverage of the behaviour of a few members of the coalition forces in Iraq. As bad as that is, on the inside pages of what is supposed to be 'the best selling broadsheet' one column of approximately three inches was given to the fact that 630 bodies had been buried after an attack on Muslims by Christian militiamen in Nigeria in the first week of May this year. This figure could reach one thousand as many charred Muslim bodies were still lying in the streets. That is obviously not something of very much importance!! - 'for whom the bell tolls'.

From the same rag I quote..... 'at an airport lounge there is a lady. She has spiky hair with red streaks. She wears a top that is too small for her. As she slumps forward to slurp her coffee, she exposes two or three inches of flesh that cascades down at each side over her trousers, which are also too small for her. In the middle of this pool of floppy pink flesh there is a tattoo and when I go round to have a look at her, I see a ring through her nose and that she is in her fifties. Not only does she look repulsive and stupidly inappropriate for her age, but she makes in some small way all English women of her age look the same.....'

After a few moments she reappeared with a seriously disabled man in a wheelchair and another holding her arm. As she passed I made the comment that she had her hands full. She smiled and said "I do this whenever I can, it gives them a change of scenery and it gives me pleasure as well". It would have been nicer if the author of the rag's whole page diatribe of outrageous snobbery had looked beyond the dress sense of his airport lady and found perhaps that her qualities far outshone his.

On another subject, why do people in hospital get free meals? If they were at home they would have to pay for them. Unless diet is a part of the treatment, let everybody contribute towards the cost of their food and save the National Health Service many millions of pounds which could be put to more important use.

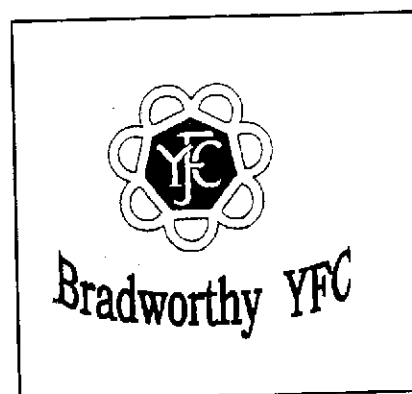

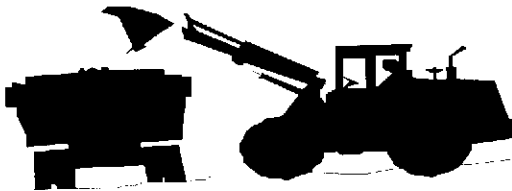

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### Homeopathic remedies for Indigestion

Try taking one of the remedies below if your symptoms match. Take one dose (6c or 30c), every 15 - 30 minutes until there is improvement, for up to three doses.

**Nux Vomica** - *Brilliant hangover remedy!* After over-eating, especially rich food and coffee. Will often feel very irritable. The stomach feels bloated heavy and tender.

**Carbo Veg** - After eating rich or fatty foods - constant belching with a sour taste. All food turns to wind. Burning pain in stomach. Feels better after belching. Stomach feels as tight as a drum so tight clothes feel very uncomfortable.

**Lycopodium** - Eating small amounts creates a feeling of being full. Has to loosen tight clothing. Burning belches and rumbling bowels. Cramping, pressing pains in stomach. Prefers drink to be hot and sweet.

**Pulsatilla** - After eating too much rich or fatty food - bloating, gurgling stomach. Not thirsty. May feel emotional, tearful.

If you suffer from persistent or recurring digestive problems, it is recommended that you consult a qualified homeopath for constitutional treatment.

### Digestive Tips

Relax and eat slowly during a meal. Giving yourself plenty of time to chew food.

Watch your posture while you eat - slouching will inhibit the natural process of digestion.

Avoid smoking before, during or after a meal.

Slippery elm powder made with milk (or soya milk) is a soothing and gentle drink that neutralises acid in the stomach and aids digestion.

Tea, Coffee, Alcohol. Spicy or rich foods, excessive sugar and smoking can aggravate the stomach's discomfort.

Try a soothing herbal tea such as ginger, peppermint or fennel tea. Make your own root ginger tea by grating a small amount of fresh ginger and infuse in boiling water, Add honey to taste.

## Don't miss out on free prescriptions, says CAB

Thousands of people on low incomes may be missing out on free prescriptions because of confusion over changes to the benefits system, Bude and Holsworthy Citizens Advice Bureau warned this week.

An annual cost-of-living increase this month has led to many people on Incapacity Benefit losing the income support top-up that also entitled them to free prescriptions. They then faced having to meet the full cost of all their prescriptions out of their benefit income - just when prescription charges in England have gone up to £6.40 for each item.

But After Citizens Advice Bureaux raised concerns about the impact of these changes, new rules were rushed through to protect people in this position. As a result, anyone whose weekly income is no more than £3.20 above income support levels is now entitled to free prescriptions - but this will no longer happen automatically, so they will have to make a claim.

They will need to complete form HC1 (available from local benefit offices, NHS hospitals, dentists, opticians & pharmacists) to get a certificate exempting them from payment. They can do this before they need treatment. But if they do not have a certificate when they get a prescription dispensed they can get the charge refunded if they ask the pharmacist for form FP57 at the time they pay. They will not be able to get these forms at a later date.

CAB manager Margaret Lightfoot said:

"We already know that around 750,000 people a year go without prescriptions because they cannot afford the cost, so it's great news that the government has acted so promptly to avoid what would otherwise have been a double whammy for a lot of sick and disabled people. Many people on Incapacity Benefit - by definition likely to be heavy users of prescriptions - faced losing their right to free prescriptions at the same time as prescription charges were increased".

"But we are worried that many of those people previously exempt from prescription charges will not realise that, while they are still entitled to free prescriptions under the new rules, they will now have actively to make a claim to get them.. They are in danger of missing out because the rules are so complex and confusing. We would strongly urge anyone unsure of their position to contact us for advice.

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## Grandparents - What Rights Do They Have?

**Q.** *My son and his wife are getting divorced. We are really worried that we may not be able to see our granddaughter anymore. Is there anything we can do? What rights do we have?*

**R.** You do not say why you fear you will not be able to see your granddaughter, & whether this could be resolved informally. At the end of a relationship, many parents are able to make arrangements amicably between themselves about where a child will live and visits from the other parent & grandparents.

Sometimes, family mediation or counselling can help if there are problems. If it is impossible to resolve the situation informally, the court can make decisions about children. There is no legal requirement that disputes about children have to be settled in court and it is always open for the carers of a child to make their own arrangements without involving the court. This is obviously less disruptive to the child and avoids the expense and delays of legal action. Grandparents have no automatic rights or responsibilities in relation to their grandchildren. But you can apply for a contact or residence order. Although grandparents are considered to have an important role in a child's life, the court will examine the role the grandparents have played in the child's life and whether an order is in the child's best interest. If your grandchild has been living with you for three years, you can apply for a contact or residence order, if not you must ask the court for permission to apply. This is often useful in situations where the parents are separating and the court is making decisions about the child; or a child's parents are refusing to let the grandparents see the child; or if the child is going to be adopted; or if an unmarried father is applying for a court order. A contact order allows you to be in touch with your granddaughter and states how frequent the contact must be. A contact order usually lasts until a child is 16. A residence order would give you parental responsibility for your granddaughter for as long as the order remains in force.

**Gelsemium** - Paralysed with fear. The mind can go blank so that they can't think or speak. A feeling of trembling weakness. They want to be quiet and to be left alone. May develop diarrhoea.

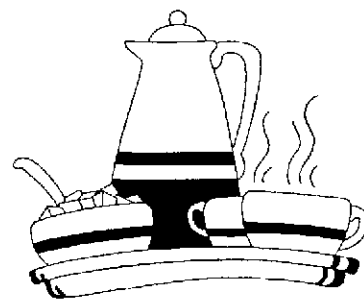
**Kali Phosphoricum** - Nervous exhaustion or headaches from over-working. Sensitive, easily startled and depressed. Forgetful. Sleeplessness.

**Lycopodium** - Great lack of confidence, Irritable and touchy. They tend to prepare meticulously for the event, fear they will fail, but do well all the same. They tend to feel particularly low between 4 and 8pm and may well develop a stomach upset.

**Bach Rescue Remedy** - can help to clam feelings of anxiety, Add 4 drops to a glass of water or small bottle and sip as required. (If there es no water available, it may be taken u diluted.)
