The meeting was a sombre event but advertising for a replacement councillor had to be discussed. The Annual General Meeting took place at the same time and was a brief and purposeful occasion. Councillor Shadrick attended and gave us some interesting facts and figures about the falling number of children in Devon's schools and the rising number of cars on the roads. It was decided that a meeting in July was not necessary due to the fact that there was very little business or correspondence received. At August's meeting an application for the Councillor vacancy was discussed and members are hoping that Grace Millman will accept the position.

A few roads around the parish have been identified as in need of repair. To date all pot holes reported have been repaired quickly. If anyone is aware of any places that do need attention then do not hesitate to report the situation to the County Council or you can inform one of the above council members. Road subsidence, Derworthy side of Matcott Bridge, has been reported and a site visit has been carried out. Work will hopefully be started soon. It is possible that the Torridge District Council's Manor Office, in Holsworthy, may be closed. This will mean the loss of a local access to TDC and result in parishioners having to make the round trip to Bideford. Anyone who feels strongly about this issue should feel free to write to TDC directly or make your views known to a parish council member. A visit from the internal auditor went smoothly and the parish accounts have now been sent for district audit. A public notice will be put up when the accounts have been returned and are available for inspection. The next Parish Council Meeting will be on the third Thursday of September if there is business that needs to be attended to. All parishioners are welcome to attend.

TRIBUTES

Two of our long-term residents have died recently in Deer Park Nursing Home.

ELON CLARKE died suddenly but peacefully on 9th July 2004 aged 83 years. Elon was born on 7th July 1921 at Home Farm, West Chilla. After his marriage to Vera in 1944 they lived at Northlew and then, in 1950, moved to "Pipers Gidcott", where they farmed until 1979, when they moved to "Verlon", Venn Green. Regrettably, Vera died in 1989, but Elon continued to live there until 2000, when due to failing sight he decided to move to Holsworthy. In November 2003, after frequent hospital stays he moved into Deer Park. Elon had been active in the life of the village, including being a member and holding office for the Methodist Church, and was a regular member of the Own 60's Club. Elon retained an active interest in the parish and with an alert mind and good memory enjoyed the company of his many visitors. He is survived by his daughter, Margaret Quance, of Shebbear, and his son, Colin, who now lives in Holsworthy.

EMILY DANIEL died peacefully on 19th August 2004, aged 85 years. Emily was born on 11th November 1918 (hence, her first name of Armistice) at Burrow Farm, Beacon. Upon marriage to the late William Daniel she moved to Woodford Farm and they "retired" to Rouse Villa in 1981, where they lived until William's death in May 2003 and her serious stroke in June 2003. After being in hospital she was moved to Deer Park. Emily was also a member of the Methodist Church, one of the organists, and a supporter of the Circuit Network, concerned with overseas and home missions. She had devoted much of her life to caring for members of her family and most latterly for her husband. She loved gardening and indoor plants, and over the years, helped to "stock" many gardens with cuttings and shrubs. She is survived by her brother, Austin, who continues to live at Burrow, her daughter, Grace Millman, and son, Roger of Woodford Farm.



Know your number. Every year the blood pressure association runs a high profile national blood pressure testing week as part of it's ongoing "know your number" campaign. This year the event runs from September 13th to 19th. There will be specially set up 'pressure stations' in public locations offering information and blood pressure checks. As well as knowing your number there are five simple steps to 'beat the pressure': cut down on salt, eat more fruit and veg, take regular exercise, stick to a healthy weight, keep alcohol intake to recommended limit. Hat trick of wins for Milton Damerel sheep.

A Milton Damerel resident has been celebrating recently following a hat trick of wins with her Hampshire Down sheep at this year's Holsworthy and Stratton Agricultural Show.

Rose Haynes entered three classes with her sheep in the "any other breed" section of the sheep classes at this years show, in it's new location at Killatree (near Pyworthy) on July 29th.

To her delight she succeeded in gaining first place in all three classes and was awarded the reserve championship in the same category.

She commented "I really enjoyed the show and the new show ground is much better, the livestock were integrated in to the rest of the show instead of being hidden away as we felt we were at the old show ground (at Trewyn Road, Holsworthy)."



September in the Garden

September is the month when the garden seems to glow with colour. Apples ready to be picked, berries on trees and shrubs have ripened, leaves are beginning to take on their autumn tints, herbaceous perennials are still flowering. It is, perhaps, the most rewarding month. It is also the main month for planting spring flowering bulbs (with the exception of tulips) to ensure a good display. Bulbs planted now in the greenhouse should flower for Christmas.

Flower arrangers will be gathering seed heads and foliage for perpetual arrangements. They can be preserved by standing their stem ends in a solution of glycerine and water.

Vegetable growers will rewarded for their hard work and be gathering their produce before it is touched by frost. Fruit growers will be harvesting their apples, pears, plums etc and will complete the planting of summer fruiting strawberries. Blackberries in the hedgerows are in abundance.

Winter and Spring flowering pot plants should be bought into a slightly heated greenhouse and you should gradually start to reduce watering and feeding rates of your houseplants.

Complete annual trimming of mature hedges and plant evergreen hedging, shrubs and conifers and trees towards the end of the month.

Begin to raise mower blades and rake the lawn to remove excess fibre and runners of creeping weeds. Top dress with a slow-acting organic fertiliser.

Pot up any half hardy bedding perennials before the first frosts. Remove all small rose buds that are unlikely to open and shorten extra long shoots that may be damaged by autumn gales.

September is a good time to introduce food to a bird table. It is also the month when adders give birth to their brood of vipers.




Open Gardens at Karldavian



The Harvest Festival will be held at the church on 26th September 2004 at 3pm. The church will be open over the weekend if anyone would like to bring produce or help to decorate the church. Refreshments will be available after the service followed by an auction of produce. Everyone is welcome.



The Harvest festival is one of the greatest religious festivals and is celebrated throughout the world. There is no more beautiful sight than churches richly decorated with the fruits of the earth. Rousing hymns, swollen congregations and a giant marrow that nobody ever wants! This time of year is for celebrating the gathering of the harvest and for traditions and customs to make sure that next year's harvest will also be good. In olden days threshing was backbreaking work, which started early in the mornings and continued until the end of the day with neighbours and friends all gathering to belp out. The machine, and all the activity about it, had a special attraction for children. Its moving belts, the noise from inside and the way it put out straw and oats, was as intriguing back then as the latest computer game is today. The harvest time created a sense of urgency, especially before the arrival of the harvesting machinery. Everybody in the community was called out to help, men and women, young and old, master, workpeople, and neighbours. At other times of the year each group had its own work, the men in the fields, the women in the house, and the children at school. Only at harvest time were they all together engaged in the same work. With fine weather and the promise of abundance, it was only natural that there were jokes, pranks, and general merriment, with the anxious farmer unwilling to dampen the high spirits, but trying to ensure that these did not hold up the work. Work complete and the celebrations could begin with a harvest feast. The last sheaf of comto be harvested was used to create a corn dolly by plaiting the wheat stalks to create a straw figure. The corn dolly was then kept until Spring. This is because people believed that the corn spirit lived in the wheat and as the wheat was harvested, the spirit fled to the wheat which remained. By creating the corn dolly the spirit is kept alive for the next year and the new crop. Sometimes the corn dolly is hung up in the barn, sometimes in the farmhouse, and sometimes in the church. In Spring the corn dolly would be ploughed back into the soil.

Why not try and make your own corn dolly and take it to the harvest festivals.

Chocolate and Chestrut Mould

250g plain chocolate broken into pieces.

4 tbs water.

125g butter

125g caster sugar

2 x 227 cans unsweetened chestnut puree

2 tbs brandy

150mls double cream, whipped to decorate or if preferred strawberries or equivalently brightly coloured fruit and a jug of cream on the side.

Place chocolate and water in a small pan and heat gently until melted, remove from heat and allow to cool. Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy, then gradually add chestnut puree beating well between each addition.


Stir in melted chocolate and the brandy.

Turn into a greased 900ml (1.5 pint) mould. Leave in the refrigerator over night to set.


Turn out onto serving dish, a hot knife slid around the edge helps or plunge the dish into warm water, not hot or it will melt the outside. Decorate with whipped cream or fresh fruit.

With an abundance of runner beans at this time of year, why not try this simple but delicious Runner Bean chutney. I am told this is an old local recipe!

8lb Runner Beans 1lb Onions

6lb Demerara Sugar 6Pts Pickling Vinegar

6tbspn Turmeric 6tbspn Mustard Powder 6tbspn Cornflour

Slice Beans and Onions into small pieces. Boil in salted water until tender. Strain well.

(At this stage you can mince or mash with a potato masher if you prefer a smoother chutney.)

Add the Sugar and 5 pts of Vinegar and boil for 15 mins.

Mix the Turmeric, Mustard and Cornflour to a smooth paste with the remaining vinegar then add to the pan and boil for a further 15mins.

Allow to cool slightly before putting into sterilised jars.
