Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agenda for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Thursday before the meeting. The minutes are posted to the website as soon as they have been approved at the following Parish Council Meeting. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time

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<u>Annual Grants</u>: At the Parish Council meeting held on the 18th November 2015, grant applications for the financial year 2016/2017 were considered, the Parish Councillors unanimously approved grants for Milton Damerel Parish Hall, Milton Damerel Newsletter, Milton Damerel Parish Church and Milton Damerel and District Gardening Club. Cheques will be issued during September 2016.

Councillor Robin Julian has attended several meetings throughout the year and continues to work hard for the constituents in his area. He was an avid supporter of Holsworthy and Bideford hospitals not losing any Community 'Beds' as such was delighted with the recent decisions. There has been some considerable financial cut backs throughout all departments of Devon County Council. In particular the Highways dept., consequently Devon's roads are in a very poor state. Complaints regarding pot holes and poor surfaces are reported regularly by the Parish clerk and Councillors, if you have any concerns regarding road conditions you can email <u>csc.roads@devon.gov.uk</u> or report directly on to Devon County Council website. The more residents that complain the more likely notice will be taken. The Parish Council have been notified that road maintenance from Stibb Cross to Woodford Bridge will be tak-ing place in March/April, this was scheduled for March 2015 but did not take place. It has also been stated that the very poor surfaces further along the road towards Holsworthy will also be repaired.

On a brighter note, Councillor Julian approved a grants from his 'locality budget, $\pounds 100.00$ to the Toddler Group which will pay for new chairs and play equipment, $\pounds 100.00$ to the 'Monster Club' which was used for a New Year Party and $\pounds 100.00$ for the renovation of the notice board at Holsworthy Beacon which is in a very poor condition, if it has to be replaced this amount will be put towards a new board

Planning matters: Recent applications approved by Torridge District Council Planning department include a two storey extension at South View, and retention of existing structure at The Oaks. Applications refused include a barn conversion at Lower Walland, a dwelling at Millrose, retention of 2 metre high fence at The Oaks, and the retention of Kennel Blocks at The Oaks. Applications to be discussed at the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

The Step Back in Time Fund for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Town and Parish Fund: This is an annual grant available to <u>two or more</u> Parishes that join forces to apply for a grant for a specific project. The amount awarded is equivalent to £1.10p per elector. Your Parish Councillors unanimously decided to once again join forces with Sutcombe Parish Council, in a joint effort to obtain the funding to keep the Parishes verges and hedges cut. Devon County Council do not seem to carry out this work, except on main highways. The grant was applied for and it was approved, thus the cost of cutting the verges in September 2015 was recovered. It is hoped that further funding will be available from Devon Highways, but failing this the Parish Council will endeavor to, when and where necessary have the verges and hedges cut. The cost of which will be paid by using the 'Contingency' amount from the budget. This is an amount of money added to the budget each year to cover any cost that is not envisaged.

The Laptop and Projector purchased with the 2013/2014 TAP grant has been used on several occasions by local organisations. Please contact the Parish Clerk if you wish to use the equipment.

Dog Owners: This is still a problem, as some irresponsible residents are still not taking their 'poo bags' home, but leaving them about the Parish, please **take them home**. New notices have been displayed, and whilst no Parishioner or Councillor wishes to do so, if the problem is not dealt with Torridge District Council will be notified, they are in a position to fine any guilty Dog owners a spot fine of £75 and if taken to court this could be increased to up to a £1000.

Freedom of information: Requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Just a Thought ... After Christmas

The shepherds said one to another, let us now go even unto Bethlehem and see this thing, which has come to pass. (Luke 2:15)

I'd like to know what happened to the shepherds after Christmas. We can be fairly certain about what happened to the others. There weren't many there, just enough to represent humanity; and we know what happened to some of them. Mary and Joseph, for instance: they were what we'd call naturally good, naturally religious people. There are some in every generation: devout, unwavering in their faith. We know what happened to Mary and Joseph after Christmas: they stayed with Jesus, right up to the end. There are many who will come to Bethlehem who won't go on to Calvary, but Mary did and we can be certain that Joseph stayed beside her as long as he lived. Mary ministered to Jesus at the joy of his nativity, and she was still there, serving him at the sorrow of his crucifixion. So we know what happened to Mary and Joseph. There are always some people whose behaviour we can predict: their goodness is so fixed and settled, we know how they'll react in a given situation. We can usually tell what the truly devoted will do. Bethlehem and Calvary are all one to them. Yes, we know what happened to Mary and Joseph after Christmas.

But what happened to the shepherds? That's what I'd like to know. After all, they were the biggest group there, as they are the biggest group anywhere. They were the common people, neither particularly devout nor particularly interested in religion; working men with little time to think about such things. Shepherds are usually very busy earning a living or enjoying what spare time they have. And we can be fairly certain how they behaved in Bethlehem. They'd stand around at the back, the way they do at weddings and baptisms, feeling slightly awkward and out of place, nipping out occasionally for a smoke. Perhaps they were impressed in spite of themselves, made uneasy by the sense that maybe there was something here they ought to be paying attention to, because it was mysteriously important. I like to think that at least one of the shepherds was permanently affected by that night and that he stood. strong and grieving, with the group at Calvary a lifetime later.

But I suspect it wasn't true for many of them. I think I know what happened to the shepherds after Christmas, because it happens year after year to most of us. After the temporary excitement and charm of it all we go back to our average ways. We remain unchanged. Bethlehem is nice once a year, but we are too booked up to go any further.

But why? Why it is so easy to remain unchanged, uninvolved? After all, we are not talking about some harmless and irrelevant interest that has its strange enthusiasts. We are talking about the action and presence of Almighty God. We are talking about God whom one day, maybe one day soon, we shall confront with unavoidable finality. Of all things, then, why is it so easy to avoid him, to avoid the very reality that gives us the power of avoidance? Why is it so easy to be like the shepherds who went back to the price of wool and the cup final at Nazareth? The answer is simple. Is there, do you think, anything more helpless than a new-born baby? One thing, perhaps: a man nailed to a cross. Yet this is how God comes to us: in helplessness. He does not crush us with fantastic power: he presents himself in weakness and in silence. But why? Why does he make it so difficult: a baby in a manger, a man on a cross? Why like that? It's because he will not force us. He wants us to recognise him by our free choice: and because he is so quiet, it is easy to overlook him. Day after day he lays before us quiet and undemanding signs of his presence, wanting us to stay long enough to read them and recognise him and go to him at last. And most of the time we don't notice, we rush past.

In Church, or wherever we are reading this article, we're given another opportunity to meet him. Like the shepherds, maybe we were interested in Christmas for the excitement, the novelty. Perhaps some unbidden prompting caused us, almost in spite of ourselves, to think about these events. Whatever the reason, here we are: reading this article or sitting in Church, caught for a moment slightly off guard.

I wonder what happened to us after Christmas? Has tomorrow engulfed us too soon and obliterated the memory of that unguarded moment just inside the shadow by the stable door? Or will this moment be our awakening, our moment of final recognition? Will we go with him beyond this moment, or is this to be another of those one-night-stand moments that so characterise the lives of those who are too afraid or too confused to commit themselves? Time is getting on for all of us. I wonder what has happened to us after Christmas?

Windows 10 - to upgrade or not?

Microsoft have been pushing Windows users into upgrading their Windows 7 / 8 computer to Windows 10. But should you upgrade? There is a deadline where the offer is removed on 29th July, however insiders think that the offer will still remain in some form.

What are the benefits? Well, each user is going have different needs. Certainly Windows 10 is visually different to Windows 7 and earlier, but users of Windows 8 won't see much difference. However 10 is more aware of you and your actions. There has been a lot written about privacy as the system will report back to Microsoft on what you open, what sites you visit and what software you use. In some respects this is pretty much standard for Google and other search engines and to some degree these can be turned off.

In some respects Windows 10 is just as easy to use as previous versions, however my view is that the software is still in beta. That means it's still under development. I have had a few issues with it with programs not running, or the screen turning white. Other people have different degrees of issues. My lad did an update that removed all his software so that he had to reinstall everything again. His files were not removed, just put somewhere else.

So my view at the moment is this. For consumers give it a go, but for businesses stay on the version you have as Windows 10 is quite disruptive and some major software programs such as Sage doesn't run well on it yet. In any case, you have 30 days in which to revert the computer back to the previous version, but make sure you do plenty of backups!

BELATED HAPPY NEW YEAR

As this is Busbys Solicitors' first article of 2016, may I start by wishing all readers of the Milton Damerel Newsletter a Happy New Year. Busbys and I hope that 2016 will be peaceful and enjoyable for one and all.

2015 was a year which saw many changes in the law. Unfortunately the further cuts to legal aid and advice imposed as part of the Government's austerity measures have meant the closure of many law centres and the scaling back of CAB services. Access to the law is increasingly difficult, especially for the less well off. Litigants in person are going it alone, and the Court system is buckling. Many Courts are set to close.

Add into this potent mix the vast changes in society we are witnessing year-on-year. The "nuclear" family of old - married parents in a stable relationship with 2 to 3 children - is fast disappearing. 8 million now live in a single household. Relationships outside marriage have become the norm. Many households now consist of children who are related to just one of the adults caring for them.

The law has struggled to adapt to these changed mores in society. The need for statute law to keep up is acute. In the meantime, great inequities proliferate, especially for women living in relationships outside of marriage which come to an end through separation or death. The need for cohabitation agreements to be put in place, and the need for wills to be drawn up which reflect the true wishes of cohabitees and parents, has never been greater.

So if you are in this kind of relationship, do not rest easy. There is little legal status to the expression "common law wife". Ensure that your legal rights outside of marriage are properly protected, and that your children can properly benefit and be looked after if relationships end. Many widowed or divorced people are prepared to commit to a cohabiting relationship without the need, as they see it, to get married. If you are in such a relationship and want protection for your partner, do not leave it too late - as far too many do. Seek good legal advice.

On a cheerier note, I was delighted to read this week that last year Britain's oldest person had a hip replacement, at 112 years of age. My wife and I have repeatedly sung the praises of the NHS to American friends and relatives fed disinformation by private medical insurance companies. Some have said that if America goes down the NHS route, all people in their 60s and beyond would be ineligible for such operations. What tosh!

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Fibre broadband in Milton Damerel?

Back in October, BT were busy laying fibre around the streets, so I was somewhat excited at the prospect of getting super fast internet. But then nothing. Having done a little research it seems that there was a deadline of the end of 2015 to have the UK 95% covered in fibre so that's why there was a push to get the cable laid.

So are we going to get fibre? Probably not for the foreseeable future. The telephone exchange at Venn Green is showing EO or Exchange Only. (google fibre checker) This simply means the fibre that was laid is just for phone lines.

As the voucher system for BDUK has now finished, there is less likelihood of getting fibre, so all we can do is keep asking our providers or our local MP



The Marathon

The marathon may have ancient roots, but the foot race's official length of 26.2 miles wasn't established until the 20th century. The first organized marathon was held in Athens at the 1896 Olympics, the start of the Games' modern era. The ancient games, which took place in Greece from around 776 B.C. to A.D. 393, never included such long-distance races. The idea for the modern marathon was inspired by the legend of an ancient Greek messenger (Pheidippides) who raced from the site of Marathon to Athens, a distance of about 40K, or nearly 25 miles, with the news of an important Greek victory over an invading army of Persians in 490 B.C. After making his announcement, the exhausted messenger collapsed and died. To commemorate his dramatic run, the distance of the 1896 Olympic marathon was set at 40K

For the next few Olympics, the length of the marathon remained close to 25 miles, but at the 1908 Games in London the course was extended, allegedly to accommodate the British royal family. As the story goes, Queen Alexandra requested that the race start on the lawn of Windsor Castle (so the littlest royals could watch from the window of their nursery, according to some accounts) and finish in front of the royal box at the Olympic stadium—a distance that happened to be 26.2 miles (26 miles and 385 yards). The random boost in mileage ending up sticking and in 1921 the length for a marathon was formally standardized at 26.2 miles (42.195K).

For decades, marathons were only open to male athletes. The Boston Marathon, which kicked off in 1897 and is the world's oldest annual marathon, began allowing female competitors in 1972, while the first Olympic marathon for women wasn't held until 1984.

As some may know I ran London marathon in April 2014 in 4hrs 2mins. A time under 4hrs at 50 years old would give me eligibility to enter as 'good for age' in most marathons. I was therefore hooked and on a mission. My attempt at Loch Ness Marathon in September 2014 failed as my time was 4hrs 7seconds however I managed a time of 3.55 in Edinburgh in May 2015. I realised my time was nearly 5 minutes under the qualifying time for the elite Boston Marathon and felt I could not miss the chance. My application has been accepted and race day is 18th April. Let the training begin!

After meeting an aquaintance there last week whilst she was dining with friends, "why don't you do a write up on "The Bayleaf" she said, I have I replied, a couple of years ago, well you aught to do another, it's good, she said, so I will.

The Bayleaf Indian restaurant, Bude, if you enjoy good Indian food the Bayleaf is the place to go, with an extensive menu there is something for everyone, never too hot (unless requested or choosing the marked hot ones) but expertly spiced to make your tastebuds hum. Service is friendly and attentive, dishes are cooked to order so there may be a little wait but the wait is well worth it, you can enjoy some poppodums with assorted dips whilst you wait.

Try a Southern Indian Garlic Balti or a Kozi Rose, both delicious, the Balti has green chilli's in so if your not too keen ask for them to be left out, another favourite is the Methi Gosht, lamb in a fusion of fenugreek & crushed red chilli.

Money & Property Matters

In todays market it is difficult to decide where to put your money to get the best return. In some countries like Sweden and Switzerland negative interest is paid on your savings! You pay the bank to keep your money! The buy to let market has always been a minefield but with banks and building societies realising this is a great source of revenue, restrictions have eased. However the Government has now latched onto this, and in our time of austerity, have realised that this is another source to boost their coffers!

Pensions have not been performing well and with the recent change in legislation with regard to taking out a tax free sum, investors are turning to the buy to let market for a better return, typically between 5 and 8% plus the capital appreciation of the property. The government have realised this and have increased the stamp duty on buy to let and second home purchases to an additional 3% on the existing standard rate. This takes effect from April 2016 so anyone buying a £200,000 second home or buy to let after April 2016 will pay £7,500 as opposed to £1,500. An increase of £6,000!

Coupled with the reduction on the maximum tax relief dropping from 45% and 40% to just 20% is a buy to let a good idea? Well in my opinion I think it is, not because I'm an estate agent, and I'm not a financial advisor but because in my experience for the majority of clients it has worked well and I believe will continue to do so. Easter chocolate bark

Prep: 20 mins Cook: 5 mins plus cooling Ingredients 3 x 200g bars milk chocolate 2 x 90g packs mini chocolate eggs

1 heaped tsp freeze-dried raspberry pieces – or you could use crystallised petals

Method

- Break the chocolate into a large heatproof bowl. Bring a pan of water to a simmer, then sit the bowl on top. The water must not touch the bottom of the bowl. Let the chocolate slowly melt, stirring now and again with a spatula. For best results, temper your chocolate (see tip).
- Meanwhile, lightly grease then line a 23 x 33cm roasting tin or baking tray with parchment. Put threequarters of the mini eggs into a food bag and bash them with a rolling pin until broken up a little.
- When the chocolate is smooth, pour it into the tin. Tip the tin from side to side to let the chocolate find the corners and level out. Scatter with the smashed and whole mini eggs, followed by the freeze-dried raspberry pieces. Leave to set, then remove from the parchment and snap into shards, ready to pack in boxes or bags.

Makes enough for 6-8 gift bags.

Gardening Report

Dear Gardeners.

With such a wet and windy winter I hope we are all out now tidying our gardens. Getting on top of all the jobs we haven't been able to do. The bulbs will all be bursting from the ground many already in flower heralding the spring to come. All the tidying now will make spring so much easier. Pull all those weeds now before they have chance to seed.

Seeds should be ordered and purchased now. Onions and Autumn leek seed should have been sown on Boxing day ready to prick out now. Tomatoes should have been sown on St Valentines day remembering there common name The love apple. Make sure they're all kept nice and warm to stop them being checked. Sow your seeds nice and early for early crops of flowers and fruits. Pot up Dahlias now and keep them in a warm sunny spot ready to plant out after the risk of frost. This will guarantee a good display. Some of the shoots can be cut just above the tuber and turned into cuttings.

Its always good to get on top of all the spring jobs allowing you time to visit other gardens. The Abbey in Hartland is open on the 6th March for Mothering Sunday so visitors can see the early spring flowers. Rosemoor is of course always worth a visit, we are so lucky to have a RHS garden so close.

Well I'm hoping for a gentle spring where gardens and gardeners are blessed with warm sunny days and gentle showers at night. Ever the optimist!!!

For those of you who have had a visit from Santa recently and have now got some new equipment, such as electrical goods or cycles in the household, don't forget to update your records at 'immobilise.com' if you use their services. If you have not come across this facility before, if is a free to use independent and secure database where you can store details of all valuable items and property with sentimental value such as electrical goods, power tools and sports equipment. The service operates countrywide and is accessible to the police and so that any recovered items can be returned to their rightful owners. Of course this won't happen unless your property is marked in some identifiable way which is unique to your household. For example, use your house name or number followed by your postcode. We have covered property marking in detail in a previous article but full details can be found on the Torridge NHW website at 'http://torridgenhw.ourwatch.org.uk' along with a range of other crime prevention articles. If you don't have access to the internet, please ask your co-ordinator for a fact sheet.

With people now turning their thoughts to holidays, it is timely to remind everyone of the 'Keyholder Registration Scheme' which is run by the Devon & Cornwall Police. Individual residents and businesses can record details of their keyholders which enables a responsible person to be called out if an incident occurs at your property whilst you are not in attendance. Your details will be held on a secure database and you can be sure that your details will only be made available to the emergency services. There is a small charge for this service which is usually no more than £5. Again, full details of this scheme can be found on the NHW website mentioned above and the Devon & Cornwall Police website.

If you have access to the internet we have recently come across a very useful site at 'www.FixMyStreet.com'. This is to report any community defect to the local authority in a very simple to use, pre-formatted on screen form. It is much, much easier to use than Devon CC's own reporting site and can be used for reporting such things as potholes, fly-tipping, non-working street lights etc. There is also an interactive map which indicates whether a problem has already been reported and shows up all the reported problems in the area. The site will also ask for feed-back after a month to check what action has been taken.

Rural North Devon remains one of the lowest crime areas in the country when we are referring to 'traditional' crimes such a burglary, theft and anti-social behaviour etc. Unfortunately, scams, whether by phone or on the internet, seem to affect all areas equally and in increasing frequency and ingenuity. 'Actionfraud' have recently advised that they have seen a large increase in the amount of victims signing up for free trials for unapproved or misleading pharmaceuticals and supplements. Part of the signing up process usually involves being asked for your credit or debit card details and payments start to be taken after the trial period ends. These payments are usually called 'recurring' or 'continuous' payments. Whilst they work in a similar way to direct debits, they are not covered by the banks' direct debit guarantee scheme and can be much harder to cancel or identify who is debiting your account. Many of these scams are linked to common pharmaceuticals such as teeth whitening products, food supplements and slimming tablets. If you desire such items speak to your GP or pharmacist in the first instance, to ask for their advice and get their recommendations.

And finally, it is with some sadness that we have to say 'Good Bye' to Jackie, who has served as our co-ordinator at Holsworthy Beacon for the past few years, as she moves on to new pastures. We wish her well for the future. Peter Fry, who has been her deputy is taking over, with immediate effect, and his contact details are at the top of the page.

Please keep your dog under control.

Once again we are approaching lambing time, ewes are very heavily in lamb or have young lambs at foot so "PLEASE PLEASE PLEASE" keep your dog on a lead and under control, even the quietest and friendliest of dogs can become a killer, the sight of a sheep or a lamb running seems to kindle the hunting instinct in our family pet and they will take off and chase and attack, even if only chased and not actually attacked a pregnant ewe will very often abort her lambs.

Many residents of Milton Damerel are farmers or of farming families so my message is not directed at them but we have people that aren't use to country living & may think it's okay for their dog to "play" with the sheep, please don't let them, keep your dog & the sheep safe, keep it under control, any farmer is quite within their rights to shoot any dog they find running amongst their livestock, there is nothing more heart breaking for a farmer than to see his stock killed or injured because someone's dog has run wild.

Holsworthy Rural Policing Update - 23/11/15 - 24/01/16

There are over 1,700km of recorded watercourses in the Northern Devon Nature Improvement Area, and monitoring the insects and other invertebrates that live in these rivers and streams is the best way of keeping a check on their ecological health.

Since 2014 over 30 local people have been trained and are sampling local rivers and streams for invertebrates as part of a national scheme called Riverfly.

They are playing a key role in keeping our watercourses in good ecological condition which is important for conserving a wonderful range of wildlife such as the endangered Fresh Water Pearl Mussel, Atlantic salmon, kingfisher and otter.

PRIMARY SCHOOL CLOSURE

SPECIAL AFTERNOON MARKS OCCASION AT MILTON DAMERELL

Last week Milton Damerell County Primary School closed, after operating for more than 80 years in the same building. To mark the occasion a special afternoon was organised by the School Managers, on Tuesday week. It began with games for the children, including some ingenious obstacle races, organised by Mr. D. Poole, assisted by Mr. C. R. Heard, chairman of the Managers, and Mr. E. German.

Then followed a short religious service for parents, friends and children. This was conducted by the Rector, Rev. G. Chippington, and an address was given by Mr. W. M. Carter (Bude), a former pupil. He said that this could not be regarded as a happy occasion, but he hoped that the children would soon settle at Bradworthy.

After the service, the headmistress, Mrs. D. M. Brewer, who has been at the school for six years, was presented with a bouquet from the Managers and children by one of the senior pupils, Sheila Braunton. Sheila also presented sprays to Mrs. M. Clarke, Mrs. P. Sluggett and Mrs. B. Jones.

Tea was served by Mrs. M. Carter and Mrs. S. Eastcott. They were thanked by another pupil, Pamela Carter.

On the last day of term, the children placed flowers on the grave of Mr. Amos Brayley, who was headmaster for more than 30 years in the last century.

Next term the 28 children, together with Mrs. Brewer, will transfer to Bradworthy School. Milton Damerel is the fourth school to close in this area. Schools at Bulkworthy, Newton St. Petrock and Thornbury, the three parishes adjoining Milton Damerell, have all closed in the last few years.

When the school at Milton Damerell was first used in the 1870s, it was housed in what is now called the boardroom.

History in Milton: Memories of Milton's School

In 6 years time our School will have been closed for 50 years. Hard to believe for those of us who well remember its closing, where did that time go?

I have been interested in collecting personal memories, of those who attended, either to print in booklet form or just for posterity! With many commitments already it will take me a long time, so if there's anyone interested to help, please get in touch.

So far I have a small handful of written memories, so if you were a past scholar I would love to hear from you. Or perhaps you could write down some of your recollections, you don't have to add all the sordid details unless you wish to, of course!!

Emeline* Short:

I was recently contacted by a lady wishing to find out more of her family history. Her grandmother, Mrs Emeline Short, nee Hearn, lived somewhere at Venn Green, where in 1931 at just 52 years, she was sadly found dead in her home. Emmaline must have had a tough life, her young husband, Ern, had died only in his thirties in 1911, from a type of meningitis , leaving her with three young children, Bill, only 4 years at the time of his father's death, Mary aged 7 years and Kathleen aged 9 years. Ern had worked for the Harris family of West Wonford.

From a newspaper cutting of Emeline's funeral, she had been a valued member of the Methodist Chapel and keen willing helper within the local community. Her funeral and burial was at the Methodist Chapel. We searched the graveyard but no stone was found, there are many unmarked graves in the graveyard.

.....Those attending in those days had to pay a penny per week. After the new Chapel was built, the old building was rented from the Methodist Trustees and used as a school, which it has been ever since. There has been no playground, only a lane used by a local farmer. For some years, however, part of an adjoining field had been used for games and school sports days.

The school has also been used by members of the Methodist Church as a venue for teas for certain of their events.
