Since the report was written for the last newsletter there have been three monthly meetings held on the third Thursdays of February, March and April and a short meeting on the 2nd March to deal with a planning matter.

Planning applications received during this period were for Woodland View and Blackberry Farm.

Two applications for Agricultural Determination were received for Chapel View and Higher Gidcott..

PCSO Raquel Rowe attended the April meeting and informed the meeting that there had been no reported community crime in Milton Damerel this year but sadly the very next day we were advised that the solar panel from the flashing warning sign at Waldon Hill had been stolen. Anyone with information about this should contact the Police central number: 08452 777444, quoting Log 620.

At the end of March the Council notified Highways of a number of pot holes in the Parish roads. We were advised that their annual survey of the roads had marked various points requiring repair and they would attend to them the following week. Regrettably at the time of writing, the yellow paint is wearing off the holes before they have been filled in. On another maintenance matter, the Lengthsmen, who's primary function is to keep the road network free of water by opening grips and easements and by carrying out minor cleaning on the Public Highway are scheduled to visit the Parish a number of times over the year. If there are any places that require the attention of the Lengthsmen please advise the Clerk or one of the Councillors so that it can be brought to the attention of the Highways Superintendent in time for their next visit.

The accounts for the year ending 31st March 2007 closed with the Parish Council having funds of £272. As part of the Annual Audit process the Parish Council accounts will be available for electors to exercise their rights to inspect the accounts. The arrangements for this will be advertised on the Parish Council notice boards at the Garage and Parish Hall

Following the Local Election process in May the above six members were returned uncontested to the Parish Council for the new 4 year term, The remaining seat has to be filled by co-option Mr Charles Bellew decided not to stand for re-election and we must offer our most grateful thanks to him for 28 years of loyal service to Milton Damerel Parish Council, his long experience will be greatly missed.

The Shebbear Ecumenical Youth Project

Doesn't time fly! Things with the project are going really well, so well I can't keep up with it!

Thanks to an anonymous donation, the project has now got the use of motor home. The project plans to use this vehicle to deliver detached work around the area. Detached work is a specific style of youth work where workers meet the young people where they're at, rather than expecting them to get to a meeting place. This style of youth work is perfect for an area such as ours where young people are isolated and struggled to get around. The motor home acts as a perfect vehicle for this by enabling us to take resources out to young people.

This is obviously an exciting time for the project and work from the motor home will be a major part of the projects work in the area. Our hope is that through extra contact with young people we can begin to develop more opportunities for young people, with young people. Over the past nine months the project has made plenty of contacts with others involved in youth work which has given us a really good understanding of the area and what is available for the young people living here. The use of the motor home will be another way to bring these opportunities out to the young people.

As I said this is a really exciting time for the project, and hopefully you share this excitement with us. However, the work is dependant on volunteers and can only develop as the number of volunteers increases. We would really like to encourage anyone who feels able to volunteer, to get in touch. As a volunteer you would join Lizz, the full time worker, on the motor home for a few hours a fortnight. MILTON DAMEREL SCHOOL 1939-1945: SOME MEMORIES

.....from Ken German, an "old boy" of the parish.....

.....I started at the school at the age of 5 in the summer of 1939. We lived about half a mile away at Milton Mill Cottage, the house where I was born.

I understand that my mother took me in the very early days but I don't remember. My earliest recollection is having a "lift" on Nancy Piper's pony, both of us in the saddle at the same time! I don't know where the pony went while we were in school, probably grazing in the school playing field behind the school, I expect. We had a couple of very cold winters at that time with a lot of snow and ice. The roads were so slippery that we could not stand up safely with the hob nail boots which all of us country boys wore at that time. My mother helped to solve the problem by putting a pair of my Dad's old woollen socks over the top of the whole boot giving a much better grip than the nails on ice.

.....When I started at school there must have been between 30 – 35 pupils I expect. Then the Second World War started and a large number of London evacuee children arrived in the parish staying with many families who had room in their houses. Around this time we were issued with our personal "gas masks" in their brown cardboard boxes. We all hated gas mask drill and to this day I don't really like the smell of new rubber! When the drill took place we all left the school buildings and went down the lane towards the woods below the school where we could hide under some large thick hawthorn bushes out of sight of enemy aircraft, if the school was attacked. Fortunately this, of course, never happened, but I remember being very worried because on the wireless there was constant talk of a German invasion. Due to the number of pupils now in the parish, another classroom was opened up with another teacher. This was in the room, which we used to call the Boardroom. This was where all the tables and benches were kept for the teas and other functions put on by the Chapel. Now I believe it is where the Youth Group meets.

.....During the War the whole country was urged to "Dig for Victory" and grow as much food for yourself as possible. The children did their bit by doing some gardening at the house of our teacher, a Mrs Arthur Hancock. She lived down just past "Crossways" or Strawberry Bank as some people used to call it. There was quite an area of "wet lawn" which we dug up and planted potatoes and green vegetables. These were used in the school canteen. All lunches were cooked on the school premises and very good they were, I remember. Mrs Larkworthy was the cook, I believe, with other helpers.

.....Some of the evacuee children stayed in the area for the rest of their lives, others returned to London but kept in touch and visited the friends they had made here.

....I mentioned Mrs Hancock, our teacher, who started me on a life time interest in "stamp collecting". She gave me a few stamps to start my collection and I still have the same ones to this day over 60 years later! Arthur Hancock, her husband, had an excellent collection at that time and I was privileged to go to their house to see it. I did now know how good it was, of course, at that time, but realized in later years how well put together it was.

....Towards the end of my education at Milton, my mother had to go into hospital to rest. She was expecting my brother David and wasn't well. My sister Thelma and I went to stay with our grandparents on their farm, Southcoombe, near Holsworthy. We went into school by a "school bus", quite an adventure. One of the things that stands out in my mind is that one day we were asked to take turns in reading aloud to the whole class. My turn came and I did my bit and when I was told to stop by the teacher, who I think was the headmaster, he said to the class "There children, that's the way to read, that's Milton Damerel school for you." I remember being very proud of what our little village school had taught me.

....At this time we had a Head Mistress, called Mrs Thomas, who was teaching me. She was very firm but a good teacher. One day she informed us that we would be going into Holsworthy to "Big School" to take an exam to decide where our future education would take place. This was, of course, the Eleven Plus, as it was later known, but at that time I had no idea what the exam meant.

....We were collected by bus one day in the Spring of 1945 and went to Holsworthy and sat the exam. During the summer term of that year we were walking to school from Milton Mill and as we approached "Pentreve", the house where Mrs Thomas lived, she opened a window and called out excitedly "Kenneth, you have won a scholarship to Queen Elizabeth's School, Crediton." I don't remember how I reacted at that time because we didn't know of anyone else who had done this. A girl called Annie Prouse from Whitebeare Cross, also passed at the same time and went to Tiverton Grammar School, I believe.

.....As the years have passed I realized what a good basic education our village school at Milton Damerel had given me.

..And those in the parish who attended the school in the late 50s/ early 60s remember Ken calling at school to replace the "wet batteries" for the school wireless, which was stored in the very large wooden cupboard, which has now been sold! GM.





An invitation for everyone to come along at some time during the two days was delivered to most households in the Parish, so we do hope you took the opportunity to come along if you were able to.

Local businesses were invited to have displays at the event and we were delighted to have Flowerbed Ed, RAW Piper & Sons, and Woodford Bridge Hotel & Country Club, all with colourful and impressive information about their products and services, and employment opportunities. Parish organisations were also invited to take display space and the Milton & Damerel Over 60s Club and Methodist Church responded with much information about their activities. Thank you to all for your active support of the event.

About 10% of the parish residents actually came along and contributed an interesting



variety of comments and ideas, which will now be used as the basis for the household questionnaire, and this will be issued in the Summer, either delivered personally to all households or be available by e-mail *** see below*. We also anticipate there will be separate opportunities, in the form of a questionnaire or similar, for children and young people to respond.

The questionnaires will be your opportunity to let us know the things that are important to you and your families .. and more importantly, will inform later discussions on the action plan of what is needed to change/improve the parish and the lives of those who live here. Your views are critical!!

What did we cover at the consultation event?

The Parish Hall was filled with displays showing a wide range of information, which invited comments from those attending on the issues, asking what were favourable, what were unfavourable, and what should be changed. The topics were:

Lambs Liver Pate

115 mins plus cooling

Serves 4-6

Ingredients

225g/8oz Streaky Bacon, derinded and stretched

225g/8oz Lambs Liver, finely minced

450g/1lb minced Lamb, (preferably not too lean)

1 Onion, finely chopped

2 teasp Tomato Paste

½ teasp Dried Sage

½ teasp Dried Rosemary

Salt and Black Pepper

90ml/3fl.oz. Dry Cider

50g/2oz Melted Butter

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Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4 and line the base and sides of a terrine or small loaf tin with the bacon rashers. Set aside.
- 2. Place the remaining ingredients in a large mixing bowl and mix, using your hands, to combine thoroughly.
- 3. Transfer the mixture to the prepared terrine, pressing it down firmly to remove any air pockets.
- 4. Cover with aluminium foil and place in a roasting dish filled with about 5 cm/2 inches of hot water. Bake in the oven for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.
- 5. Once cooked, remove from the oven and place a weight on top of the foil. Allow to cool at room temperature.
- 6. Once cold, refrigerate for 6 hours before turning out.

Information from CAB:

Q. My bills got a bit out of hand in the last few months and my finances are in a bit of a mess as a result. I started getting calls from debt collectors about my credit card, so I paid that, but it meant I missed a mortgage payment instead. The way things are going it looks like I'm not going to be able to pay this month either.

A. When debts start to mount up it's easy to be panicked into paying the creditors who shout the loudest first. but you must make mortgage payments your top priority – you could lose your home if you don't pay. You only need to miss two or three payments before your lender takes you to court and you are at risk of repossession.

Always let your mortgage lender know if you're having problems - don't just stop paying or miss payments. But if you do start to fall behind with mortgage payments, its time to get free, independent advice as soon as possible. Contact your local Citizens Advice Bureau (see www.adviceguide.org.uk or your local phone book for details) or phone National Debtline on 0808 808 4000.


Never ignore court papers and court hearings – do attend court, but get advice first.

If you're suddenly out of work or unable to work because of illness or injury, check for any payment protection insurance you may have.

Your local CAB can help you sort out your debt problems, negotiate with creditors, and check for any additional income you may be due such as tax rebates, benefits or tax credits. They can also help you get back on track by taking a long hard look at what you have coming in and going out, and helping you make sure that in future you take control of your finances rather than letting them take control of you.

SOME CURRENT ADVICE FROM OUR POLICE COMMUNITY SUPPORT OFFICER.......I would like to advise everyone in the community to be aware and vigilant, especially since the last shed burglaries that had occurred recently in Putford and Thornbury areas. My advice for people, who have valuable things stored in their shed is to have a good padlock on their sheds, good lighting, store items in the area that cannot be seen by the window, and never leave valuable things around the vicinity.

The WEEE (Waste Electrical & Electronic Equipment) Regulations became law on 2 January 2007, but what does it mean to you?

For consumers it means that anything that displays the symbol on the right, that item must be disposed of correctly. For example all electrical resellers must be on a 'take back' scheme where-by you buy a new TV and they take the old one away free of charge. Older equipment can be disposed of it by taking it to a recycling centre. Generally it will be free for consumers to dispose of waste using the take back method, however some companies can make a charge to dispose of equipment that was not specifically purchased from them. Always check before disposing of that old washing machine or computer.

MILTON DAMEREL & DISTRICT 'OVER 60' CLUB



...There are currently 32,952 ALPHA courses running in 158 countries around the world; from Albania to Vietnam, people from all over the world are coming together to explore the Christian Faith through the use of ALPHA. Courses are being run in such diverse venues as prisons and universities, from large and grand venues to small country communities and home groups.

Adventurer, *Bear Grylls* recently helped launch a new series of ALPHA events. Bear is pictured on ALPHA promotional material standing at the top of Snowdonia, the caption reads "Is there more to life then this?" His TV series "Ultimate Survival" is due to be shown on Channel Four this year. Bear admits that his faith is a huge part of his life giving him confidence to do some of his dare-devil adventures, such as swimming in crocodile infested rivers!! Bear and his wife Shara went on an ALPHA course about two years ago.
