Regular Parish Council meetings have been held on the third Wednesdays of March April and May. The Annual Parish Meeting was held in April and the Parish Council AGM was held in May. All meetings are open to the public. Thank you to those members of the community who attended the Annual Parish Meeting.

The Milton Damerel Annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 20th April when the Chairman updated the community on the position so far with the Parish Plan and Roger Lawes, Chairman of the Emergency Response Team presented the draft Parish Emergency Plan. There were reports from the Newsletter Group, the Gardening Society, Milton Damerel Parish Hall Committee, the Over 60's, Sunday and Monster Clubs. The Neighbourhood Watch coordinators presented an update on the activities of the Neighbourhood Watch in the parish. The guest speaker James Morrish gave an informative talk on the improvements made to the performance of Torridge District Council over the last four years bringing it up from one of the worst performing councils to the highest rated in Devon, Somerset and Dorset and gaining an award for being the second most improved council in the country.

<u>Parish Council Election and Parish Council Annual General Meeting</u> There were seven nominations from the existing seven councillors for the seven seats on Milton Damerel Parish Council and therefore all existing councillors were duly elected uncontested. At the Parish Council AGM held in May Councillors present signed their Declarations of Acceptance of Office and completed Members Register of Interests, to begin their next four year term of office. Cllr Grace Millman was elected by the councillors to be Chairman for the year and Cllr Gareth Piper was elected to be Vice-Chairman for the year.

<u>Planning Matters</u> Since the last report applications have been considered for single wind turbines at Worden Farm and Gidcott Farm. Milton Damerel Parish Council was also consulted on the applications for single wind turbines at Henscott Farm in the parish of Bradford and at Greylands Farm in the parish of Holsworthy Hamlets owing to the possibility of the structures being visible from within Milton Damerel. Planning applications for the conversion of an old barn near to Milton Mill for residential use and an application for a sensory room at The Beeches, Venn Green were also considered by the Parish Council.

<u>The Venn Green bus shelter</u> recently sustained some damage to the roof slates facing the road in a number of places and after estimates were obtained, a local builder has done the repairs. To make the bus shelter a little more open inside, the dividing wall has also been reduced.

The Annual Return and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31st March 2011 are awaiting audit and are available for inspection by Electors and their representatives until 17th June 2011 on application to the Parish Clerk. The accounts show a surplus of £33 on the year with a reserve of £851 carried forward to the new financial year. After audit and approval by the Councillors at the Parish Council meeting on 15th June, the Annual Return will be submitted to the Audit Commission for certification after which copies will be displayed on the three parish notice boards.

<u>Freedom of Information</u> In line with the publication scheme adopted by the Council in January 2009, requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some information can be made available by email free of charge but paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side.

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Holy Trinity News

It was agreed at the Church Council AGM that I should get quotes for repair of the roof and tower. We are aware that we may be able to get as much as 80% of the costs in grants but this will still leave a substantial amount to raise for the remaining 20%. The estimates will give us an idea of how much the 20% will be. It is only then that we will know what we are up against and if raising the funds is a possibility. I have been informed that grant applications and facilities (permission to carry out the work) can take up to 3 years so we have time to do some fund raising.

I have heard that there is a rumour going around that the roof is to be removed and the church will become a redundant building. This is a rumour. The church may become redundant if it cannot continue as a church but once the roof and tower is repaired it should be water tight and will last for many years to come.

The church welcomed the first Fresh service which was held on the 22nd May. It was nice to see the church come to life with people, music and singing. Food and tea were provided in the chapel hall following. A big thank you goes to Davit Pett for giving us a thought provoking and meaningful service.

The church yard continues to bring its challenges as the grass cutting is becoming overwhelming for one volunteer to do when they are free. The PCC have agreed that we could pay for someone to cut the grass on an occasional basis but this would be at minimum wage plus expenses for petrol etc so if there is anyone willing with time on their hands please can you contact me. Last summer the working party of volunteers worked well and the church yard looked great. Sadly I had to cancel the 2nd scheduled date due to the weather. In view of the success of the working party I am scheduling further dates and call on any willing volunteers. It is not only the grass that needs attending to but the gutters and gulley's need clearing and the felled branches need burning. The dates I am proposing are

23rd June 7PM

14th July 7PM

25th August 7PM

Please contact me to check go ahead if the weather is questionable.

My thinking is that a group work can be fun and a few hands make light work. I promise to bring refreshments. If you feel that you are able to help even just for an hour please can you let me know? Such a community effort could help to save the church from bankruptcy.

It has been brought to my attention that children have been entering the church and have burnt one of the old wooden trestles from the vestry. This is no loss as they were old and rickety and I did think about burning them myself. There is no damage to the church interior and no effects missing. I am aware that word got around and I was contacted by the police. Not wanting to make this an arson enquiry I have suggested that they have a word with any potential culprits. Kids will be kids and they can help us have a big bonfire on any of the nights suggested above if they wish.

In response to this information I know hold the key to the church so if anyone wishes to gain entry please do not hesitate to contact me and I can make the key available to you.

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Milton Damerel Parish Emergency Plan

. In August 1952, twelve people died in a flash flood in Lynmouth.

In 1963, many communities in south west England were isolated by deep snow drifts for up to six weeks.

In October 2008 the village of Ottery St. Mary suffered flooding on a scale never recorded before.

These incidents were unexpected — occurring in areas not prone to natural disaster. In each case normal emergency services could not react, and local residents had to work together in order to cope with the situation.

The planning team appointed by the Parish Council has completed the final draft of the Parish Emergency Plan: it was presented to the Council at the Parish Annual Meeting on 20 April. The full plan is now being published and will be available for perusal through the Parish Clerk. It will be reviewed annually and updated as necessary. A simplified version, together with a Devon County Council emergency planning advice leaflet, is included with this copy of the Newsletter.

The plan is intended for use in extremis, i.e. in a situation where normal emergency services are unable to react. In effect, it formalises the existing spirit of self-help and mutual co-operation that is inherent within the community when faced with an adverse situation.

The Planning Team thank those who assisted, especially with completion of the questionnaire sent out last autumn.



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MARCH

Bill Wrighton gave a detailed talk on pruning showing the tools to use, explaining the timing for various subjects and he showed a film he had made demonstrating the pruning of a Blackcurrant, a Gooseberry, an Apple and a Pear.

The apple was in need of drastic treatment which it got when Bill tackled it with a bow saw to create an open habit.

APRIL

Dr. Wendy Lawrenson a judge for the Best Kept Village competition gave a fascinating insight into the criteria that the judges use when viewing entries, she illustrated this with a series of photographs taken around our parish which she used to demonstrate what would add and subtract from the judges scoring.

She set the audience the task of awarding points of up to 10 in each of 10 categories including for instance the tidiness of bus shelters, the condition of Parish noticeboards, access to rights of way and the state of the roads ignoring potholes, the scores ranged from a very generous 80 down to 60.

MAY

Nicola Wrighton put on a colourful display of summer bedding plants ranging from Petunia, Begonia and Busy Lizzie 6-packs through pot grown trailing plants including Fuchsias, Geraniums and Surfinias to readymade hanging baskets.

She demonstrated how to make a traditional hanging basket using a wire frame and natural moss filled with a good quality potting compost and a range of upright and trailing plants with a Geranium centrepiece.

This demonstration was followed by a Question and Answer session with Nick, Ed and Bill forming the panel which answered numerous questions though an awful lot revolved around replacements that would survive the likes of last winter's devastatingly cold weather.

There are in fact an enormous range of plants that are fully hardy whilst Bill pointed out that a lot of the problem is the modern trend to use what are called architectural plants such as Phormiums and Cordylines which are natives of New Zealand and do not survive much below -12c.

The June meeting, the last before the summer recess will hopefully feature a film show compiled by Bill demonstrating various tasks including lawn and algae treatments with the results shown, potting, seed sowing etc.

The Garden Show is on Saturday September 10th, schedules can be obtained from any of the committee and will be available from the garage in August.

Publicity for Planning Applications

It was normal practice for Torridge District Council to advertise all planning applications in the local press – for the Holsworthy and surrounding areas the Holsworthy Post was used. Last year advertisement of most applications was discontinued, with only applications affecting listed buildings, or in conservation areas, or major development, or such as wind turbines, being advertised in the press.

Now the process for notifying planning applications, in addition to the continuation of site notices at the relevant locations, relies on neighbour notification (see below for criteria), and the online public access planning system on the TDC web-site. Neighbour notification main approach is an individual letter to the occupiers of adjoining and nearby dwellings, defined as those 'likely to have a material planning interest in the application'; this includes all those with a boundary adjoining the application site (including opposite of street/road). 'Material planning interest' may also include properties close to the boundary or front access roads, in particular, for new housing developments.

Where an application for planning permission is made following a refusal, permission or withdrawal of a similar scheme within the preceding 12 months, all those who made individual representations to the earlier scheme will be notified of the new application.

The full Code of Practice for Neighbour Notification is available on the Torridge web-site www.torridge.gov.uk select Planning / Development Control. To view planning applications, incorporating weekly lists, www.torridge.gov.uk select Planning / View Planning Applications / Public Access.

None of the above supersedes the best practice of all... that is ... to have discussions with your near neighbours about your plans for changes to your property, particularly changes that affect or create boundaries, create overlooking, or impinge on landscape and views.

Do you regularly worm your dog.?



Do you regularly worm your dog, did you know that there are two species of dog tapeworm that affect sheep and cause lamb carcases to be condemned at the abattoir due to tapeworm cysts, this can results in financial loss to the farmer. The cysts are found in the organs and muscles of the lambs, the tapeworms are picked up by grazing land contaminated with infected dog faeces, in bad cases all the farmer's lambs are affected, lambs cannot be treated to remove the cysts, the only way is prevention, the only way to prevent infection is to regularly round worm and tape worm your dog every 3 months. If you do not and exercise your dog on farm land the chances are your dog is infecting the pasture. Spot-On flea and worm treatments do not cover tapeworm so treat with Drontal Plus or similar, consult your vet.

Round worm can also cause problems to both sheep and cattle, Neospora and Salmonella to name just a couple. Neospora causes abortion in cattle and Salmonella from dog faeces in hay or haylage results in abortion and other problems in sheep and cattle, a farmer lost 17 sucklers one year with salmonella, dog faeces in his silage was found to be the cause, and don't forget Toxocara Canis causes blindness in humans, so Spot-On regularly, once again consult your vet they will tell you the best treatment for your dog.

If you do exercise your dog on farm land even if they are wormed regularly remember to take your plastic bags to pick up your dog's deposits, that way there are no nasty surprises for anyone handling the grass crop from that farmland.

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AN EARLY START

I am sure there is no need to remind you what wonderful weather we had in April but up to the point of my writing this article May has been, in my opinion, dull and quite windy making it feel cold in comparison.

Like most plants lawns grew apace in April and needed mowing at least once a week but the ground soon dried out and in early May cutting was required less frequently, I am trying to film some examples of lawn treatments for the Garden Society's June meeting but I might have to resort to watering the grass to achieve the desired effect.

YOU'RE NOT ALWAYS TO BLAME

Most of the vegetable plants I started inside have thrived when planted out but seeds direct sown in the ground have achieved very poor germination and two sowings of beet and carrots produced nothing when both sowings of spinach have thrived.

When seeds don't perform I tend to blame myself but it can occasionally be the seed at fault, I sowed peas from a new packet twice but only half a dozen ever germinated, then I bought some more seed from town and all of these grew in the same soil and aspect giving me a thick row so it was not the way I had sown them that was at fault, I always tell my daughter that she must sow the seeds upside down to achieve the results she gets.

My early potatoes and broad beans are very well developed and I should achieve my favourite spring meal of both with a gammon steak in very early June.

FLOWERS

Probably because of the last three cold wet summers I have been jaundiced with the results from the vegetable garden so this year I am growing a lot more cut flowers, a productive tradition on many allotments.

I saved last year's chrysanthemum stools in the glasshouse and propagated a lot more plants from the spring shoots to give me several rows of mixed decorative and spray blooms to start cutting in the late summer, all they require is regular pinching out of side shoots to restrict the number of flowering stems with caning and tying for support.

The antirrhinums (snap dragons) I sowed in early March were ready to be planted out in mid May and hopefully they will produce scented flower spikes suitable for cutting in the summer though I am, perhaps naively, hoping they will survive the winter and being biannual produce even better blooms next year.

The last flowering addition to my vegetable garden will be Sweet Williams but they won't be sown until this month to produce plants to go out in early or late winter to give those long lasting cut flowers next summer and hopefully the year after.

GARDENING AT WAIST LEVEL

Using a raised bed I now have a productive Asparagus bed albeit needs another year for all the plants to produce the thick stems suitable for cutting but there have been enough to give us a few small tasters of what might be achievable in the future.

Last autumn I knocked up a raised narrow timber structure in my polytunnel onto which I placed 4 grow bags then planted each with 3 strawberry plants which have thrived and are loaded with fruit which I should be picking by the time this article goes to print.

They do need a lot of care, watering daily and feeding twice a week, commercially this gro bag method is quite common but of course they have automatic drip watering and feeding systems to ensure the best result.

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CHINESE LANTERNS

Last month I found an expired Chinese lantern in our field where bullocks are grazing. The small wires and bamboo hoops are lethal to animals – wild and farm animals – and if digested can cause much harm or possibly death. When lit and let to fly off into the sky no-one can predict where they will land, often some distance from where set off. Not only will animals eat them in the fields and elsewhere, but they can be chopped up in the silage and cause problems for farm animals several months later.

Quotes from BBC news in 2010 ... "I found the remains of a Chinese lantern within a few yards of where the cow had been lying... and it had been well-chewed. Consulting the vet, his opinion was she had actually eaten part of the lantern and the fine wire inside it had punctured her oesophagus. So she'd in effect spent a long, painful 48 hours suffocating on her own feed."

"There's also a good chance that the wire part of the frame could get wrapped around an animal's foot and become embedded in the skin which would be terribly painful."

"The NFU is also concerned lit lanterns could set fire to fields of standing crops or straw, or to barns or thatched properties."

A massive plea to everyone PLEASE NOT TO USE them !!

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
<u>September 23.2010.</u> Mr and Mrs Philaes Fogg alias Trevor & Penny Sanders with 1,400 passengers and 800 crew set sail on P&O's Oriana ship to cruise the high seas. We left Southampton under dismal cloud to arrive three days later at our first



port of call the beautiful island of Madeira. On 2.Oct. the island of St. Lucia, weather was improving all the time temperatures now 29C. The next port was Isla Margarita, Venezuela, here the ship docked by the beach we all had our first taste of real palm tree beaches and white sand lagoons, Curacao, Mexico followed. By 6. October the ship arrived at the entrance of the Panama canal for the full day transit 80 Kilometres long, through three sets of locks, each of which have two lanes. These operate as water lifts to elevate ships like the Oriana 26 metres above sea level to the height of the Gatun lake then lower them back to sea level on the opposite side, even though the ship uses its own propulsion for the greater part

of the canal, when passing through the locks they are assisted by electric locomotives nicknamed mules, which use cables to align and tow the ship, working in pairs the mules move on rails and keep the ship in position within the locks chamber. The ship has now travelled from the Caribbean sea to the Pacific Ocean, saving hundreds of sea miles but costs the ships £288,000, the Panama canal works 24 hrs a day., since opening in August 1914, 957,698 vessels have transited the waterway. Construction is now underway to enlarge the canal to move even the biggest of cruise and cargo ships. Next stop is Acupulco, highlight here was a display of young death-defying divers some as young as ten climbing up the side of cliffs and diving into the ocean below many films such as Tarzan Lord of the Jungle were filmed in Acupulco. Three days later 13.Oct. we arrived in San Francisco the Golden Gate Bridge, crooked steep streets and a very unusual wharf where many hundreds of Sea Lions bask in the evening sunshine. 17.10.10. today was our Ruby Wedding anniversary we were lucky enough to be able to eat our evening meal outside under the stars overlooking the lovely Island of Kahahii, Hawaii.

22.10.10 The Oriana crossed the equator, big celebrations the Captain was thrown into the swimming pool along with all other crew who had never crossed the line before. 19.Oct. Honolulu next stop visiting Pearl Harbour and the memorial which spans the US Arizona sunk in Pearl Harbour, with over.1777 men entombed. when the Japanese made a surprise attack. on December 7. 1941. 24.Oct. Apia Samoa was final port before crossing the Tasmin Sea, arriving In Auckland New Zealand on the 29.Oct. Next port Tauranga here we visited a Maori village where they still live and work in traditional Maori ways. Wellington was the final stop in New Zealand. 4.Nov Sydney Australia half way and around the world, We have now travelled 16,000 miles. More to follow.

The police officers, both men and women, now have much larger areas to cover and they spend the larger portion of their time in the areas where they are actually needed. Therefore the fact that we don't see a great deal of them means that our own crime levels are low which is surely a reassurance. Whilst Andy Moakes and Raquel Rowe are our two main points of contact, due to shift patterns and absence cover etc., you could come into contact with any of them within the Parish.

The property security marking sessions held at Blackberry Farm on 8th & 9th April were well received and our PCSO's are to bring the marking kit to the fete for anybody who wishes to have their mobile phones, lpods, laptops etc. marked.

Supermarket Scam – one of our members has brought to our attention a scam which could affect anybody using the supermarket cash-back facility. Whilst this scam is not very common in the southwest it is more prevalent in the larger city and urban areas, especially in the midlands and south east. Vigilance is everything, in that this scam takes place when somebody asks for cash-back of say £30 or £40, especially if it has been a large shopping bill. The cashier sneaks an extra £10 onto the cash-back request which he/she keeps back for themselves. Most people don't tend to check the receipt in detail – if they do spot the error at the time it is put down to a mistake and corrected, but if the customer doesn't notice it until later, then with it being a relatively small amount it is shrugged off as a memory lapse on the part of the customer. The answer is to be vigilant and always check the receipt at the time of issue before leaving the till.

I would like to advice people to regularly check their oil and fuel.

Remember:

The theft of possessions occurs to obtain cash or items that can easily be sold on. By marking your possessions or keeping items with scrap value out of sight will deter thieves, decrease the opportunity for it to be sold on and increase the ability for thieves to be caught.

Check stocks of charcoal or gas and clean the Sow spring cabbage, carrots, lettuce, barbeque.

Treat pest and diseases at the first sign and repeat as instructed on the products you use,

Sow/plant runner beans, carrots, beetroot, lettuce, radish, spinach, swede, turnip and the last sowing of peas.

Keep on top of weed control and mowing, growth of both should slow down at the end of the month.

Cut back any herbaceous that has finished flowering e.g. lupins, this may encourage a second later display.

Keep climbers tied back and support any tall growing perennials, chrysanths and dahlias.

Lift early potatoes once their flowers open.

Feed tomatoes weekly, remove side shoots and tie up. By the end of the month there should be a good crop of unripe tomatoes, try putting a few very ripe ones in amongst the plants to encourage the green fruit to turn red. radish and turnip.

Dead head everything that has finished flowering cutting back rose bushes by around a third.

If the weather is hot and dry reduce the regularity of mowing and raise the blades.

Water everywhere as necessary and as long as it is legal.

Sow lettuce, spinach and turnips.

Relax and enjoy the fruits of your labour and decide what to enter in the Garden Show next month.
