Since the last newsletter report was written there have been three regular monthly meetings, May, June and July. The Parish Council AGM and the Annual Parish Meetings where also both held on 17th May.

At the Parish Council AGM the 6 newly elected councillors signed their 'Declaration of Acceptance of Office of Councillor' and elected Gareth Piper to serve as Chairman for the year and Grace Millman was elected Vice Chairman. The vacant seat was filled at the May Parish Council meeting by co-option and Mr John Webb attended his first Parish Council meeting in June.

There were various planning matters to be considered during this period including full planning applications from East Wonford Cottage, West Wonford Farm, Elmfield, Moor View Farm and an amended scheme at Town Farm An application for Agricultural Determination was received for Withypool Farm and Certificate of Lawful Development was considered for Wonford Park Farm.

In May a new Code of Conduct for Parish Councils was published and this was formally adopted by Milton Damerel Parish Council on 19th July 2007.

At the Annual Parish Meeting Parish organisations reported on their activities over the last year and the guest speaker was Ricky McCormack, Head of Operational Services at Torridge District Council who spoke passionately about recycling and waste disposal. He spoke about the efforts being made in Torridge to increase the number of types of materials that can be recycled. He also explained how the savings from no longer providing black bags would be redirected to other aspects of rubbish disposal.

Every household in the parish is entitled to have a green box and green bag for their weekly recycling collection from the roadway. Anyone not having a box & bag can arrange to get them by contacting the Recycling Team at Westcombe Depot Tel; 01237 428734 or E-mail; recycling@torridge.gov.uk.

<u>The recycling pavilions</u> have recently been repaired and they are still in operation but we have been asked to remind users that they must NOT leave rubbish such as cardboard, plastic bags and plastic containers and packaging in the pavilions. Cardboard can be taken to the Recycling Centre at Anvil Corner.

The following items may be left in the pavilions or the green boxes & bags;

Plastic bottles, glass jars & bottles, food tins, drinks cans, aluminium foil and aerosol cans.

(Please remove all plastic tops first) Newspapers, magazines, catalogues and telephone books.

If you require any further information please contact the Recycling Team as above.

From the many items of correspondence received by the Parish Council readers may be interested in a letter from Holsworthy Motor Club Ltd advising that they will be holding their "Roger Pole Taw & Torridge" classic reliability trail on Sunday 23rd September 2007. There will be about 50 cars and 40 motorcycles taking part and they will be passing through the parish twice on that day. The first vehicles should come up the A388 from Holsworthy on their way to Stibb Cross about 10.30am. They will return from Torrington in the afternoon turning right at Shop Cross at about 2.45pm on their way to Abbots Bickington. The Clerk of the Course hopes that they will cause no nuisance to anyone.

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

HARVEST FESTIVAL – With harvesting all around us, we are planning our Harvest Festival week-end for 14th & 15th October. The chapel will be open on Friday, 12th October for decorating and bringing in of flowers, produce, etc. The usual arrangements will apply – families or anyone able to take responsibility for a window or area are most welcome to call in at any time during the day, with their contributions and to share in the task of expressing our thankfulness for the harvest again. The Rev John Carne, the Chairman of the Plymouth & Exeter Methodist District is our guest preacher for the morning service on 14th October at 11am. Do come along and join us. CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE – At a recent meeting we reported on several matters concerning the graveyard. The garden area established in the spring has been producing a variety of vegetables and the floral displays. The Monster Club (and in particular, their parents) have a rota for weeding duties. A waterbutt has been installed, which means visitors placing flowers on graves can find a water supply again – you may need to have a suitable container for carrying the water required. It is a health and safety requirement that we ensure all the grave stones are securely fixed and we try to check this once a year. We will contact families/relatives if we find a stone is insecure. We will also be planning the re-building of the wall by the copper beech tree later in the year – in the meantime, we ask every-one to take care as the wall is being damaged by the roots of the tree and stones are beginning to fall out of the wall. Warning signs are displayed. We are also concerned about the deteriorating condition of the décor in the Schoolroom, but will be asking for expert opinion on the condition of the roof before starting any redecorations.

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MILTON DAMEREL 50 YEARS ON

We held another of the walks on 10th August taking the route from just beyond Great Derworthy to Venn Green and then to Milton Town, for a BBQ at the Methodist Schoolroom. The original text from "Milton Damerel in 1951, Prepared by Seymour Marks on behalf of Milton Damerel Parish Council" is reproduced below, with changes to the parish shown in bold italic print thereafter.

VENN GREEN TO GREAT DERWORTHY

The first house in Derworthy Lane is the post office, which was moved about 30 years ago from Milton Town. Since then it has become a whole-time business. It shares with the Beacon post office the delivery of letters once a day.

The first houses are now a bungalow and a house built in the garden and on the opposite of the road, a house built in the field at the rear of Tor View and two bungalows further along. There are now no Post Offices in the parish or at Holsworthy Beacon.

A few yards along is a small cottage, the pump for which is on the opposite side of the road, while some distance farther on is a railway bungalow.

The railway bungalow ceased to exist after a fire in the early 1960s – although some of us on the walk can recall the events of the night when the fire occurred.

Moor View has a commanding position on the hill overlooking a wide expanse of country. It stands in Victorian loneliness without one tree to keep it company. It is almost at the corner of the lane leading to Great Derworthy, which possesses a different sort of solitariness, as the lane beyond the farm wanders in a vague way to somewhere in the beyond.

A bungalow to serve the farm of Moor View was built in the 1990s.

Great Derworthy is somewhat of a disappointment at first glance, as it is a modern building of nineteenth-century uncompromising primness, shared by the two semi-detached workers' cottages beyond. Turning from the latter, however, the eye is caught by an open space with a tall tree near one side of it, which surely in days gone by must have been the evening gathering-place of the many retainers who staffed the former house in medieval days. Yes, it must have been an important centre at one time, as witness the farm buildings, especially the tithe barn, though tiles and much corrugation have now taken the place of thatched roofs. Alas, for the days of metal and cement!

....At the corner of Derworthy Lane (with the main road) is a house once the Courtenay Arms the family name of the Earl of Devon, Lord of the Manor. It was a resting-place for the Plymouth-Bideford coaches, the stables, now storehouses, being opposite. There was a skittle alley in the narrow piece of land adjoining the house.

The house is now named Tor View.

....Venn Green, or Fenne Green (there is mention in a document of 1333 of John of Fenne), though it is not strictly speaking the centre of the parish, its position on the main road, with the surrounding buildings, leads passers-by to assume it is. On the left are two thatched cob cottages, adjoining the one-time red brick smithy, two cob cottages lying back from the road, now unoccupied, and two houses built in 1890, one originally the residence of the parish constable, who never failed to get a drink at closing time and leave the company with "I'm going now".

The cottages described here have now disappeared – they were along the A388 towards Holsworthy. Two bungalows now replace the cob cottages and smithy, although retains the name of The Forge. Beyond the two houses built in 1890, now one residence, there is an additional bungalow.

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VENN GREEN TO MILTON TOWN

....At Venn Green we turn left (from the main road) round a plot of land that was purchased for the site of a new school, but sold again when it was decided to use the old chapel.

A house has now been built on the land, and on the opposite side of the road a total of eight residences, mainly bungalows have been built in the intervening years.

..... Milton Town is half a mile ahead, but before reaching it we pass a footpath to North Town, then Merrybetween, where stood a cob cottage, now in ruins, then a cottage on the right, and on the left the remains of the old smithy, part of the building with the black and white striped door, now a garage, but once upon a time the workshop of Samuel Glover, the carpenter. A pleasant residence is on the left, and beyond it Rosemead, which some forty years ago was the post office. The garden in front adjoins the path to the Church.

A property now called The Old Rectory was built in the 1950s, as a replacement for the original Old Rectory (which was off the road between Shop Court and Five Lanes). Neither of the Old Rectory's are now the home of the Rector, as we no longer have a parish-based rector. The barns around the courtyard at Milton Town Farm have been converted and on the opposite side of the road the farmyard and buildings belonging to Milton Town Farm have been sold for development of c. 10 new residences, for which planning consent has been granted.

Extract about the Church and the Chapel were given in the leaflet for the walk from Chapman's Green

In just over 50 years, there has been significant increase in the residences, particularly in the Venn Green area. Also the junction at Venn Green has been re-designed – straightened and widened.

A small group of 10 joined the walk on a lovely summer's evening, and a few more came along to enjoy the barbecue. Approximately £30 profit from the BBQ was made for Newsletter funds. Thank you to those who supported us!

PARISH PLANNING - Update

The Steering Group has compiled the Household Questionnaire and a separate Questionnaire for Young People. Volunteers are delivering these to each house in the parish during August, with a covering letter, explaining how the questionnaire should be completed by each member of the household. Volunteers will arrange a date and time to return and collect the completed questionnaire. On collection an envelope will be provided for the household and young people's questionnaires. Our target is to complete the collection of all completed questionnaires by 14th September.

Completed questionnaires will be "rewarded" with a ticket for entry to the Prize Draws. For the Household Draw the 1st prize will be Dinner for Two donated by Thatchers Restaurant, Woodford Bridge; 2nd and 3rd prizes will be hampers with a range of "goodies" from Horrellsford Garage and Lizzy's Larder. 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Recipes ready for Christmas, (oh yes it's that time of year again.!!!!!!!!)

Mincemeat.

Ingredients:

250g/8oz Peeled and cored, hard, sour apples (good cookers).

130g/4oz Shredded Suet (vegetarian or animal)

130g/4oz Sultanas 130g/4oz Raisins 60g/2oz Cut mixed peel 130g/4oz Dried Apricots 130g/4oz Currants

130g/4oz Brown sugar (Barbadoes or Demerara)

Zest and juice of 1 lemon.

70ml/2oz Brandy or Calvados or Rum or Cider.

1/2 Teaspoon Mixed Spice

½ Teaspoon Grated Nutmeg

½ Teaspoon Ground Ginger

½ Teaspoon Cinnamon.

Method:

- Wash the apples and all the dried fruit separately in cold water and pat dry with a clean cloth or paper towel. The easy way to wash dried fruit is to place in a sieve and run under the cold tap.
- Peel and core the apples and then grate or chop in a food processor.
- Mix with the shredded suet.
- Chop very finely the sultanas, raisins, mixed peel, dried apricots and mix with the apples and suet.
- · Add the brown sugar and currants to the mix.
- Take off the yellow zest of the lemon with a grater or zest scraper, do not use any of the white, pithy portion and add to the mix. Cut the zested lemon in half and squeeze out all the juice and add this to the mix. Add the chosen spirit, mixed spice, grated nutmeg and any additional spices or flavourings to the mix.
- Mix thoroughly to combine all the ingredients. Cover with cling film and leave to stand in a refrigerator or very cool place for at least 24 hours (48 would be even better) Mix well again after this period and then spoon into chosen containers, pressing the mincemeat well down to avoid any air gaps Cover with a piece of greaseproof or waxed paper cut to size and then fit airtight lid. It is a good idea to write the date on a label and if you intend to give it away as a present it might be a good idea to list the ingredients.

The mincemeat must be stored in a cool dry place. If you have carried out all the instructions correctly it will keep

for at least 1 year.



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Christmas Pudding,

Ingredients:

125g/5oz Sultanas ½ teaspoon ground ginger 125g/5oz Currants ½ teaspoon mixed spice 125g/5oz Raisins seedless) ½ teaspoon grated nutmeg 125q/5oz **Dried Plums** Pinch of salt. 125g/5oz Suet (shredded) Zest and juice of 1 lemon 3 Large eggs Zest and juice of 1 orange 125g/5oz Bread crumbs Wine glass of brandy (at least) 100g/4oz Plain flour 4 tablespoons Stout (Guinness)



Method:

100g/4oz

200a/8oz

125g/5oz

All the dried fruit should be washed and patted dry.

Soft brown sugar

Cut mixed peel (optional)

Sift the flour, salt, spices, nutmeg and ginger into a mixing bowl.

Add the sugar, breadcrumbs, suet, fruit, mixed peel and orange/lemon zest.

Beat the eggs together and add to the spirit, stout and orange/lemon juice.

Stir this into the dry ingredients adding the milk to make the mixture into a dropping consistency. Give the mixing a good stir and then cover with greaseproof or cling film and place in a cool place or refrigerator for at least 24 hours.

After this period of standing, give the ingredients another good mix/stir.

Have ready 2 well greased/buttered 1pint pudding basins.

Divide the mixture into 2 equal portions and placed firmly in the basins. The mixture should be ideally form a dome in the basin rather than level or sunken. Place a disc of buttered greaseproof paper on top of the mixing and then wrap in baking foil, ensuring that moisture will not be able to come in contact with the pudding during steaming.

To steam the puddings, stand them in a saucepan with enough water to come halfway up the basin. Place on the lid and bring to the boil, reduce to a slow simmer for at least 5 hours.

Check the water level regularly and top up with boiling water as needed taking great care to avoid any water getting into the puddings and to avoid personal accidents.

MICROWAVE:

This pudding can be cooked in a microwave instead of steamed. To microwave ---this this will require the addition of 1 teaspoon of Cocoa powder and 1 tablespoon of black treacle in the mixing. Cover the basins with cling film NOT FOIL and make a slit to prevent ballooning up in the microwave. Cook each pudding separately on full power for 6 minutes or according to maker's instructions.

STORAGE

Wrap in cling film or greaseproof paper, then over wrap in baking foil, then store in a cool dry place. Can be stored in the refrigerator.

RE-HEATING:

Remove storage wrapping and re-cover with baking foil, re-steam for approx 1 ½ hours before serving.

ECUMENICAL YOUTH WORKER PROJECT UPDATE

One of these major developments has been the set up of the detached youth provision. Since buying the mobile home we have been travelling out to a few villages, meeting young people and working with them to develop opportunities.

We're really keen to increase this provision over the summer holidays and hope that we'll see even more developments come from this work. Below is a brief timetable of for the mobile youth centre over August. Please spread news of the mobile youth centre and its whereabouts among young people you know. We're still looking for volunteers so if you can help with any of the dates, please get in touch.



Milton School Memories of Thelma Crook nee German

My first memories of Milton Damerel Infant School are at age 5 years. My first day, sitting with George Jordon. Betty Harris was my teacher. We used to take raw apples for the lunch break which we put on, or near, the black fire burner so they were part cooked. People I remember being at school with: Raymond Wonnacott, John Carter, Bill Carter, Mary Watts, Ruby Ayre and Greta Sheeman. We used to play in the school lane in the winter. But in the summer we were allowed to go into the field at the back of the school. The other teacher was a Mrs Cole. One of her stories was of a gold fish called Tilly.

There was a pump house in the school lane. We used to dress up for a wedding with lace curtains for a veil and ivy leaves and berries for the head dress. I lived at Milton Mill cottage and used to walk to school. I remember the 'meadow sweet' flowers that grew in the hedge rows and still in the summer I will pick just one to smell and remember my child hood days. I keep it in the kitchen to have a 'sniff' each day of the lovely perfume.

While at the school we had the American Forces there to practise manoeuvres, prior to D Day. The soldiers used to give us little tins of chocolate powder: we used to dip our fingers in and lick it off. Also, milk powder solid in the size of cheese straws and orange thick syrup we had to water down to drink. Dad was in the Home Guard.

Other special memories of Milton are of the pantomime. I was in each one—Aladdin, Cinderella, Queen of Hearts.

I was 8 years old when we moved from Milton Mill to Little Johns Cottage; when Granfer died we went to look after Gran German.

When mum went into hospital to have baby David, I went to Holsworthy Primary School, I was always top of the class and found everything very easy which meant Milton School was of very high standard. At the time we stayed with Granparents at Southcombe Farm.

I was 11 years old when I went to Holsworthy Secondary Modern School; we used to go by bus.

My Sunday School and Primary School used to have a day each for a special outing to the seaside. We didn't have cars so this was very special, we went to bed just praying the Sun would shine the next day. The outings would be to Bude, Newquay, Westward Ho!, and Woolacombe.

Sunday school was very important. We sang special songs and learned to recite recitations. We used to stand on the platform with a new outfit—a bonnet and pretty dress. I remember my first grown up coat, much too long but I was assured that I would grow into it.

The teachers were Mr Cory, Mr Alfred Davey, Mrs Rosa Davey and Miss Ada Yeo. Mr Peter Carter played the organ. Mrs Gladys Watkins. The band of hope came on New Years Day, we sang special songs with actions. Wide wide is the Ocean. Zachaeus was a very little man. Climb Climb Sunshine Mountain. Jesus wants me for a sun beam, Jesus buds us shine. I am H A P P Y. I still remember them all. I wonder if the new tunes and songs will last as long.

I left school at age 15 and went to work at Woodford Bridge Hotel

Milton School Memories of Mary Robins nee Watts

My first memories of going to Milton School at the age of 5. About the Wednesday after starting on Monday, the dentist came with her white coat and put me off school for a very long time. The teacher I remember most was Mrs Hancock.

She was my class teacher in 1946. there was a school outing I wasn't well enough to go, she brought my home a brooch. It was a little dog kennel with 2 little dogs.

Mrs Larkworthy used to cook the school dinners, she used to make little square biscuits, she also used to open 7lb tin of orange jam which was delicious. We also used to bring apples to roast in a oven above the big coal stove.

Its always a pleasure to come home to Milton.

From the Citizens Advice Bureau

- Q. When I took out a loan I was sold insurance that promised to cover my repayments if I lost my job or was too ill to work. Recently I was made redundant but my claim has been turned down. Is there anything I can do?
- A. The payment protection insurance (PPI) business is currently facing close scrutiny from regulators after concerns were raised by Citizens Advice and other about excessive profiteering and the high number of policies that fail to pay out. In recent months half a dozen companies have also been fined for mis-selling PPI.

Mis-selling occurs when a company gives false information about a policy, or recommends one that is unsuitable for you, and you are unable to make a claim – for example, if you are above or below the given age limit, are unemployed or work part-time.

If a company recommends a payment protection insurance policy, it must take reasonable steps to ensure it is suitable for you. If companies do not offer a choice of policy, they might be mis-selling if they fail to provide appropriate information about the policy in good time for you to make an informed decision about it and it turns out to be unsuitable.

If you think you have been mis-sold, you should write to the company concerned requesting a refund of the policy premiums (if the policy is completely unsuitable), or compensation if you were misled regarding what you could claim. If the complaint is not resolved within eight weeks, you can ask the Financial Ombudsman Service (FOS) to intervene. 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Are you into Digital Photography?

Digital Photography is great, no film processing, instant pictures on your PC and possibly you take considerably more photos electronically than film. However, sadly I have seen many parents near to tears after realising that they have lost 3 or more years worth of their children's life in pictures gone due to a hard drive failure and a lack of backing up.

It is a fact that regardless of buying an expensive, cheap, branded or non-branded PC, Hard Drives will fail. Its just a case of when not if.

The most effective way to backup is to use a CDRW and copy your photos (and other personal data) to a CD. At as little as 15p for a blank CD there's no excuse—other than being lazy. An alternative to a CD are external hard drives, and while there's a risk that these may also fail, these can copy your entire system in one go.

The best way to protect your precious photos is to copy to CD / External Hard Drive and store them away from your home (in case of fire). You could store them in a dry shed, or at a friends / relations. An offsite backup is your only protection to a complete disaster.

Trust me, there is nothing worse that confirming to a parent that all their baby, birthday or xmas family photos are lost forever. Terry
