Meetings are usually held the third Wednesday of each month when there is sufficient business to require a meeting. The agenda for all meetings will be displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the meeting. All meetings are open to the public and press.

<u>Planning Matters.</u> The Parish Council has been consulted on the following planning applications: At The Old Rectory, an extension to the existing dwelling to include a dependant relatives annex, at The Barn, East Wonford, conversion of a redundant farm building to provide holiday accommodation and at Higher Grawley, a solar photovoltaic array on a shed roof. The Parish Council was also consulted on the Agricultural Determination regarding a building for storage of machinery and hay at Brendon Fields and also for a building for storage of feed and straw at Gidcott Farm.

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 18 April 2012 when Ricky McCormack, Head of Operational Services with Torridge District Council provided an interesting and informative talk and discussion on the many aspects of recycling and waste disposal. He was able to advise that a new contract for the dry recycling has been agreed with South Molton Recycling for an improved and extended service. The cost of the collection of recyclables has to be off set by the market value of the materials and there are many types of plastic that can not be economically collected.

Reports were presented by the Newsletter Group, Parish Hall Committee and Gardening Society who were all in receipt of Parish Council grants. The Chairman Cllr Grace Millman drew attention to the Jubilee News Sheet recently delivered to all households giving details of the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations in the Parish.

<u>The Parish Council Annual General Meeting</u> was held on Thursday 17 May, this was a very short meeting where the Councillors elected the Chairman and Vice Chairman to serve for the following year. Cllr Grace Millman was elected the Parish Council Chairman and Cllr Stephen Moyse was elected the Vice Chairman.

The Annual Return and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31 March 2012 have been audited, approved and signed by the Parish Council. The accounts show £1076.73 to be carried forward to the new financial year, of which £100 is ring fenced by the Parish Paths Partnership (P3) scheme and £203.02 is the balance of the Step Back in Time fund passed to the Parish Council to administer. The accounts are available for inspection by Electors and their representatives until 8 June 2012 on application to the Parish Clerk. The Annual Return has to be submitted to the Audit Commission for certification, after which, copies will be displayed on the three Parish Council notice boards in turn.

A Step Back in Time In 1992 Milton Damerel took part in the Devon Village Ventures Competition and was awarded a Certificate of Merit in recognition of active involvement in the preservation of rural community life in Devon. The certificate and presentation photo are on display in the Parish Hall. There was a cash prize which the committee decided to set aside to help young people undertake special activities. A small number of grants were made to assist with such things as volunteering overseas. The dormant fund has now been passed to the Parish Council for distribution. Letters of application from young people of the parish should be sent to the Parish Clerk for consideration by the Parish Council.

<u>Diamond Jubilee Children's Souvenirs</u> will be presented to those eligible children who have applied, at the Children's Jubilee Tea. Anyone who has made an application but is unable to attend the Tea on 5 June 2012 should contact the Parish Clerk to arrange to collect their child's souvenir medal and certificate after the event.

Refuse and Recycling Bank Holiday Collections. Information has been revised to make clear that schedules will be one day late for *week commencing* Monday 27 August and Tuesday 1 January 2013. Following the Jubilee in June despite it being a two day bank holiday, green box collections will be normal and collections of black bags and green wheelie bins will be just one day late.

<u>Freedom of Information</u>. Requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some information can be made available by email free of charge but paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side. Copies of recent Parish Council meeting agenda and minutes are now available on <u>www.miltondamerel.com</u>.

Devon Oil Collective

The Devon Oil Collective is an initiative launched on 1 February 2012 by the Community Council for Devon supported by Devon County Council which works on the principle that the annual spend on heating oil can be reduced by collectively buying oil in bulk with the aim of helping to combat fuel poverty in rural communities.

Based on a similar scheme in Oxfordshire, a typical savings of around £30 to £50 per 1000 litres of heating oil is predicted and as many homes use around 2,000 litres per year, that equates to annual savings of up to £100 per household. Householders will be charged £24 to join; community organisations £36; and business/statutory organisations charged £120 to become members.

Through negotiation with heating oil suppliers, reduced rates can be passed on to participating households and business premises. Orders are made on people's behalf and oil is delivered to people's properties within two weeks of the order and they pay the supplier direct.

The success of the scheme will depend upon like-minded people volunteering to act as local co-ordinators for their patch, in return their annual membership fee will be waived and they will be provided with all the promotional material they may need to help spread the word locally. **Should you be interested in becoming a local co-ordinator or to find out more about the scheme** contact the Community Council for Devon on 01392 248919 or email oilscheme@devonrcc.org.uk

Roger Clark was our March speaker who with the aid of slides showed us what Agatha Christies Greenway estate looked like before being taken over by the National Trust who he felt had damaged some of the plant infrastructure and alienated many of the long term staff.

April saw a visit from Howard Wills who after retiring from teaching set up Fernwood Nursery at Peters Marland where he specializes in growing Semperviviums holding a national collection of several hundred varieties.

Howard used sophisticated projection equipment to show which mountainous regions these pretty alpine plant originate from and several photographs of plants growing on lumps of rock in the wild where they receive little or no rainfall.

May's meeting was a home movie taken in various members gardens featuring the problems they were attempting to tackle, a sound problem caused by excessive wind slightly marred one members efforts to describe how he is trying to improve his soil by the incorporation of various natural materials but the improvement was obvious even on camera.

The film also featured the complete restructuring of an overgrown apple tree where as much growth had to be removed as was left after the pruning.

The compiler of this newsletter described his efforts to construct a raised vegetable bed with other associated works to create a soft fruit garden and compost heap complete with access paths, he set of with good intentions with his spade but had to resort to hiring an excavator.

Finally a water logged garden at Strawberry bank was shown with advice given on digging a soakaway but the work proved to be too much to achieve in the limited time available so the results or failure will be shown sometime in the future.

On June 6th Michelle Heard of Cheristow Lavender at Hartland will be talking about all the uses they make of the hundreds of Lavender they grow on their 100 acre site. July and August are vacation months with no meetings prior to the Garden Show on September 15th this major event is dependent on a good turnout of entries so we really do plead with everyone to 'have a go' you have nothing to lose and with categories ranging through photography, baking, flower arranging, arts and crafts, vegetable by both size and quality, flowers etc. there has to be something everyone in the parish can enter.



Jubilee fairy cakes recipe

Makes 24

We used ready-to-roll red and blue sugarpaste icing (£1.15 for 250g from janeasher.com) to decorate. It's so easy children can do it.

For the cakes

250g (9oz) butter, slightly softened 250g (9oz) caster sugar 4 large eggs, room temperature, lightly beaten 250g (9oz) self-raising flour 1 tsp vanilla extract

5 tbsp milk

For the icing

1 large egg white

300g (10½0z) icing sugar, sifted



To make the cake, just put all the ingredients into a food processor and blitz until smooth. Spoon into paper cases set in muffin tins, dividing the mixture evenly. Put into an oven preheated to 190°C/375°F/gas mark 5 and bake for 20 minutes; they are ready when you pierce one with a skewer in the centre and the skewer comes out clean. Leave to cool.

Mix the egg white with the sugar and stir with a wooden spoon until really smooth. Leave to firm up a little (it tends to run straight off otherwise), but not so long that it hardens. Spread the icing over the cakes using a small palette or butter knife. Decorate however you fancy and leave to set.

CATCHING UP TIME IN THE GARDEN

If you haven't already done so as a matter of urgency you should be planting all those tender plants you have been protecting, bedding plant displays should be created, hanging baskets hung, dahlias set out, tomatoes even outdoor ones planted, runner beans started up their poles, courgettes, marrow and pumpkins set out with lots of space etc.etc.

Should you be like me you got a little behind earlier in the year when we were having unseasonal cold and wet weather which made the ground unworkable then now is the time to get caught up particularly with weeding and mowing whilst later in June banks and verges of wild flowers can be cut and hedges trimmed.

Chemical weeding.

Lawn weeds should be treated with either granular feed and weed which will boost the grass growth as well as killing both weeds and moss or a liquid selective weed killer such as Verdone, both of these need applying on a dry day so that the foliage can absorb the chemicals.

General weeds in paths and drives or fallow ground can also be treated now with products containing Glyphosate or Paraquat again during dry spells, the first mentioned is contained in Round Up and will take a few days to have any effect because it is being absorbed through the foliage into the roots which it subsequently kills.

The other one mentioned is in products such as Weedol and only kills the tops so the weeds will certainly regrow, a bit like using a flame thrower a quick result but not long lasting, if the problem is mainly annual weeds such as bittercress and willow bay herb then removing the top growth will usually finish them off.

Enjoy your endeavours.

Sometimes we spend so much time working in our gardens we lose sight of it's purpose which is to be a peaceful and calm environment where we can relax on those warm and pleasant summer days which I think we are all hoping to see this year after three very mediocre summers.

Cleaning garden furniture and the barbeque ready for those balmy evenings should be a priority closely followed by checking stocks of charcoal or gas, burgers, sausages, salad ingredients and of course our wine cellars which in my case is a rack in the boot room.

Although what you want to be doing from now on is enjoying the fruits of your labours in the form of fresh vegetable there is still time to sow more crops to keep the supply going into the autumn, I cannot list them all here but in early June you can certainly sow more peas, beetroot, lettuce, spinach etc.etc.

Remember in August to start selecting you entries for the Garden Show, leave a few beans and carrots heading to be the longest, feed and tend the largest marrow and onion, spray your blooms against greenfly and caterpillar so they aren't spoilt and get creating in the kitchen and craft room.

UNSCRUPULOUS TENANTS - HITTING WHERE IT HURTS

Living as we do on an over-populated island, housing is always an area of difficulty. Local authorities have the legal duty to assist those with housing needs who qualify for help. They have a large portfolio of social housing, they partner housing associations in the offer of rented accommodation, and they provide help with housing benefit and council tax benefit.

The higher the concentration of population in any given area, the more difficult it is for a local authority to discharge its legal duties. London is worse than anywhere for that reason. One of the major headaches faced by London boroughs is this. Often someone will climb the waiting list, then be allocated housing. Once in, they sublet at massively higher rental income to them, pocket the difference, and live elsewhere. Herminio Nascimento was one such individual.

He was given the tenancy of a two bedroom property in Westminster. Without Westminster Council's knowledge or consent, he sublet the flat to someone else. He then lived with his partner in their jointly owned house in Crawley. With more than 1,000 families on Westminster Council's allocation waiting list, all waiting to be moved into better accommodation, the Council felt it was time to make a stand

Normally councils in such circumstances resort to civil remedies and seek a County Court possession order. In this case, however, Westminster Council brought criminal charges under the Fraud Act 2006. They wanted this kind of behaviour exposed for what it was exploiting and cheating a vital support system put in place to protect and house society's most vulnerable residents. Westminster Magistrates Court sentenced Mr Nascimento to 16 weeks in prison and £7,100 legal costs in March.

This is the first time a tenant has been charged under the Fraud Act. Other local authorities have taken due note. The Housing Minister has unveiled proposals for criminalising subletting with sentences of a maximum of two years, and fines of up to £50,000.

Meanwhile we read of unscrupulous landlords in East London evicting good tenants so they can get a cash bonanza from letting out their properties to spectators of this summer's Olympics. Probably just as bad in ethical terms as Mr Nascimento's actions - but with little if any come-back for such unscrupulous actions.

WOOLMERS EXETER AND PLYMOUTH GAZETTE SATURDAY DECEMBER 29, 1849

CHURCH DESECRATION

To the Editor of the Exeter and Plymouth Gazette

Sir – A constant reader of your valuable columns regrets to observe in your last that the font of Werburgh's Church, Derby, is removed to a gentleman's garden to put flowers in, (no power, order or authority can sanction this). But what would your readers say on hearing that a few years since the font belonging to the parish church of Milton Damerel, Devon, was removed to a farmyard to meat pigs in? I am, Sir, A.F. Holsworthy, 20th Dec, 1849.

THE EXAMINER (LONDON, ENGLAND), SATURDAY JANUARY 17, 1880

On New Years Eve the Village of Milton Dameral, in North Devon, had a visitation. Exactly at midnight (so the story runs) the inhabitants were startled by the sound of a crash, mingled with the discordant clang of bells. A few of the boldest of the villagers set out, lantern and gun in hand, to discover the evil-doers. They saw no one worse than themselves, but they discovered that the tower of the village church had fallen, "ringing as it fell its own funeral knell". That this should have occurred without any previous warning is strange, but that it should have occurred just as the old year gave place to the new is stranger still.

THE WESTERN TIMES, EXETER, FRIDAY JULY 16, 1880

MILTON DAMERELL

CAULIFLOWERS – Mr. Thomas Yeo, Smith, of this parish, cut in his garden on Saturday a cauliflower weighing 7lb without leaf, and measuring 2ft 9 ins in circumference.

Scams of various sorts seem to be coming to our attention again with increasing regularity. We are therefore setting out below a short article on the subject which has been put together by the Bideford Police Beat Team. Apologies to those who have seen this before but the information remains relevant and as people are still getting caught out we feel that it is worth republishing.

There are always all manner of SCAM going on. These will arrive over the internet, through your post, unsolicited telephone calls and sometimes even via a door step caller. We give the same advice with regards to any get rich quick or surprise win scheme. If it seems too good to be true it almost certainly is. Always consult others before you commit to anything and never believe that you have to do something there and then. Here are some pointers that should help to educate and if adhered to keep you safe.

These schemes usually have a plausible and persuasive patter explaining you will benefit with little effort or risk. Here are some common scheme types:

You've won a major prize in a lottery or draw, even if you haven't entered one

You have exclusive entry to a scheme that's 'guaranteed' to make you money

Earn easy money by agreeing to help them get sums of money out of their country

A chance to join an investment scheme that will make you vast amounts of cash

However, they will be aiming to trick you into doing something along these lines

Send money up front: They may request this in all kinds of ways, such as saying it's an administration fee or tax, but however it's dressed up, the aim is to get you to give up some of your money (and remember, you've not received anything yet, except hollow promises which will inevitably turn out to be false)

Give them your bank, credit card or other personal details: NEVER fall for this one. You should always be very wary who you give such details to. If anyone asks this of you report the matter to your bank immediately

Ring an expensive premium rate phone number: this could cost you a fortune. One simple way to avoid phone scams is to block your phone line from being able to make premium rate calls, contact your phone company about how to do this.

Buy something first in order to collect a prize: there will be no prize or, at best, it'll be worthless. If you receive an e-mail you consider to be a scam then our best advice is to delete without opening it.

More Help and Advice

Office of Fair Trading: If you have lost money and become a victim of an overseas scam, the OFT would like to hear from you. Call them on 0845 722 4499

Consumer Direct: Call for help and advice on 08454 04 05 06 or check their website www.consumerdirect.gov.uk or check out their SCAM WISE leaflet.

ICSTIS: You can complain to ICSTIS, the regulator of 09 phone lines if you have become a victim of a premium rate phone line scam. You can call ICSTIS or even check the status of premium rate numbers by calling them on 0800 500 212 or viewing www.icstis.org.uk.

Police: You can call the police to report a SCAM. They will advise you how to protect yourself from further abuse. Please bear in mind these schemes are very often based overseas.

Sheds and Outbuildings

Thefts from sheds and outbuildings are again on the rise in the rural areas. Gardening equipment and power tools seem to be what the thieves are looking for, so please make sure that your premises are secure and equipment is marked with your post code. If these security markings are clear to see it acts as a deterrent to thieves as the items are more difficult to dispose of. Also, if they are stolen and later recovered by the police they will be able to be returned to you. Trying to return recovered property is a major problem for the police and a quick look at their website, Devon & Cornwall Police-Online Services-Bumblebee Auctions, will give you an idea of the scale of the problem.

When we was brung up proper!

Congratulations to all my friends who were born in the 1940s, 50s and 60s.

First, we survived being born to mothers who smoked and/or drank sherry while they carried us and lived in houses made of asbestos.

They took aspirin, ate blue cheese, bread and dripping, raw egg products, loads of bacon and processed meat, and didn't get tested for diabetes.

Then, after that trauma, our baby cots were covered with bright coloured lead-based paints.

We had no childproof lids on medicine bottle, or locks on doors or cabinets and when we rode our bike, we had no helmets or shoes, not to mention the risks we took hitchhiking.

As children, we would ride in cars with no seatbelts or airbags.

We drank water from the garden hose, not from a bottle.

Takeaway food was limited to fish and chips, there were no pizza shops, McDonalds, KFC or Subway etc.

Even though all the shops closed at 6pm and didn't open on a Sunday, somehow we didn't starve to death!

We shared one soft drink with four friends from one bottle and no one died from this. We could collect old drink bottles and cash them in at the corner store and buy toffees, gobstoppers and bubble gum.

We ate white bread and real butter, drank cows milk and soft drinks with sugar, but we weren't overweight because... we were always outside playing!

We would leave home in the morning and play all day, along as we were back when the streetlights came on. No one was able to reach us all day, but we were OK. We would spend hours building go-carts out of old prams and then ride them down the hill only to find we forgot the brakes.

We built treehouses and dens and played in riverbeds with matchbox cars.

We did not have PlayStations, Nintendo Wii and Xboxes, or video games, DVDs or colour TV.

There were no mobiles, computers, internet or chatrooms. We had friends and we went outside and found them!

We fell out of trees, got cut, broke bones and teeth and there were no lawsuits from these accidents. And we ate worms and mud pies made from dirt too.

Only girls had pierced ears.

You could buy Easter Eggs and Hot Cross Buns only at Easter time!

We were given airguns and catapults for our tenth birthdays, we rode bikes or walked to a friends house and knocked on the door or just yelled for them.

Not everyone made the school rugby, football, cricket or netball teams. Those who didn't had to learn to deal with disappointment. Imagine that. Getting into the team was based on merit.

Our teachers hit us with canes, gym shoes and threw the blackboard rubber at us if they thought we weren't concentrating.

We can string sentences together, spell and have proper conversations now because of a solid three Rs education.

Mum didn't have to go to work to help Dad make ends meet because we didn't need to keep up with the Joneses!

The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke the law was unheard of. They actually sided with the law!

Parents didn't invent stupid names for their kids like Kiora, Blade, Ridge and Vanilla.

We had freedom, failure, success and responsibility, and we learned how to deal with it all.

You might want to share this with others who grew up in an era before the lawyers and government regulated our lives.

And while you are at it, forward it to your children, so they will know how brave their parents were.

Mow and weed very regularly.

Prevailing weather conditions may alter the timing of certain tasks

Weekly feed and tend plants in pots especially Tomatoes and Cucumbers.

Sow more vegetable and salad crops.

Apply pesticides and fungicides as necessary.

Cut back herbaceous that has finished flowering many will produce a second flush in the autumn.

July

Daily water plants in pots indoor or out.

Sow successional crops such as lettuce and carrots, late month sow spring cabbage.

Cut back stems which have flowered to encourage new growth from lower down.

August

Go to the beach, light the barbeque, plan what to enter in the show next month.
