Regular Parish Council meetings were held on the third Wednesday of September, October and November.

<u>Planning Applications</u>. Since the last report, the Parish Council have been consulted on the planning application for the demolition and replacement of dwelling at Withypool Farm.

<u>Housing Needs Survey.</u> John Scott the Rural Housing Officer from Community Council of Devon came to the October meeting to present the report and advise the Parish Council on the next steps that need to be taken to work towards the objective of providing more affordable housing in Milton Damerel

<u>Installation of Notice Board at Holsworthy Beacon.</u> To address one of the issues highlighted by the Parish Plan, the Parish Council have been working towards providing a parish notice board near to Beech Park to help to keep all members of the parish informed on community matters and it is hoped that it will be erected very soon.

<u>Highway Issues</u> We have been informed by the DCC Highway Maintenance Technician that there is little funding remaining in the budget for road repairs within the parish except for safety defects until the next financial year. Where road edges and verges are eroded verge markers are being installed to warn drivers of hazards. The Parish Lengthsman is due to attend the Parish in January and his duties include hand cleaning of ditches and small culverts to keep the roads clear of water. If anyone has any particular problems for him to look at please advise the Clerk before the next meeting on 16<sup>th</sup> December.

# Fly Nuisance - Worden Farm

At the meeting on 18<sup>th</sup> November Alison Gidlow Team Leader Environment Management (Upper Tamar Team) Environment Agency came to inform Parish Councillors and community members present at the meeting, of what actions have been taken to prevent a recurrence.

Worden Farm has been regulated by an Environment Agency permit since October 2007. Site inspections and meetings were held at Worden & Beacon Farm in July after over 50 members of the public had registered complaints. The inspections identified areas where W J Watkins & Sons Ltd could improve their operating procedures, particularly with regard to the assessment, removal and spreading of manure. Over the summer fly affected chicken manure was removed from the sheds and encapsulated in black plastic to kill any fly eggs, larvae, pupae or flies present. Some of this has now been spread on arable land without any reports of nuisance. A detailed audit was carried out on 11<sup>th</sup> November where a number of actions were identified that need to be carried out by the operator. A great deal of work has been carried out by W J Watkins & Sons Ltd staff in improving the management operating systems. This was classed as a category one incident. The enforcement response has been considered and officers are currently preparing a prosecution file for permit non-compliance relating to the fly incident. TDC are working with the Environment Agency to investigate the incident response and communication lessons that can be learned and to develop and improve ways of working to ensure this industry sector does not cause further nuisance.

<u>Setting of Precept</u> At the November meeting members considered all grant applications received from Parish organisations before finalising the budget for 2010-2011 and completed the application for the Parish Precept and they are pleased to inform parishioners that there will be no increase in the precept for 2010-2011 which will remain at £2350 This is the sum of money collected by the District Council in Council Tax and paid to the Parish Council in two halves, April and September to cover the grants paid out and running cost of the parish. Annual grants to organisations are paid in September each year.

<u>Freedom of Information</u>. In line with the publication scheme adopted by the Council in January, requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some information can be made available by email free of charge but paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side.

FREEDOM CENTRE, BARNSTAPLE – During September and October we left a box in the lobby for gifts of food for the Freedom Centre in Barnstaple, and were able to take several carrier bags full of tinned food, teabags, rice, etc., for use in or distribution by the Centre. The Freedom Centre was one of the charities recently visited by The Secret Millionaire in the programme of that name, shown on Channel 4, when a millionaire was based in Barnstaple. The Day Centre is the most well established and well known service of the Freedom Social Projects – it supports homeless and disadvantaged people with free meals and hot drinks, clothing, hygiene facilities, recreation and advice and information on finding accommodation, training and employment, and the small team of project workers are greatly supported by many volunteers. Just one statistic – to date this year (in October) over 9,000 meals have been served. The centre is always very grateful for any support – supplies of food, good clothing, etc. - which can be delivered to the Centre at Howard Avenue in Barnstaple. #### YOUTH WORKER PROJECT UPDATE

The project Management Committee took the difficult decision not to apply for further funding from Methodist funds, for a second term for the youth project. Lizz Prangle sought alternative employment opportunities and since 1<sup>st</sup> June this year has been employed by Devon County Council in the post of Youth Participation Senior Youth Support Worker, covering maternity leave until June 2010. This post commits her for 4 days per week. Lizz offered to continue with the Shebbear Ecumenical Project for the equivalent of 1 day per week, and this was gladly accepted.

To mark the conclusion of the first 3-year term of the project Lizz has compiled an "End of Term" report, highlighting the achievements and successes of the project, and the valuable lessons learnt about delivering youth work in a rural area. In the second part of the report she has developed the lessons learnt to describe a vision for the continuation of youth work in this area, setting out revised aims and objectives for the work, and improved work processes, such as better involvement and ownership with young people, participation within local communities, within schools work, and encouraging volunteers and inter-generational relationships. This part of the report is visionary, challenging, exciting and "awesome".

The Committee has shared the report with those who have been involved in, supported and benefited from the project. There have already been some most encouraging comments from far and wide. # **Holy Trinity Church**

Holy Trinity Church has been part of the Milton Damerel community and sky line for around 700 years. The tower did fall down in the late 18th century and it was a few years before it was rebuilt.

Regular services now only take place on the 4th Sunday of each month with extra services at Easter and Christmas.

I am probably not wrong in saying that most people do not regularly attend services at the church but there are occasions when the church is packed and becomes a focal point for christenings, weddings and sadly funerals. We all expect the church to be there for these occasions and it would be a great loss to everyone if it wasn't. The truth is that without more support the church cannot last forever.

It would be a shame if after all the centuries of use Holy Trinity fell out of use in our time. At the moment the roof is on and keeps most of the rain out, if not the bats and the bees. The stones at the top of the tower are in a desperate state and will need to be made safe soon. The battle to keep the church yard tidy is not being lost thanks to a couple of volunteers. Recently work has been done to trim trees and clear ivy from the wall and lych gate. The building is due its 5 yearly inspection which may result in a list of critical jobs which need to be completed in order to conserve it and make it safe for continued use.

If anyone feels that the church is important enough to keep or would be interested in doing anything to help preserve or maintain Holy Trinity your support would be gratefully received.

John Scott of the Community Council of Devon presented the report at the October Parish Council meeting - here is a summary:

# MILTON DAMEREL HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY REPORT

In the June the Devon Rural Housing Partnership with Milton Damerel Parish Council carried out housing needs survey in the parish. The purpose of the survey was to discover if there are a significant number of people living or working in Milton Damerel who have not been able to obtain housing suitable to their circumstances.

#### WHAT WE ASKED FOR ......

Households were invited to complete a three part form. This was designed to gather details of the reasons for which the current accommodation failed to meet its needs and the type of accommodation required in the future.

#### WHAT YOU SAID......

There were a total of 71 Surveys returned, which is a response rate of 35.5%.

7 households were found to be in housing need with a local connection to Milton Damerel.

The biggest reason for wanting to move was setting up an independent home.

77% of those replying said they were in favour of a small affordable housing development for local people.

# WHAT THE REPORT RECOMMENDS......

Provision for the need of 7 affordable homes needs to be made.

# WHAT NOW??

The Rural Housing Enabler will work with Milton Damerel Parish Council and Torridge District Council to work up proposals for affordable housing in the Parish.

We hope to be able soon to site the notice board at Holsworthy Beacon. Permission of the landowner has been obtained, and we have cleared the location with the planning and highways authorities, and checked the locations of water mains, underground cables, etc. with the utilities bodies, and the notice board has been re-furbished ready for setting up. So we are now ready, at last, to install .. and parish councillors have volunteered to do the necessary "digging" and "fixing", etc. Watch this space!!

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




# Children In Need Breakfast Morning

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# WET AND WARM IN THE GARDEN

We have certainly had our fair share of rain and the ground is completely saturated which has curtailed several jobs I had hoped to get finished this year, my raised vegetable beds are still half built I can only hope for some crisp winter days to enable me to get them finished, I must get the Asparagus and Strawberries planted before the Spring.

A bonus has been the mild weather in both September and October, my family and I were dining al fresco on the harbour in Torquay at the end of Oct. and the winter now seems a lot shorter at least in the lead up to Christmas.

As ever the grass keeps on growing and my lawns desperately need mowing but they are waterlogged, at the first opportunity after a couple of dry days it is worth getting the mower out otherwise you will be faced with a hay field in the spring which will take numerous cuts to get back into a presentable state.

#### STILL TIME TO PLANT.

I planted shallots, garlic and sowed winter broad beans and peas in October but if the weather stays mild it would not be too late even in December to carry out a late planting particularly the sets which will sit dormant in the ground until they feel like emerging.

December is the month to sow onion seeds indoors for those bumper specimens next year, I always sow Kelsae the Scottish variety to plant out in March/April but I see there are Japanese varieties which you can plant in the autumn though in North Devon I suspect they won't like sitting in cold wet soil through the winter months.

Except during very harsh conditions the winter can be a good time to carry out new plantings of both ornamental and culinary plants including soft and top fruit which are available as bare root plants that are a lot cheaper than the containerized versions and will establish quite quickly.

Because there is always some root cut off when plants are dug up you should compensate by trimming the top growth by at least a third which will also encourage bushier growth next year, bare root roses and native hedging plants should be cut down to around 6" (150mm) to encourage new growth from the base.

# PLANNING FOR THE SUMMER.

One of the enjoyable jobs in the winter is going through seed catalogues and planning what to grow next year.

Seed purchases used to be cheap particularly as the resultant crops can be so rewarding but I am always surprised at the price of even the most basic seeds which must be paying for the seed company's glossy catalogues and national advertising.

I was introduced to a small specialist seed company a few years ago whose catalogue is a plain black and white leaflet with sensible prices and clear information on how many seeds you actually get, in the case of Lobelia that is 3000 for £0.75 but you do plant these in clumps not individually.

Conversely F1 hybrid All Female Cucumbers are 5 seeds for £2.40, as one hundred percent germination is nigh on impossible these are very expensive so personally I just buy a couple of plants in May letting someone else take the risks.

If you need pictures and more information then use a national companies colour catalogue but consider contacting Wallis Seeds on 01245 360513 as an economical alternative supplier.

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

#### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT**

Since our last report there have been a number of changes at Holsworthy Police Station which affect us. Our Beat Manager, John Sheppard, has been transferred to Launceston and his position has been filled, with effect from the 1st November, by PC Anna Rock. Our PCSO Raquel Rowe will be away for several months on a training course and her position been filled by PCSO Andrew Elston who was previously covering the Holsworthy Town area.

It has been commented recently on the fact that we do not hold regular meetings as do some other NHW schemes and we are aware from meetings with our colleagues in Bideford and Torrington that these are necessary in some areas. Rural North Devon and in particular the areas around Holsworthy continue to be very low crime areas, which is of course to be welcomed. There is therefore very little point in holding meetings on a regular basis. However, that is not to say that we cannot hold meetings and should the need arise, then we will certainly do so. If anybody does feel that a meeting is required at this time could you please speak to one of the co-ordinators.

With Christmas approaching a postal delivery scam has again reared its head in parts of North Devon and Torridge. A company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) leaves a card suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them to make arrangements for the delivery. The number that you are asked to ring starts 0906, which is a premium rate number and you will be charged a hefty premium if you dial it. If anybody is contacted by this company please in the first instance contact the police, as soon as possible, on 08452 777 444.

Whilst on the subject of Christmas, we would like to remind our local residents that extra care and vigilance is required over the festive period. Please ensure that all gifts and presents are secure and out of sight from other people. A car was recently broken into on the car park in Holsworthy, in broad daylight. Your gifts will then be received by the people you intended should get them and they do not end up in the hands of some light-fingered opportunist.

Despite our comments about low crime there have been a number of thefts of red diesel from farms and yards over recent weeks. If you keep stocks of this fuel on your premises please try to secure the tank and keep a look-out for unfamiliar vehicles in the area. Also, with the dark nights now with us once again, the police recommend that if you are away from home it is good practice to leave a light/& radio playing to deter intruders.

#### **BOGUS CALLERS**

We have been informed that a bogus caller, that has been happening in the Torridge area, has now moved to other areas of North Devon also.

A lady in North Devon reported that she was telephoned by a man claiming to be from the council. He told her that she was possibly eligible for some council tax to be repaid, going back sixteen years. He even quoted an amount.

The man who already had some of the woman's details, like her address and banks name, then asked for more of her bank details. However, the woman correctly refused to give him any further information. The man then ended the conversation saying that he would post out some forms for her to fill in to process the claim.

Police can confirm that this man was not anyone from the council.

Please be very careful when a phone call such as this is made to you or cold callers visit your address. If in doubt phone the company they represent. If you do not wish to have anything to do with what they are trying to sell for example then simply say that you are not interested thank you.

Also I have been informed that a company called PDS (parcel delivery service) leave you a message asking you to call 0906661941911. This is a premium rate number and if you phone you get a recorded message, and it will of already charged you £15.

Whilst out on patrol in different locations in the rural area, I have noticed lots of properties that have items left outside visible from the road or within easy reach should any thieves be in that area. I have recently seen several properties with various amounts of coal in bags adjacent to the road or certainly visible from the road. Logs in stacks, bikes, vehicles unlocked. It when things left like this that it invites thieves to see what else there might be around of interest.

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# Another Local Air Crash – Halifax Bomber DT781

The Handley-Page Halifax was a heavy bomber which shared the RAF's offensive thrust into Germany during the Second World War. Whilst early models had a design flaw in the rudders, modifications were made, including removal of the front turret, modifying or removing the mid-upper turret and redesigning the rudders. The plane then became a solid and dependable aircraft although it didn't share the same charisma



as its stable mate the Avro Lancaster of "Dam Busters" fame. It was similar in design to the Lancaster, although of all metal construction and a little more 'square' in shape. Early models were equipped with the same liquid cooled Rolls-Royce V12 Merlin engines as the Lancaster and these were also used in the Spitfire and Hurricane fighters.

Handley-Page Halifax DT781 was based at Lindholme in South Yorkshire as part of Heavy Conversion Unit 1656. Lindholme was an operational training base covering Halifax, Lancaster and Avro Manchester bombers. On January 13, 1944 DT781 took off at 21:49 for a night navigation training flight. At 20,000 feet a fire broke out in the port side outer engine which led to a general fire and the

subsequent loss of control with the aircraft then breaking up. The main bulk of the wreckage crashed into a field at about 1:40 on January 14. The crash site was a field to the east of Holsworthy, near to Anvil Corner. Despite the prompt action and efforts of Home Guard Lieutenant Fred Bate and Home Guard Medical Officer Dr. Charles Evans, who were both quickly on the scene, all six crew members perished. Flight recording equipment was not a feature at that time and so it was not known whether the fire was due to an inherent engine fault or some other cause. The inexperience of the relatively young crew may possibly have contributed to the loss of control. Crew members were:-

Flight Sergeant William Routledge Wilson, RCAF, Pilot aged 21
Sergeant Robert Herbert Dolden, RAF, Flight Engineer aged23
Flying Officer Frederick Jacob Hjartarson, RCAF, Navigator
Flight Sergeant James Joseph Cleary, RAAF, Bomber-aimer aged 24
Sergeant Roy Charles Bradbury, RAVR, Wireless Operator/Air Gunner aged 20
Sergeant Roy Burgess, RAFVR, Air Gunner ages 19

In 2002, largely due to the efforts of a local amateur historian, Mr Charles Cornish of Holsworthy and paid for by public subscription, a memorial plaque was commissioned and sited close to the crash site. This memorial is still in place and can be seen approx. 350 yards from Anvil Corner along the Staddon Road, on the eastern side.

#### It's a small world

Back in October we went on holiday to visit family in Holland. They often visit us and other relatives in Devon, so this time it was our turn to visit them. We set off armed with luggage, tickets, passports and Euros.

From Exeter airport we flew out to Schipol and hadn't been in Holland for more than 10 minute when 'Terrrryyyyyy' came booming across from the Arrivals gate. We turned to see Gareth Piper, well talk about a small world. He was flying back from the same gate on the day we arrived. What are the odds?

Whilst there we visited the Kröller-Müller Museum, to get there you park 6km away and use the free bicycles to ride through the forest to the museum. As its flat its not too much of a problem – apart from the rain that came horizontally so by the time we got there we were all pretty much soaked. Helene Kröller-Müller collected the art during her lifetime, but due to recession, the collection was threatened with being broken up. So she gave it to the Dutch people on the basis that it remains intact. What we all found amazing is that all of the works of art are there to be seen close up. There are no barriers, ropes or screens between you and the art. You could be millimetres away from paintings worth millions. I have never appreciated art before, but when you walk into a room with over 30 Van Goghs, its breath taking. She also collected other artists, so I was looking at Gauguins, Monets, Renoirs and Pablo Picasso to name a few. One of the paintings 'Transport of colonial solders', was painted by Isaac Israels when he was 18. The painting must have been 10' x 4'. I had to wait an age for people to move out of the way before I could take a picture!! (you need to google it)

One day we took the train into Amsterdam for a days sightseeing, its surprisingly busy.

Now I have never read Anne Franks Diary, but know about the story, so we went to the Anne Frank Museum. We had to wait around 40 minutes to get in. Once inside you walk through the rooms that remain pretty much unchanged over the years, there are historical documents and items in glass cabinets that tell the story of the people that hid in the secret annex. The Dutch people who worked downstairs that helped and supported the Frank family also had their stories told. I found the experience moving as you felt the despair that the people must have gone through during the war. Both Marie and I agreed that the kitchen was the one room which really brought it home – the granite sink which you touch immediately connects you to the past, and the people that lived there.

Afterwards we had pancakes the size of dustbin lids and went on a sightseeing tour of the canals. To finish off the day, Bobs choice...a tram ride. As we got on the tram, the driver asked us where we were going. "Don't know, just wanted a ride on the tram" we replied. "Get on" she said, "no charge". So we finished our day with a free ride on the tram.

The next day we were discussing the visit to the Anne Frank house when my brother in law Paul said his uncle was in the same class as Anne at school, and that there are only 15 class members still alive. His uncle who now lives in Canada was flown in to be interviewed by Dutch TV for a documentary to be shown at Christmas time.

Our last day we spent in 'The Hague' and visited The Binnenhof, which is like a cross between 10 Downing Street and Buckingham Palace in its roles, but is open to the public with access to all areas and no guards. We ate ice cream looking into the prime ministers office.

The next day we headed home from Schipol airport, our holiday gone too quick and this time without meeting anyone from Milton Damerel we boarded the plane back to Exeter.
