Regular Parish Council meetings have been held on the third Wednesdays of September, October and November 2011. The dates of the next three meetings are 14th December 2011 (if required), 18th January 2012 and 22nd February 2012. The agenda for all meetings is displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the given date.

<u>Planning Matters.</u> The Parish Council has been consulted on a planning application for alterations and an extension at Glendene and an application for an extension to the leisure centre entrance at Woodford Bridge Hotel & Country Club.

<u>Winter Roads</u>. The Snow Warden scheme provides the Parish with a supply of road salt/grit to be used on the Parish roads which are not part of the Devon County Council salting network. The Parish Council has agreed to join the scheme this winter. Community volunteers are being recruited, registered and trained by the Parish Snow Warden, Cllr Edgar Pett. The roadside salt/grit boxes will still be available for self-help but the salt/grit is ONLY for use on the public highway. Geoffrey Cox MP was contacted regarding the use of red diesel by volunteers on winter roads and guidance on the subject from HMRC which he provided can be found on page 19.

<u>Affordable Housing.</u> Efforts continue in the background to try to progress a scheme for Milton Damerel but funding difficulties at these times of constraint will inevitably hamper progress.

<u>The Annual Return</u> and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31st March 2011 have been satisfactorily audited and certified by the Audit Commission. Copies have been displayed on the three parish notice boards, in turn during September and October, but if anyone needs any information they should contact the Parish Clerk.

<u>Setting of the Annual Precept.</u> At the November meeting members considered the grant applications received from Parish organisations before finalising the budget for 2012-2013 and completing the application for the parish precept. Parish Councillors are pleased to inform parishioners that the precept will remain at £2350 for a fourth year. This equated to £13.19 per band D property during 2011-2012.

<u>Diamond Jubilee.</u> The Parish Council has agreed to provide Diamond Jubilee Souvenirs for children from birth up to and including Year 6 at Primary School as at 5th June 2012. See article on page 14 for full details. Please submit applications to the Parish Clerk, by 31st December 2011, using the application form provided with this newsletter.

<u>A notice of the temporary closure</u> of the road from Thornbury Mill to Gidcott Cross, except for access, from 12th to 16th December 2011 between 7.00am and 6.00pm each day has been received by the Parish Council due to drainage works being undertaken. Diversions via Bason Cross will be signposted.

<u>The Constituency Boundary Review</u> has been subject to a 12 week consultation ending on 5th December. Details of the proposals are available on the Boundary Commission website but the aim is to reduce the number of constituencies and MPs in Parliament and to include a similar number of electors in each constituency. It is proposed that Torridge District will be split between three constituencies with Milton Damerel in a new constituency with Bideford and Bude.

<u>Freedom of Information</u>. In line with the publication scheme adopted by the Council in January 2009, requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some information can be made available by email free of charge but paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side.

A message from Revd Meg Slingo

Well, here we are and Christmas is almost upon us. So who is Christmas for? Well, Christians around the world will be celebrating and remembering that Christmas is about "Immanuel" God with us.

Christians will be reflecting back on the birth of Jesus who we remember left heaven and came to earth for all people, of all ages, backgrounds and cultures. The shepherds when they heard the news came down the hill into Bethlehem to visit Jesus. The contrast between the different groups of people who came to see Jesus after he was born are striking. These shepherds were Jews and would have known the promises of the Messiah. God gave a verbal message through the angels to the shepherds and this message was full of Old Testament imagery. For example "town of David", "Saviour," "Christ the Lord".

Sunday Club Trip to Freedom Centre

We went to Barnstaple Freedom Centre at half term. This is a very busy church which provides food and food parcels for needy people, clothes, washing facilities and training. There is also a gym where people can learn fitness instruction. Computers are available to help find employment. It reminded us of Dr. Who's Tardis, being moderate on the outside and spacious inside. It is open from 12 noon until 4 in the afternoon but also has the facility to provide shelter during really cold weather. We saw the food warehouse filled with tins of beans, rice pudding and everything you can imagine. Roughly 30-60 people are given meals daily which amounts to approx. 13, 000 meals per year.

We thought it was really good work. We had made sweets to send with Sunday Club which were really appreciated and we received a nice letter to say so. Our church also sent a box of groceries at Harvest Festival. It was good to see it being put such brilliant use.

Shoe Box Service

Brandon, Sheila and Jill were all able to attend the Shoe Box Service held at Black Torrington Church on Remembrance Sunday afternoon. The church was warm and welcoming and well over 100 boxes were gathered there including 10 from Milton Damerel. We had managed to raise £86.00 at the last Tea and Cake afternoon and the Sunday Club helped make the shoe boxes up. During the service, led by the Rev. Kathy Roberts we were asked to each hold a shoebox whilst a prayer was said and a candle was lit. We prayed particularly for those children who would receive a box. Some local children helped out with readings. Rev. Meg told the very moving story of Vanya, (see below). After the service we enjoyed the friendly chat over tea. Finally if you buy any shoes in the next few months please could you let us have the box as it has been difficult this year to get enough shoe boxes! Thank you.

Shoe Boxes

We made shoe boxes for people who are in need of daily life things and stuff to play with, but no chocolate or anything that won't last long. With the toys they don't want anything with batteries. The age groups were 2-5 girls, 2-4 boys, 10-14 boys, 10-14 girls, 5-9 girls, 5-9 boys. They get sent to places like Africa and Asia to help needy people. Brandon.

Vanya's story

Little Vanya is just four years old. Sadly he has no mother or father. Home for Vanya is a tiny hospital ward deep in the chilly city of Mogilev in the country of Belarus. Vanya has cerebral palsy which limits his movement and breathing and so he spends his days in a cot.

When the OCC team delivered Vanya's shoe box the two children who share his room had their mothers with them, but Vanya was alone. His eyes were empty and he was listless. A team member gave Vanya a friendly teddy bear from his box and gently stroked his face. Though he is unable to speak his big brown eyes lit up with delight and his beaming smile spoke more than words ever could.

The team said: 'We had the absolute joy of spending a little time with him, holding his hand, blowing some bubbles over his cot and watching him cuddle into the teddy bear!'



The use of red diesel by farmers undertaking snow clearance and gritting work

Following correspondence with Geoffrey Cox MP on the above matter, the Parish Council felt the information provided from HM Revenue & Customs, as below, would be of interest to the wider community.


European Union and UK legislation limits the type of activities that can be undertaken by vehicles fuelled on red diesel - which is subject to much lower rates of tax than road fuel. Schedule 1 of the Hydrocarbon Oil Duties Act 1979 lists the categories of 'excepted vehicles' - that is, vehicles that are entitled to use red diesel. Schedule 1 includes excepted vehicle categories for 'Tractors', 'Snow clearing vehicles' and 'Gritters'. The 'Tractors' category states that, to be able to use red diesel on the public road, the vehicle must be used solely for purposes relating to agriculture, horticulture, forestry or the cutting of road verges; the 'Snow clearing vehicles' category says that a vehicle is an excepted vehicle when it is being used, or going to or from the place where it is to be or has been used for the purpose of clearing snow from public roads by means of a snow plough or similar device; and the 'Gritters' category says that a vehicle is an excepted and used solely for the conveyance of machinery for spreading material on roads to deal with frost, ice or snow.

In effect, the law allows any vehicle with a snow plough fitted to clear snow from public roads while fuelled on red diesel, but only a purpose built or adapted vehicle can be used to spread salt/grit. We do not consider a tractor towing a gritting cart to be an 'adapted' vehicle because the gritting cart can easily be removed; nor is gritting an activity within agriculture, horticulture, forestry or verge cutting. Further information about which vehicles are entitled to use red diesel can be found in Notice 75 – 'Fuel for road vehicles', which is available on www.hmrc.gov.uk

While we have a responsibility to ensure that the law as set out above is enforced, we also recognise that, in extreme circumstances where the safety of the public is endangered, a pragmatic approach is needed. That is why, for brief periods during each of the last two winters, we relaxed our enforcement of the law and announced that tractors on public roads clearing snow or gritting to provide access to schools, hospitals, a remote dwelling, or communities cut off by ice and snow were entitled to use red diesel. The relaxation of enforcement of the rules took place because weather conditions were significantly worse than normal UK winter conditions. If such extreme conditions recur, we will again consider a relaxation and publish announcements as appropriate on www.hmrc.gov.uk

The issue of whether farmers could be allowed to use their tractors fuelled on red diesel to carry out tasks for the community on a charitable or goodwill basis is one in which the Economic Secretary to the Treasury has taken an interest. She has asked HMRC to undertake a review, and we are therefore looking to see whether a relaxation of the rules could be introduced which is consistent with EU law and which does not undermine our enforcement and compliance responsibilities.





SHOW REPORT

The Garden Show in September was another success with 36 people entering 166 items for the judges consideration and considerable effort was necessary to separate the entries into first, second and third.

A special award for the heaviest Kelsae onion was won by Ken Parnell with his 1.8kg (4lb) specimen whilst Kaya Kirby won the Best Childrens category with a well constructed 'garden themed picture' using natural materials.

The Banksian Medal is awarded to the person scoring the most points overall in all categories, this was won by Roger Daniels though he only beat Liz Kirby by one point.

Best in Show is decided by all the judges jointly and was awarded to Sheila Daniels for her 'Vase of Flowers' which contained at least 15 different varieties from around her garden.

The day was rounded off with several groups enjoying cream teas or cake followed by the raffle draw for numerous prizes ranging from a luxury hamper to bottles of wine.

AUTUMN MEETINGS

Our first meeting after the summer break was on October 5th when we welcomed Michael Gee who some 30 years ago led the campaign to reintroduce the Mazzard (Devon Cherry) to the county, to achieve this he propagated new stock then planted an orchard at Landkey.

Subsequently he wrote a book on the subject and started a society called Orchards Live and is still involved with various projects both local and national, he illustrated his talk with slides showing initially the ancient trees that he found in isolated places on farms from which he obtained material to graft new trees and concluded with shots of the netting going over the tree at harvest time.

In November Trevor Wiltshire gave a very interesting illustrated talk on Cyclamen which included his many travels to Turkey and elsewhere to gather and catalogue new varieties.

He explained that he initially worked in banking but became jaundiced with the services being offered and changed career to become, amongst other things, the superintendent of the rock garden at RHS Wisley.

Trevor is the International Registrar of Cyclamen Species so it is his responsibility to catalogue any new varieties discovered hence his extensive travelling, he brought a selection of plants with him many of which were purchased by members.

WINTER PROGRAMME

Gratton Vineyard

In May 2008, after dreaming about it for 20 years I planted my vineyard in Gratton. To be truthful I planted one vine, a demonstration – the other 199 were planted by friends and neighbours who kindly offered help. The varieties are Siegerrebe (white) and early Pinot Noir (red) and had been grafted onto a rootstock which is disease resistant to root pests like phyloxera that devastated the French vineyards in the 19th century. The choice of vine was made allowing for the height above sea level -140 metres – to ensure the vines would ripen in good time. At sea level these vines will ripen in late August but will be delayed by about 3 weeks on account of the height. Vines such as chardonnay would not ripen at this height before the poor weather arrived.

The first fruits are usually taken in the 3^{rd} growing season but I decided to wait until the 4^{th} as this should yield a better quality crop. So, after nurturing the vines for 3 seasons (2008 was the first) I planned the first harvest. In the spring this year the weather was superb and I counted about 14/15 embryonic bunches per vine – so all looked set for a fine crop. However, in June and July when the weather turned autumnal the rot set in. This is the time when pollination takes place by wind. The appalling rain just swept the pollen to the ground and little pollination took place. Consequently the crop was negligible – I gathered 1 litre of white juice and 5 litres of red juice! The commercial growers in the region fared no better with many of them importing grapes from other parts of the country to keep their commercial business going. Well let's hope for a better vintage next year!

GARDEN REFLECTIONS

MY POOR LITTLE PLUM.

A Victoria plum I planted 6 years ago has had a sad life, when 2 years old it was snapped off by a rogue cow, after it had regrown to what looked like a tree a gale snapped it off but it again grew back with some training to form a short tree.

This year it set a crop of some 40-50 plums which I expected to pick when I returned from a holiday in August but they had all disappeared off the tree and the ground without even a stone left, I couldn't believe that anyone had taken them all but initially it looked that way.

A little later when working in my field I disturbed a Roe Deer which my wife immediately decided was the culprit, I then discovered that deer do enjoy plums which on the tree are at tabletop height for them, so if your crop has disappeared don't assume the neighbours are to blame.

WHERE HAVE THE GOOSEBERRIES GONE??

Sometime earlier in similar circumstances my well laden Gooseberry was stripped just as the fruit ripened, what could have done this without breaking a single branch, any suggestions would be gratefully received.

A HIDDEN MENACE.

Towards the end of last summer we noticed the display from one of the two pots framing our front door was disappointing in comparison to

its twin, I only discovered the cause when I removed the plants it was apparent they had hardly any root and I knew immediately what the culprit would be and lo and behold what little root was left was riddled with vine weevil grubs.

In September I noticed that three strawberry plants I had in a grow bag were drooping even though the compost was wet, when I touched the first plant it fell off in my hand and again the roots were riddled with vine weevil.

In both instances the affected plants were well above ground and the adult who cannot fly must have climbed up to lay its eggs, in the case of the strawberries which were on trestles the climb was some 3' and the only defence would have been grease on the legs.

The grubs are near impossible to kill even with drenching so it is important to keep an eye open for adults and kill them before they have a chance to lay eggs.

WINTER TASKS.

During any dry spells of at least 3 days take a light cut off lawns, without these odd winter cuts the grass will just get long and wet making the first cut next year very difficult even impossible for some mowers.

Service your mower and other equipment, if you send them away to be done make sure the engineers know you must have the machine back within a month in case the opportunity to mow does arise.

Commence winter pruning whether it is fruit trees needing controlling or reshaping, cutting back leggy shrubs, reducing HT/Floribunda roses by at least a third or just removing the dead foliage off herbaceous, woody material should be disposed of in a fire or green bin whilst lighter foliage can be put on the compost heap.

Glasshouses and polytunnels should be cleaned inside and out to let in the maximum amount of light and remove any debris which could decay and encourage diseases or harbour over wintering pests.

Any lingering weeds can be treated with herbicide on dry days, the chemical will take a lot longer to work but I have found a better kill is achieved when the absorption rate is slow.

Community Self-help & Snow Warden Scheme

The Parish Council decided to sign up for the Snow Warden Scheme and the provision of salt for use on parish roads and pavements. Councillor Edgar Pett (Tel: 07811 889457) is our nominated Snow Warden and will be the point of contact.

Several parishioners have been contacted with a request for them to volunteer to look after an area of potential problem should severe weather – snow or very low freezing temperatures – occur over the winter months. Each has been requested to come along to a short training event at the Parish Hall on 23rd November – so that each can be designated a registered volunteer, which is essential for cover under Public Liability Insurance taken by Devon County Council to include the spreading of salt by volunteers.

Salt in 25kg bags will be delivered by DCC to one point in the parish and will then be distributed under the direction of the Snow Warden, for use by the volunteers in their proximities. Devon County Council will ensure all grit bins are filled at the start of winter and may replenish thereafter if able to.

The Parish Council have identified the locations within the parish for which we hope there will be a volunteer – these are hills and steep inclines. For the stretch of road from Gidcott Mill to Gidcott Cross, Shebbear Parish Council have offered to run their salt spreader to Gidcott Cross, for which we are very grateful.

Volunteers will be advised and encouraged only to go out and spread salt if individually each considers it is safe to do so, and they are able to follow guidance issued at the training. The overriding consideration will always be their personal safety.

Please note: in the same manner that Devon County Council Highways is unable to guarantee the primary salting routes will be kept accessible at all times, the Parish Council cannot be held accountable for keeping all parish roads accessible during all weather situations. In good faith we have elected to join the Snow Warden scheme and to benefit from the local availability of salt to spread on public roads and pavements, but cannot be held liable for keeping access open.

Should the need arise, in the first instance please contact the Snow Warden on the telephone number stated above. If this fails you can contact the Parish Council Chair, Grace Millman, (07970792557) or the Parish Clerk, Roberta Jackson (261196).

This is the first year of this new scheme. We will be reviewing, after winter, how well the new arrangements worked, (assuming we have weather conditions which warrant actions by the volunteers!) and will revise our arrangements for future years, if needed. We will be pleased also to receive your comments, after winter, on how well the arrangements worked.

New Police NON-Emergency Number

With effect from 5th September 2011 our new police "non-emergency" number changed to **101.**

The old eleven digit number **04852 777 444** will still work for the next twelve months but the new number is much easier to remember.

This new number was first piloted in 2006 as a partnership between the police and local authorities. It has continued to operate since then as a police non-emergency number in Wales, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, and Sheffield as a partnership between the police and the local council. Police forces across England and Wales are now rolling out 101 as the new police non-emergency number - the number to call when you want to contact your local police but when it's less urgent than 999. This new number will be available 24 hours a day, 7 days per week and is due to be adopted by every police force in England by early 2012. It can be used for everything that the old number was used for, including making contact with Holsworthy Police Station

Christmas Postal Scam

This particular scam seems to crop up every Christmas and people can very easily be caught out as there are now so many different parcel delivery companies. As it has been confirmed by Royal Mail and Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the scam we just can't understand why the authorities don't just close the number down, so please be on your guard.

"A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 (a Premium rate number). DO NOT call this number, as this is a mail scam originating from Belize. If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £315 for the phone call". If you do receive a card with these details, then please contact Royal Mail Fraud on 020 7239 6655. Security of Property

Ladders left lying about can provide a burglar with easier access to an unopened upstairs window. If they need to be left outside please use a lock and chain to make them secure. Make sure and garden tools, trailers and gardening machinery is also safely locked away and that all windows are locked when you're away from your home.

Finally, as this will be the last Newsletter before Xmas, we would like to take the opportunity to wish everybody a very happy Christmas and please remember to take extra care to protect and secure presents and property over the festive season.

Rural Policing Update

- House Burglary at Holsworthy Beacon where by a wallet was taken with some cash.
