Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agenda for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Thursday before the meeting. The minutes are posted to the website as soon as they have been approved at the following Parish Council Meeting. Members of the public and press are always welcome and time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time.

**Annual Grants** were considered at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 19<sup>th</sup> November 2014 and it was agreed that Milton Damerel Gardening Society, Newsletter, Parish Hall and The Holy Trinity Parochial Church Council would receive grants as in previous years. Requests from outside organisations were written to and informed that it is the policy of Milton Damerel Parish Council only to award grants to local community organisations.

## Dates for your Diary

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on the 15<sup>th</sup> April 2015, All residents are cordially invited to attend. Guest speaker to be announced. Local organisations will be invited to attend and give a short report about their events of 2014-2015. The Annual General Meeting will be held on the 20<sup>th</sup> May 2015.

I am sure you are all aware that there is a 'National Election' in May, if you have not as yet done so make sure you are on the electoral role to vote. Are you aware that there are also the Parish Council elections? Have you thought about becoming a Parish Councillor? If you are interested details will be available from the Parish Clerk, or have a chat with one of your Councillors.

<u>Councillor Robin Julian</u> has attended several meetings throughout the year and continues to work hard for the constituents in his area. There has been some considerable talk regarding financial cut backs throughout all departments. In particular Devon's roads are suffering. Complaints regarding pot holes and poor surfaces are reported regularly by the Parish clerk and Councillors, but if you have any concerns regarding road conditions you can report directly on to Devon County Council website. There are also ideas regarding 'Community self help schemes' and Community Road Warden Schemes', details of both are available from Devon County Council website or from the Parish Clerk.

## Planning matters;

There have been several applications for converting barns to residential dwellings; some of the applications have been turned down as there are strict criteria covering these applications,

Wind turbines continue to be applied for, the recent refusal of a planning application for one at Culsworthy Farm, Sutcombe has now gone too appeal. Permission was granted to the application for a 'Solar Array' at Cross Farm.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk, as there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

From April 2015 Torridge District Council will no longer be sending out copies of 'Plans' to the Parish Council, this is to save the cost of printing and postage costs. The projector and laptop will be used if the Parish Councillors wish to see the plans in more detail, the plans will be 'downloaded' to a memory stick to be viewed at the relevant Parish Council meetings.

<u>The Step Back in Time Fund</u> for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

## Projector/Laptop

The Projector, laptop and projector screen purchased in conjunction with Sutcombe Parish Council is available for local organisations to use in presentations for information or raising funds or any other suitable reason. The equipment can be used at the Village Hall or other premises provided that the presentations are for the local community. For example if there was a family celebration and the organiser hires the Village Hall the equipment would be available as part of the hall facilities, but an individual could not use it in their own home, nor can it be used by other Parishes (except Sutcombe who are joint owners). If in doubt, or for any further information, please do not hesitate to contact any Councillor or myself.

#### T.A.P. Fund

This year's allocation was donated to the 'Holsworthy Longhouse Project', 15 other Parish's contributed making a grand total a total of  $\pounds$ 8128, a very worthwhile project.

## Holy Trinity News

Just before Christmas Fr Christopher had major surgery and is recovering well, he is gradually taking on more work and expects to be back taking Services for Easter.

## From the Church Wardens:

There have been some recent changes in the Holsworthy Deanery; the new Rector, Richard Freeman in Bradworthy. Chris Hardwick leaving Pyworthy and Bridgerule and the combining of Holsworthy and Bridgerule/Pyworthy Benefice. The impact of these changes to the rota of Church Services will take time to bed in so please bear with us as we plan forthcoming Services. One suggestion to reduce the number of churches which now fall within the Holsworthy Benefice is for Holy Trinity to become part of Bradworthy Benefice but this simply makes Bradworthy a 6 church benefice instead of Holsworthy. Nothing is decided and much more discussion and engagement needs to take place before any plans are made.

## **Revision of the Church Electoral Roll:**

The electoral roll is revised annually. A notice announcing the revision of the roll is now displayed on the notice board adjacent to the church door. The existing Roll is also displayed and to be on the electoral roll a person needs to have been baptised, be at least 16 years old and either:

- Living in the parish and a member of the Church of England or a Church in communion with the Church of England
- Not resident in the parish but is a member of the Church of England (or a Church with which the Church of England is in communion) and has regularly attended worship in the parish during the six months prior to enrolment
- A member in good standing of a Church which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity and they are
  prepared to declare themselves a member of the Church of England, having regularly attended worship during
  the six months prior to enrolment

During the period of preparation of the roll, members on the previous roll need to apply to be included - inclusion is not automatic and new people also apply during this period. A person applies by filling out an application for enrolment form which should be completed by 7 March ahead of the Annual Meeting on 22<sup>nd</sup> March. All persons whose names are entered on the church Electoral Roll of the parish and all persons resident in the parish whose names are entered on a register of local government electors by reason of such residence are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on the 22<sup>nd</sup> March after the Service

## "I Enjoy going to my Church"

John Taylor's first article under this heading was published in our June 2014 Newsletter, at which time John had no idea that he was seriously ill. The follow up articles below were written as John deteriorated, having been diagnosed with brain tumours in March 2014 and sadly passing away in November 2014, at the age of 76. John hoped to promote dialogue about the Church in his community and others if possible, which is amazing as John described himself as agnostic up until a few years ago.

## I enjoy going to my Church 2

As a toddler I said prayers with my Mother at night. I was sent to Sunday school as a youngster – perhaps so that parents could spend time together. Said prayers in school assembly, we all did, signed in as C of E for National Service when you nominated a Christian faith, or Atheist – there was nothing non-Christian to chose.

My wife and I were married in the old Methodist Chapel at Meriden, she was always part of her church. Our home is Fillongley where our two children were born. Like everyone we are busy parents and family activity grew, as the children grew. Now the grandchildren grow, the first starting University this year.

In recent years, my wife and I share and prioritise our time in church. It is our faith that Jesus speaks to us man, woman and child, telling us in simplest terms of God's love and care for each one.

I live in my village, identified by my culture, proud of my family and confident of the future generations.

But recent events had me think outside the village. I grew up in a world of mono countries in antagonism, of mono religions in antagonism and of mono cultures in antagonism. Now it is a multicultural global world. It is a world in which every culture and every religion must be equally valued and respected by the other.

There is a massive responsibility on humanity to manage change and to make things work – but ultimately, we must depend on what is beyond us, which for us is the Creator.

#### I enjoy going to my Church 3

Our church is alive and dynamic. We are each comfortable in our church community and in Christ. We have a large and growing Sunday school and many youngsters who participate in services, in clarity and understanding, especially in family services. All ages enjoy the togetherness and share togetherness readily with any visitors to our services. And of course we have a good 'chin wag' and chance to meet up, with coffee, cake and toast, in the meeting room afterwards. We are happy and self contained in our church.

But in our community, I believe, there are a number of modern people who have Christian and spiritual values but are alienated by the church. Maybe services are too drilled and formulated, without freedom and lacking in self expression. I don't have answers, only my thoughts.

There must be massive changes in all religions. In the new world of equality of cultures and in respect for each others religion, then we must surely come to the conclusion that the Creator, whom is infinite and totally beyond human understanding, must be the one God.

People must work together for peace in the further ages. This is a massive 'sea change' in the world and it is inconceivable that there can ever be a third war but we can only ultimately depend on the Creator. In the new world, every individual must go forward fulfilled.

These are my thoughts, shared with the readers of the Parish Magazine, for what they are worth. These articles are intended to stimulate thoughts about our church and the intention is to create dialogue in the Parish Magazine.

#### I enjoy going to my Church 4

In the world of our village and our church, I hope for continuity for years to come. I hope that our church and community grow and also hope that some of my simple thoughts can be brought into a dialogue in the Parish Magazine. If you have an opinion about where our church is succeeding or failing for you, share your thoughts. Whether you have never been to church or go with doubts, you will be welcomed by the congregation and to the service. You can go forward with Jesus in your heart.

Looking outside from our church community, there are such massive changes in our lane in 20 years. Agricultural activity was dominant and people were tied in to local activities but for some, now, community is not there. But let's stay in the present, how can you improve our community and our church.

## LEGAL ADVICE FROM BUSBYS SOLICITORS

## **INHERITANCE REFORMS**

Many people have regarded the inheritance rules as unnecessarily restrictive and indeed punitive in their operation. For example, under the old rules if you were married, then died leaving no Will and no children, then after a statutory legacy of £450,000, half of this would have gone to your parents or siblings.

New provisions came into force on 1 October under the Inheritance and Trustees' Powers Act 2014. The new provisions change the way a person's estate is divided should they die without having executed a valid Will.

Under the new rules, if a deceased person leaves a surviving spouse or civil partner but no children, the surviving partner inherits everything. If the deceased person dies without a Will but leaves children, the surviving spouse receives a statutory legacy of £250,000 plus the deceased spouse's personal belongings, as well as half the estate.

One of the effects of the new rules is that one's second spouse would take over 50 per cent of everything.

Under the new rules, we do not see any significant protection for co-habiting partners who never married. There is little if any protection for children from previous marriages or for wider family members. The terms of the Act mean that from 1 October there is a streamlining of the intestacy process with the removal of a number of fairly obvious anomalies. However, the intestacy laws will not work in every situation, given what we see as extremely mobile and complex family structures in the modern era.

If you die intestate, you lay yourself open to many unintended consequences. Your estate may still pass to individuals whom you would not wish to benefit. It will also sadly be the case that people who should have benefited will be left out in the cold. If you have a partner whom you did not marry, that partner will lose out massively.

The only way you can truly protect your assets and ensure that your inheritance goes where you want it is by drafting a Will to represent your real wishes. Despite the critical need for a Will, estimates indicate half to two-thirds of all adults in the UK do not have a current Will.

I would therefore urge readers to ensure they have an up to date Will. I would also urge them to use qualified insured solicitors because they are trained to spot and address the issues that might lead to trouble later on. Anyone can set themselves up as a "will writer" under the current laws. You therefore need to distinguish between those writing Wills who are unregulated, uninsured and untrained, and solicitors who specialise in this area and who offer a quality service.

## Police launch Operation Jessica to protect the elderly and vulnerable from fraud

Following a recent rise in the numbers of frauds against the elderly in the North and West of Devon, Police have developed Operation Jessica.

It aims to warn and protect elderly and vulnerable residents against the perils of frauds, particularly those designed to catch people off guard via phone calls or through the mail.

Since May 2014, thirty five elderly victims have fallen foul of frauds operated by organised criminals, defrauding them out of life savings totalling over £600,000. Police suspect the figure is higher, with many incidents going unreported. The average age of victims is 75.

Operation Jessica has been launched to reduce the likelihood of further elderly people becoming victims.

"This operation is about protecting the most fragile members of our community from frauds which come through the postal system and criminals who contact them by phone. By raising awareness of this these frauds and working with the community we intend to make North and West Devon a less profitable environment for criminals to operate within. We all have a role to play in preventing this type of crime, and this could be as simple as discussing these types of fraud with an elderly relative, friend or neighbour and what they can do to prevent themselves from falling victim to one of these frauds." DI Praveen Naidoo

In liaison with Trading Standards police have identified 340 people whom fraudsters may be targeting and as part of the operation, uniformed police teams will be visiting people on this list to identify victims of crime and enable them to take steps to reduce the likelihood of further victimisation.

"Always check the identification of anyone at your door, if for any reason you are still unsure check with the organisation the individual represents using a recognised phone number. In the case of the police this is 101.

"Be suspicious of any call purporting to be from the police or the bank reporting any fraud on your account. End the call.

Never give your PIN, security or bank details to anyone over the phone.

"If you receive a call you are unsure of wait at least five minutes before attempting to make another call to ensure you're

not reconnected to the offender. Use a different phone e.g. a mobile phone or a neighbour's phone. If that is not possible

then phone a known friend that you will recognise to test the phone to confirm you aren't still unwittingly connected to the

Operation Jessica derives its name from 'Think Jessica' a national campaign set up to protect elderly and vulnerable people from postal and phone scams, founded by Marilyn Baldwin OBE. "The full price of fraud is not just financial or economic; it causes emotional and psychological harm to individuals and damages businesses."

#### Shed Burglaries are on the Increase

Over the last few months we have seen a rise in the number of thefts from sheds and outbuildings. Some of these have been from locked buildings where there has been a forced entry but there have been a few where the buildings have not been left secure. Nothing has been reported from our own Parish but most of the surrounding villages and hamlets seem to have been targeted and suffered from such attacks. Please continue to be on the look-out for unfamiliar vehicles parked in the area and pass their details to Raquel or your co-ordinator.

## Winter Road Conditions

During this period of unsettled and poor weather conditions, driving on our lanes can sometimes be problematic. Of all our roads, only the A388 is salted regularly by DCC Highways, which means that our lanes, which are frequently wet due to poor drainage, become skating rinks. Please take extra care and drive according to the conditions. Steering and braking are severely compromised when the roads are icy and it is far better to arrive at your destination a little late, than not at all. There are salt/grit boxes in various locations throughout the Parish which can be used to treat the roads when conditions demand it. Spreading details are on the inside of the box lids and should not be exceeded as this is just being wasteful. The Parish is fortunate to have a nominated Snow Warden in Edgar Pett, and any problems should be directed, in the first instance, to Edgar on Tel: 261277.

## **Property Marking**

Those of you who have bought, or been given, some new equipment at Christmas, don't forget to "mark" it and register it on the free property register at www.immobilise.com. If you don't have access to the internet yourself a relative or family friend can do it on your behalf. We did an article covering property marking in the June 2013 issue but if you don't still have this to hand, we have a hand-out sheet which any of the co-ordinators will be pleased to let you have.

#### Scams

Scams continue to be a regular feature of our articles for a good reason. The crime statistics show that whilst most types of crime are actually falling, scams are increasing at an alarming rate. Research carried out by ICM, suggests that **58% of people have received suspect calls, a steep rise from 41 per cent of** respondents in a similar study carried out last summer. The figures also show a threefold rise in the amount of money lost to phone scammers over the last year. **£23.9m of losses can be attributed to Vishing – up from £7m** in the previous year. These 'cold call' scams typically involve fraudsters deceiving victims into believing they are speaking to a police officer, a member of bank staff, or a representative of another trusted agency, such as a Government department. Typically, the criminal will convince an individual that they have been a victim of fraud, and will ask for personal and financial information in order to gain access to their account. This can include card details, four digit PINs and passwords. Another variation of the scam involves the fraudster persuading their victim to transfer money to other accounts or to hand over cash directly to a courier. No matter how plausible the call may sound please remember that the banks, card companies and police **will not** ask you for personal details in a cold call situation. If you have any doubts whatsoever about a call it is better to phone them back on a number from your own records rather than any number which is given to you by the caller.

## A reminder to dog owners.

Spring is almost on us and soon lambing will be in full swing, this is just a reminder, please keep your dog under control, not just during Spring but all year round. Sheep worrying is a problem to many farmers, even the smallest of dogs can do a lot of damage if it chases pregnant ewes, the stress of being chased could cause the ewe to abort her lambs. Even the quietest of dogs can become a sheep worrier, and remember if its seen running free and not under control amongst livestock the farmer has a right to protect his livestock. In brief the law is:

**1**. A farmer commits a criminal offence in threatening to shoot a dog, and also in actually shooting a dog, unless he honestly believed his livestock was 'in immediate need of protection' and that 'the means of protection adopted or proposed to be adopted were or would be reasonable having regard to all the circumstances'. So where shouting, throwing something or shooting over the head would be enough, then that is what should be done first to avoid committing an offence. (Criminal Damage Act 1971). 2. The dog owner can sue the farmer for compensation, and his only defence to killing a dog is he believed and had reasonable grounds for that belief, that either 'there was no other reasonable means of ending or preventing the worrying' or if the owner is not there, that 'there was no practicable means of ascertaining to whom it belongs'. He must also have reported the shooting to the police within 48 hours. (Animals Act 1971).

3. The dog owner commits an offence if (a) their dog is in a field with livestock worrying them, worrying means attacking livestock, or chasing livestock in such a way as may reasonably be expected to cause injury or suffering to the livestock or, in the case of females, abortion, or loss of or diminution in their produce; or (b) their dog is not under control in a field with sheep, even if he was not worrying them, but a police dog, a guide dog, trained sheep dog, a working gun dog or a pack of hounds are all excluded. (Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953). So when out exercising your dog do keep it under control at all times, when walking through a field with sheep in it keep your dog on its lead, remember that a public footpath is only a footpath not the whole of the field and you and your dog should keep to the designated path and remember to take your poo bags with you and pick up after your dog.

It is also inadvisable to walk through a field with your dog, where cows are with their calves, cows can become very aggressive towards you and your dog and as your dog is likely to look to you for protection you are the one likely to be attacked and trampled, not your dog.

Enjoy the countryside with your dog, but remember keep it under control at all times around livestock, if you can't see it you don't know what it is up to.

#### HOT CROSS BUNS

#### FERMENTER

7 fl oz Luke Warm Water1 Egg beaten2oz Strong White Bread Flour2tsp Caster Sugar1 Satchet Dried Yeast

#### THE CROSSES

Plain Flour

Water

TEA CAKE MIXTURE - makes 12 buns

1lb Strong White Bread Flour 3oz Caster Sugar 3oz Margarine 6oz Mixed Dried Fruit 2tsp Mixed Spice 1tsp Salt



1. Measure the water in a jug then add the egg, if necessary add a little more warm water to make the egg mixture up to 1/2 a pint of liquid, whisk with a fork.

2. Weigh the flour put into a large enough bowl that will take the egg mixture and allow to rise, then add the sugar and yeast, using a small spoon gradually add the egg mixture until all blended together, cover with cling film then leave to rise in a warm place for 30 minutes.

3. Whilst the liquid is fermenting, measure the flour, sugar and margarine into a large bowl, rub dry ingredients together until resembles breadcrumbs, then add the spice, salt and dried fruit, mix together, leave to one side.

4. When 30 minutes are up, pour the fermenter into the dried fruit mixture, knead all ingredients together in the bowl then pour the dough mixture onto a floured surface and knead, add alittle more flour if required to stop the teacake mixture from sticking to the surface after about 5 mins place into the large greased bowl, put some oiled cling film over the mixture and cover the bowl with a damp tea towel, leave in a warm place for 1 hour.

5. After an hour take dough out of bowl and knead again, this is called knocking back, put back into the bowl cover with the oiled cling film and tea towel then leave for another 30 minutes.

6. Now divide mixture and shape into 12 buns, place on a baking tray lined with baking parchment cover the whole tray with some oiled cling film and leave in a warm place for 45 minutes until double the size.

7. Put some plain flour into a cup add water, mix together until it forms a paste, put into a piping bag and pipe crosses onto each bun.

8. Warm the oven to 150oC and bake in the middle shelf for approx. 10 - 15 minutes check and turn the tray every now and again.

9. Once out of the oven, warm some honey and brush over the top of each bun, leave to cool on a cooling rack.

# THE WINTERS ALMOST OVER.

I know it is probably just me but it seems to have been a short winter (still time for some bad weather) though the opportunities to get anything done in the garden have been few and far between, I normally mow at least once a month but have only recently managed to take the first cut since October and many other tasks have been postponed or cancelled.

I am sure in normal winters we get the odd days here and there when the skies clear, the winds drop and we can get outdoors to carry out mundane though important tasks albeit with multiple layers of clothes on, this winter seems to have been especially miserable trapping me indoors or am I just being a wimp.

## Making a start

Indoors there are many tasks that can be started especially seed sowing including Broad Beans, Cauli., Cucumbers, Tomatoes and many others whilst early potatoes should be in trays chitting for planting out mid/late March.

I have had excellent crops of garlic from October plantings but didn't get any cloves planted last year so I am reverting to the advice been given in the 1970s to plant in March to hopefully produce a crop in August.

Many national companies are advertising their range of bedding plants saying that they are supplied in large 'ready to plant' plugs but if planted out whether into containers or the ground I feel many will go rotten, they need potting on into 9/10 cm pots for a few weeks before being planted out which should not be until May.

Some of these plug plants are expensive and you can buy bigger more reliable potted plants from local nurseries/garden centres for little more cost.

Nurseries generally buy young plug plants, after potting into packs or pots they are grown on for anything up to 2 months before being offered for sale, most nurseries do not sow their own seed which can be unreliable without a very specialist propagation unit.

If you have been filling a compost bin for some time now might be good timing to break it open and use the rotted material in the garden either as a mulch around permanent planting to keep the weeds down or forked in ready for new planting or to condition the soil in the veg beds.

Now is a good time to carry out planting of shrubs, roses, herbaceous etc, as the soil warms up it gives the plants a chance to produce new roots to establish them in their relocation before they start to leaf up when they need to be drawing moisture from the ground.

A start should have be made on breaking up the soil in the veg bed ready for new planting and sowing, it is only weeks away from sowing peas, broad beans etc the seeds of which you can buy in packets or loose from a few shops in town.

Spring pruning should be started especially roses, cutting back HT's and Floribundas by at least another half from the autumn pruned height and trimming any wind damaged growth off climbers and tying them back to their supports.

If you need to feed any plants in the garden now is the time to do it with the slower release fertilisers such as Vitax, bone meal etc.
