Milton Damerel 50 years on

(First written in 1951 by Seymour Marks on behalf of the Parish Council, updated in 2006 by Lizzy Kirby for the Parish Newsletter)

In 1951 Mr Seymour Marks made a survey of Milton Damerel and his findings were recorded in a booklet. There were a number of chapters. The first covered the Parish as a whole, with 6 more taking walks along routes of interest and finishing with a summary of the people and facilities.

50 years on we thought it would be timely to see how much life has changed or indeed what has stayed the same. To do this we will compare each chapter, try and update them by researching and comparing the facts and also by rewalking the most interesting routes.

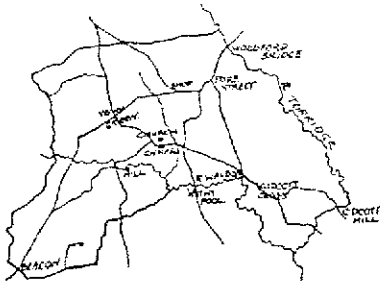
We would love as many people as possible to get involved so whether you have lived here all your life, have recently moved to the Parish, are young or old, we really want you to be part of this "snapshot" in history.

How can you get involved?

There are many ways. Over the next few newsletter issues we will be reprinting the 1951 booklet, updating the published facts and collating new information. We will also recreate the main walks starting with an easy and gentle walk on May Bank Holiday which will start at the top of Gratton Hill and end at Strawberry Bank with a Pasty and Cider lunch in the Parish Hall. (Please see details below for more information). You can also help by telling us your memories and anecdotes of the Parish past and present, or letting us know interesting facts about your homes.

The Parish

The best way to start making our survey of Milton Damerel seems to be to journey to every corner of it and record all that can be seen or heard. This will give a broad picture of the roads and buildings within its boundaries that can be filled in at leisure. But before starting our journeys let us look at the parish as a whole.



In 1951 Seymour Marks wrote : Milton Damerel is roughly shaped like a winged sycamore, the centre being Venn Green to Milton Town, with a wing enclosing Gidcott to the east, the other wing embracing West and East Wonford and Down on the west. It is 4,415 acres (1792ha) in extent, if waste, roads and water are included. It has one main road running more or less along the northern boundary, with a secondary road roughly parallel from Gidcott Mill through Gratton, Milton Town and West Wonford to Chapman's Green. There are several subsidiary roads branching from these two principal roads which we will discover as we travel.

As far as we know in 2006 none of these facts have changed.

Seymour Marks continued : In 1893 a Local Government Act was passed creating the local authorities of today. The chief of these is Devon County Council, its area being divided for easier working into Rural Districts. Milton Damerel in 1951 was in the Rural District of Holsworthy which consisted of two persons elected by each of the 21 parishes of the District. **Nowadays Milton Damerel is in the postal district of Holsworthy and Rural District of Torrridge.** Each parish within the District is under obligation to hold at least one annual parish meeting for every elector in the parish to attend, and if there are more than 300 such electors, they must elect a Parish Council. Milton Damerel has such a Council consisting of 7 councillors (including representation from Abbots Bickington), who elect a Chairman amongst themselves. The first Parish Council was elected on December 4th 1894 when John George Jollow was made Chairman. The records show that on 4th December 1950 (exactly 56 years on) the Councillors were WE Gifford, CRH Heard, CJ Slee, CC Stidwell, EG Taylor, J Thorne and GGD Watkins. **On 4th December 2005 (exactly 111 years on), they were C Bellew, D Dyer, J Elliot, S Harper, M Kirby, G Millman and G Piper.**

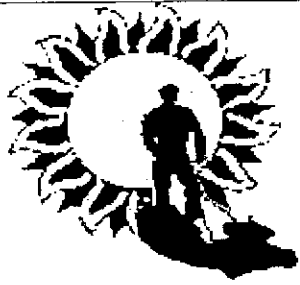
The duties of the parish council have not changed much since the 50's although many provisions such as washhouses are no longer relevant. Nowadays, the parish council acts more in an advisory capacity informing the County and District Councils in matters such as planning, housing, footpaths and highways issues. In 1951 the Parish Council was authorised to spend no more than 1d. in the £ without permission from a higher authority. The amount of rates in 1951 was 9s.6d for the half year. **Council Tax has now replaced this and I am sure you all know the amount. Parish Precept is currently £600 per half year.**

THE GARDENING YEAR COMMENCES

After what I read was the coldest winter for at least 10 years it is finally time to at least start planning the new gardening year if not getting stuck into some of the tasks that can be tackled before better weather and the spring growth starts.



After a couple of months of rest grass has now started to grow again and regular lawn mowing should recommence, during March a feed and weed can be applied, either a proprietary product such as Evergreen or Toplawn but for more economy apply Growmore fertiliser which not being so rich in nitrogen won't make the grass bolt followed by a treatment of Verdone or Supertox which are easily applied with a watering can and kill lawn weeds most effectively.

Where moss is a problem you can apply lawn feeds including a moss killer or use lawn sand containing sulphate of iron, do remember to apply lime after you have raked out the dead moss to discourage regrowth.

Old well established clumps of herbaceous perennials should be lifted and split during the early part of March keeping only small healthy pieces from around the edge which can be replanted in the same place, moved or given away.

If you intend to carry out any new planting now is the time, you can plant out of containers at any time of the year but early spring gives new plants the chance to make root before the onset of summer enabling them to produce some new growth later in the year. If you plant Rhododendrons or Azaleas be sure to get the top of their roots level with the surface of the soil, as Percy Thrower told me some 40 years ago they can become flower shy if planted too deep.

I know beds and borders look better for being forked over but often this does not suit the plants who do not like their roots being disturbed a prime example being Paeonias who positively hate a fork anywhere near them, instead try loosening the surface with a hoe or mulching with compost, bark, wood chip etc.

Always follow the instructions on the packet but a lot of seeds can now be sown given the protection of a greenhouse, spare room or propagator, some F1 hybrid seeds are very expensive and difficult to germinate so consider buying young plants instead these are often no dearer than the seed.

Stoney Broke!

Following a number of complaints, Devon County Council Highways Department have issued guidance on obstructions placed on or near to a public highway.

You must not place any object within 18 inches of the mapped highway (Where the edge of the highway has eroded over time you must measure from the original edge not from the newly created one).

This covers any obstruction such as dustbins, fences, plants, trees & stones and contrary to popular belief, it makes no difference if they are brightly painted and in the case of trees, plants and bushes you must take into account the species height and spread when making your calculations so that when it is fully grown it will still be more than 18 inches from the edge of the highway.

If anyone is injured as a result of an obstruction that you have placed by the highway **you are legally liable** so be warned because in this day of compensation mania you could end up stoney broke.

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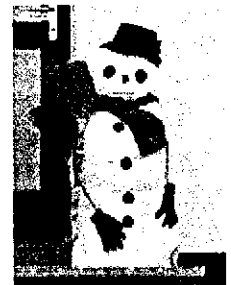

Children's Hospice South West Open Day

This year nine of us took the opportunity to go along to the Children's Hospice Open Day on Saturday, 21st January. The weather was beautiful with bright sunshine. We parked as usual at the Fremington Army camp and did not have to wait long for the shuttle mini-bus to take us over to the Hospice. There we were greeted at the door as we signed in. We were able to hand in two donations: £300 collected at the Horrelsford Garage, in the collecting box and from the proceeds of the Christmas Draw; and, just over £65, being the contents of the Chapel collecting box, raised mainly at the Friendship Club bring and buy stalls. Guides were on hand to give us a tour of the building and we were fortunate to see much more of it this year as no children or families were in residence, and all the decorating had already been done. This year is the 10th Anniversary of the Hospice and the cook was busy in the kitchen preparing for a special re-union of staff to take place the following day. If you have ever visited the Hospice you will know what an uplifting place it is to visit. Beautifully decorated with some very thoughtful homely touches and amazing wall hangings, needlework, embroidery, patchwork and so on. Everything is done to make it a home from home for the families and terminally ill children, who are cared for. The feel of the place is a very positive one, with nothing being overlooked. The tour finishes with a walk around the Narnia garden with sound effects and water shoots, some of which can catch you unaware and give the unsuspecting a slight shower!!

As we walked to the refreshment marquee we commented on how thankful we should be at having healthy children, but also that such a wonderful place exists for those not so fortunate. In the marquee, we met with Eddie Farwell, whose late wife, Jill, had been, with him, the main driving force in getting the hospice off the ground, after two of their children had terminal illnesses. The nearest hospice for them to go to, at that time, was in Oxfordshire, a very tiring and difficult journey for them to make. Eddie told us how the new hospice near Bristol is well underway and should be ready by the end of the year. It is hoped to have open days there during November, so watch this space, we may be holding another trip!

Leek, Potato and Bacon soup.

Ingredients

300g/12oz leeks, washed and finely sliced
300g/12oz potatoes, peeled and sliced
150g/6oz lean and chopped bacon
700ml/1 1/4pt stock (preferably fresh chicken stock, but chicken or vegetable stock cubes can be used)
290ml/1/2 pint milk
fresh ground black pepper
cream (optional)

Method

1. sauté the potato, leeks and bacon in a pan, until soft but not coloured.
 2. Add the stock and cook until the potatoes are tender. Liquidize.
- Return to the pan and add the milk. Add the cream if desired.

Vegetable soup.

Ingredients

55g/2oz unsalted butter, cubed
1/2 carrot, peeled and diced
1/2 celeriac, peeled and diced
1/3 leek, washed and sliced
splash of white wine
290ml/1/2 pint vegetable stock
1 tsp tomato purée
1 large field mushroom, chopped
dash of Tabasco
55g/2oz stilton, cubed

Method

1. Gently melt the butter in a medium pan and fry the carrot, celeriac and leek for 4-5 minutes, or until soft.
2. Stir in the wine, then pour in the stock. Bring to the boil and then reduce the heat.
3. Add the tomato purée, mushroom and Tabasco. Simmer gently for 10-12 minutes.
4. Stir the stilton into the soup and heat for a further 1-2 minutes.
5. Remove from the heat and ladle into a soup bowl. Serve.

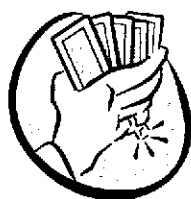

Information from the Bude, Holsworthy and District Citizens Advice Bureau;

- Q. I am up to my eyes in debt and it is causing me a great deal of stress. I have heard that I could go bankrupt and wipe the slate clean. Is this true and would you recommend it?
- A. Firstly there may be a number of options for sorting your debts out that could be better for you than going bankrupt. You should make an appointment with a debt advisor at a Citizens Advice Bureau who will be able to give you some expert advice on what may be your best option.
- There are advantages and disadvantages in filing for bankruptcy. The pressure is taken off you because you no longer have to deal with your creditors. An official called the Official Receiver takes control of your money and property, and deals with your creditors. You will be allowed to keep household goods and a reasonable amount to live on. Normally after a year you will be able to make a fresh start and in most cases the money you owe will be written. **However**, it costs £460 to go bankrupt and while you are bankrupt you will be unable to apply for more credit. If you own your own house it will usually have to be sold and you may lose your car and any other luxury items. In some professions people who have been made bankrupt may not be able to carry on working. Bankruptcy is never private; you will be listed on the Internet and it may even be published in your local paper. Some debts such as court fines and student loans will never be written off.
