Regular Parish Council meetings were held on the third Wednesdays of June and July. No meeting was held in August as there was no urgent business and very few other matters to attend to. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 15th September 2010 at 7.30pm at Milton Damerel Parish Hall. All residents are welcome to attend and observe meetings. With the permission of the Chairman, members of the public can be permitted to address the meeting. The agenda for meetings is displayed on all three Parish Council notice boards from the Thursday before each meeting.

<u>Freedom of Information</u> In line with the publication scheme adopted by the Council in January 2009, requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some information can be made available by email free of charge but paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side.

Planning There have been no new planning applications for consideration by the Parish Council since the last report.

<u>The Annual Return</u> and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31st March 2010 have been satisfactorily audited and certified by the Audit Commission. Copies of the annual return have been displayed on all three notice boards in turn over the last few weeks.

<u>Grants</u> Applications approved at the end of 2009 are due to be paid out in September 2010 and organisations within the Parish are invited to submit grant applications for 2011, in writing, to the Parish Clerk or any Parish Councillor by 17th November 2010 for consideration at the Parish Council Meeting to be held on that date. Applications should be accompanied by a copy of the organisations most recently 'audited' accounts.

<u>Speed Limits</u> Following the County review of speed limits there are to be no changes to the speed limits through Milton Damerel. The Parish Council put forward suggestions to DCC highways to help self enforcement of speed limits. Highways are to look at the replacement of any missing 40mph 'repeater' signs. They also suggest that community speed watch in conjunction with the neighbourhood police team could be a very beneficial way of helping to tackle community speeding issues such as ours.

<u>Highway Issues</u> Sadly, despite being lead to believe that improvements to verges to make pavements along the A388 was a definite possibility we are now informed that it would be too expensive and therefore there are no improvements that Devon County Council can support at this time.

The Parish Council has been informed by the County Rights of Way Officer that the proposed diversion of footpath No. 21 from Waldon Farm will not now go ahead and the original route is being reinstated. It is noted that the Public Footpath sign at the start of the route has now been erected.

<u>Part-night Street Lighting</u> Devon Council have advised that they intend to introduce part-night street lighting by switching off two lights at Venn Green and three at Beech Park between 12.30am and 5.30am each night. The lights on the A388 will remain lit all night. Residents along the affected roads have already been notified.

<u>Temporary Road Closures</u> The road from Town Farm to Milton Mill Cross will be closed from 6th to 8th September for remedial works by May Gurney. Alternative routes will be sign posted. Major road works including cable under-grounding in Torrington will close the A386 from Limers Hill towards New Road from 13th September for approximately three weeks. The diversion route to cater for large vehicles will be sign posted via Hatherleigh and Holsworthy through Milton Damerel to Landcross.

<u>The Holsworthy Motor Club</u> are holding their Roger Pole Taw & Torridge classic reliability trial, on Sunday 12th September. Approximately 50 cars and 40 motorcycles will be taking part and will come from Abbots Bickington, in the afternoon, on to the A388 at Shop Cross, turning left for Stibb Cross on their way back to Clovelly.

Farmers' Market - Saturday 20th November



ANOTHER BAD SUMMER

Lets hope September brings some better weather as it often does though not forecast at the moment, we have been taking our holidays this month since the late 1970's and usually get the best of the sun albeit a bit chilly in the evenings.

In the garden September is a busy month with crops to harvest before the nights go cold and new planting to do, it is generally safe to expect rain at the last Bank Holiday of the year making it ideal to carry out new planting, seeding, turfing etc all of which can be tackled in the knowledge that the soil is still warm which encourages new roots to establish before the winter sets in ready for rapid growth next spring.

CHRISTMAS COLOUR AND SCENT

Bulbs start arriving in the shops from the end of August, if I remember correctly the earliest prepared Hyacinths for Christmas flowering can be brought out of the cold stores is around the 17th, these should be planted in bowls of bulb fibre and kept in a cold, dry, frost free place with no light until the buds are taller than the leaves.

Check the bowls weekly and water sparingly if the fibre has dried out.

We used to plant the prepared bulbs in large trays covering them with peat or black polythene in outdoor frames protected against frost until early December when they would be brought out and replanted into bowls to flower for Christmas and into the New Year, they will last a lot longer in cool light rooms they can be over in a day if hot.

Spring flowering bulbs make a wonderful reliable display year after year and are readily available for planting immediately or up to December though I have planted Daffs in January and they still flowered.

As a general guide the planting hole should be a minimum of three times the depth of the bulb, the hole for a daffodil should therefore be 6" deep with 4" of soil over the bulbs, I actually plant mine deeper whatever the variety, they still come through each spring and are less likely to be disturbed by deep hoeing or light digging, in pots and bowls deeper planting allows me to leave the bulbs in then plant bedding over the top of them.

SAVE OR INCREASE YOUR PLANTS.

September is one of the best months for propagating most plants. it is the traditional time for taking cuttings of bedding plants particularly Geraniums which once rooted can be completely dried out and stored in light frost free conditions ready to pot up next spring.

Those bedding plants that I have enjoyed through the summer I try to overwinter in the glasshouse but as a safeguard I also take a few cuttings now in the hope that one or other will survive to delight me next year, I managed to keep my Dahlia Bishop of Landaff last winter and it has been a wonderful display.

Most shrubs root well taken as cuttings in September, if overwintered cool but frost free they are ready to go into small pots in March then larger ones in June prior to planting out in the autumn or the following spring.

TOPICAL TIPS

Shallots and garlic can be planted in September to give a slightly earlier crop next year.

Do keep up with mowing, a lawn neglected during the autumn and winter can be mess next year, mow whenever you can at weekly intervals in September, fortnightly in October and then monthly unless the weather goes as cold as last winter, these are guides they may vary dependant on the prevailing weather.

Clean any shading off glasshouses to get the best of the autumn sunshine even if only to get rid of any damp that can encourage mildews to thrive.

Grass areas that contain wild flowers should be cut in September for a neat appearance through the winter and to encourage a good display next spring, wherever possible collect the arisings which can smother new growth.

Milton Damerel Emergency Plan

The Parish Council has set up a planning team in order to prepare a Parish Emergency Plan. It is increasingly the practice that villages and parishes have such a plan. Its purpose will be to identify risks within the community and co-ordinate action in response.

The scope of the plan will cover events where the normal emergency services may not be able to respond: prolonged isolation owing to 1963 type snowfall being the prime example. In effect, the plan will formalise the existing common sense response and community self-help process.

The team will be collecting information over the next few weeks and will ask for input from parish residents. The aim is to complete the plan by early 2011.

The assistance of all parish residents is desirable throughout, in particular with the completion of a questionnaire – an example of which is included with this newsletter. The actual questionnaire will be delivered and collected by the planning team during September/October.

Update on affordable housing in Milton Damerel

A local site meeting was held in June, including Sue Southwell, Rural Housing Enabler, Rachel Webdell from Torridge District Council, and representatives from Drew Construction, who will developing the Milton Town site, and a Housing Association.

The representatives agreed that the most obvious way forward would be for Drews Construction to take the project forward with the Housing Association taking over the management of the homes once they are developed. Drews Construction would draw up a sketch plan showing how the site could look and produce a financial feasibility assessment as a first step.

The sketch plan will be for houses round a village green and Highway's opinion to be sought on the suggested access for these homes, probably on the eastern edge of the site.

One major issue, which is making planning ahead difficult, is uncertainty about government funding. It is likely that grant rates for affordable housing from the Homes and Communities Agency will be drastically reduced and might even disappear for a period of time. For this reason developers will not invest in the project beyond an indicative plan until there is more certainty about funding.

Another issue was how to make the site viable. The design requirements will mean that there will have to be an element of cross subsidy on the site to make it work. In effect, there will need to be some open market houses which will help to pay for the costs of building the affordable houses. Until the financial appraisal is complete it is impossible to say what proportions (of open market and affordable houses) would make the site work.

Sue Southwell and Rachel Webdell will attend a Parish Council meeting to report on the initial layout and feasibility study, once this has been completed by Drew Construction.

Did You Express an Interest in Cycling?

One outcome of the Parish Plan was that a considerable number of people expressed an interest in some form of cycling activity centred within the Parish, together with several people indicating that they were prepared to organise and/ or help with such a venture.

With formal cycling clubs already existing a short distance away, based in Bude and Barnstaple, they ably cater for the serious cyclist who is keen to be competitive in the different aspects of the sport. Also, the CTC (Cyclists' Touring Club) a national organisation, caters for more social forms of riding and has hubs throughout Devon and Cornwall.

As cycling is a sport which has a number of different formats and, as the Parish Plan questionnaire did not go into such detail, we would now like to find out specifically what it is that people would be interested in participating in locally. So that we can now try to develop this matter it would be very helpful if all the people, who indicated an interest, would please phone **Mike** on **261196** to discuss their ideas.

Triumph Herald 13/60 - 1968 Part 3 The rebuild

Having only a few hours each weekend to do the refit, progress wasn't rapid but with each visit the finish line was edging closer. Restorations are rarely straight forward; jobs that should take 5 minutes ending up taking hours, parts that had been working perfectly beforehand now decide they've had enough.

Come the end of June 2009 I had refitted the wiring, fuel tank and cooling system, enough to fire up the engine for the first time in 3 years. A final check of oil, water and static timing and we were ready to go. After sorting an earth problem, the engine spun freely and ran smoothly, although all was not well as 2 problems were spotted. The first was a few small drips of water from the head gasket at the back of the engine and the second that the oil pressure light was still glowing brightly.

So it was off with the cylinder head, surfaces cleaned, new head gasket and everything was back together; this time she ran with no leaks. I was hoping that the second problem was just



the oil pump not priming, but after several fruitless hours trying to get it resolved the only option was to get the car up on the ramp and remove the sump. With this done the problem was obvious; the alloy casing of the pump had fractured in several places. So a new pump was fitted, the engine re-filled with oil we tried again and this time the oil pressure light went out instantly - a huge relief. So after several lost weekends the engine was finally sorted and I could move on to the next job.

With the engine now running, there was no longer any need to push her around the workshop, as she could now move under her own power....or so I thought. The clutch and brakes were bled, but initially I couldn't get the car in gear. It had been around 18 months since I



fitted the clutch, so I assumed the clutch plate had stuck. This was partly true as wedging the clutch pedal down overnight did free it up and allow me to engage a gear, but when taking her up drive the gearbox was making some expensive sounding crunching noises.

There was no alternative and the gearbox had to come out. With the gearbox removed and the clutch off the problem was obvious, the springs on the friction plate were clipping the four bolts holding on the flywheel. I had fitted heavy duty spring washers to these bolts which reduced the clearance, so these were replaced with standard items, the gearbox went back in (eventually) with help from Steve & Roger, this time the gears could be selected smoothly and without any undue noises.

Later that day it was bugging me why the clearance was so tight on these bolts. Some delving through old parts catalogues made me realise that the bolts should not have had washers at all, their presence was actually dangerous as it could potentially cause the flywheel to work lose - not

good. So I reluctantly took the gearbox out again for the second time, removed the 4 washers, and put everything back, hopefully for the last time in a long while!

In between engine and clutch problems the rest of the refit was progressing slowly but surely and she was looking more and more complete. The last big job was to get the new hood fitted, a fiddly job, but after a couple of attempts Steve and I managed to get it looking presentable. With the hood now on it did highlight how poorly fitting the frame was, so off it came until I could source a better one from EBay. This took a few weeks to source but by early December 2009 the hood was

back on and things were better.

She was finally ready for her MoT and a slot was arranged for 22^{nd} Jan 2010. Some smaller jobs remained to be completed post-MoT.

So 42 years after being first registered and 1,240 days since being taken off the road Bluebell was back on the road and looking as good as new.

There's still a few bits to do, the front seats are in need of replacement, the hood and frame still need fettling, and a few minor parts obtaining – restorations are rarely ever completely finished!

I would like to thank Steve for all his hard work in getting the car looking so good, for his willingness to help out without question and for the use of his facilities. Thanks also go to Roger for his help along the way and for pulling me up the hill with his tractor when it was too icy for my Mercedes. Also a big thanks to Michele for letting me escape for a few hours almost every Saturday and Sunday for nearly a year!

Neighbourhood Watch Report

HAVE YOU SEEN THIS VEHICLE ? A white van, make uncertain, and thought to have the registration number V146 LBF has been seen at a number of properties in the Parish, with the occupants, 3 to 5 males, acting in a suspicious manner. When challenged these people have made a rapid "get away". It is a possibility that this is the same vehicle which has also been involved in a number of thefts and break-ins in nearby villages. With the security of outbuildings and other property becoming evermore important, the police have brought to our attention a reasonably priced padlock which has recently come onto the market. It has a built-in 110dB siren which is activated when the lock is tampered with and requires the key to turn it off. The lock is weather-proof, security key operated, supplied with batteries and comes with a 1 year warranty. It is priced about £12 and if anybody would like to inspect one, or need further information, please contact Edgar.

We have been advised that the annual delivery of the Exeter Yellow Pages will be commencing on 31st August in this area. Where possible these books should be put through letterboxes or handed to the occupants. However, if you see a directory left outside in a conspicuous position and feel that this is advertising the fact that there is no one at home in the property, please take the directory in and pass it to your neighbours when they are home.

Vehicle crime continues to be a significant factor in the number of crimes committed in the North Devon area. Whilst it is pleasing to note that this type of crime has fallen by almost 19% over the 3 months April to June, compared to the same period last year, we can still do more. Many of the vehicles stolen, which include cars, 4 x 4s, quad bikes and tractors had been left with their keys in the vehicles which makes them an easy target for the opportunist thief.

More and more, whether it is by phone or online, we are all being targeted by scams trying to get us to reveal our bank account details. Often these can appear to be quite plausible reasons, such as wanting to make a refund of an overpayment or the like and the caller does come across as genuine. However, please be on your guard against any request to divulge bank or credit card details. Genuine businesses which you have been dealing with should not be contacting you to request this type of information and such requests should be politely declined. You can always call the firm back using your own contact number to clarify a situation. This type of bogus phone call should be reported to the police on 08452 777 444, as soon as possible, with as much detail as possible. Online service providers have their own systems in place for dealing with scams.

Cobnut Banbury cakes

Preparation time: less than 30 mins Cooking time: 10 to 30 mins Makes about 10 cake Ingredients

- 80g/3oz Cobnuts husks removed, roughly chopped
- 100g/3¹/₂ oz Damsons stones removed, chopped (or use the same amount of chunky plum jam and reduce the quantity of sugar)
- 50g/2oz Demerera sugar
- 50g/2oz Raisins
- 75g/2¹/₂oz Currants
- 75g/21/2oz Shredded suet
- 1/2 Lemon, juice only
- 1 Apple, cored and finely chopped
- splash damson gin (or Sloe Gin, whisky or brandy)
- 50g/2oz Lean red meat, such as beef or venison, very finely chopped
- Flour, for dusting
- 250g/9oz Ready-made Puff Pastry
- Caster Sugar, for sprinkling

Preparation method

1. Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5.

2. Place all the ingredients, except the flour, pastry and caster sugar, into a bowl. You can use the mixture straightaway or leave in the fridge for the flavours to develop.

3. Roll the pastry out thinly on a lightly floured surface. Place desserts poonfuls of the filling mixture onto the pastry, widely spaced apart, then cut squares around the mixture.

4. Scrunch the pastry up around the filling and press the edges together to seal, trimming away any excess pastry.

5. Turn the pastry parcels over so that the join is on the bottom and gently press down to flatten slightly. Score the tops of the parcels with a sharp knife.

Place the parcels onto a baking sheet and bake in the oven for 10-12 minutes, or until golden-brown. Remove from the oven and sprinkle with caster sugar while still warm. Once cooked, eat within a day or two, reheating for five minutes in a warm oven before eating
