Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month in the Parish Hall. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the meeting and also on the website. Anyone is welcome but the public are not permitted to take part in discussions, however time is set aside on the agenda of all meetings for public comments.

Annual Grants: Annual Grants which were approved at the meeting in November 2016 were paid during September 2017. Cheques were sent to, MD Parish Hall, MD Newsletter, MD Church, MD & District Gardening Club and North Devon, Torridge and District CAB. Requests for annual grants for the financial year 2018/2019 were considered at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 15th November, applicants were notified as to whether their application was successful or refused.

The Annual Return and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31st March 2017, have had an internal audit and were sent to the Audit Commission. The accounts were returned with no issues raised. All details were displayed in the Parish Council notice board and is available to view on the website. If anyone needs any further information please contact the Parish Clerk

The Step Back in Time Fund for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Planning Matters:

<u>Development at Town Farm</u>, there was a lively discussion regarding this application at the Parish Council meeting held on the 18th October, where 11 residents attended. All Parishioners comments and concerns raised were passed on to the Torridge planning department, at the present day we have not been notified of any decision. Other applications which were successful included, bungalows at Parkfields and Tor View, also a Garage and storage facilities at Lower Buttermoor. The application for an extension at The Oaks was refused.

All applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings when the plans are discussed. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk, as there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

Town and Parish Fund: The application form for the annual grant 2018/2019 have now been forwarded to Torridge District Council. The Parish Councillors have decided to once again join forces with Sutcombe Parish Council to enable both Parishes to keep the Parishes roads and lane safe for all motorists by cutting back hedges/verges.

Although your Councillors would like to have them all cut, because of the limited funds, only hedges/verges which obstruct motorist's vision have been cut.

The Laptop and Projector purchased with the 2013/2014 TAP grant is used regularly by local organisations. Please contact the Parish Clerk if you wish to use the equipment.

By the time you are reading this the season of Advent will be upon us and I can't believe how fast this year has flown. However, according to the shops and media the run up to Christmas began much earlier - I saw the first Christmas cards on sale in October! I expect the Christmas trees will be twinkling away in front rooms' right at the beginning of December and the office parties in full swing. It's no wonder we struggle to observe the full twelve days of Christmas because we have been enjoying Christmas for at least a month before it actually arrives! The commercialism of Christmas has been growing year on year and I think we are reaching consumer saturation point. As we become more self-indulgent we find we have little to celebrate, for many people Christmas has become a celebration for the sake of celebrating. If we are really honest what we need this Christmas is security in the present and hope for the future. We need to know that we are loved and valued and somewhere there is meaning in life. In the person of Jesus Christ we find our answers. His coming to earth was the biggest rescue operation of all – God himself entered our world to show us what he is really like. He loves us, forgives us, and gifts us with His Holy Spirit to enable us to live life to the full. What a gift and what a hope. Another year is almost ended and now is the time to give you an update on the Heritage Lottery Fund application and where we are with the Church Roof Appeal.

We started the year at Holy Trinity quite turbulently, its true many of us don't like change but it does happen and we have to get on with it – sink or swim. Roy and I viewed the task before us and were quite daunted by what we had to achieve – but we decided to swim and see where we get to - there was work to be done.

The first task was dealing with another HLF grant application – no mean feat after being turned down twice already – and then continuing the work to raise monies to the tune of \pounds 13,000 - that will be Holy Trinity's contribution to the roof repair.

To this end we held coffee mornings in church and at our home respectively which jointly raised $\pounds400$

In August we held our first 'Garden Party', it was suggested and organised by a good friend of the church – Roberta. The day was mainly dry and windy but this did not deter the spirit of people in Milton Damerel and the surrounding area who enjoyed an afternoon out in convivial company and who also kindly donated cakes, bric a brac and time to the event.

Our thanks too to Malcolm who undertook to keep us entertained with background music as he played his keyboard interspersed with Cd's, this added to the atmosphere of the event.

The Gardening Club very kindly donated their day's takings from selling plants which were supplied by club members.

Raffle prizes were kindly donated from Sanders Garage, The Union Inn at Stibbs Cross, Woodford Bridge, and from The Big Sheep - they were worth buying a ticket or two for.

Money raised amounted to $\frac{1}{2}548$, less expenses we were able to put $\frac{1}{2}474$ into the Roof Fund.

We have been supported in our efforts by you the people who live in Milton Damerel and donations from the Gardening Club for which we thank you all very much. Our end of year figure now stands at £10,400 with another £1000 pledged when (if) we get the Lottery funding.

Its still a little way to go but it doesn't look quite so daunting now. With the community of Milton Damerel and Bradworthy Benefice supporting and helping us we can achieve this.

Thank you to everyone who gave their support - will you please do it all again next year?

Remember you can make a donation to the roof fund at any time, no amount is too small.

I am biting my nails down to the quick as the days count down to December when we will be told of our success (or otherwise) of the HLF application.

The outcome will be displayed on the notice boards both inside and outside the church - as soon as we know.

In July our Church BBQ was very well attended and new 'chef' Keith did an excellent job over the BBQ stove - donations amounted to f_{160} for church funds.

HELP, would anyone volunteer to help us remove crows nest debris from the tower. We need at least 2 able body persons to go up the ladder into the tower to clean it out and make it secure so the crows won't be able to access it next year. The debris is blocking the bells so we can't chime them. If it isn't done before the crows return then it will delay the work on our new roof.

Isn't life strange at times: amongst the visitors to the church of late was Kevin Anderson and sister Joy Dartington (nee Anderson) from Western Australia. They signed the visitors book adding that they were the great, great Grandson and Granddaughter of the last past Minister Rev. William Dyer. How I wish I had been in church to talk to them about their family history.

However less than two weeks later we had a visitor from Stibbs Cross during gardening afternoon her name is Jennifer nee Anderson she was researching her Ancestry in the churchyard. She turned out to be another great, great Granddaughter of Rev. William Dyer Anderson - this is the absolute truth.

How sad they did not meet here at Holy Trinity - could you imagine the reunion?

Luckily the New Zealand visitors wrote their email address in the visitor's book so with Gods help they hopefully have managed to make contact across the decades and across the miles.

We are looking forward to Friday 8th and Saturday 9th December as those are the dates of our second *Christmas Tree Festival* here at Holy Trinity.

This is another opportunity to show off your Christmas tree decorating skills.

Ready for winter?



Do you remember the last time that we had "proper snow"? It was probably ten or more years ago - when many roads within the parish were impassable for several days. Since then we may have forgotten the difficulty of dealing with ice and snow. But some of us are old enough to remember the conditions during the winters of 1963 and 1978/79 – which could happen again. We need to be ready, and the last thing we want to do is encourage people to panic-buy, however, some sensible measures should be taken. All households should hold a stock of candles (and the means of lighting them), spare batteries for torches, some dried food (pasta etc), dried soups and so on. This will ensure that, in extremes, no-one should suffer unduly.

Finally, when you go out in the car make sure that you are dressed for the weather and not for the warmth inside the car! A shovel and a blanket might also be useful.

Vulnerable People

It is not viable to maintain a list of individuals or groups of people living in the parish who may be considered to be vulnerable during a period of cold weather. Nevertheless, in an emergency resulting from heavy snow a priority at the time will be to establish such a list. In the meantime, if anyone does wish to notify the Team of a vulnerable situation or specific needs then they should inform one of the Response Team members.

Parish Footpaths

All of our footpaths are currently usable although some are quite muddy in places due to the large amounts of rainfall which we have seen in recent weeks. By the time you are reading this newsletter, the last of the inter-parish walks for this year will have been completed and is reported on elsewhere in this issue by Evelyn. The 2018 walks programme will be available on the Parish website in the early new year.

With the health benefits of walking on a regular basis now well documented and being promoted by the NHS we have reproduced below an account of a recent walk with the Holsworthy Walk and Talk group.

Despite a wet and windy month our Friday walks have mainly been dry overhead. The Monday walks have not been quite so fortunate, but we have still had good attendances. Last Friday we met at 'St James the Great' Church, Kilkhampton, for a new Level 3 walk on our programme. A record number of 36 walkers set off on a lovely autumnal morning, through the churchyard and out onto West Street which is a part of the village not normally seen by driving straight through on the A39. A short walk took us to the National Trust site of a mediaeval 'motte and baily' castle. A motte is the large circular mound which would have been topped by a wooden or stone lookout tower. Very little structural evidence survives here, which would indicate that this tower had been constructed from wood. The mound is surrounded by a ditch which is the route the footpath now takes. The bailey is the enclosed courtyard attached to the motte which would have housed the lord, his family, servants, horses etc., all surrounded by a wooden palisade, which is a fence made from wooden stakes and usually with pointed tops. Unusually, Kilkhampton Castle had two baileys. We then walked across a field which gave us wonderful views over the countryside, including a glimpse of the sea at Duckpool. A short section of road took us to a footpath/bridleway leading to Herdacott Farm. From here a steep decline through some woodland took us to the inevitable steep incline which slowed us down somewhat, but our heart rates soon recovered to finish the walk on a level path back into the churchyard just as a few raindrops began to fall. Technology showed that we had walked 2.6 miles or 7,000 steps which is well on the way to our recommended 10,000 steps a day. What technology doesn't record is the benefit of great views, short bursts of increased heart rates, the camaraderie of helping each other over stiles and down challenging slopes and talking whilst walking.

A recent study from New Mexico's Highlands University also indicates that regular walking can prevent Alzheimer's disease which has been linked to reduced blood flow in parts of the brain. Holsworthy Walk and Talk group offers a weekly Friday morning walk with routes which are graded so that you know what to expect and you can opt in or out accordingly. There is also a programme of Monday walks aimed at people recovering from illness or walking for the first time and which can be supported on a 1 for 1 basis, if needed. All walks are free to attend. LEGAL ADVICE FROM BUSBYS - UPDATE ON COMMUNITY CARE

The latest information is that there are now approximately 700,000 fewer people getting care support than in 2009 - this approximates to a cut of 40%. More than two-thirds of us underestimate the real cost of care for the elderly. The latest figures show that the average care bill for an individual over a 10 year period exceeds £360,000. Consumers had believed the figure to be about £283,000, and you can see there is a potential short-fall of £77,000. Three-quarters of so-called millennials expect their parents to foot their own care bill. Set against that the worries of 30% of those aged over 55 who have no idea how they will pay for it. One way of paying for it is to sell the family home to finance care, and already one in five people in the UK are doing precisely that. Estimates indicate that caring for one of your parents for 6 years approximates to the same cost as raising a child to the age of 21.

You will see from these sobering statistics that families need to start talking about care planning now rather than leaving it to fate.

Meanwhile Barclays Bank have come up with a very good initiative. They now advertise that carers looking after elderly friends or relatives will shortly be able to get "carers' cards". These will be known as carers' cards, and the carers will be provided with debit cards with separate PINs so they don't have to ask for details which might tempt them to steal money. It will be possible to limit exactly how and where money can be spent with the use of these cards, and typically they will be used to buy groceries and pay bills. That will enable the carers to escape any accusation of fraud. These cards will give carers limited rights within the banking system, and in consequence are to be greatly welcomed.

Another good initiative comes from Royal Mail. Postmen will now be able to open and refuse to deliver any letters which look to be scam letters. The aim is to protect the elderly and the vulnerable who are very often targeted by unscrupulous individuals and companies.

I also read that Scotland will now proceed to ban private firms from carrying out disability benefits assessments. The Government will be aiming to create a system based on "dignity and respect". Having acted for many disabled clients in their efforts to get disability benefits, my hope is that England will adopt the same practice. Farming the work out to independent companies has led to some huge miscarriages of justice where dignity and respect have been largely missing.

A visit to Newmarket.

On a recent visit to Newmarket I had the chance to visit the Dalham Hall Stud, owned by Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid al-Maktoum, the ruler of Dubai.

The first impression is "wow", immaculately fenced paddocks, not a leaf out of place and this was at the end of October when the trees were shedding their leaves, the paddocks were more like over grown lawns not a weed in sight. A short walk took us to the stables where the stallions lived, each one had a solid oak highly varnished door with solid brass hinges and bolts, on the back wall of each was a very large plaque with the name and pedigree of the present occupier, once again not a bit of bedding out of place, spotless.

At that time there were only about 4 stallions in residence, Dubawi and New Approach being the 2 names I remember, Dubawi a stallion worth millions but a rather small (around 15-2) ordinary looking horse, but with a stud fee of $\pounds 250,000$ a mare and he generally covered 4 mares a day in the season, when the English season finishes he travelled out to Australia to work the season out there, just imagine $\pounds 1,000,000$ a day.

The rest of the tour was on 4 wheels, feed sheds, hay barns and the most amazing dung heap. As the bedding from the horses doesn't have enough dung in it it is used as bedding for a herd of cattle, once well "manure" it is emptied into a yard where it is scrapped into long piles and then a special machine gets to work, it travels along these piles turning them, after a few weeks of turning the bedding starts to look like compost, even this yard, apart from the piles, was spotless.

With this tour and also a visit to the Jockey Club, our visit to Newmarket was quite special, plus another highlight was seeing the statue of Hyperion that I had actually seen being sculpted back in the early 60's when I was just 16.

Shed Burglaries

You will be aware from the weekly news reports that shed and garage burglaries are on the rise. This tends to be a regular trend at this time of year with mainly opportunist thieves looking for tools and equipment that they can sell on to make some easy money. Please make sure that your outbuildings are secured and that equipment is security marked in some way. This will make it less desirable to a thief and also enable the police to return it, should it come into their possession. We have a property marking handout for anybody who would like one.

BT Phone Scam (Yet another one!)

Please be aware that the Parish is currently being targeted by calls starting with the area code 01560. This is originating from Moscow in Scotland. The caller is a foreign sounding man saying that he works for BT and he needs access your computer to check for a broadband line problem.

DO NOT give him access to your computer, this is a scam and you should just put the phone down. The authorities are aware of the matter and are working to shut the line down.

STOP AND THINK

A national initiative has recently been launched called "Take 5 – To Stop Fraud" with the aim of trying to reduce the amount of money lost to scams, which continues to rise at an alarming rate and in particular is catching out the older generations who are more trusting which leaves them open to being caught out. If you have older friends and relatives please make them aware of the following:

Never disclose your security details, such as passwords and pins. Don't assume that an email, text or phone call is genuine. Don't be rushed – a genuine organisation won't mind waiting. Listen to your instincts – you often know if something doesn't feel right. Stay in control – don't panic and make a decision that you will regret.

IF YOU HAVE ANY DOUBTS – GET MORE ADVICE

It is also important that **our local police force** has an accurate picture of crime in **our area** so they can allocate policing resources accordingly. They can only do this if you report crimes that have occurred.

Call 999 if:

- you're reporting a crime that's in progress,
- there is a likelihood of the offender being apprehended if police officers respond immediately. if someone is in immediate danger.

Call 101 to contact your local Police force for all non-emergency calls to your local police force.

Equity release is becoming more and more popular with the over 55s, 55 usually being the minimum age, wishing to realise the equity tied up in their homes. There area multitude of schemes available offering an array of benefits.

In principle equity release, or life time mortgage as it is sometimes known, is a way for the more mature house owner to release cash tied up in their property without the need to move house There are a variety of schemes but the most common is a mortgaged based scheme that is repaid when you die or go into long term care. The amount you can borrow depends on your age, value of your house and sometimes health. A typical 75 year old could borrow around 47% of the value of their house with the percentage increasing with age and possibly certain medical conditions

With a large number of interest only mortgages maturing at this time this means that the equity release scheme is a way of raising capital to clear any outstanding debt. In essence you are taking out a long term life time mortgage secured against your home, usually repaid from the sale of the property when you die or go into long term care. Most present day schemes offer a negative equity guarantee, so you should never end up owing more than you have borrowed however in the past some schemes were controversial, charging high fees, and some owners ending up owing more than the actual value of their home. Schemes have moved on with favourable rates, typically fixed between 5 and 6 %, however they are normally higher than the standard mortgage rate generally because the lender has to wait longer for the return and the scheme generally offers less cash than if the property is sold on the open market.

So is equity release, or life time mortgage, an option? You will still have to maintain and insure your house, including any repairs, however you don't have to make payments although the debt will increase over a period of time and consume more of the remaining equity in your home. Interest is charged on a compound rate, meaning the interest charged increases daily and homeowners borrowing just \pounds 45,000 over 25 years could end up paying just over \pounds 153,000!

Is it better to sell and downsize without having a loan and therefore leaving more to your loved ones? A question only you can answer!

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What to do in your garden in Winter, Courtesy of Sutton Seeds

Should you have a few spare hours available, pruning dormant plants quite severely will prove beneficial for their growth next season.

So as to keep your favourite garden tools and mowers in good condition, servicing and storing them properly at this time of year is worthwhile as it will help to make sure they work well and last for years to come.

Another important job is to sweep patios and driveways so that any slippery algae and leaves are cleared away.

Keep clearing up any leaves so that slugs and snails can't shelter beneath them.

Now is a good time for repairing fences, trellises, pergolas, etc., replacing any loose posts or any that might be rotting at the base before they collapse which could cause a lot of damage.

Also treat timber with preservative or wood colouring when perennial and annual climbers have either died away or lost their leaves.

The remains of any old crops should be cleared away, and added to your compost heap or to your garden composter, tidying the area and preparing the ground for next year.

A layer of compost can be spread over the soil once cleared, using one of your best garden forks to work the compost into the surface.

During the winter months plants should be watered sparingly so as to prevent water-logging and rotting.

Plants should be checked weekly and only if the compost has almost dried out should watering be carried out. Also avoid getting any water on the leaves.

Sowings can be made of coleus, cyclamen and geranium provided suitable temperatures can be maintained.

Taller growing bush roses can be pruned down by about half which will prevent the wind from causing them to become loose through swaying and in turn damaging the roots.

The branches of standard roses should also be shortened.

Bare-rooted rose bushes can be planted this month.

Flower bulbs that have been potted up and placed in forcing frames should be watered if compost is dry, and only when their shoots are 5cm (2") high can they be brought out into light, cool conditions.

Broad Bean Aquadulce Claudia can be sown outdoors and the variety. The Sutton broad bean variey can be sown under cloches.

For large onions, seed can be sown during December and early January transplanting the young plants outdoors in spring.

Vacant areas in the vegetable plot can be dug ready for sowing and planting in spring.

Chicory roots can be lifted at this time by cutting back tops and potting up which will force them to produce blanched, tender chicons with whitened leafy shoots. Three roots should be contained in a 25cm (10") pot placing another pot (upturned) on top so that light can't penetrate.

Soft fruit such as currants, gooseberries, raspberries, blackberries and tayberries can be planted at this time as they are dormant.

Blackcurrants – established plants can now be pruned allowing the young wood, which will bear most of the fruit, to start putting on growth in spring.

Blackcurrants – all the buds that are intact should remain, but in the case of whitecurrants and redcurrants only the top four should be left, removing all the others.

Gooseberries - cuttings may also be taken.

Rhubarb – lift clumps, pot up in large boxes for forcing and place either in the greenhouse or shed. The roots should be covered with moist compost, then with the support of a frame place black polythene over the top which will exclude light.

Use apple trays for storing picked apples. Fruit that isn't going to be used immediately in clear plastic bags. The bags should be sealed but two or three small pinpricks should be made in the sides so as to release any gasses produced by the fruits. The bags should be kept in a cool place and only healthy fruits stored. Check the fruit regularly and remove any rotten ones.

Using a garden lawn rake to remove any leaves that have blown onto the lawn, keeping off the grass if wet or frozen!.

Leaves should also be cleared away from rock gardens and borders.

Remove any worm casts when nice and crumbly by using a stiff broom/brush or besom from the lawn on a dry, windy day.

This is the ideal time to clean the greenhouse, pots using a pot brush and trays in readiness for plant raising.

Also check that greenhouse heaters and propagators are working correctly.

Greenhouses can be kept warmer using a heavy duty greenhouse fan heater and you can also using bubble film as insulation which is quite easy to fit.

Before starting to line glass below staging level with white polystyrene, was the greenhouse glass inside and out as this will maximise light levels.

Remember to keep the gutters clear of any leaves or debris.

Pests may overwinter on plants so keep an eye out for them, as small infestations of red spider mite, greenfly and whitefly can soon spread. This could provide problems in the future so it is best to control now by either spraying, removing them from the leaves or, if really necessary, disposing of any plants that are infected.

Do we know from an early stage that this situation is the start of Dementia/Alzheimer's? Is it creeping in on us, like a wiggle worm? Should we take note? We laugh it off, when we know we have forgotten something not really important and apologise, if necessary. But are these signs.....

Some time ago, a month or so, I was talking to someone; I remember it was a lady, about marrows. Do we eat them, grow them? I responded that none were grown this year, but I don't mind them. A Runners High

Day 15 of 28 at Flagstaff, Arizona (7000ft above sea level).....

Another early alarm at 5:30 - quick cup of coffee, some gentle stretches then straight out the door for the morning run (a gentle 9 mile recovery run). It's another beautiful day in Flagstaff - cool but not a cloud in the sky with temperatures due to peak at around 23 degrees in the afternoon. In fact it's the same forecast for the next week - Flagstaff typically enjoys over 280 days of sun a year!

As soon as I get back from the run it's time for breakfast. I've decided to replace my usual cup of coffee with orange juice at meals - because I've learnt that caffeine is proven to inhibit iron absorption and good iron levels are essential to encourage a response to altitude training (vitamin C is also proven to help the absorption of iron). The negative of a much reduced caffeine intake is however evened out as I have had to increase my intake of (lean!) red meat to build my iron levels. A nice sirloin steak is on the menu tonight....

In the afternoon I catch the bus to Buffalo Park - a regular haunt for runners (even Sir Mo). It contains a 2 mile trail loop and is relatively flat by Flagstaff standards. The loop is even distance marked every 1/4 mile. I complete a steady 6 miles with the middle 4 miles slightly quicker - targeting a heart rate in the mid to low 150's beats per minute. Any form of exercise at altitude is notably harder. My paces here are typically 30-40 secs slower per mile compared to the same effort at sea level (although hopefully this will improve during the last 10 days as my body creates more red blood cells).

It's another early night as I need a good night's sleep for tomorrow's hard session of 19 miles. For my hard training sessions, I have been travelling down to lower altitudes. My main options are either Sedona (4500ft) - a beautiful tourist town carved out of the red rock formations and Camp Verde (3000ft) - not as beautiful and a much smaller town but still nice. Both towns are less than an hour bus ride away but because of the dramatic drop in altitude, temperatures tend to be around 10 degrees hotter than Flagstaff.

I've been wanting to experience altitude training for a number of years now. Luckily a host of factors aligned and made it all possible - most of all I managed to get 4 weeks of leave approved at work! It's generally accepted that a duration of around a month is required at altitude to get the best results. Although I'll go some way short of stating this is a once in a lifetime opportunity - I do realise that I'm dealing in diminishing returns in now being closer to 40 than 30!

Flagstaff is a great location for altitude training - small enough to get around easily without a car but

big enough to provide city conveniences to make living easy. There's plenty to do outside training - the famous Route 66 runs straight through the centre of town and the Grand Canyon is a short drive away. Regular snowfall in the nearby mountains make it a popular ski destination in the winter.

Time is flying here - I travel to Chicago in two weeks, arriving three days before the marathon. I'm now approaching the phase of training known as the 'taper'. This involves reducing overall training mileage and intensity of workouts to ensure you reach the big day fully rested, recovered and in peak condition for the race. Surprisingly it is a lot hard than it sounds but it is definitely a case of less is more, especially in the last week.



The end result a nice Personal best of 2:27:07 for 45th place at Chicago Marathon. Next stop London Marathon in April.

Gingerbread wreath Courtesy of BBC Good Food

Prep: 45 mins Cook: 12 mins - 15 mins

Serves 12 - 15

Turn delicately spiced, iced biscuits into an edible Christmas decoration - a gorgeous gift to give to someone special over the festive season

	Ingredients
175g dark muscovado sugar	85g golden syrup
100g slightly salted butter	350g plain flour, plus extra for dusting
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda	1 tbsp ground ginger
1 tsp ground cinnamon	1 egg, beaten To decorate
blue food colouring paste (optional)	500g fondant icing sugar
silver edible glitter (optional)	ribbon and cellophane (if giving as a gift)



Method

Put the sugar, golden syrup and butter in a saucepan. Bring to a simmer, then bubble for 1-2 mins, stirring until well combined. Set aside to cool for 10 mins.

Tip the flour, bicarbonate of soda and spices into a large bowl. Add the warm syrup mixture and the egg, stir to bring everything together, then gently knead in the bowl until smooth and streak-free. The dough will feel a little soft now, but will firm up once cooled. Wrap the dough in cling film and chill for at least 30 mins.

Remove the dough from the fridge and and leave at room temperature until softened. Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6 and line two baking trays with baking parchment.

Cut off half the dough and keep the rest wrapped in cling film. Roll out the dough to the thickness of a £1 coin, then use a plate or the base of a cake tin as a template to cut out a 20cm circle. Transfer to one of the baking trays, then use a 7cm cutter to stamp out and remove a circle in the middle. Roll out the remaining dough and cut out a variety of other shapes to decorate the wreath (you'll need about 20-25 pieces – we used stars and angels) and arrange these over the trays too.

Bake the biscuits for 10-12 mins, swapping the trays over halfway through cooking. Stamp a hole in the top of the ring using a small cutter, or the end of a piping nozzle, as soon as it comes out the oven – you can tie a pretty ribbon through this later. Leave to cool on the trays, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Mix the icing sugar with enough water to make a thick icing. Transfer to a piping bag fitted with a small nozzle, then decorate the biscuits as you wish, using a little edible glitter, if you like. We flooded some of the biscuits with pale blue icing (see tip) and piped white details on the others. Leave the icing to dry for 1-2 hrs, then use a little more icing to stick the biscuits to the wreath. Thread a ribbon through the hole and wrap up in cellophane, if giving as a gift (the ribbon is just for show and may not support a hung wreath). Will keep for 2 weeks.
