Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agenda for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the meeting. Anyone is welcome but the public are not permitted to take part in discussions, however time is set aside on the agenda of all meetings for public comments.

At the Parish Council meeting held on the 16th December Councillor Gareth Piper was welcomed back to the Parish Council, following co-option at the meeting held on the 20th November.

Annual Grants were considered at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 20th November 2013 and it was agreed that Milton Damerel Gardening Society, Newsletter, Parish Hall and The Holy Trinity Parochial Church Council would receive grants as in previous years. Requests from outside organisations were written to and informed that it is the policy of Milton Damerel Parish Council only to award grants to local community organisations.

Councillor Robin Julian attended the meeting held on the 16^{th} December and informed the Parish Council that a further cut in the budget of two and a half percent would affect services further. Libraries that were uneconomical to renovate could be closed. Due to adverse weather conditions and emergencies Councillor Robin Julian was unable to attend any other meetings. The funding of £500 that the Parish Council requested through Councillor Julian for Public Footpaths (P3) was granted. This was put with the 'earmarked fund' held in the bank account for the Pathway 16 Boardwalk which has now been completed. The total cost of the boardwalk was £2554.94 plus VAT Milton Damerel Parish council contributed £1200.00 and Devon County Council paid the balance.

The step Back in Time Fund for young people has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

At the meeting held on the 15th January the annual precept was considered and the Budget figures discussed in November and December were confirmed. The precept was set at £3506.00. The Parish Councillors appreciate that this is quite an increase over previous years. For the past five years the precept has remained the same, not even a 'cost of living' percentage has been requested, consequently Milton Damerel Parish Council Funds are very low and there is no financial backing for emergencies. As this year there is no 'cap' on the percentage increase that a Parish Council can request it is deemed prudent by all concerned that the necessary sharp increase is made this year, as it seems in this financial situation of cutbacks being made by Government it is highly likely that a 'cap' will come into force in the near future, we might also be asked to undertake work previously done by the local councils. The precept is used for Annual Grants, grass cutting, hall hire for meetings, Insurance, Audit Fees, the Clerks salary and subscriptions. A financial report is given at each Parish Council Meeting.

Planning Matters: The application for the proposed storage and workshop building at Strawberry bank was withdrawn. Milton Damerel Parish Council have been consulted regarding the erection of Wind Turbines at, Babbington, Chilswothy and Land at Down Farm, Thornbury .

An application for a Solar Voltaic Array at Worden Farm has been granted.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections to applications they can convey them in writing to Torridge District Council or send an email to the planning department;

Affordable Housing .. Following the update in the last edition, the Parish Council discussed at their January meeting ideas for alternative sites for affordable housing development. Then ... in late January we were advised that Drew Construction have submitted an updated planning application for the Milton Town sites. Torridge District Council planning officers will now engage in further enquiries with Drew Construction to establish the application is valid. When these are complete the application will be registered on the Council's web-site and the consultation process with relevant bodies and the public will commence. At this stage the Parish Council will advertise the date and times for public sessions at the Parish Hall enabling parishioners to view the plans and raise queries, to be followed by an open meeting when representatives of Drew Construction will present their proposals and take part in a question and answer forum.

Eating out - The New Inn, Roborough

A WINTER OF COMPLETE INACTIVITY

I started to write this article on the 5th February when I was yet again housebound due to the high winds and rain which have been regular occurrences throughout the winter, this was the day that amongst other things the rail line through Dawlish was destroyed.

A consequence of the foul weather was the decision to cancel that nights Garden Society meeting so I spent an hour e-mailing or telephoning all the members most of whom indicated that once night fell they had no intention of venturing out again, the thought of sitting in the hall trying to hear a speaker over the sound of a hurricane blowing was not an attractive one.

LOTS OUTSTANDING.

Like many of you I am not just behind in the garden but haven't actually been able to start any of my winter tasks and not least of the neglected items are the lawns which are looking very long, green and lush so will take two, three or more cuts to get them back to normal but even if we do get a few dry days I wouldn't dare venture onto the lawns the mower wheels would do a lot of damage to the soil and bring mud to the surface.

From November onwards I normally cut back, prune and trim everything from overgrown shrubs, die back on herbaceous to my fruit trees, this year I haven't touched any of them so if it does stop raining at some point I will have a lot of catching up to do though the forecasters are saying there is no improvement in sight during February.

I am very glad that I only planted garlic in the autumn anything else would have rotted off, the garlic has come up but I do not expect the usual excellent results I get.

WHEN CAN WE START.

I am loathe to suggest any tasks in the garden until we have at least a fortnights drying weather which may mean it will be April before we start sowing and planting, at this point it is difficult to believe it will ever be dry again but it will change and then it will be a mad dash to get everything done not least trying to break up the soil for planting, that will be a job and a half after lying wet for so long it will have set into a close approximation of concrete.

I am rather pleased that in November the Garden Societies speaker extolled the virtues of Hostas, well he would he worked at Bowden Hostas, having some wet spots, that now describes the whole garden I could do with some extra foliage and have ordered three plants plus some grasses and ferns.

There is quite a large space to fill so one of the Hostas I ordered is a giant one called Empress Wu with enormous blue/green leaves and pale Lavender flowers on a plant that should achieve over 6' in height and even wider, that will help to fill the space and the plant is too tough to be eaten by slugs, the American Halo and Orange Marmalade that I also ordered are both large growing with variegated foliage.

The grass is one call Imperata Red Baron which to match its name has red leaves and again enjoys wet conditions along with the giant fern Matteucia Struthiopteris Jumbo I have ordered which grows up to 7' tall, my final was Miscanthus Gold Bar a bamboo like grass originating from New Zealand growing to 3' tall with leaves prettily horizontally striped in gold bands.

I'm just hoping when they arrive the weather will be a little better for working outside and that my enthusiasm for gardening will have returned.

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Dog owners "Do you know"

Living as most of us do surrounded by farm land those of us with dogs often let them exercise on our local fields, did you know though that leaving any dog faeces on the ground could cause abortion in cattle. The disease is caused by a singlecell parasite called **neospora caninum**, which lives in both dogs and cattle but only reached full maturity and reproduces in its canine host. Once transmitted to cattle it can result in abortion or the birth of premature, impaired or infected calves. There is no vaccine and no treatment and the only way of eliminating Neosporosis from a herd is to cull infected animals, just think how you would feel if it were your dog that had to be put to sleep because it was infected, a cows life is just as important to the farmer and there is a financial loss as well. Generally people know very little about it and have little thought that their dog might carry the parasite - especially as there is no obvious impact on the dog itself, however they can unwittingly spread it to cattle, where the results can be devastating, and that's why it is important for people to clean up after their pet when out walking in the countryside - especially on pasture land, if dog waste is left in situ, not only can cattle contract the parasite from grazing, but it can also potentially get into grass silage, in that instance the risk of spreading the disease to many more animals is significantly increased.

Spring is almost on us and soon lambing will be in full swing, remember keep your dog under control, sheep worrying is a problem to many farmers, even the smallest of dogs can do a lot of damage if it chases pregnant ewes, the stress of being chased could cause the ewe to abort her lambs. Even the quietest of dogs can become a sheep worrier, and remember if its seen running free and not under control amongst livestock the farmer has a right to protect his livestock. In brief the law is:

1. A farmer commits a criminal offence in threatening to shoot a dog, and also in actually shooting a dog, unless he honestly believed his livestock was 'in immediate need of protection' and that 'the means of protection adopted or proposed to be adopted were or would be reasonable having regard to all the circumstances'. So where shouting, throwing something or shooting over the head would be enough, then that is what should be done first to avoid committing an offence. (Criminal Damage Act 1971).

2. The dog owner can sue the farmer for compensation, and his only defence to killing a dog is he believed and had reasonable grounds for that belief, that either 'there was no other reasonable means of ending or preventing the worrying' or if the owner is not there, that 'there was no practicable means of ascertaining to whom it belongs'. He must also have reported the shooting to the police within 48 hours. (Animals Act 1971).

3. The dog owner commits an offence if (a) their dog is in a field with livestock worrying them, worrying means attacking livestock, or chasing livestock in such a way as may reasonably be expected to cause injury or suffering to the livestock or, in the case of females, abortion, or loss of or diminution in their produce; or (b) their dog is not under control in a field with sheep, even if he was not worrying them, but a police dog, a guide dog, trained sheep dog, a working gun dog or a pack of hounds are all excluded. (Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953).

So when out exercising your dog do keep it under control at all times, when walking through a field with sheep in it keep your dog on its lead, remember that a public footpath is only a footpath not the whole of the field and you and your dog should keep to the designated path and remember to take your poo bags with you and pick up after your dog.

The last meeting of the year, in December, was a quiz night which was both interesting and amusing ably conducted by John Binns with garden related questions in five catagories none of which were too technical.

Unfortunately the turnout was very poor with only 6 members and 3 visitors turning out so we could only manage to assemble 4 teams many of just 2 people, Lesley Self's table won the Duck dinner which they split between themselves.

There was no meeting scheduled for January whilst the February meet on the 5th was the day of the very bad gales, when Dawlish seafront was wrecked, so at 3 pm after discussing the situation with the speaker we elected to cancel the evening and rebook David Usher for our March meeting when he will speak about soil formation and treatment.

April sees a visit from the Tavistock Dowsing Society who will talk about this ancient method of locating water and if the weather allows we might even get the chance to try our hand at locating an underground aquifer.

We are in contact with a couple of possible speakers for our May & June meetings though as an alternative we have a film showing a method of covering raised beds and what pruning Clematis require, if he is free our local grape grower David Fisher will also give us a report on the results of the harvest after our visit last June, we will publicize the meetings at a later time.

Gardeners Diary.

March.

Try to get at least a cut or two off the lawns.

Sow Brassicas in general plus Broad Beans, Leeks, Lettuce, Onions, Tomatoes etc. read the seed packets for more information.

If the ground is still saturated sow indoors and grow plants on ready to plant out later.

As soon as conditions allow plant out Potatoes and direct sow Parsnips, Peas, Radish etc. if necessary cover the ground with polythene for a few weeks to help it dry.

Complete cutting back especially roses before new growth emerges.

Sow bedding plant seed indoors as indicated on the packet, it generally takes 8-10 weeks to be ready to plant out depending on the temperature.

Complete any bare root planting this month.

April.

Sow anything you couldn't do last month and keep an eye on watering indoors.

Sow Runner beans indoors at the end of the month, from sowing it is often only 3-4 weeks before they are ready to plant out.

Start watering any stored Dahlias and Chrysanthemums to promote new growth.

Mow regularly lowering the blades each time.

Clean garden furniture and barbecue.

Treat any hard surfaces covered in moss or algae with Armillatox, slabs, decking, glasshouse staging etc.

May.

Start successional sowings of vegetable crops that you originally sowed in March.

Direct sow Runner, French and Broad beans.

Plant Tomatoes and Cucumbers into their final pots in the glasshouse and provide supports.

Toward the end of the month plant out tender plants, bedding, outdoor Tomatoes etc.

Mow lawns at regular intervals ideally weekly.

Tie in new growth on climbing plants.

Looking Back

From old edition of The Post & Weekly News, Saturday, July 6th 1957, found when clearing out Uncle's house

MILTON DAMERELL.

The Methodist Church was crowded for its anniversary services on Sunday and Monday, and forms had to be placed in the aisles. Sunday's services were conducted by Mr. Badge, of Broadwood, with Mr. Peter Carter at the organ. The collections were taken by the scholars who also gave special singing. On Monday, a tea for the children was followed by a public tea, in charge of Mesdames Burrow, Wonnacott, W. Johns, D. Colwill, S. Bassett, Larkworthy, C. Slee, T. Short, W. M. Carter, J. Hole, Miss A. Yeo. The evening service was presided over by Pastor C. C. Capener and Mr P. Carter. Recitations were given by Terry Wheeler, Marion Wonnacott, Brian Parnell, Grace Daniel, Michael Hill, Diana Wheeler, Charles Daniel, Linda Wheeler, Rita Ashton, Jachol Hill, Mary Braunton, Anita German, Sheila Wheeler, Mary Bassett, Margaret Clarke, Roger Daniel, Dennis Daniel, Christine Palmer, Brian Wonnacott, David German, David Cole. The satisfactory report was read by Pastor Capener. Mrs A. J. Davey, who for many years has helped to train the children, was unable to be present and has now been removed to Exeter Hospital for treatment.

The annual Sunday School Anniversary was a significant event in the calendar of the local Methodist Church. Just after Easter, the Sunday School teachers met and made a choice of special songs for the week-end, from publications written specifically for Sunday School Anniversaries, and to select individual recitations for each scholar to learn and recite at the Monday evening service. About 6 weeks prior to the Anniversary, a choir of about 20 adult members and all the Sunday School scholars would be called to attend twice weekly rehearsals to learn the new songs, under the tutorage of Mr Peter Carter, the organist, and for the scholars to show how much progress had been made with learning the recitations!

For the Sunday and Monday evening services the scholars were given 'pride of place' on an 'elevated' stage' (known as a platform) built along the front of the pulpit, with school (backless) forms as seats, and were expected to display 'best behaviour' through out in addition to being word perfect with their recitations – this was easier for some than for others – stage fright, poor memory, distraction by others – to suggest just a few reasons why not everything was 'perfect on the night'!

The day school was closed on the Monday, known as the Tea Day, so that the main schoolroom could be set up with trestle tables and forms for the scholars and public tea. Sandwiches, thinly cut buttered fruit bread, cut rounds with jam and cream, sponges, cakes, etc. were prepared in the early afternoon and tea would be served from 5pm until the service commenced at 7.30pm. The challenge for the children was to take advantage of being able to play together in Elliott's field, (whilst the adults enjoyed their tea), already dressed in the smartest dresses and suits bought/made especially to wear for the Anniversary, and avoid the many catastrophes a farmer's field can produce - grass stains, cow pats, stinging nettles, brambles tears.....

At least 2 ladies were assigned to each long trestle table to pour tea, for which the best silver teapots and jugs were brought from home, and the best chapel china teaplates, cups and saucers were used. With no kitchen area or sinks washing up bowls were used with hot water drained from the boiler so that 2 - 3 sittings could be managed at each table.

Of the many names mentioned in the article, only one of the ladies is still alive, Mrs D Colwill, of Oxenpark, who now lives with her daughter, Marilyn, at Sheepwash, and just 3 of the scholars now live in the Parish. However, some of us remain in contact with the other scholars, some of them stay in contact and visit the parish regularly, and the majority still alive reside within Devon.

For sure, all will remember, with varying degrees of 'affection' the annual Sunday School Anniversary of their childhood days!!

Children's Easter Recipe

Chocolate Krispie chick

Cooking time

Prep: 40 mins Plus drying time

Skill level Easy

Servings

Makes 1 egg

A crispy treat specially for Easter that kids will love to make during the school holidays

Ingredients

For the egg

- 175g milk chocolate, broken into pieces, plus extra for decorating
- 50g Rice Krispies cereal

To decorate

- 2 x 50g bags chocolate mini eggs
- 2 white chocolate buttons
- 50g golden marzipan
- 25g white chocolate, broken into pieces, plus extra for decorating, melted and cooled a little

Special equipment

• 2 chocolate egg moulds, piping bag, rolling pin, flat pastry brush or small paintbrush

Method

- 1. Break the chocolate into pieces and gently melt in a heatproof bowl over a pan of simmering water, making sure the bowl doesn't touch the water. Stir until smooth, then take off the heat and and stir in the Rice Krispies, mixing well to coat. Spoon half the mix into one of the moulds, then use the back of your spoon to press it into a thick, even layer. Be sure to cover the whole of the inside, leaving a thick edge. Repeat with the other mould and leave in a cool place to set. Put the moulds in the fridge for 5 mins. TIP: Putting the egg halves in the fridge once the chocolate has set makes it easier to add another layer of warm chocolate. Don't be tempted to leave the moulds in the fridge any longer than necessary as condensation could cause the chocolate to discolour.
- 2. Carefully unmould the eggs. Fill one half with a few mini eggs, then fix the halves together with melted chocolate. Patch any holes with a few extra Rice Krispies and melted chocolate. Leave in a cool place to set.
- 3. To make the eyes, paint blobs of melted milk chocolate onto the white chocolate buttons. Fix onto the egg using a little more chocolate. Spoon the white chocolate into a small piping bag, then pipe a beak and wings onto the egg and allow to set.
- 4. For the feet, roll out the marzipan on a sheet of greaseproof paper to about ½ cm thick. Using a knife, cut out two feet, making them large enough for the egg to sit on. Once the egg has completely set, place the chick on its feet, pressing down so that it stays upright. Finish by scattering some mini eggs around your chick to create a nest.

THE PERILS OF BEING A SOLICITOR

Busbys' Bude office is situated on The Strand in Bude. In recent days we have had to resort to sandbags and flood alerts to keep us going. The Daily Mail carried some great online photos of surfers riding the tidal bore upriver outside my office, with waves lapping over the river wall. There is more to come, but with the flood defences working well, we keep our fingers crossed.

Having survived flood and tempest, we were unfortunately unable to avoid human intervention. A few days ago, a drunken male took it upon himself to hurl a building brick through my office door at 4.00 am.

Lawyers, like many in public life, can be easy targets. In January, the High Court ruled that Blackpool Borough Council cannot obstruct a solicitor's ability to provide justice to local residents. The solicitors' firm concerned leased property from the Council in the Blackpool Enterprise Centre owned by the Council. The Council refused to renew the firm's lease. The firm had acted for a number of claimants who had successfully sued the Council for personal injury on Council property arising out of the Council's negligence.

The solicitors saw the refusal to renew the lease as nothing more than an act of vindictive retaliation. The firm brought judicial review proceedings against the Council alleging the Council had acted improperly and had abused its powers. The Judge ruled that the Councils' refusal to renew the lease was an attempt to punish the solicitors. He said: "There can be no conceivable basis for any criticism of a firm of solicitors who, acting in accordance with the law and the relevant professional rules, enable genuine claimants to obtain access to justice so as to claim compensation for injuries sustained as a result of the breach of public bodies such as the Defendant." In consequence, he overturned the Council's decision.

Solicitors, almost to a man or woman, will fiercely represent their clients' best interests. Sadly, and increasingly often in today's blame society, it is the solicitor who carries the can. It is high time individuals who do wrong and get punished for it start looking in the mirror. They should put their own house in order rather than looking to damage someone else's.

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Be 'Cyber Streetwise'

With more and more people taking to the internet for shopping, banking and booking holidays etc., the National Fraud Agency has just launched a new web site <u>www.cyberstreetwise.com</u>, to help give us all some essential tips to improve our performance online and help keep important stuff safe. If you have a few minutes to spare it might be worthwhile having a browse at the site to see if you can pick up any tips.

Scrap Metal

The theft of metal for scrap has been a problem in both town and rural areas for a long time. In an attempt to address this problem the 'Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013' came into force at the end of last year. All scrap metal dealers now need to apply to their local council for a license to operate, under new rules which have come into effect, and there are stiff penalties for flouting the rules and not keeping proper records. Payments are cashless and need to be made into a bank account so that there is a 'paper' trail. The new scrap metal laws will also mean that all scrap metal dealers must verify the name and address of the seller at the point of sale, which is recorded and retained by the dealer. Vehicle details are also noted. There will also be a single national publicly available register of all scrap metal dealers.

Hopefully these measures will go some way to reducing metal theft crime but please remain vigilant as the criminal element will, no doubt, be looking for ways to get round the rules.

Keyholder Registration Scheme

With Spring hopefully just around the corner many of you will be thinking of holidays and time away from home. We have mentioned the Keyholder Registration Scheme in the past but it is a little publicised service that the Police offer and which we feel deserves more merit. Through this scheme you can nominate a responsible person for the police to contact should your home or business come to their notice during periods that you are not available. The person's contact details will be registered on a confidential database which is maintained by Devon and Cornwall Constabulary and can be accessed 24 hours a day, all year round. To register you need to phone 0901 470 0440 but you can get further details from the Police web-site.

Gidcott Area

A warm welcome is extended to Anne Hamilton-Clark who has taken on the responsibility for being NHW Co-ordinator for the Gidcott area. Anne will shortly be contacting the households in Gidcott but in the meantime should anybody wish to speak to her, the contact details are above.

809 Area Code Phone Scams

If you receive any unexpected phone calls, either direct or left on answering machines, asking you to call back urgently and quoting an 809 area code concerning a sick relative or something similar, please ignore it. This scam is being distributed widely and the trick is in getting YOU to call back. The 809 area code is located in the Dominion Republic and with there being so many new codes coming into use in recent times it is very easy to think it is one of our own. The charges afterwards can become a real nightmare. That's because you actually made the call. If you complain, both your local phone company and your long distance carrier will not want to get involved and will most likely tell you that they are simply providing the billing for the foreign company. You will end up dealing with a foreign company that argues they have done nothing wrong. Similar types of scam are also using area codes 284 and 876.

Beware ! Phone calls from 'BT' - don't get caught out.

You may have heard of this scam before, hopefully this will prompt all of us to be wary....

"Received a phone call from BT, informing me that he was disconnecting me because of an unpaid bill. He demanded payment immediately of \pounds 31.00 or it would be \pounds 118.00 to re-connect at a later date.

The guy wasn't even fazed when I told him I was with Virgin Media, allegedly VM have to pay BT a percentage for line rental!

I asked the guy's name - he gave me the very 'English' John Peacock with a very 'African' accent - & phone number -0800 0800 152. Obviously the fellow realized I didn't believe his story, so offered to demonstrate that he was from BT. I asked how & he told me to hang up & try phoning someone - he would disconnect my phone to prevent this. AND HE DID !!

My phone was dead - no engaged tone, nothing - until he phoned me again. Very pleased with himself, he asked if that was enough proof that he was with BT. I asked how the payment was to be made & he said credit card, there & then.

I said that I didn't know how he'd done it, but I had absolutely no intention of paying him, I didn't believe his name or that he worked for BT. He hung up.

I dialled 1471 - number withheld I phoned his fictitious 0800 number - not recognized.

So I phoned the police to let them know. I wasn't the first!

It's only just started apparently, but it is escalating. Their advice was to let as many people as possible know of this scam. The fact that the phone does go off would probably convince some people it's real, so please make as many friends & family aware of this.

How is it done? This is good but not that clever. He gave the wrong number - it should have been 0800 800 152 which takes you through to BT Business. The cutting off of the line is very simple, he stays on the line with the mute button on and you can't dial out - but he can hear you trying. (This is because the person who initiates a call is the one to terminate it). When you stop trying he cuts off and immediately calls back. You could almost be convinced!

The sad thing is that it is so simple that it will certainly fool many. By the way this is not about getting the cash as this would not get past merchant services - it is all about getting the credit card details which include the security number, to be used for larger purchases"
