Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agenda for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the meeting and also on the website. Anyone is welcome but the public are not permitted to take part in discussions, however time is set aside on the agenda of all meetings for public comments.

Milton Damerel Parish Council held their Annual General Meeting on Wednesday 21st May 2014. After serving as Chairperson for five years Grace Millman nominated Stephen Moyse as the Chairman, this was seconded and Stephen was unanimously elected as Chairman of the Council for the coming year. Richard Piper was nominated by Gareth Piper and was unanimously elected as Vice Chairman. Councillor John Webb thanked Grace for all her very hard work on behalf of the Parish, this was reiterated by Stephen and all other councilors present.

The annual Parish Meeting was held on the 16th April and was well attended, with the guest speaker Councillor Philip Collins leader of Torridge District Council giving a very interesting talk, there were also reports from 9 local organisations, an update from the Chairperson for the Parish Council Grace Millman regarding the 'Parish Plan'. The minutes of the meeting will be on the website after the next Parish Council Meeting which is the 21st May 2014.

Councillor Robin Julian continues to attend Parish Council Meetings and also attended the Annual Parish Meeting, he has informed the Parish Council that he has a 'locality' budget to be distributed to Parishes, and this might be the last year that these funds are available. If any resident has any ideas to put before Robin please contact any Councillor or the Parish clerk. Last year with the agreement of Torridge District Council he awarded the Parish £500 which went towards the cost of the new boardwalk. The constant talk of cutbacks continues and it would seem that there could be a substantial reduction in services in the forthcoming Financial year. One of the obvious results is the poor road surfaces and potholes, please report to Devon Highways any concerns you may have regarding this.

The step Back in Time Fund for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Planning Matters: The Parish Council was asked for their comments on several Wind Turbine applications and also solar voltaic arrays panels, and a new 3 bedroom dwelling and annex at Beechcroft to replace an existing property. The application for a wind turbine at South Arscott was refused and has now gone to appeal.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any councillor or the Parish clerk, as there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

Town and Parish Fund: This is an annual grant available to two or more Parishes that join forces to apply for a grant for a specific project. The amount awarded is equivalent to 10p per elector.

Those that were at the annual Parish Meeting would have been informed of the grant awarded jointly with Sutcombe Parish. The grant was spent on a Projector, laptop and two projector screens. These are now available for local organisations to use in presentations either for information or raising funds or any other suitable reason. The equipment can be used at the Village Hall or other premises provided that the presentations are for the local community. For example if there was a family celebration and the organisor hires the Village Hall the equipment would be available as part of the hall facilities, but an individual could not use it in their own home, nor can it be used by other Parishes (except Sutcombe). If in doubt or for any further information please do not hesitate to contact any Councillor or myself.

Japanese Knotweed; if you see any of this very invasive 'weed' growing anywhere either inform the environmental agency ,any councillor or the Parish Clerk. If you are unsure to what it looks like got online where all information you need will be.

Freedom of information: Requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some Information can be made available by email free of charge, paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side. THEFT OF LEAD FROM CHAPEL PREMISES - In the week leading up to Easter a significant amount of damage was done to our premises by thieves gaining access to the roofs and gulleys to steal lead. Some was successfully removed and lead on other areas was damaged in preparation for removal. In addition there was damage to slates and other roof coverings by stripping out the lead. On the advice of the police we have regrettably had to install further security precautions, including closing the school lane to open access, by placing a locked gate at the entrance. We had previously painted "SmartWater" on lead etc. for traceability in the event of theft.

We are very grateful for much support from within the parish and for donations received, monetary and otherwise, and to the police for their attention and very helpful support. Their enquiries continue.

We would ask for your continued vigilance and if you observe anything unusual or suspicious please contact the police by telephoning 101 and contact any of our members, telephone numbers at the foot of this article and also displayed in the chapel noticeboard outside the chapel.

A good number attended Easter morning service, which was led by Mr John Dennis from Torrington, who was recently presented with an acknowledgement of his 50 years as a local preacher. The young people continued their crafts during the service which was followed by tea and coffee.

London marathon 13th April 2014

John, Jo and I travelled to London on the Friday before and went directly to the Excel Centre, London Marathon Expo to register and prove ID. An emotional moment as I really was quite scared and anxious about the whole thing. After a Saturday of trying not to do too much the Sunday morning arrived and I had to be up early to get breakfast and get to the start. The moment I stepped out of my cousins house in Brixton I experienced the much talked about crowd support as people started shouting out my name and wishing me luck. Of course my name was printed across the front of my vest. The start was pretty uneventful. said goodbye to John and Jo and I joined the huge queue for the 'female urinals' which was a bigger challenge and a more alien experience than the marathon itself. I was disappointed to find that I was back in start pen 7 having overestimated my finish time on the application. This meant I had to weave my way past Bagpuss, Jurassic dinosaur, Save the Rhino and the man with a fridge on his back in order to run at a steady pace. I remember enjoying the atmosphere and engaging with the crowds and at mile 18 remember registering a sore toe on my left foot which I quickly put out of my mind. I saw John and Jo at mile 6 and 20. They were lucky to get my attention from the crowds, it was a real boost to see them albeit very briefly.



I had trained up to 20 miles so I knew I would be fine up to that point. I remember thinking at 20 this is where it begins to hurt. In reality I do not remember much of the last 6.2. I think I went into a sort of trance though I do remember having to manoeuvre my way around various suffering individuals who were either on the floor suffering muscle cramps or vomiting at the roadside. I lost all awareness of time in the last miles and my mission to maintain 9 minute miles to complete in less than 4 hours went off track a little. The finish line was suddenly in front of me and the expectation that I would burst into tears was not realised, probably because I was still in a trance like state. As I regained mental awareness I realised that my feet were very sore. However apart from my feet and the feeling of being depleted of energy I felt remarkable good. My marathon was completed in 4hrs 2 mins 15 secs which got me silver UK Athletics Association Award and I broke the Okehampton RC marathon record for my age group. It took 3 weeks before my energy levels and muscle power came back and I was able to run again. I am now minus four toe nails as a result of the battering I gave my feet. Would I do it again? Of course would.

Friends and family had been watching closely on the marathon website tracker especially staff at Hamoaze House who obviously had a vested interest in me finishing. I am now able to confirm that the total amount raised came to £879.46 however taking into consideration the sponsorship that was gift aided brings the total up to approx. £980. I know this will go some way to providing vital services to people who are trying to abstain from substance misuse. I have been shown much appreciation from the service users at Hamoaze House some of which I have got to know quite well as they have taken an interest and followed my training.

Free Parish Council Pack - helping people to cope during power cuts...

....from Western Power Distribution

The Parish Council has received a parcel from WPD containing a demonstration pack to be used by Parish Councils to inform residents on the useful items a household should consider keeping in case of a power cut. Councillors felt the most effective way of communicating this is by an article in the Newsletter.

The issue of the free demonstration pack arises from the severe weather conditions during December 2013 – February 2014, when there was significant damage across the electricity network, leading to power cuts for many customers.

The recommended items as displayed in the photo below are:

- Analogue telephone (digital cordless phones will not work during a power cut)
- Torch with batteries
- Powerbank (for charging essential items like mobile phones during a power cut)
- Rechargeable radio
- Foil blanket
- Reusable hand warmer
- Information booklet

THE MYTH OF THE COMMON LAW WIFE

They say that all of life is a learning curve. As a solicitor, I find that what happens when life ends can be the desperate learning of a very harsh lesson.

I'm sure that a number of readers will have tuned into Radio 4 recently to hear of the experience of a poor woman. She had had a loving relationship with a man over many years, outside of marriage. He had cancer. She was his main carer. There had been little, if any, discussion on life after he died. In fact the will left everything to his long-separated wife and the children of the marriage.

The poor woman had simply thought that as a "common law" wife, she would have priority due to the fact of their loving relationship. She discovered that trying to show his will was simply out of date meant nothing. She was surprised to discover the stark truth. She got back a sum of money representing the capital she had put in. She lost one of her treasured wishes - the right to remain living in the home she had shared in life with her partner.

If she pushed it further, she might have brought a claim under the Inheritance Act. That would have asked the Court to consider giving her reasonable financial provision from her late partner's estate. This could include the Court giving her a life interest in the property they shared. She might also have a claim under the Trusts of Land and Appointment of Trustees Act. Here she would ask the Court to resolve a dispute about the ownership of the house in her favour. She might also be advised of the possibility of bringing a claim to challenge the validity of the will. She might want to argue, for example, that her late partner may have been subjected to undue influence, or lack of capacity, or want of knowledge and approval.

But such challenges produce their own set of angst, particularly to someone still grieving at the passing of their loved one. Allied to undoubted emotional trauma, there will be worries about the likelihood of success, delay, and significant costs issues.

Lawyers like me regularly bang the drum about the unfairness in the way cohabiting couples outside the union of marriage are treated in the law. The phrase "common law wife" is virtually meaningless. Cohabitation, no matter how long it might be, does not guarantee financial security. Married partners have hugely more protection under the law as it presently stands. Changes to the statute book have been slow in coming.

All the more reason, therefore, to ensure that there is a will in place which truly reflects the wishes at any given time of the will maker. The man with cancer had an out of date will. It did not reflect his true wishes as his cohabiting relationship developed. But he did not think to change it. So his old will, never swapped or updated, was the one which counted - the one taken by the Probate Court as representing his wishes as at the time of his death.

If you are in a cohabiting relationship outside of marriage, take time to stop and think. Do you have a will? Is it up to date? Does it need changing? If so, what steps will you take to make a will or update an existing one?

Real pain, real inequity may be the result of doing nothing. The same applies to us all - make sure you gift your property to the people in your life who really matter. Otherwise people you may no longer like or love may be the surprised beneficiaries of your largesse.




Bones of men and animals have frequently been found under Churches or bridges, which would seem to indicate the continuance of the practice until comparatively late time.

A PROPER SPRING – AT LAST

Wasn't it wonderful during the last few months when everything bloomed when it should, we had several magnificent displays from the likes of Snowdrops, Daffs., Primroses and Bluebells all running into each other to give a continuous display for some 2/3 months, not to forget how good the Camellias and Rhododendrons have been not having been frosted for the first time for a number of years.

June is the catch-up month when we try to get the jobs done that we should really have done in May for example planting out tender plants including Runner Beans, Marrows/Courgettes, Pumpkins, Dahlias, Geraniums and bedding plants in general.

By now early potatoes should be well up and having been ridged up during April/May you can start lifting some small crops of tasty young spuds later in the month, I have grown International Kidney this year, when grown on Jersey they are marketed as 'Jersey Royals' and I am hoping for something approaching the flavour of the famous variety.

LAWN CARE

If you want to improve your lawn now is your last chance it will soon be too hot and dry to apply any treatments, mow regularly which probably means every week, 3/4 days after a cut you can apply a feed but make sure it gets watered in before you cut next time.

There are several granular feeds available many containing weed or moss killers or a combination of both so decide what your problems are and treat accordingly, if you consider moss to be most problematic then treat the lawn with lime at around the same time which will change the acidic conditions moss enjoys.

Those lucky few who do not have unwanted vegetation can use a straight forward feed which can be granular or liquid, liquid products are cheaper but take longer to apply and cannot be applied in just one operation, liquid lawn weed killers will kill a wider range of weeds than the granular ones but weeds such as clover which shed the liquid so it cannot be absorbed through the leaves need a wetting agent to help the droplets to adhere to the leaves.

You must not use any treatments containing lawn weedkillers on areas containing wild flowers which will be killed by the chemical.

FLOWERS

Having had a mild winter, very few frosts, all those plants I overwintered in my glasshouse survived and started into growth in April these included quite a few dahlias especially Bishop of Landaf which I seem to keep increasing my stock of, last year I

had enough to plant a row in a raised south facing bed in a sheltered spot and in September they gave a magnificent display.

Chrysanthemums are another flower I have taken to in the last couple of years and I kept stools of both early outdoor and late indoor varieties, as soon as they grew new shoots off the old stumps I took these as cuttings, when these rooted I was able to discard the old stools growing the young cuttings on in small pots.

The late indoor varieties take longer to grow flowering in the early winter so need to be dealt with first, I plant the young well rooted plants into 10ltr pots and pinch out the growing tip an action I repeat when the new shoots have reached around 30cm, at 45cm I start caning the stems tying carefully to hold the considerable weight.

To produce sprays the plants can now be left to grow naturally, for show blooms side shoots must be removed leaving just the leading buds to grow into the large individual blooms usually 6 or 7 per plant, since seeing some at a wedding 3 years ago I have been growing Spider chrysanths which have very open slightly twisted blooms much nicer than I have described them.

Early outdoor varieties will be planted out late May/early June and treated the same way as the indoor ones but will bloom in late August/September.

Actually, growing chrysanthemums is not new to me I used to grow them commercially by the hundred selling direct to florists and through Birmingham market, unfortunately that was over 40 years ago so I had to remind myself how to do it.

BUSINESS CARDS + OTHER STATIONARY

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The first society meeting of the year took place in March when our speaker was David Usher a very experienced gardener with a background in private gardens, he talked about how soil is formed from the breaking down of rock and the different types of rock that form the differing soil types we work with.

He then discussed the various types of soil and what we can do to improve them including compost and fertilizer incorporation.

April was a very interesting meeting with Nigel Twinn from the Tavistock Dowsing Society explaining how dowsing works, what you can dowse for and how helpful it can be even to plan a route when travelling.

Nigel had bought along a number of bent bits of wire which we all used to dowse for water under the hall floor.

No one is more sceptical than me having always considered the crossing of the rods is probably influenced by the person holding them but even with a very tentative grip on the rods they reacted positively with no help from me, they both swivelled round from pointing straight ahead and crossed over each other at right angles to their previous position.

Since then I have tried it at home and had positive indications in a couple of places in my back yard, I think one of them may be where the now defunct well was but of course the rods give no indication of the depth of the water, electric, gas or whatever you are looking for.

In May we kicked off with a report from David Fisher on his grape harvest which he measured in bottles not barrels, this was followed by a short film starting with the pruning of the three different categories of Clematis in Edgar Pett's garden.

In Bill Wrighton's garden we were shown how to construct a simple polythene cloche over raised vegetable beds and then a method of constructing a large decorative compost heap using slotted pressure treated timber.

The last item was a clip in Gareth Smith's garden showing the different soil ameliorants he was adding to his soil last spring followed by a verbal report from Gareth on the success of these treatments.

The June meeting is a quiz evening presented by John Binns, we then have our summer break until the Garden Show in September when we hope to see you there with lots of entries, we need your support.

Garden Society Quiz night on 4th June 7-30pm at the Parish Hall.

The event is open to everyone not restricted to Milton Damerel residents, entry costs £1 for members £2 for all others.

The quiz is garden themed but not aimed at experts for instance the last one contained the following questions:

GARDENERS DIARY

IUNE

Start feeding tomato plants as soon as the first flowers open, remove sideshoots and tie up at least once a week.

Feed Peppers and Cucumbers in fact most things growing in pots.

Mow very regularly.

Treat algae/moss on hard surfaces with Armillatox or similar and apply stain/preservative to wooden surfaces including decking.

Treat pests and diseases as soon as you spot them.

Late in the month cut banks and other areas of wildflowers

JULY

Sow vegetable plants for a continuous supply.

Water and feed all plants in pots.

If we get a decent summer be aware of the need to water new planting.

AUGUST

Keep on top of watering.

Take the opportunity to sit back and enjoy the fruit of your labours

AGRICULTURAL RECORDS

Edgar Harris, who lived at West Wonford until 2008, kindly gave me a few articles and items of interest from the extensive collection of his late brother, George. One of these was 6 hand-written sheets, headed Agricultural Records - J M Stratton, cataloguing points of interest covering years from 359 to 1929, some 17 centuries, that George had noted. Internet search showed the book was "Agricultural Records A.D. 220-1968 by J. M. Stratton". From a commentary about the book I have found that it was compiled by two Wiltshire farmers of two different generations, it lists year by year information about weather, crops and agricultural prices. In turn J M Stratton's book was based on Thomas H Baker's 'Records of the Seasons, Prices of Agricultural Products and Phenomena Observed in the British Isles', published in 1883 and again in 1912. John M Stratton took it as a starting point for a compilation of records to 1968, and updated to 1977 and published again. Baker's work is drawn mostly from local sources (he farmed near Mere in Wiltshire, Stratton at nearby Stockton), while Stratton's attempts to bring a national perspective. It is suggested that this is a book to reach for when needing a work of history – what was the weather like in that year? What was the price of wool? Was there famine or plenty? It is also a book to dip into, to find fascinating little pieces of information.

Clearly, George Harris had found it very interesting to so laboriously hand-write snippets from so many years. The typed versions are also several pages so over the next few editions of the Newsletter we will print a section. Hopefully many of our readers will also find the record interesting.

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Paper-wrapped quiches recipe

- Serves 8
- 15 mins to prepare and 15 mins to cook
- 120 calories / serving
- Healthy

Ingredients

- · 400g (13oz) spinach, well washed
- · 6 large eggs
- · 100ml (3½fl oz) milk
- · 2tbsp freshly grated Parmesan or Gruyère
- · 1tbsp black pepper
- · 2tbsp chives or parsley, finely chopped
- · 2 thick slices ham, diced
- · 8 cherry tomatoes, halved

Serves 6

- · 15mins to prepare and 20mins to cook
- · 336 calories / serving2 red peppers

Cook the spinach in a dry nonstick pan over a high heat until wilted, tossing well. Squeeze dry and set aside.

Preheat the oven to Gas 4, 180°C, fan160°C. Cut out eight 15cm (6in) squares of baking paper and use to line eight deep muffin moulds.

Beat eggs with milk, cheese, pepper and chives or parsley. Scatter a little spinach and ham into all the muffin moulds. Fill each one with a little of the egg mixture and top them with two cherry tomato halves.

Bake for 12 to 15 minutes until just set. Top with the extra grated cheese.

Eat warm, or cool

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Access to library services in Milton Damerel and Holsworthy

Following a recent review of the Mobile Library Service, the schedules have been rearranged and the van now visits Milton Damerel once every four weeks. It is hoped that the service will be more reliable as they will have a 'spare' van to use whenever a vehicle is off the road for any reason, therefore visits should not have to be cancelled at the last minute.

Starting in April the mobile library is at Lizzy's Larder on a Wednesday every four weeks from 3.45pm to 4.30pm. The next dates are 4 June, 2 July, 30 July, 27 August and 24 September.

The static library in Holsworthy is open four sessions per week, Monday 2-5, Wednesday 10-6, Thursday 10-5 and Saturday 10-1.

DCC are currently consulting on a series of proposed changes to the way all library services operate in Devon. Got to www.toughchoices.co.uk and click on Devon Libraries under Current Reviews for details and to complete a feedback form. This consultation ends on 17 July 2014.

There will also be an opportunity to discuss the proposals with Devon Libraries managers at a drop-in session at Holsworthy Library on Wednesday 23 June 2014 from 10am to 12 noon.

Holsworthy Library is one of 22 libraries considered appropriate to become Devon Centres, however the current library building, which was built in 1967 covering just 90 sq metres, has limited potential to provide a wider range of services to the local community due to its small size. DCC state that they "would be happy to discuss with local organisations any proposals for co-locating in another building in the town to develop a Devon Centre approach".

For the remaining 28 libraries, DCC proposes to work with communities to identify how these smaller libraries could be sustained in the future as Community Libraries.

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I Enjoy Going to My Church

I was, very reluctantly, persuaded to join a church Alpha course. I told them I would be a party pooper, because I would say exactly what I thought and not pull punches. The Rev. Jane Close said "That's exactly the sort of person we want on the course". In discussions the speaker put in the top marker, I put in the bottom marker and the others slotted into the continuum. Everyone's opinion was heard and valued. The course was brilliant, and afterward I was much more comfortable in church, unchanged but a known quantity.

Then I joined a church 'House Group'..... Couldn't avoid it really, because it's at our house. Some of the church stalwarts are in this house group and I expected to be in a minority of one. But, we each have our unique and personal belief and accept that it is so. For each of us our belief has to be instinctive and for a Christian, guided by the words and deeds of Christ. At no time have I felt pressure from the church to modify what I think or to conform to a norm.

In church now I say every word of the responses and sing every word of the hymns. As a member of the congregation, I can do this. The words often go beyond my personal belief, and probably beyond that of most people in the congregation; they have been refined over centuries and represent the very limits of our aspiration as a church. But I do feel that this should be explained to newcomers, whom I see sitting there feeling as I used to feel in church.

For example: the Creed, which we stand up and say in the church service, was first formulated by a council of bishops in 325AD. It is the distillation of their total belief and is probably beyond any single person's belief. In church I say it as a member of the congregation, to whom it is an aspiration and an inspiration.

Communion is often a problem for newcomers, taking the bread and wine is 'jumping in at the deep end'. I used to stay in the pew, but that seemed very negative. Then, for many years, I went up and took a blessing, which I really valued. Now I take the bread and wine. Everyone has the choice.

Church is at the centre of our community. It is its own community of love, fellowship and friendship. It links the generations and joins us through the ages, with those who have been before and with those who will follow. It is somewhere for the whole family to go and meet up with others.

The bottom line is, that I go to church to thank the Creator for my life and for having activity and participation in His wonderful creation.

Tea and toast in the meeting room afterwards, with the buzz of happy conversation, is a bonus.

WORLD WAR I

In the early summer of 1914 the assassination of Arch Duke Franz Ferdinand in Sarajevo led the European powers to invoke various treaties set up and agreed over the previous decade and so the World War or Great War began. With much interest on commemorating the events and remembering the enormous loss of lives during the 1914 - 1918 World War, we have been receiving in the parish enquiries about the fallen heroes and others who served in the First World War from this parish.

If you take a quick tour around Milton Damerel you won't see a war memorial, a common sight in most villages and towns across the land. Was Milton Damerel one of the 31 Thankful Villages? A Thankful or Blessed Village was a community where all those who went to serve in the First World War returned. A look in the Chapel answers the question about Milton Damerel, on the South Wall is a Scroll of Roll of Honour and a Memorial Plaque, both displayed on the south wall inside the Chapel, as follows:

Torridge District Council is proposing a memorial for all our Fallen Heroes and has requested information from each parish about the names and ranks of all those that died from your Town or Parish during the First World War. As readers will see that close examination of our Plaque and Roll of Honour shows some discrepancies between the two, and there is no record of rank. Searches of World War 1 records on the internet have assisted but there are still some gaps. Do you have any information you are able to share, particularly those who lost their lives during the conflict?

- Although **Frank Ayres** is mentioned on the Memorial Plaque, his name does not appear on the Roll of Honour, and although there are several Frank Ayres on the internet records, there is insufficient detail to link any of the records to someone originating from this parish / area.
- **Arthur Jordan** was a Private (16936) in the Devonshire Regiment and was the step-brother of Mary Harris of Higher Grawley, Milton Damerel, Brandis Corner. He was killed in action on 1st July 1916. He was born in Bideford and resided in Holsworthy. No age is recorded.
- **Frederick T. Martin** was a Private (202217) in the Worcestershire Regiment and was the son of Frederick & Elizabeth Martin of South Wonford, Thornbury, Brandis Corner. He was killed in action on 27th May 1918, aged 23 years. His record states he was born and resided in Milton Damerel.
- **William J. Cornish** was a Private (27955) in the Somerset Light Infantry and was the son of Mrs S. Cornish of Milton Mill, Milton Damerel, Beaworthy. His date of death is recorded as 19th January 1919, aged 20 years.
- **Sam Sanders** is included on the Roll of Honour and listed as killed in action, but his name is not on the Memorial Plaque. He was a Private (53330) in the Machine Gun Corps and was killed in France on 27th July 1917. He was the son of John & Alice Sanders of Justment, Brandis Corner.

There is a headstone for the grave of Marwood Oke in the Chapel graveyard, and some of the other names in the church yard from the Roll of Honour. There are also several unmarked graves which may be the resting places of any of those listed.

To commemorate the centenary of the start of the war the Church is looking to compile a list of all those from the Parish who served in the first world war, record their names and something about them and their service. If you know a story from a grandfather, father or other family members and want to share it, have it written down and recorded for others in the Parish, or if you are interested in looking into the archives and doing some research on those who served then please contact Anne or John Binns at the usual contact details or contact Grace Millman (01409 261251). We will put these stories together and make it available at an event at the Church on Sat 16th August.

We are pleased to be able to let you know we have two additional members to the Holsworthy Police Team. PCs Mark Holmes and Caroline Franklin are both experienced officers and have family connections with the South West. This brings our PC strength up to four, with the aim of increasing response times in the Holsworthy area. In the past, with the possibility of a response officer having to travel from Bideford, Bude or Launceston there is a built in delay of 20 - 30 minutes extra travel time. The aim is that this is much reduced.

After the good news in the first paragraph, we will sadly be losing PCSO Beverley at some stage during June. Beverley is transferring to the police station at South Molton as she and her husband are re-locating to the Tiverton area. We have always found Beverley to be very approachable and helpful, and wish her well in her new work place and new home. We understand that Beverley's place at Holsworthy is not being replaced but as there are currently two PCSOs covering the Holsworthy Town area there will be some reorganisation of responsibilities. We will keep you informed of developments.

In our article in the Summer Newsletter last year we covered the different options available for property marking. We now have some ultra violet marker pens which work on a variety of surfaces and if anybody would like one please contact your co-ordinator. If you don't have the Newsletter article from last year it can be viewed or downloaded on "miltondamerel.com" or if you don't have access to the internet your co-ordinator will be happy to let you have a copy.

Doorstep Criminals

Whilst living in a rural area we are not troubled to the same extent by 'cold-callers' as are those who live in urban areas, we are never-the-less faced with the problem from time to time. Rogue Trading incidents typically occur where consumers have been 'cold called' by traders using fraudulent, misleading or aggressive practices including: deliberately overcharging, incompetent workman ship, charging for unnecessary work, damaging property deliberately in order to obtain work, leaving work unfinished, intimidating behaviour. The rogues often target the most vulnerable in society including the elderly, housebound and those suffering from dementia. In the worst cases many thousands of pounds are obtained for work of little or no value. Devon and Somerset Trading Standards has successfully prosecuted rogue traders operating in this area. Last year a cowboy builder from South Devon was handed a custodial sentence after cheating an elderly Devon resident out of nearly £120,000 by overcharging her for various building works at her property, including some work which was also unnecessary.



Cases like these show the importance of using recognised, suitably qualified and accredited tradesmen. Anyone looking to have work done should ask friends and neighbours if they can recommend somebody and our own Parish newsletter displays adverts from many reputable local traders.

We have a small supply of these stickers, if anybody would like one, which will fix to a prominent position on or near your door in an effort to deter cold-calling.

Incidents can be reported to trading standards on 08454 04 05 06 or to the Police on 101 for non urgent cases or 999 if it is urgent.
