Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month in the Parish Hall. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the meeting and also on the website. Anyone is welcome but the public are not permitted to take part in discussions, however time is set aside on the agenda of all meetings for public comments.

Annual Grants: Annual Grants which were approved at the meeting in November 2016 will be paid during September 2017. Requests for annual grants for 2017/2018 should be made to the Parish Clerk; applications in writing should be accompanied with the latest set of annual accounts. All grants will be considered at the Parish Council Meeting to be held on the 15th November 2017, please have your applications in by the 10th November

The Annual Return and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31st March 2017, have had an internal audit but have yet to be returned from the Audit Commission. Copies have been displayed for two weeks on the Parish Council notice board but if anyone needs any further information please contact the Parish Clerk.

The Step Back in Time Fund for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Planning Matters:

Recent applications awaiting decisions from Torridge planning department are for a new bungalow at Parkfields 1/0554/2017/REM, a detached bungalow at Tor View 1/0617/2017/FUL and the Demolition of a shed and the erection of a building for storage and to garage vehicles 1/0617/2017/FUL, all details are available to view at the Torridge District Council planning portal.

All applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings when the plans are discussed. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk, as there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

Town and Parish Fund: The application forms for the annual grant have now been received. The Parish Councillors have decided to once again join forces with Sutcombe Parish Council and apply for the 2017/2018 grant to enable both Parishes to keep the Parishes roads and lane safe for all motorists by cutting back hedges/verges. Although your Councillors would like to have them all cut, because of the limited funds, only hedges/verges which obstruct motorist's vision have been cut. The Laptop and Projector purchased with the 2013/2014 TAP grant is used regularly by local organisations. Please contact the Parish Clerk if you wish to use the equipment.

Venn Green Bus Stop

There has been some confusion as to whether there will be a Bus shelter supplied but Julie Pepworth has informed the Parish Council that the Bus Shelter might now be erected. Julie is waiting for three quotes from the various bus shelter companies and then gain approval from the finance department. We will keep you informed

HARVEST

Harvest is from the Anglo-Saxon word hærfest, "Autumn". It then came to refer to the season for reaping and gathering grain and other grown products. The full moon nearest the autumnal equinox is called the Harvest Moon. So in ancient traditions Harvest Festivals were traditionally held on or near the Sunday of the Harvest Moon. This moon is the full moon which falls in the month of September.

An early Harvest Festival used to be celebrated at the beginning of the Harvest season on 1 August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers made loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop. These were given to the local church as the Communion bread during a special service thanking God for the harvest.

Nowadays the festival is held at the end of harvest, which varies in different parts of Britain. Sometimes neighbouring churches will set the Harvest Festival on different Sundays so that people can attend each other's thanksgivings.

Farmers celebrated the end of the harvest with a big meal called a harvest supper. Some churches and villages still have a Harvest Supper.

The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" but also Dutch and German harvest hymns in translation helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.

Up to now we have had a busy year at Holy Trinity and it has been truly great to have so many of the local community giving us their support for our 'Raise the roof appeal' by supporting us at our fundraising events. It's a hard slog but we are confident with the help and support of the community of Milton Damerel and Parish, we will get there in time.

Latest news on the Heritage Lottery funding application....it has been submitted again for the August review. Now we have to wait until November/December to find out if we have been successful this time.

The Living history has started off well with donations of photographs from the events at the Church Hall (now the Parish Hall), we will have them on display in the church, if you can name anyone on them that would be a great help to us.

We have two family histories, Camilla whose grandfather was the Reverend Holman at Holy Trinity and was once, with her brother Gabriel, the church Patrons, patronage had been passed down through the generations but no longer applies. The family still have a connection to the church as their cousin is remembered in the wall plate - the young airman Andrew who was lost in WW1, and many of the family rest in the churchyard.

We have been given a very interesting history, family tree, of the Hancock's family who were at the forefront of many activities in the parish of Milton Damerel, thanks to Grace for that. Look out for them in the church.

It was a bit spooky that when I was putting the Hancock's family history on display in the church, the garden volunteers were at the same time uncovering a concrete slab that had just been found under the grass at their family grave.

Church Gardening

Despite the inclement weather this summer the volunteers have still turned out to cut the grass, weed and generally tidy up the churchyard, keeping it the envy of many.

PROTECT YOUR LAND AND PROPERTY FROM FRAUD

As you may know, July is Scams Awareness Month. The Land Registry has been active during the month in its efforts to remind their customers of some key fraud advice. In particular they want to alert the public to the steps which can be taken to protect one's property from being fraudulently sold or mortgaged.

Statistics show that you are more at risk of such property fraud if:-

- Your identity has been stolen
- You rent out your property
- You live overseas
- The property is empty
- The property is not mortgaged

The property is not registered with HM Land Registry

Your property will be registered if you bought it or mortgaged it since 1998, but do check the register if you are unsure by going on the gov.uk website and accessing the Land Registry tab.

Since 2009 HM Land Registry has prevented 254 fraudulent applications being registered, representing properties valued in excess of £117 million. No system can be completely fraud-proof, but by working with the Land Registry and your solicitor you can take the best appropriate steps to help protect yourself and your property.

You can sign up to the Land Registry property alerts service and you will get property alerts if someone applies to change the register of your property, for example if someone tries to use your property for a mortgage. You can get alerts for up to 10 properties and there is no fee. You can stop HM Land Registry registering a sale or mortgage on your property unless a conveyancer or solicitor certifies the application was made by you. You should contact HM Land Registry property fraud line if you think you are the victim of property fraud.

Busbys can help you put a restriction on your title. We can also help you to register your property with HM Land Registry if it was bought before compulsory registration came into effect. Registration will also be of considerable help in defining exactly what land you own, and this will be of great assistance if there is any boundary dispute. 

Inter Parish Footpath Walk

Of all the Inter Parish walks on the programme, the Bradworthy walks have always been very popular. The walk on Monday 12th June was no exception. There were forty walkers including four dogs. A record turn out!!

We made quite a spectacle as we followed Sandra & her two dogs out of The Square heading North with the Church on our left. Two other Ladies from Bradworthy, Sarah & Jackie, kindly brought up the rear. This enabled me to mingle & have a natter with both regular walkers & newcomers. We went past Crosspark & stayed on the lane which was quite steep at one point. We took the opportunity to admire the view across to Berridon which enabled us to catch our breath. We turned left along a track which was uncharted territory for

most people. It was surprisingly wet but fortunately there were grassy verges for those that wished to dodge the puddles. I was intrigued to see where the track would come out - Dinworthy Farm. I realised then that we had been here before but had approached it from a different direction. It has dawned on me that this is the great thing about walking in & around Bradworthy. There are lots of loops that you can choose from. Big loops & little loops with various footpaths intersecting them depending upon how energetic you are feeling! From Dinworthy we followed the lane back towards Bradworthy emerging opposite Crosspark. We turned right which would have taken us straight back into The Square but Sandra took us on a couple of diversions. First of all we visited the childrens' play area. There is a great selection of equipment & it's obviously an ongoing project. There is evidence that a roundabout is on the cards. We were all drawn to the very pretty Millennium Garden. It consists of a raised bed which is beautifully planted. On the uprights which support a decorative

Around the outside is a paved area which includes some pretty mozaic tiles which were made by the school children in year 2000. Even if you don't have children or grandchildren, it is well worth a visit. We also visited the Bowling Club, saw a smart new development of houses & found out that there are a few industrial premises tucked away too. There really are a lot of facilities in Bradworthy & it's well worth exploring.

By the time we had removed our walking boots/wellies, refreshments were ready for us in the Village Hall. It was very kind of Daphne to organise them for us especially as she must have had to rustle up a few more cups & saucers than she had expected! It is always a treat to spend a while in the Collacott Room on the first floor where there is a huge collection of archive material. As a matter of interest it is generally open on Wednesday mornings (10am - 12.00) for anyone that is interested in local history. It made a perfect end to a very pleasurable morning.


Walking Parish Footpaths

For any new residents to the Parish who are not sure where our rural footpaths are, there is a guide on the Parish website, under local information. This can be downloaded as a complete booklet or the individual walks printed off. If you don't have access to the internet please contact the Parish Clerk.

MD Footpath 15 from Holy Whitebear Farm to Chapel View

A diversionary route has now been set up so that there is no longer a need to walk through the farm yard at Whitebear Farm, which is a working farm with vehicles moving around and the possibility of cattle being corralled within the yard. This alternative route has been provided by kind permission of the landowners and you are requested to keep to the marked path and be mindful that there may be livestock in some fields, so dogs should be kept under close control.

Starting from the farm end of the path, walk south along the lane for approx. 100 metres where you will come to a field gate on the left (A). Through the gate and left along the track until you reach a pedestrian gate (B). Continue through this gate and keeping the field boundary to your left until you reach a second pedestrian gate (C). Through the gate and down the short slope to meet up with the original route where you turn right to continue along the track and the rest of the original existing route of the path.



Any comments concerning this alternative route should be passed to the Parish Clerk or any of the Parish Councillors, whose contact details are at the front of this newsletter.



Recipe

Autumn Pudding

10 Slices of White or Brown Bread, at least one day old 1 Bramley Cooking Apple, peeled, cored and sliced 225g/8oz Ripe Red Plums, halved and stoned 225g/8oz Blackberries 75g/3oz/6 tbsp. Caster Sugar Low-fat Yoghurt or Fromage Frias to serve



- 1. Remove the crusts from the bread and use a biscuit cutter to stamp out a 7.5cm/3in round from one slice. Cut the remaining slices in half.
- 2. Place the bread round the base of a 1.2 litre/2 pint/5 cup pudding basin, then overlap the fingers rounds the sides, saving some for the top.
- 3. Place the apple, plums, blackberries, caster sugar and 60ml/4 tbsp. water in a pan heat gently until the sugar dissolves, then simmer for 10 minutes, until soft. Remove from the heat.
- 4. Reserve the juice and spoon the fruit into the bread-lined basin. Top with the reserve bread, then gently spoon over the reserved fruit juices.
- 5. Cover the mould with a saucer and place weights on top. Chill the pudding overnight. Turn out on to a serving plate and serve with low-fat yoghurt or fromage frais.

Cook's Tips - Choose good quality bread that is not too thinly sliced - it needs to be at least 5mm/1/4in thick so that it supports the fruit when pudding is turned out

Oil Thefts

The theft of domestic heating oil and farm fuels seems to be on the increase again everywhere and we have had three incidents in our own Parish within the past few months. Fuel oil is a bulky item to steal and will need a vehicle of some sort for transportation. Please keep a look out for suspicious activity and vehicles in the vicinity of oil tanks and report it if you have any concerns.

What is a Scam?

Scams have become the scourge of modern day life and seem to worm their way into every aspect of what we do. At a recent meeting, somebody asked the question "What exactly constitutes a scam?" Scams come in many forms; uninvited contact received by email, letter, and telephone or in person, making false promises to con victims out of money or their bank details. There are many scams but some of the most common are fake lotteries, deceptive prize draws or sweepstakes, clairvoyants, computer scams, and even romance scams. The criminals attempt to trick people with flashy, official looking documents or websites, or convincing telephone sales patter, with the aim of persuading them to send a processing or administration fee, pay postal or insurance costs or make a premium rate phone call. Doorstep Scams are crimes carried out by bogus callers, rogue traders and unscrupulous sales people who call, often uninvited, at people's home under the guise of legitimate business or trade. The Police tell us that scams now form a large part of their workload and they have a specialist department, called ActionFraud, for dealing with these cases. They can be contacted on tel: 0300 123 2040, or there is a reporting link on the Devon and Cornwall Police website.

Keyholder Service

The Devon & Cornwall Police have been successfully running a keyholder registration scheme for over 10 years. This enables a responsible person to be called if an incident occurs at your property when you are unavailable (on holiday for example). The scheme is run by dedicated staff and your details are kept confidential. There is a small charge to cover administration which usually works out at less than £5 and needs to be renewed every 2 years. Your co-ordinators have an information sheet and there is a link on the Police website.

Looking Back

James Poole of East Wonford has been spending some time on the British Newspaper Archive researching East Wonford, or Wanford, and thought we may like to use this newspaper article in a newsletter.

The newspaper is The North Devon Journal, November 1, 1860

"Coroner's Inquest – On Friday last an inquest was held at East Wonford, in the parish of Milton Damerel, before George Doe, Esq., deputy coroner, on the body of Agnes Sanders, wife of John Sanders, farmer, who met with her death on the previous day, under the circumstances detailed in the following evidence:- John Sanders sworn:- I am a farmer, residing at East Wonford, in the parish of Milton Damerel. The body which the coroner and jury have now viewed is the body of my wife, Agnes Sanders. She was 75 years of age. I was in bed with the deceased yesterday morning, and awoke about 4 o'clock, and heard some of the walls crumbling, and thought it was caused by the rats. I heard the same noise shortly after, and my wife said, "I think the house is going to fall down, and we shall be killed." I said to her, "I think it is the rats." A part of the plastering then fell down, and immediately after I heard a crash, and the roof fell in upon us, and we were both covered with the ruins. The house belongs to me and my brother, and I did not consider that the wall was unsafe. I called out to the servant girl, who slept in the same room, and she gave the alarm to the neighbours, who rendered assistance and took me out. ---- John Moore Sanders sworn:- I am a farmer, residing at East Wonford, and am a son of deceased. Soon after 4 o'clock, yesterday morning, my father's boy came and called me, telling me that father's house had fallen in, and they could not get out. I partly dressed and ran to the house. I called out to my father, and asked where he was, He answered, "I am on the planch." With the assistance of Mr Hopper and others, we removed the rubbish and beams, and dragged my father out. My mother was under him, and was quite dead. -----Benjamin Hopper sworn:- I am a famer, residing at East Wonford. Yesterday morning, between 4 and 5 o'clock, I went to the house of Mr. John Sanders, and found that the wall of the house had fallen out, and that part of the roof had fallen in. I assisted in removing the rubbish, and saw one of Mr. Sander's legs. We got him out, and found that the end of one of the principal rafters was resting on Mrs. Sanders' breast. She was bleeding profusely from the mouth and the ear, but I did not see any mark of injury on the body. ----- Verdict, "Accidental death."

James is also hoping to write an article for the Newsletter on findings from his research – we look forward to learning some more about the history of East Wonford.
