Meetings of the Parish Council are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agenda for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Thursday before the meeting. The draft minutes are posted to the website within 30days. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time.

<u>Annual Grants</u>: Grants for the financial year 2017/2018 were agreed at the meeting held on the 16th November 2016, the successful applicants were: Milton Damerel Parish Hall, Milton Damerel Newsletter, Milton Damerel Parish Church, Milton Damerel and district Gardening Society and Torridge and District Citizens advice Bureau. All applicants were notified by post, and cheques will be issued during September 2017

<u>Councillor Robin Julian</u> has attended several meetings throughout the year and continues to work hard for the constituents in his area. The grant of £150 received was used to pay for entertainment for the Children and youth's annual party. This was a great success and thanks go to all who gave up their time to organise the event.

PCSO Raquel Rowe attends the meetings when her duty rota allows, and keeps the Parish Council up-to-date with crimes in the area.

There is now a new sergeant at Holsworthy and it is hoped he will be able to attend the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on the 19th April.

<u>Planning matters</u>: There have been very few applications over the last three months one approved application was the 'formation of hardstanding, at 2 Downs View. A recent application for 'Side extensions at Windy Nook has been discussed and approved by Parish Councillors but no decision has yet been made by Torridge Planning Department.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

<u>The step Back in Time Fund</u>: for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Town and Parish Fund: This is an annual grant available to two or more Parishes that join forces to apply for a grant for a specific project. The amount awarded is equivalent to £1.10p per elector. For the funds that were available for the financial year 2016/17, your Parish Councillors unanimously decided to once again join forces with Sutcombe Parish Council, in a joint effort to obtain the funding to keep the Parishes verges and hedges cut. The application was successful and some cutting was carried out in September but funds were limited, as such not as many lanes were cut as the Parish Council would have liked. Devon County Council do not carry out this work except on main highways. Your Parish Councillors unanimously agree that the safety of their residents is of paramount importance.

The Laptop and Projector purchased with the 2013/2014 TAP grant has been used on several occasions by local organisations. Please contact the Parish Clerk if you wish to use the equipment.

Venn Green Bus Stop: Julie Pepworth from Devon County Council has recently informed the Parish Council that she is putting forward an application to the finance department for a new bus stop and hard standing, the Parish Council has to agree to maintain the shelter, the details will be discussed at the next Parish Council Meeting to be held on the 15th February 2017.

<u>Community Defibrillator (AED)</u>: The training session was held on the 6th January and was attended by Parish Councillors and 14 residents. Those that attended said it was very worthwhile, but because of the <u>confusion and misinformation</u> surrounding the use of Defibrillators another session will be held on Friday 10th March. This is free of charge and could be a very valuable and important lesson. <u>See separate information in newsletter.</u>

<u>Annual Parish Meeting</u>: This will be held on Wednesday April 19th 2017, this meeting is the opportunity for you to ask any questions of the Parish Councillors and have your say on matters concerning you or the Parish in general.

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SUPERFAST BROADBAND & MILTON DAMEREL - An Update

The Parish Council has now received a response on its petition to Geoffery Cox, our MP; also one resident at Gratton has received a personal response, which has been kindly shared with us; by using information from the letters received and checking the Connecting Devon and Somerset web-site, the following information is given as an update.

From our MP (extract from letter):

" I am advised that while Milton Damerel is one of BT's smaller exchanges, and as such it wasn't included in their commercial fibre roll out programme, the exchange has now been upgraded using Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) technology, with support from the Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) BDUK project team.

The upgrade was completed in the last two weeks and should enable many local residents to access the faster service, depending on the distance they live from the exchange. To find out more about fibre broadband availability, residents can enter their phone number or post code on the BT website: www.homeandwork.openreach.co.uk/when-can-i-get-fibre.aspx

Presuming the service is available the next step would be for residents to contact their Service Provider (SP) who will run further availability checks and place an order if possible to do so. The BT website also gives details of SPs who offer FTTP products."

From the web-site: www.connectingdevonandsomerset.co.uk/where-when/

Entering your postcode on this page of the web-site advises one of two situations -

either, that part of your postcode is/will soon be fibre enabled,

or, your postcode is not covered by the current programme (to cover 90%).

The accompanying map on the web-site has shaded areas, the key for which is 'green' – live; 'orange' – coming soon; and these only apply to an "eastern" area of the parish. The map key also shows areas shaded 'blue' – under evaluation; and, 'grey'- out of programme - there is no blue area for Milton Damerel, but plenty of grey area along the A388 corridor!

Delving further on the web-site for Milton Damerel there is a listing of postcodes to be "live by Dec 2016". There are 21 post codes listed in the "EX22 7___" area, most are properties in the Thornbury and Woodacott parish, only 5 are actually in the parish of Milton Damerel, namely:

EX22 7DQ EX22 7AS EX22 7PB EX22 7AU EX22 7DH

Possibly the information provided to our MP is based on the area covered by BT's Milton Damerel Cabinet 1 and does not particularly relate to the Parish of Milton Damerel. (There is no definition on the web-site about the area covered by Cabinet 1 and the 261xxx landline numbers extend to a greater area than the parish.)

From local personal experience:

For those areas fortunate to be served by Milton Damerel 1 Cabinet, it should be noted there is no automatic notification to premise occupiers from BT, or other providers, that fibre is now available. If the web-site shows your postcode is live, you will need to contact your internet service provider to establish the position and arrange service as also advised by our MP, see above).

<u>Please note:</u> The information above is a personal interpretation, is not official information, and has not been validated with Connecting Devon and Somerset (apart from the post code information). The writer accepts no responsibility or liability for inaccuracies.

<u>The Defibrillators</u> purchased for the Parish have been installed at Horrelsford Garage and on Watkins Workshop at Holsworthy Beacon (see photos - front cover).

In an emergency the actions you should take are:

- 1) Dial 999 for the emergency services.
- 2) Start CPR
- 3) Send someone for the Defibrillator Make sure they have a phone with them.
- 4) When by the Defibrillator Dial 999 Tell the emergency services where you are
- 5) They will give you a code to open the cabinet to retrieve the Defibrillator.
- 6) Once back with the casualty the Defibrillator will tell you exactly what to do.

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Changes to waste collection & recycling services in Torridge.

Torridge is changing the way we collect waste and recycling and welcomes the views of residents on our proposals

At a meeting of the Full Council on 23rd January Councillors voted in favour of taking forward an options model that looks at the way Waste and Recycling services are delivered across the district. While Torridge's recycling rate of around 43-45% is already above average nationally, a study has shown that without a change in the way the service is provided the Council will not be able to achieve the statutory environmental target of 50% by 2020. The increasing numbers of houses being built in the area and a need to modernise the fleet of vehicles and the depots operated by the Council will also bring cost pressures on the service which need to be addressed.

The proposals in outline include:

- \cdot Weekly recycling collection in boxes and bags with an enhancement to include additional mixed plastic materials.
- \cdot Weekly food waste collection on recycling vehicles.
- · Fortnightly charge for garden waste collection offered to 100% of the district, with a charge of £35 per annum.
- \cdot Fortnightly non-recycled waste collection in black bags.
- \cdot A project to investigate depot options.

The new proposals include a significant extension to the range of materials that the Council intend to add to its kerbside recycling collections including nearly all types of plastics with only the exception of black plastic. The collection of food waste will also be made available to more households and not just those on the current garden waste collection rounds which only covers 60% of the district at the moment. Removing food waste from the material that goes to landfill will be handled through a new sealed 23 litre caddy system. This has been designed to be vermin-proof, and should at the same time reduce the incidence of bags being ripped open by wildlife and domestic animals which has been an issue particularly in rural and coastal hotspots.

Garden waste collection will now be offered to the whole of the district at a charge of £35 per annum which will contribute to the additional cost the service will face in implementing not only an extension of the garden waste service but all the other changes being proposed. Torridge is the only authority in Devon which still collects black bag waste on a weekly basis, which research and evidence suggests has a restraining effect on the level of recycling. The planned changes to a fortnightly black bag collection, while at the same time extending the range of plastics collected, and enhancing food waste and garden waste collections, are expected to have a positive effect on recycling rates, reducing the amount of waste that ends up in expensive and environmentally damaging landfill.

The consultation will run until 31st March 2017.

MD Footpath 16 from Holy Trinity Church to Whitebear Cottage

A diversionary route from the top end of the boardwalk to Whitebear Cottage has recently been established as an alternative to crossing two fields which are frequently used for grazing cattle. This alternative route has been provided by kind permission of the landowners and you are requested to keep to the marked path and be mindful that there may be livestock in adjoining fields, so dogs should be kept on a lead.

Using the same start point opposite Whitebear Cottage (C) - instead of going over the ladder stile take the farm track running to the right for 200 metres to where it reaches a fieldgate on the right. Take the path on the left going through the copse for approx. 100 metres, where left (B), up the bank and immediately right, following the field fence. CARE – when cattle are in the field the electric fence will be live. When you reach the top of the boardwalk (A) you rejoin the original route.

Green Dwindling gas and oil supplies will mean volitile prices. Electricity, increasingly generated by nuclear, wind, solar and other sustainable sources, is the fuel of the future.

Apart from the Volunteer Car Service, there is another wonderful service provided by Holsworthy Rural Community Transport (HRCT) who are based in The Square in Holsworthy. It is called Ring & Ride. It is primarily for people who do not have their own transport or for those that have difficulty accessing public transport. It can also be used in situations where there is only one car in a household with a young family for example & one parent needs the car to go to work. The other parent & child/ren would be eligible. What to do in your garden in April

Flowers:

Plant out your Autumn sown Sweet Pea seedlings or sow now direct in their final flowering position.

Dependant on the variety hardy annuals can be sown either indoors or outdoors, following the instructions on the packet. Have a browse through our range of flower seeds

Half-hardy flowers can be sown in trays and kept on a windowsill or in the greenhouse.

This may be your last chance to order young flower plants as many will be delivered in May so have a look at your garden plan and check for gaps.

Hanging baskets can be planted up and kept in the greenhouse while the plants grow on.

Fruit:

Mulch around trees with well-rotted manure.

Keep an eye out for any pests and take corrective action.

Apple trees, pear trees, plum trees and cherry trees will start flowering in April. If as few as 5 to 10% of the flowers set then you will have a good crop so don't worry too much about flowers dropping.

If frost threatens then try to protect the flowers with fleece.

Check tree ties to prevent rocking.

In drying wind water all newly planted trees.

Summer and autumn fruiting raspberries should be cut back to approximately 23cm from the base.

To encourage early flowers cover strawberry plants with cloches.

Vegetables:

Now is the time to sow direct carrots, peas, beetroot, winter cabbages, broccoli, salad crops and much more. Browse through our full range of vegetable seed.

Marrows, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes and tomatoes can all be sown in a heated greenhouse or propagator.

If frost threatens then pull some fleece over your potato foliage.

Plant onion sets when the soil is dry.

Make sure you've ordered your tomato plants.

If any rhubarb flowers appear then cut them out near the base as otherwise they will steal food and energy from the plant.

If your asparagus beds are at least 2-years old then any spears can be cut using a sharp knife or better still, a made-for-purpose asparagus knife.

Lawn Care:

Rake out any dead moss with a scarifier and then fork over to improve drainage.

Apply lawn fertiliser.

Mow growing grass but keep the blades fairly high still.

Dig out any perennial weeds.

General:

Early sowings outside may prove difficult due to the cold and wet soil at this time, therefore, by warming up the soil of prepared areas with cloches it will protect from frost and rain.

It is ideal to leave the cloches in place for at least two or three weeks when the soil can be raked prior to seed sowing and planting out of young seedlings. Replace the cloches giving the young plants a good start.

Keep an eye out for slugs and snails with the use of slug pellets if needed, of course, following directions on box.

Herbs:

Sowings can be made of dill, fennel, hyssop, parsley and thyme.

Any sowings made in March may need careful thinning.

If you have an established thyme plant then have a go at layering some creeping stems by covering them with fine soil. Once they've rooted you can separate them and plant elsewhere. It won't take long – thyme waits for no man (sorry!).



CONVEYANCING FRAUD ON THE UP

Last year in the High Court a Judge gave judgment against two conveyancing firms when a rogue seller walked away with £470,000 for the "sale" of a property he did not own. The Judge said that the selling firm of conveyancers made no serious attempt to comply with anti-money laundering regulations. Had they done so the likelihood was that they would have been able to prevent the fraud. They had negligently failed to obtain any documentation from the fraudster which would have linked him to the property being sold. The Judge also ruled against the buyer's solicitor for not drawing attention to any concerns having asked whether the so-called owner was entitled to sell the property. Both firms had deviated from what should be standard practice.

Now one of the big national firms has fallen victim to another conveyancing scam. Again it was another form of identity fraud, which in this case has led to a Judge making a finding against the firm. The Judge found them to be liable for breach of trust after their client was duped into buying a property in London from a fraudster. This particular fraudster was a tenant posing as the owner.

Appropriate ID is very often the key to unearthing fraudsters. In the most recent £1 million fraud the driving licence of the hoax seller was recently issued and the address document showed a different address. Lawyers are asked to be extremely vigilant where a driving licence or passport has been issued within the past three months. If necessary they should ask for a client meeting or further forms of ID.

Scams are more likely to be perpetrated where a property is of high value, or where there is no mortgage, or where it is unoccupied. We as lawyers also need to exercise great caution where it appears that the seller is putting great pressure on the conveyancers to rush the sale through - in this latest case the seller gave the bogus reason of going through an impending divorce and needing the finances for it.

It is a great sadness that fraudsters use every conceivable trick in the book to steal money from hapless victims. It is only through ever increasing vigilance and the most strenuous of checks that this will be defeated. In the meantime buyer, seller and legal advisers must exercise the maximum amount of caution. Always remember if you are a property owner that you can ask the Land Registry to notify you should there be any attempt at any time to change the details concerning the ownership of your property in the Land Registry records.

Finance & Property

With current interest rates remaining at a record low and pensions not performing as well as expected investors are looking for an alternative ways of making their hard earned cash work for them. Buy To Let mortgages are still worth serious consideration. Rates are typically around 4% with incentives starting at 1.9%. A minimum deposit of 25% is generally required with an interest only mortgage an option. This may give you an increased return but it must be remembered that the capital would need to repaid at the end of the term.

At the moment landlords can earn tax relief on the interest on a buy to let mortgages however between 2017 and 2020 the tax relief will gradually be cut back to 20%. In certain circumstances this can be avoided if the landlord sets up a limited company, however by transferring the property to a company the landlord could incur capital gains tax. From April 2016 landlords have not been able to deduct 10% for general wear and tear however other expenses such as agents fees, maintenance, professional fees are still tax deductible .

Becoming a landlord is a serious responsibility. Most properties require maintenance of some kind, the majority of which are tax deductible, but it must be remembered that the tenant has the right to enjoy the property and a good landlord tenant relationship is essential.

Your property could be at risk if mortgage payments are not maintained

Please keep your dog under control.

Once again we are approaching lambing time, ewes are very heavily in lamb or have young lambs at foot so "PLEASE PLEASE PLEASE" keep your dog on a lead and under control, even the quietest and friendliest of dogs can become a killer, the sight of a sheep or a lamb running seems to kindle the hunting instinct in our family pet and they will take off and chase and attack, even if only chased and not actually attacked a pregnant ewe will very often abort her lambs.

Many residents of Milton Damerel are farmers or of farming families so my message is not directed at them but we may have new people that have moved here, that aren't use to country living & may think it's okay for their dog to "play" with the sheep, please don't let them, if a field looks empty please check before letting your dog off its lead, that there aren't any sheep or cattle in the field or adjacent fields, keep your dog & the livestock safe, keep your dog under control. Also remember cows with young calves at foot can be very dangerous both to you and your dog, a cow will be very protective and nine times out of ten your dog will run to you for protection, putting you at risk.

Any farmer is quite within their rights to shoot any dog they find running amongst their livestock, there is not much more heart breaking for a farmer than to see his stock killed or injured because someone's dog has run wild.

Marzipan Triangles

(Contains nuts)

Ingredients

Sponge

Filling

Topping

5oz Self Raising Flour 4oz Caster Sugar 4oz Margarine 2 Eggs 4oz Icing Sugar 2oz Butter Raspberry Jam (Seedless) Vanilla Flavouring

Marzipan Dark Chocolate Milk Chocolate



Method

Oven temp 140oC

This recipe will make 1x 8" sponge.

Grease and flour 8" sponge tin

Put flour, sugar, margarine and eggs into a bowl, using a hand held or large mixer, mix ingredients together until light and fluffy.

Pour into sponge tin and bake in middle of the oven for approximately 1/2 an hour or until golden and spongy to the touch.

Turn out onto a cooling rack and leave to cool.

Sift the icing sugar onto a bowl add the butter which should be softened, add a little vanilla flavouring, beat together until light and fluffy, leave to one side.

Melt the dark and milk chocolate together in a bowl over a pan of hot water

When completely cooled, using a large/bread knife slice across the cooled sponge into three, one level for the jam and one level for the buttercream as shown in the picture.

Spread the first sliced sponge layer with raspberry jam evenly and to the edge.

Put second sponge layer on top of the raspberry covered layer, then spread that layer with the buttercream and top with the last sponge layer.

Roll out the marzipan, enough to cover the top of the sponge, spread the top of the sponge with some raspberry jam and place the marzipan on the top, trim the edges of marzipan to form a circle shape of the sponge, then using large/ bread knife divide the marzipaned sponge into 8 triangles.

Lift each triangle out and using a dinner knife cover the edges with the melted chocolate and place each triangle on greaseproof/baking parchment paper, repeat until all 8 triangles have been covered, for a decoration make a piping bag out of greaseproof paper, fill with chocolate and decorate as in the last picture, on the top of the triangle. Leave to set

Property Marking

For those of you who have bought, or been lucky enough to have been given, some new equipment at Christmas, please don't forget to "mark" it, and register it on the free property register at www.immobilise.com. If you don't have access to the internet yourself, a relative or family friend can do it on your behalf. We did an article covering property marking in the June 2013 issue but if you don't still have this to hand, we have a hand-out sheet which any of the co-ordinators will be pleased to let you have.

Rustling

The theft of animals, especially sheep and horses is becoming a problem across the county and we are requested to report the movement of animals which you might see happening during the hours of darkness. Some quite large flocks of sheep have disappeared which would have needed large vehicles and taken some time to organise and carry out, so please keep a look-out if you are out and about at night. Also, if you become aware of anybody offering cheap meat for sale, this should also be reported. Apart from the possibility of it being stolen, it could also be a health risk

Burglaries

Whilst burglaries to the home are relatively low in the rural parts of Devon, a recent survey across the country found that 42% of people regularly left their properties unlocked when they went out. As most burglaries are opportunist crimes this is making life easy for them so please don't give them the opportunity and get into the habit of locking up every time you go out. This also applies to sheds and garages, and we do know that these buildings continue to be targeted in the surrounding villages, with property and equipment regularly being stolen. If you have any concerns about property security our PCSOs will be happy to advise you and if necessary will involve the Crime Prevention Officer.

Police Scam

A new scam has recently been bought to our attention which is very easy to catch people out. A very realistic email is received, which purports to be from the Police and is headed up 'Notice of Intended Prosecution (NIP)'. It will go on to give brief details about a speeding violation or some other traffic offence and will ask you to click on a link to access the full details. If you are sure that you or another family member are not involved, then **DO NOT CLICK** on the link. The link will infect your computer with malware. Even if you are uncertain about the stated violation it is better to check first by contacting the Police independently, via 101 or email, quoting the references given in the original email, to get confirmation. Suspected scams should be reported using the **www.actionfraud.police.uk** site which has an easy to follow reporting link and you will also be able to forward the scam email.
