Meetings are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month in the Parish Hall. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards no later than the Thursday before the meeting and also on the website. Anyone is welcome but the public are not permitted to take part in discussions, however time is set aside on the agenda of all meetings for public comments.

Devon County Councillor Barry Parsons; attended the Parish Council Meeting in September but was unable to attend the October one due to heavy commitments.

Barry continues to work very hard behind the scenes to support your Parish Council, he sends regular reports by email, there are funds available from him for worthy causes, if you have a request for a grant please contact the Clerk with the details.

P.C.S.O Emma Tomkies send regular updates to the Parish Council, due to the very wide area of her 'patch' it is not always easy to attend meetings.

Annual Grants:

Annual Grants which were approved at the meeting in November 2017 were paid during September 2018. Cheques were sent to: MD Parish Hall, MD Newsletter, MD Church, MD & District Gardening Club and North Devon, Torridge and District CAB. Requests for annual grants for the financial year 2019/2020 were considered at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 21st November, applicants were notified as to whether their application was successful or refused.

<u>The Annual Return</u> and accounts of Milton Damerel Parish Council for the year ending 31st March 2018 have been completed and details were publicised in the notice boards and all details are available on the website. The accounts were subject to an internal independent audit. Due to new Financial Regulations Parish Councils with a turn over of less than £25,000 no longer need to send accounts to an outside auditor. A certificate of exemption was completed by the Parish Council and sent to the new auditors F. Littlejohns, no issues have been raised.

<u>The Step Back in Time Fund</u> for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Planning Matters:

Development at Town Farm, at the time of writing this report there is no update on this development

The development at Southerly, Gidcott was approved by Torridge Planning Department. The application for the Outline planning for three dwellings at Holsworthy Beacon has yet to be decided.

All applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings when the plans are discussed. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application, they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk, as there is now a strict 21 day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

Town and Parish Fund this has now been changed to 'Communities Together Fund'

The scheme (originally Town and Parish Fund) was devised to encourage "cross-border" projects, either for councils to work together or for them to support community organisations to benefit residents of more than one parish. At present we do not have a project in mind but if any Resident or members of local organisations have any ideas please let the Parish Clerk know, or discuss them with any Councillors, the project must involve two or more Parishes.

Complaints

Your Parish Councillors receive many complaints, these are usually discussed at the next Parish Council Meeting, or by email if it is deemed appropriate.

It might be worth remembering that Torridge District Council, and Devon County Council have numerous departments to deal with a large range of complaints, the more residents that complain the quicker complaints will be dealt with.

Community Defibrillator (AED):

If at any time you see that there is any damage to the cabinet at either site, or if the light is not working please contact the Parish Clerk or any Councillor.

Hello Everyone

The clocks have gone back, it is getting dark earlier and despite the lovely days we enjoyed during September and October there is a definite crispness in the air. Winter is here bringing all the joyful things we enjoy in the winter months, such as a warm and welcoming home, closing the curtains early and snuggling down in front of a warming fire and if, like us you are naughty, then also something to nibble on - usually sweet and usually chocolate covered.

Then there is the highlight of the year to look forward to - Christmas – the Christmas story seems to be of less prominence or importance in people's lives as each year passes, but let's remember it is the reason we celebrate this time of year and the reason we exchange gifts as we celebrate the greatest gift the world has ever received. Holy Trinity Church Grave Yard Project 2018

During the hot dry summer aerial photos by drone where taken which enabled a plan of the grave stones in the Church Yard to be produced. The whole grave yard has been divided into five sections A-E and each grave stone has been given a reference number. Over 170 stones have been photographed and the data commemorating 235 individuals has been collected and recorded on a spreadsheet. This information will be made available in alphabetical order in a folder in Church, to help with family history enquiries. There are just a small number of marked graves where the names are not yet available. Sadly, the original grave plan is missing so unmarked graves cannot be catalogued.

PROMISES MUST BE KEPT

Gilbert Thompson is a farmer. He has farmed all his life. He left school at 15 to work on his parents' farm. As his farming knowledge and experience increased he took on more and more responsibilities.

Gilbert was the youngest of five children, the first four being sisters. None of the girls were interested in farming, and his parents' hope always was that somebody would be interested in carrying on the farm, following a long line of Thompson farmers before him. He was happy to work on the farm even though he was given a very low wage. His parents had promised him that he would one day own the farm, and that is what kept him going.

In 1992 he went into partnership with his parents and the farm was transferred to them in equal shares. Under the Partnership Agreement Gilbert undertook to devote his full time and attention to the business, reinforcing his belief that he would one day inherit the farm in its entirety.

In 2004 Gilbert and his parents met with their accountants and discussed some inheritance planning. The parents wanted to leave a decent amount to each of the children, but did not want the farm broken up as this would be left to Gilbert. The four girls benefitted by having many insurance policies bequeathed to them. Mr Thompson died in 2012, at which time his widow signed a new Will leaving everything except the insurance policies to Gilbert.

Gilbert and his partner moved into the farmhouse with Mrs Thompson. That was the start of numerous arguments over the way in which the farmhouse should be run, including its decoration. This led to Court action after Mrs Thompson got cold feet and no longer wanted Gilbert to inherit the farm. Gilbert told the Court he relied on the promises made at various times throughout his life that he would be the one to inherit the farm. This was one of the reasons why he accepted a reduced wage. Two of his sisters sided with him and confirmed



to the Court that it was known he was to inherit the farm.

For her part Mrs Thompson and one of her daughters sought to persuade the Court that Gilbert was negligent and unable to run the farm. The Judge gave that short shrift. He said that Gilbert's reliance on the original promises that he would inherit the farm had and would impact negatively on his life should those promises not be honoured. The Judge ruled in his favour. Gilbert's evidence was compelling and the Judge found his two supporting sisters' evidence to be "credible, truthful and reliable".

When members of a family business fall out, the consequences can be dire if they cannot patch up their differences - and I have seen on many occasions these kind of cases end up in Court at huge expense to the parties concerned.

Milton Damerel Parish Emergency Plan

The Parish Emergency Response Team (ERT) met on 8th October and carried out the annual review of the Parish Emergency Plan. The Plan was drawn up in 2011 and updated in 2016; its purpose is to help to deal with an emergency or major incident likely to cause or threaten death, injury or widespread disruption to the local community and which, otherwise, *could not be dealt with by the emergency services or local authorities*. Implementation of the plan would normally be ordered by the Parish Council.

The ERT decided that no significant changes need to be made to the plan this year. Kate Moyse and Roger Lawes have stepped down from the team and Christian Whitley has taken over as Coordinator with Robert Stennett becoming Deputy Coordinator. The team plan to carry out an exercise by the end of November to test the effectiveness of hand-held radios purchased last year.

Footpaths News

Parish Footpath No. 1: We reported in the last issue that the footbridge was rotting and becoming dangerous. Unfortunately, it has worsened and recently collapsed making it unusable. Our Rights of Way warden has ordered a replacement bridge and we hope that this will be installed in the near future. In the meantime, in the interests of safety it would be better if people didn't try to cross the bridge although the rest of the path is of course still usable.

Inter Parish Walks: The Pyworthy Walk, starting from the Village Hall car park on 12th. November will be the final walk for this year, December and January usually being kept clear due to holidays, Christmas and bad weather. The new 2019 programme will be put on the Parish website as soon as it becomes available. Overall, the walks have been very well supported this year with an average of 25-30 turning out each month and the weather has mainly been favourable. A report on the most recent walk, by Evelyn, can be found elsewhere in this issue.

Holsworthy Walk & Talk: The following article has been provided by Gillian Aston (a walk leader).

This month has given us a good mix of walks to suit all abilities. The Kilkhampton Walk has gone to the top of our Challenge Chart toppling our Ashwater route into second place. Kilkhampton offers a range of terrain with long, steep climbs and several stiles. All walks are graded on the programme with Level 3 being the most challenging but still within the three mile remit of Walking for Health. Level 2 walks are slightly shorter with gently sloping terrain or level with a good surface such as the Rydon Lane and Ruby Way walks which, for the most part, follow the cycle track. The Level 1 Walk in the Park is on totally level and easily navigable ground and lasts no more than half an hour making it ideal for those who are returning to exercise following illness or injury.

On our programme, all walks have a short explanatory note alongside the venue indicating the terrain to be expected together with any particularly steep climbs, possible mud and stiles. Thanks to the great work carried out by the various Parish P3 Coordinators and Devon County Council many stiles have now been replaced with new pedestrian gates. The volunteer P3 Coordinators work hard within their Parishes to keep our footpaths in good repair for the benefit of all by cutting back brambles, strimming and repairing any damage to gates, stiles etc on a very modest budget. However, when we do encounter any stiles on our walks there are always many helping hands to assist any reluctant body parts to safely clamber over.

The Government's advice is that any physical activity is better than none. Start small and build up gradually. Regular physical activity can help to prevent and manage over 20 chronic conditions and diseases, many of which are on the rise and affecting people at an earlier age; 1 in 3 of the working age population have at least 1 long term condition and 1 in 7 have more than one.

Becoming more active could prevent one in ten cases of stroke and heart disease in the UK and one in six deaths from any cause. In fact it's often said that if physical activity was a drug it would be classed as a wonder drug.

Walking for Health is doing its part to meet the Government guidelines and in such a way that we get to see many interesting and beautiful local places, meet new people and enjoy the many physical and psychological benefits of walking. All walks are also FREE!

Our Monday Level 1 walks in Stanhope Park, Holsworthy start at 10.30 am. We now meet outside the Holsworthy Area Sports Pavilion with tea and coffee served afterwards. The Friday walks move off at 10.30 am from various locations around the area. Details can be found on our walk programme.

Inter Parish Walks

On Monday 10th September, seventeen of us met at the Village Hall in Clawton. We repeated the route that we took this time last year in the knowledge that Devon County Council (DCC) has made some considerable improvements. We began by heading down the lane & joining the footpath on the right hand side just before the Church. This first part of the route has always been challenging as it involved clambering over some very substantial stiles. From memory there were at least six & each one seemed to get progressively higher!!!! Now it's a completely different story as they have all been replaced with galvanised gates. It obviously made a huge difference to the progress that we made along the footpath which goes behind Court Barn Country Hotel, through a couple of private gardens & along the edge of a maize field. There was evidence that the hedge had been cut earlier in the year but the rapid growth made this section a bit tricky for us. Personally, I always feel guilty walking through crops preferring to keep to the hedgerow but I am sorry to say that we were somewhat thwarted by the Blackthorn & Hawthorn, both of which have thorns! I think the clue is in the name. We opted to walk between the rows of maize for obvious reasons. Hopefully, we didn't do too much damage to the crop but I was concerned as I remembered from last year that there had been a second field of maize to negotiate. We all commented on how much drier the ground was than this time last year as we remembered having to circumnavigate some seriously muddy patches. We went through a couple of gates & entered the second maize field only to find that a path had been cleared along the edge. It made our progress very much easier & obviously we didn't have the worry about feeling responsible for damaging the crop. From there we walked through fields of lush grass & negotiated what had been a treacherously slippery wooden footbridge last year. The dry weather over the summer months has obviously had a major impact on the ground & wooden structures. It wasn't remotely slippery & some kind person had obviously repaired a couple of wooden steps that had shown signs of rotting. We were delighted that the owner of Hole Park had once again managed to produce a stunning floral display in their garden. The hanging baskets are always spectacular & a joy to behold as we approach the end of the footpath. From there we rejoined the lane & headed back to our cars stopping on the way at Bramble Farm to purchase some homegrown veg. I have realised that it is always worth carrying some loose change whilst out walking as there are often eggs, vegetables & flowers for sale at the gate of various properties.

I believe everyone enjoyed the walk in Clawton & we are all most appreciative of the efforts of those concerned for keeping our local footpaths so accessible. Hopefully more people will be inclined to use them in the knowledge that they are well marked & clear. If you are aware of any problems, I would advise letting your local Parish Council know so that they can make DCC aware.

The walks in Bradworthy are always popular & Monday 8th October was no exception. There were twenty seven of us including five residents of Bradworthy. It is always a bonus when local people come on our walks as they know their Parish far better than me & they have lots of snippets of local knowledge.

We set off from The Square & headed past the School. This pretty lane goes downhill, over the River Waldon & up the other side. It is always full of colour & of course at this time of year we were able to enjoy the glorious autumnal colours. Daphne had very kindly arranged for us to visit Waldon Valley Lodges which is set way back from the road. I would say that it could be one of Bradworthy's best kept secrets. For many years it was a successful quarry producing China Clay. Even after all these years, there is evidence of its history including the office associated with the weighbridge although it blends cleverly into the natural backdrop. With kind permission of the owners, Mr & Mrs Derek Cann, we were able to explore their beautiful property. There are three charming lodges for holiday visitors set around a lake. The owners have created a woodland walk & a river walk for visitors which provided a very peaceful stroll for us. Mr Cann reminded us that it wouldn't have been so quiet in years gone by when blasting would have taken place three times a day. We stood by the lake enjoying the peace & tranquility, also being enjoyed by a Heron. We were reluctant to leave! However, we knew that we had the prospect of refreshments kindly arranged by Daphne in the Collacott Room so we headed back to The Square. It is always a treat to look at the archive material kept there. The unexpected treat was biscuits. They went down very well. The Collacott Room is in Bradworthy Hall, Bradworthy Square, and is open every Wednesday morning between 10.00 & 12.00 if you would like the opportunity to see some of the material & photos that are kept there. I would like to thank Mr & Mrs Cann for their very kind hospitality & also Daphne, Sarah, Pam & Tina for

giving up their Monday morning for us.



Our last walk for this year was on Monday 12th November. I had received a special request to walk a particular footpath in Pyworthy. I knew that we had not walked it for three years & that several "new people" would not have walked it previously, so I was keen to oblige. Gill Aston very kindly liaised with local land owners about their livestock that would normally be grazing those particular fields. She also advised Nick Lock, the local P3 (Parish Paths Partnership) volunteer heavens opened for several consecutive days during the previous week!!! I was somewhat concerned as it isn't everybody's choice to walk along a footpath across squelchy fields. The day itself dawned sunny & bright. Twenty of us, including Rusty who is very aptly named, met at Pyworthy village hall. We set off in the direction of the Molesworth Arms & then headed towards Hoppatown. If you look at the map, the lane sort of runs parallel with the footpath & so I was able to give everybody a choice. They could follow the footpath across the fields & rejoin the lane at the electricity sub-station. By turning left, they would then find the Old Rectory on their left. Alternatively, they could follow the lane & by turning right at the T-junction would find the Old Rectory on their right. The plan came together so that we could all choose our preferred terrain according to our footwear & we all met up again before too long. Bearing in mind that the sun was shining, we didn't need much encouragement to follow the next footpath towards Crinacott Farm. It is a concrete drive initially & then the footpath cuts across by the solar panels on the left, across a couple of fields & rejoins the lane at Yeomadon. These fields were relatively dry underfoot. It was a shame that at this point the heavens opened & we tended to keep our heads down rather than admire the view back towards St. Swithun's Church in Pyworthy. Thankfully it didn't last for long & we were all prepared for it in our various coats. The lanes were quiet & it was a nice stroll back to our cars albeit up hill initially. I think everyone enjoyed the walk but I am sure those that chose to walk along the lane rather than the footpath will wonder what they missed, ha ha.

I would like to thank everyone that has been involved in these walks over the last ten months. I am always very pleased to have company. It is very nice to meet new people & equally nice to renew my acquaintance with familiar faces. Your willingness to join me whatever the weather, whatever the terrain & your eagerness to assist me with trimming annoying brambles is very much appreciated. I also owe a big thank you to those that have kindly devised the routes & led the walks in the Parishes of Thornbury, Halwill, Bradworthy, Milton Damerel & Pyworthy. You are far more familiar with your local area than I am & I am very grateful to you for your kind assistance. I am always happy to lead the walks myself but if anyone in the Parishes of Clawton, Pancrasweek or Holsworthy Hamlets would like to lead them next year, please let me know. I must also thank the local land owners who are so accommodating when it comes to parking on their property & making provision with their livestock.

The timing is such that I will take this opportunity to wish everyone a Happy Christmas. I will be in touch before too long with the programme of walks for next year. The first walk will be on Monday 11th February 2019. If you would like any more information, you are welcome to ring me.

CHRISTMAS WORD SEARCH

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Wildlife and Rural Crime: Holsworthy Police Station is now the base for PC 7357 Lee Skinner, who is the North Devon Wildlife/Rural Crime Officer. Lee has recently transferred from Hampshire Police where he was part of a small specialist unit dealing exclusively with wildlife and rural crimes, and he is now looking forward to bringing his knowledge and skills to North Devon. His remit is quite broad-ranging and covers Farms, Plant Machinery, Environmental Crime, Habitat Destruction, Endangered Species and CITES (which is an acronym for "Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora". It covers such things as ivory, rhino horn, tortoises and other protected species). In his recent travels around the area, Lee has met many farmers, game keepers and land owners who have told him about incidents which have occurred but which have never been reported as crimes/criminal activity and so the police were not aware that there have been problems. He would now like everybody to have a change of mindset and rather than just ignoring something which might seem to be trivial, such as a broken lock on a field gate or barn, and report it. Actual crimes in progress should of course still be reported using 999 and other less urgent criminal activity on 101.

If he is not available you can reach him via tel: **101**, who can take a message or ask Lee to make contact with you. Christmas Scams: With Christmas now fast approaching, many of us will be using internet shopping which brings the added risks of being targeted by scammers. Rural North Devon might be a low crime area as far as traditional crimes are concerned but internet and telephone fraud know no boundaries and the police tell us that these types of fraud continue to increase at alarming rates and large sums of money are being lost across the South West. Courier fraud which we mentioned in the last issue, tends to increase at this time of year, so please be on your guard and aware of the possibility of a scam. This also applies to emails and phone calls purporting to be from delivery companies and drivers and even your bank or credit card company.

Holsworthy Beacon: It is now 2 years since we lost our co-ordinator at Holsworthy Beacon and as there have been a number of changes to the households during this time we wonder if there is anybody who might like to be the local point of contact. Please remember that we live in a very low crime area and so the work involved in being a co-ordinator is not onerous, and can be rewarding in many ways. Firstly, you meet local residents which under other circumstances you might not have the opportunity to do so. Secondly, you meet police officers, PCSOs and other members of organisations, such as the fire service. You have the opportunity of attending occasional meetings which are both informative and constructive. You will be the first to know, from these meetings, trends in crimes in the area and about police operations which have not yet been made public. This information is then communicated to your residents in whatever manner is appropriate for your area and people. If you are interested in joining our team of co-ordinators, or would like any further information about what is involved, please contact our area co-ordinator Roger, or any of the other co-ordinators whose details are above.

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As this will be the last newsletter for this year our PCSOs also join with us in wishing everybody a very Happy Christmas, Safe and Peaceful New Year.

Hot chocolate stirrers

Prep: 10 mins Cook: 2 mins - 3 mins

Easy - makes 6

We all know a few die hard chocolate fans - make them one of these hot choc stirrers as a gift and they'll never want to use powdered cocoa again.

Ingredients

sunflower oil, for greasing

300g dark, milk or white chocolate (or a mixture), broken into squares

To decorate

selection of chocolate buttons, hundreds and thousands, mini fudge pieces or chopped peppermint candy canes

Method

1. You will need:

6 cupcake cases, pencil, pastry brush, 6 empty 47g fromage frais pots (washed and dried), 6 wooden lolly sticks, cellophane and string or ribbon for wrapping, 6 gift tags.

Push a small hole in the middle of the cupcake cases with a pencil and put aside for later

- 2. Dip the pastry brush in the sunflower oil and paint a very thin layer of oil over the insides of the fromage frais pots.
- 3. Put the chocolate in a bowl and heat in the microwave in 30-sec bursts until runny, stirring after each blast. Or melt it in a heatproof bowl set over a pan of simmering water (get an adult to help you). If you're using different types of chocolate, you should melt them separately.
- 4. Carefully pour the melted chocolate into the pots. Put a lolly stick in the middle of each and sprinkle your chosen decorations around it.
- 5. Sit a cake case on top of each pot so that it covers the chocolate and the stick pokes through the hole. Put them in the fridge to set overnight.
- 6.The next day, carefully pull the chocolates out of the pots and throw away the paper cases. Wrap each in cellophane tied with string and write a tag to read: "Simply stir into hot milk".

Mince pie brownies

Prep: 35 mins Cook: 30 mins

Easy - Makes 16

Combine two favourites in this clever mash-up of brownies and mince pies. These sweet treats will prove a big hit throughout the festive season

Ingredients

185g unsalted butter cubed

185g high-quality dark chocolate chopped
85g plain flour
40g cocoa powder
3 large eggs
275g golden caster sugar
6 mince pies or 9-12 mini mince pies
icing sugar, for dusting

Method

- 1. Melt the butter and chocolate in a medium bowl, either in a microwave– cooking for 1 min on High, then stirring and continuing to heat in 20-second blasts or by setting the bowl over a pan of simmering water and stirring occasionally. Once melted, leave the mixture to cool.
- 2. Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Line the base of a shallow 20cm square tin with non-stick baking parchment. Sieve the flour and cocoa into a medium bowl. Whisk the eggs and sugar with an electric mixer on maximum speed until thick and creamy, about 3-8 mins, or when the mixture runs off the beaters and leaves a trail for a second or two.
- 3. Pour in the cooled chocolate mixture, then fold together with a rubber spatula in a figure of eight, moving the bowl round until the mixture is a mottled dark brown. Be gentle so you don't knock out the air.
- 4. Sift in the cocoa and flour mixture and continue gently folding. The mixture will look dry and dusty, then fudgy. Stop just before you feel you should, as you don't want to overmix it.
- 5. Spoon a little mixture into the prepared tin, then add the mince pies, leaving them whole. Scrape over the rest of the mixture, gently easing it between and over the pies. Level the top. Put in the oven for 25 mins. If the brownie mixture is very wobbly in the middle, it's not quite done, so bake for another 5 mins until the top has a shiny, papery crust and the sides are just beginning to come away from the tin. Take out of the oven and leave to cool in the tin. Dust with icing sugar. Cut into quarters, then cut each quarter into four squares. *Will keep in an airtight container for a week and in the freezer for up to a month.*

Holsworthy Rural Policing Update

Holsworthy Neighbourhood Police are asking residents to be vigilant against opportunist burglars and thieves when buying presents for Christmas.

The risk of domestic burglaries increases in the weeks leading up to Christmas and we are warning locals that any presents on show in their homes can be a target for criminals.

DEVON & CORNWALL CONSTABULARY

Over the festive period we are recommending that householders take care by keeping doors and windows locked and secure, and by keeping presents and valuables away from outside view.

The majority of burglars are opportunists who enter homes where windows are left open or doors are left either open or unlocked.

We also would like to remind shoppers that not everyone is full of goodwill to all men at this time of year.

Even here in Holsworthy, where theft from vehicles is relatively rare, thieves are well aware that shopping areas will be packed with people spending their hard-earned money on presents for loved ones and will be doing their utmost to take them away.

Shoppers can reduce the risk of becoming victims by taking simple measures like keeping presents or valuables hidden from view as thieves will target those vehicles which offer easy pickings.

Please don't be a victim of crime. Shut your windows, lock your doors and keep your valuables out of sight!

We also urge people to security mark presents and valuables with their postcode and house number and register items using the free service: www.immobilise.com which enables police to identify the owner of valuables if they are stolen.
