Since the report was written for the last newsletter there have been three meetings. Held on the regular third Thursdays of November and January with an extra meeting on the 3rd January to deal, primarily with a planning application which had to be returned sooner than the scheduled meeting.

Planning applications received during this period were for Kites Cottage, Woodford Farm and Kittabear. An application for Agricultural Determination was received for East Wonford Farm.

Following the parish footpaths walk and his own survey, the DCC Rights of Way Warden has informed the Parish Council that works are to be carried out to fit two new stiles, fix a gate and handrail and re-erect two signs. We are grateful to all those involved in these tasks.

PCSO Raquel Rowe attended the January meeting and reported that the Neighbourhood Watch start up was slowly making progress and has agreed to attend further meetings on a quarterly basis so we look forward to seeing her again in April.

The issue of road safety was raised at the last meeting, in particular, with regards the safety of horses and riders. All road users are urged to take great care on the roads, especially on the narrow lanes and to be aware of what might be on the road, round the next bend, be it tractor, car, bike, horse or pedestrian.

Parish organisations have received their 2006 grants and the precept for 2007-2008 was completed in November. This is the money collected with council tax that is paid to the Parish Council to fund the Council and enable it to make grants to support local organisations. The Parish Council's contribution to the Parish Plan project has been agreed and the funding application for the remaining bulk of the cost has been completed.

The annual audit of Parish Council accounts to the year ended 31st March 2006 has been successfully completed and the accounts were displayed on the Parish Hall notice board in December.

Finally a word of thanks to Anne Binns who retired as Parish Clerk at the end of November after over three years in the post. I hope that I, as the new clerk, can continue to serve as well as Anne did.

Making your mark in local elections

2007 is Local Election year. Councillors stand for re-election every 4 years. Any casual vacancies that arise during the 4 year term are usually filled by co-option. There are 7 seats on Milton Damerel Parish Council. Should more than 7 candidates be nominated to stand for election then voting would take place on **Thursday 3rd May 2007**.

Parish and Town Councils provide a line of communication between the community and District Council. Parish Councillors are there to listen to the concerns of the community. Parish Council meetings are open to the public. The meetings are advertised on the parish notice boards at the Parish Hall and Horrellsford Garage for the three days prior to the meeting.

Parish and Town Councils depend on local people taking an interest in what happens in their communities. Whatever their background, local people standing as councillors can bring a wealth of knowledge and community understanding into the local team. Parish and Town Councils are exactly the same, whether large or small they are there to understand and represent the community needs and to provide or support local services.

To find out what is involved in being a Councillor contact the Parish Clerk for more information. The Notice of Election will be published in early March when Nomination forms will be available from the Parish Clerk or Torridge District Council.

Electors should ensure that their name is on the Electoral Register so that you can support your community and vote. Copies of the Electoral Register are kept at TDC Manor Offices in Holsworthy and by the Parish Clerk. It's your right to vote so don't miss out. If you vote you choose who will take decisions on your behalf.

PARISH PLANNING

The steering group has met on three occasions since September and an application for grant funding from the Community Council of Devon was submitted in late January. The Parish Council and our County Council Councillor have also committed funds to our project to have a local plan for Milton Damerel.

We have looked at the steps required over the next 12 months and drawn up a draft timetable of the activities we will need to complete, including some research on the profile of our population, compiling a questionnaire for all households to contribute their views on what is important for the village, and then collating all this into an Action Plan.

At our meeting on 9th February we were delighted to report the grant application has been successful and funds should be issued in the next two weeks. We also agreed the overall aim and objectives for the project, namely:

"...The aim is for the community of Milton Damerel to participate in producing a parish plan. The purpose of the plan is:
to compile a "snap shot" of the parish now, which will be a historical record for the future – a community profile
to consult the community and find out what people value, want to preserve or change, and empower them to achieve
these

to find ways to improve the parish and the lives of those who live and work here and agree how to make it happen – an action plan

to produce a document that will be:

useful for local projects and a point of reference when seeking funds or assistance from outside agencies a reference source for statutory bodies when drawing up policies and making decisions that affect the parish..."

We hope this is a readable, understandable statement and will be pleased to receive any comments on it. We also began our thinking on what needs to be included in a community profile, such information as the nature of our population, facilities and services, which we want to finalise at the next meeting, together with discussing the types of questions to be included in the household questionnaires.

We anticipate the project will start in March, and our next meeting is on Friday, 2nd March at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. Each step during the year will be widely publicised and seeking the involvement of everyone, - clubs, businesses, young and older people, special interest groups, etc.-, and will include open events, probably at the Parish Hall.

Anyone wishing to join the steering group will be most welcome; please contact Anne Binns (tel: 261381) or Grace Millman (tel: 261251). There will be several opportunities for volunteers to be involved, as, for the grant funding, we need to show a significant contribution of voluntary assistance. So please let us know if you can assist or join the group.

Happy New Year to you all!


The New Year is a great time to reflect on all that is past and make plans for the year ahead and it seems the work of the project is no more immune to this than the rest of us!!


2006 saw the birth of the projects work and consequently the re-launch of Milton Damerel's Youth Group, a trip to Delirious and a youth leaders training day, both in Exeter. I spent many evenings visiting youth groups that were already established and generally meeting allsorts of people in hope to gain a clearer picture of youth work in the area. On top of this the project joined forces with North Devon Youth Services in Torrington to deliver an extensive survey among young people to develop an accurate view of youth work in the area and the needs of the young people who access it. This was a very major piece of work, and, very exciting. Unfortunately, responses were very low and we have been unable to draw any conclusions from the research. On a positive note, and, now looking into 2007, we hope to re-launch the needs analysis survey *** and try to deliver it slightly differently in order to get a greater response. Equally, if this is the first time you have heard about the needs analysis survey, and you wish to take part, please feel free to contact me, alternatively, go to www.shebbearyouth.org.uk and follow the link and you can take part online.

So, what does the future hold? Early in January we will see the first ever North Devon Christian Youth Workers Network where anyone involved in Youth Work in any form, in North Devon can get together share resources, ideas and support. We will also see the start up of a new youth club in Black Torrington (subject to a planning meeting on the 19th January) and a trip to the Christian Resources Exhibition in Exeter on the 26th of January. We extend a very warm welcome and invitation to any-one wishing to come along to our regular services/meetings/clubs. Just come along to any events/clubs you see advertised, or if you would want to know more or have an introduction, please contact any of the leaders.

COMMUNITY SURVEY – We were delighted with the number of responses to our survey distributed in the summer – thank you to everyone for taking the time to answer the questions. We have tried to summarise the answers and comments received from 42 respondents, which were:

Apart from one "not interested" response, all confirmed their awareness of the Chapel in the village, with 19 visiting for special services, etc., 9 visiting for worship, 2 to visit family graves, whilst 11 did not visit and were unlikely to.

Only 3 respondents did not consider the village's churches to be important/significant part of the community, whilst many provided positive comment on their purpose within the community. Generally, most expressed there would be a sense of sadness if either of the churches closed. Several comments were made on the role the churches should have in the community, such as bringing people together, supporting those with needs, lonely, in despair, etc., and providing services and encouraging community spirit.

A few proposals were made on how the churches could be helpful. 36 positively responded that they felt able to contact the church or someone of the church, whilst 20 responded they would be unlikely to come to church if the style was different. It was noted there may have been some confusion on the question about Alpha course, but possibly up to 10 had responded positively; similarly on discussions about Christian matters. 9 respondents already receive MAP**, 7 indicated would like to receive and 21 declined the offer.

From the responses and comments we have agreed the following actions:

Services:

- Rev Wheeler will be developing "more inclusive" worship for services led by him, that is encouraging those present to join in and offer prayers, volunteer to read, discuss and ask questions about the readings or sermons, choose hymns, etc. It is emphasised all this will be voluntary, at the behest of those present, and an opportunity to 'feed in' if would like to do so.
- To advertise the weeknight events in our area for those looking for opportunities to meet and worship, other than Sunday services, namely, Bradford Village Hall on Thursdays @ 7.30pm with fortnightly Communion services starting on 25th January, and Trinity Rock on the last Friday of each month at Lake @ 7.30pm. These are open to any-one of any or no denomination

Opportunities for Discussions:

- In light of interest in an Alpha course, Sheila Daniel will contact Newton St Petrock and Putford on the idea of running a course jointly for the 3 parishes and to consider starting a course in September. Whether you responded to the questionnaire, please contact Sheila if you are interested in joining an Alpha course and please look out for the publicity on Alpha.
- With publicity on Alpha to advertise "Discussions on Christian matters" which will be led by our Minister, Rev David Wheeler, and welcomes
 anyone interested in talking about such issues as Evil in the World.

Use of our Premises for Community:

- A garden area in the graveyard, involving the Milton Monsters club, and a garden seat to be provided, for those visiting graves or just passing.
- Coffee mornings to continue on the last Saturday quarterly, and to include a speaker/visitor/special interest on each occasion
- More promotion of the Friendship Club, the opportunity for meeting together once a month for "a cup of tea" and to hear about some interesting adventures, experiences, etc., and to support Children's Hospice South West with the bring and buy stall.

** MAP is the Magazine and Plan published by the Shebbear Methodist Circuit, in February, May, August and November, containing many articles on Christian views, current affairs, events in the Circuit, etc and includes the lists (plan) of Sunday services and preachers for all the chapels

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Pan-fried pheasant with wilted spinach and caramelised onion sauce Rose Haynes

Preparation time less than 30 mins Cooking time 10 to 30 mins

Ingredients

For the onions

1/2 onion, finely chopped 30g/1oz butter 2 tbsp red wine 1/2 stock cube salt and freshly ground black pepper knob of butter

For the pheasant.

1 pheasant breast salt and freshly ground black pepper a little oil, for cooking 1 clove of garlic, chopped sprig of thyme

For the spinach

handful of spinach leaves knob of butter salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

- 1. To cook the onions, melt the butter in a saucepan over a medium heat.
- 2. Add the chopped onions and stir occasionally. Allow the onions to caramelise slightly.
- 3. Add the red wine and crumble over the stock cube. Cook for two minutes until the liquid has reduced.
- 4. Finish off the onions by adding a knob of butter to the pan.
- 5. To cook the pheasant, preheat the oven to 200C/400F/Gas 6. Heat a sauté pan with a little oil.
- 6. Season the pheasant breast with salt and pepper and place into the pan, skin-side down.
- 7. Cook for about two minutes until the skin is golden brown. Turn the breast over to cook the other side for one minute.
- 8. Add the thyme and chopped garlic to the pan. Place the pan into the preheated oven for 4-5 minutes until the breast is cooked through.
- 9. Pan-fry the spinach leaves with a knob of butter.
- 10. Season with salt and pepper.
- 11. Serve the pheasant breast on the caramelised onions with the pan-fried spinach.

"MILTON SCHOOL DAYS"

In approximately 1839 a village school was built at Fore Street cross on the left-hand side of the road which leads towards Shebbear. This school was destined to be in use for only 32 years. In 1876 the Charity Commissioners were informed that the trustees of the school wished to dispose of the building as the school had for 5 years been totally disused.

I was amazed to find a photograph of this building in the archives in the early 1990s. Although the building itself looked disused and not the best condition it is hard today to believe the school ever stood there as there is no sign of it

whatsoever! Young Jack Curtis, who lived just across the way at Cross Cottage was one who attended this school. He only had a short amble across the road each morning. Stanley Walters from Northtown Farm was Jack's best pal at school. His sister, Eunice, used to tell us that if Jack wasn't there, Stanley refused to stay at school.

In those days the village children would congregate in the middle of the road, which was just a rough track, in order to play marbles and other games. I can imagine the clatter of hobnail boots as the village children hurried down Fore Street to get to the school on time!

It was stated in the history file at Holsworthy Library that this school 'has been disused owing to the erection of other schools under a School Board in the Parish.' I've never heard where these schools were situated so if anyone out there has any idea I'd be interested to know for inclusion in the newsletter

It was in the early 1900s that the village school first started up at the Methodist Schoolrooms and there it stayed until 1972, when Milton lost its school and children were bussed to Bradworthy.

More about the school in future newsletters. I would be really pleased to have your old school memories whether you were at Milton or not.

Have your say on Post Office changes, Citizens Advice urges public

How would you be affected if your local post office closed? Citizens Advice is giving people a chance to have their say on the future of the post office network through an online survey, launched today (4th January) on the national charity's website www.adviceguide.org.uk

The quick and easy survey asks about the Post Office services people use, what they value about post offices and how the community they live in would be affected if their local branch were to close.

Other questions aim to find out how often people use their post office, how easy it would be to get to another branch, and where they would go to get the same services if their local post office was no longer available.

The answers will help shape the charity's response to the government's consultation on the future of the post office network.

Citizens Advice social policy officer Tony Herbert said: "People often say that post offices play an important community role. We want to find out whether this is really true, and if so, what people think that role is. We also want to hear what, if anything, people really value about the post office – do post offices really provide a unique service, or could what they do be done equally well by a range of other providers? The results of the survey will also give us a clearer idea of who would be most affected by the loss of local branches, and what impact on their lives would be - from the additional costs in travelling further, to any extra inconvenience.

We can't escape the fact that for the network to remain viable, some changes to the way services are provided are inevitable. But we want to make sure that, as its review gets underway, the Government does not lose sight of the role of the post office at the heart of the community. We want to see a post office network that meets people's needs. Our survey will provide ordinary people with the opportunity to make sure their opinions are "heard".

Viruses and Spyware

If you're a computer user and spend any time surfing the internet you could leave yourself exposed to small programs that automatic install themselves on your PC. To understand the difference you have to understand what a Virus and Spyware is and does.

Virus: A program created to cause disruption by deleting files or causing errors within the computer. At worst, a virus can render a computer unusable by clearing the 'brain' of the PC, thus the computer can never start.

Spyware: Mainly designed to monitor your internet activity to offer you a better 'experience' by learning your surfing habits or hobby, e.g., if you look for fishing items, then the Spyware will direct you to fishing websites—even if you were looking for something different. However, in extreme cases the Spyware will monitor your keystrokes so when your typing in your online banking details this information is then relayed to a criminal somewhere in the world.

What you can do

Installing a good quality Anti Virus will stop viruses getting into your system, however a lot of the 'free' programs available on the net unfortunately let many viruses onto the system so you <u>must</u> buy cover to protect yourself. Sadly there are very few Spyware applications to protect the user. In my experience some of the 'free' Spyware programs actually allows Spyware to

happen, and Anti Virus programs are not currently able to handle Spyware removal

efficiently.

So, how do you know if you have Spyware? Simple. Odd things happening, you go to a website that you hadn't planned on going to, extra toolbars within Internet Explorer (eg, MyWay, MySearch, Hotbar), or the computer generally feels sluggish.

To prevent Spyware is relatively simple. Don't visit 'dubious' sites, when your want to trial a new software package, check to see if it comes with 'paid for advertising', and avoid using Internet Explorer. Firefox is another web browser which does not allow

automatic installations of programs that cause havoc, whereas IE allows programs to install automatically without user intervention.

A good place to visit if your concerned with Spyware is **www.spywareguide.com** and run their online free scanner. It may not clear every nasty on your PC, but it will deal with the most common.
