

The parish council met in October and welcomed Grace Millman to her first meeting since her appointment. At this meeting it was agreed that a precept of £1200 for the year would be applied for. This would enable grants to be given to local causes in 2005, as follows:

Youth Club £40.

Parish Hall £150.

Sunday Club £40.

Newsletter £80.

At this meeting plans for a new dwelling next to Town Farm where viewed and discussed. An agricultural determination for Lower Grawley was also dealt with. Since the last newsletter plans for the new dwellings and barn conversion at Town Farm have also been

In November the council discussed the development of a local community self help plan. It was decided that the community could benefit from having a plan if an emergency arose. For example if there was major power failure or some other unexpected situation. I have asked Torridge District Council to send us a model plan to give us some ideas but to date this has not arrived. This will be discussed later at a further date. Cheques where signed for the grants paid to local causes as agreed in the 2003/2004 financial year.

Lack of business meant that there was no need for the council to meet in December and January.

In December we where all shocked and saddened to hear of the sudden death of our chairman, David Poole. He has been very committed to his role of councillor and chairman over the years and was full of knowledge and experience. He will be sadly missed by all of us. Our next meeting in February will be very different without him and a new chairman will have to be appointed.

This sad situation has left a vacancy for anyone willing to give their time and effort to the role of the Parish Council. I expect that advertising the vacancy will be discussed at the next meeting. Please can any interested individuals make their interest known to either myself or any of the councillors listed above.

TRIBUTE

David Poole - A Stalwart of our Community

It was with total disbelief that we received the news that David Poole was very seriously ill, and then, almost immediately, had passed away following several hours of major surgery. The enormity of the news for all who knew David's family seemed nearly too great to bear, and our thoughts and prayers were constant, knowing that we could only seek the comfort and reassurance of Heavenly Father to carry Ann and the family through these unreal days as they cope with this most sad loss. Our deepest sympathies continue to be with the family.

Thoughts for a tribute to David led to thinking about the word "stalwart". The Collins Concise English Dictionary definitions are: "strong and sturdy, robust", "solid, dependable and courageous", "resolute and firm", "a supporter", and these seem very apt as descriptions of David. He was a strong and sturdy farmer and solid in physical stature. He was a solid and dependable member of our community and in the area. His Christian faith was resolute and firm and David was a faithful, loyal member of our chapel, for 40 years. His valued contributions included organist, Sunday School teacher and treasurer, society and property steward. In our community he had served as a governor for Bradworthy Primary School and Holsworthy Community College, a parish councillor for 32 years and the Chairman in recent years; as Chairman of the Parish Hall Committee; and, for 20 years until 2003, was district councillor for the Waldon seat. The District Council paid tribute to David's service as Chairman of the Planning & Development and Trading Services Committees, leader of the Independent Group, and in 1996, Chairman of the Council. His knowledge of local government was extensive and he was resolute and dependable in discharging the duties of the offices he held. He was robust in promoting the interests of rural communities and their continuance. As his selected Chaplain for his period of office as Chairman of the District Council, Rev Patrick Crow was invited to pay tribute at the funeral service on 31st December 2004. In David's year of office we were honoured to have the Civic Service held at Milton Damerel. During his tribute, Rev Crow offered comfort to the very large gathering of family, friends and colleagues of David, with the thoughts that the Father takes to their eternal home those whose work on earth is completed. I am sure that both family and friends would all have considered that David still had much to offer and give to the community and most dearly to his family, as a husband, father and grandfather. However, our thoughts do not necessarily accord with God's great plan and therefore we must claim his comfort in our grief and loss, as David himself would have advised, and at the same time thank God for the fullness of David's life in all its aspects. He will be greatly missed at Milton Damerel and by all who had the privilege of knowing and working with him.



HAPPY EASTER IDEAS!!

Try decorating hard boiled eggs.

Here are a fer

suggestions!

Get an adult to help make dye solution. Cut strips of crepe
release the dye. Remove paper and add tablespoon of white
eggs into cooled dye solution, leave in longer for a deep colour. Place eggs on scrampled aluminium foil to dry.

Another idea using the dye solution - collect a selection of leaves. Secure leaves on eggs using a piece of nylin stocking or tights, wrapping firmly around and tie top with rubber band, dip into dye. Remove excess dye with a tissue and peel off stocking when dry.

Using onion skins either brown or purple – firstly place piece of old cloth on table, put layers of onion skins on to cloth, add pieces of rice or leaves on to onion skins, then place fresh raw egg in shell on top, add another layer of leaves or rice plus onion skins and wrap the cloth around firmly, wrap with rubber bands or string to secure. Place in pan of water and boil for 30 mins. Remove from pan and cool, remove cloth etc., when egg is dry rub with a little cooking oil to give shiny appearance.

When you've decorated your eggs, why notmake a basket for them using a clean marg tub, decorated with foil, tissue or crepe paper. You can paint on to foil or plastic if you add washing up liquid to powder paint - 1 teaspoon per ½ cup of paint. Add a handle made from ribbons.



analysing the needs of the area

establishing contact with young people and offering a safe, confidential "listening ear"

to recruit and train a team of volunteers

to develop a mobile resource facility taking equipment into very rural areas

to support existing youth work where appropriate...... and so on.

In order to show support with this venture a small amount of fund-raising is required to help achieve the grant so on Friday, 4th March there will be an ANTIQUES & COLLECTABLES ROADSHOW from 7pm at the Methodist Schoolroom with Desserts and Coffee. But if you haven't got anything to bring just come along and enjoy a feast of gateaux, trifles, and other delicious puddings.

WELCOME GLO

This area is to have an international Teacher and Preacher visiting during March. Rev. Glorian Bonnette of Seattle, USA is planned to preach at our church on Sunday, 13th March at 11am. Glo, as she likes to be called, has a worldwide ministry covering 35 countries, including Malaysia, Singapore and Poland, where she spends a month each year living and working in the slum areas. For over 12 years Glo has been regularly visiting Cornwall on preaching engagements, but she now feels called into this area. During her ministry she has experienced miracles and many 'God incidences'. She has recently written two books on her experiences, which are to be published soon. From a childhood of abuse, Glo progressed through four marriages, all ending in divorce. Finally she desperately cried out to God for help and her life totally turned around; the rest as they say is history! Glo will be delighted to welcome any-one to hear her on 13th March.

FRIENDSHIP CLUB UPDATE

The Friendship Club meets on the last Monday each month from 2.30 till approx. 3.30pm in the Schoolroom, and "friends" attend from Milton and other parishes. There is no charge. If like me you enjoy eating out or maybe you have a special occasion to celebrate here are a few suggestions of some local and not so local eating-places.

Although I myself have not yet been there, I have been recommended to try the "Bickford Arms", now fully refurbished, the food I believe is delicious the only complaint being that there is usually a bit of a wait before your food arrives, apparently this being because each order is freshly cooked, no bad thing as nothing is worse than kept warm vegetables. The price is about average.

For those with more exotic tastes try the "Bay of Bengal", where you will always receive a very warm welcome from the owners and staff. I have been there, and can say that the food is delicious. They have an extensive menu and are

once again reasonably priced, booking is not always necessary but for a large party advisable. A bit further afield try the "Duke of York" at Iddesleigh, but be warned if you want Bar food you will have to be prepared to wait, and don't be a shrinking violet or you will be waiting a long time for a table.!!!!!!! The restaurant really has to be booked, the last time I was there the price was £16 for a 2 course meal or £20 for a 3 course, prices may have gone up since. Believe me unless you have an enormous appetite 2 courses are plenty, the portions are very generous. The menu is extensive with a good selection of meat and seafood, plain and fancy, something to suit everyone. Try the scallops wrapped in streaky bacon starter, delicious, the steaks are always thick and full of flavour. I believe all the meat is reared on the owner's own farm or bought locally. A very nice place for that special occasion, it's not cheap but for the quality of food worth it.

More for you to try next time. Bon appetite.

Warming Watercress Soup

Method:-

Place salmon in a blender, reserving a few for garnish. Melt the butter and mix with lemon juice and cream, add to the salmon and blend until smooth.

Season with pepper to taste and spoon into ½ pint dish.

Refrigerate until set.

Leave at room temperature for 30 mins before serving. Garnish with the remaining salmon and cucumber.
