

Meetings of the Parish Council are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Thursday before the meeting. The draft minutes are posted to the website within 30 days. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time. Due to the Covid 19 pandemic all meetings have been held on the ZOOM platform, any resident is welcome to attend, but if you wish to do so please notify the clerk.

If you need any help with shopping, getting prescriptions please contact one of your Parish Councillors or the Clerk. If you have any financial issues please contact Torridge District Council who have protocols in place to help those in need. Your Local and County Councillors are also there to advise and assist.

District Councillors

Our District Councillors Kit Hepple and Ken James have been attending our ZOOM meetings, details of which are in the minutes. Regular updates are also received by email, although not always available to attend meetings both Councillors work in the background to support the Parish and can be contacted by all for any help required.

Devon County Councillor Barry Parsons;

Barry has also attended our ZOOM meetings and a brief synopsis of his reports are always contained in the minutes. His full reports can be found on the website. His continued support of the Parish is greatly appreciated. Although Barry cannot attend all meetings, he works diligently in the background to support the Parish Council. There are funds available from him for worthy causes, if you have a request for a grant please contact the Clerk or any of your Parish Councillors with the details. It is with great regret that we report that Barry is standing down as our district Councillor; he will not be standing for re-election in the May elections. Barry has always been a great supporter of the Parish Council both financially and advisory, he will be greatly missed.

PFCSO Mark James has been unable to attend any meetings recently due to his workload, but sends regular updates by email to the Parish Council; these reports are posted to the website.

Planning matters:

There has been only one application since December, a conversion of an outbuilding to a residential annex.

After many years in the pipeline the Application for the development at Town Farm has now been passed, this will be for 9 residential homes and the barn conversion into two dwellings.

Although objections and concerns were raised regarding the application, especially concerning the number of dwellings, it is felt by all Councillors that the site has been an eyesore for many years and something needed to be done. It is hoped that the project will be started without further delay.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application, they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21-day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

Milton Damerel Parish Annual Grants

Cheques for approved Grants for the financial year 2021/22 to Milton Damerel Newsletter, Milton Damerel Parish Hall Milton Damerel and District Gardening Club, Milton Damerel Parish Church and North Devon and District Citizens Advice, will be issued and distributed in September.

Applications for annual grants for the Financial Year 2022/23 will be considered during the meeting on the 17th November 2021, successful applicants will be notified by post shortly after the meeting.

The Step Back in Time Fund: for young people still has a balance of £183.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Community Defibrillator (AED):

If at any time you see that there is any damage to the cabinet at either site, or if the light is not working, please contact the Parish Clerk or any Councillor. If you would like a refresher on the use of the AED and basic life support please let the Parish Clerk know, these are conducted free of charge.

Condition of the Roads in and around Milton Damerel:

The Parish Council receive numerous complaints regarding the poor state of the roads, the Parish Clerk always passes on the complaints to Devon County Council and copies in Councillor Barry Parsons, who invariably substantiates our complaints. The more people that go onto Devon County Council's website and reports potholes and poor road surfaces the better, the Parish Council encourages residents to do so as often as they can.

Annual Parish Meeting and Annual General Meeting:

At present neither the Annual Parish Meeting or the Annual General meeting have been planned.

If restrictions are lifted and it is safe to do so both could be organized, the parish Council are waiting for further guidance from their guiding body the Devon Association of Local Councils who are advised by their guiding body the National Association of Local Councils. Please look out for notices on the website and in the Notice boards.

Freedom of information: Requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act should be sent to the Parish Clerk. Some information can be made available by email free of charge, paper copies will be charged at 10p per A4 side. Chapel News - March 2021

From our Minister

Dear Friends

We are now into the Holy season of Lent. It of course, began on Ash Wednesday (I hope you enjoyed your pancakes the day before on Shrove Tuesday) and runs for 40 days, Sundays excluded, until Good Friday.

The 40 days are based on Jesus time in the wilderness. It is from that episode that we get the idea of giving up things for Lent. Chocolate is a favourite, no doubt because we know Easter and Easter eggs are coming. But actually, Lent is a time for taking things on. That is because Lent is a time of preparation – of getting ready for the climatic events of the last week of Jesus' life – Holy Week. It is a time for preparing for the worst, the brutal death of Jesus Christ.

During Lent there are two parallel journeys taking place; and both heading towards the cross.

The first we observe is the passage of Christ, towards Palm Sunday and Good Friday. Without consideration of that, we cannot really celebrate on Easter Day.

The second track is our pilgrimage alongside Christ. Lent has traditionally been a time of self-discovery as well as learning about Jesus.

All roads lead towards the cross, and Good Friday. The last week of Jesus' life is traumatic to say the least. The adulation of Palm Sunday is followed by growing tension with the authorities, who are out to "get" him. That is brought about by the betrayal of one of his followers. Following a dramatic and poignant last meal with his disciples the deed is done; Jesus is arrested and subject to a mock trial and frequent torture. The cheers of Palm Sunday turn to the jeers of Good Friday; and lead to the crucifixion; a most painful and degrading way to die. That is the road that suffering love has taken Christ – to his cross.

But that is not the end, although one needs to face the reality of Good Friday.

For on Easter Sunday Christ rose and we rejoice. The way of love is vindicated and hope is triumphant.

We live in difficult and worrying times. Hope will prevail. Things will improve and we shall get through this terrible pandemic, even if it means, as I suspect it does, that we are going to have to face new ways of living. But more, Love will triumph – the way of Christ; the way of service, and the way to life.

May this spring time be a blessing to you all.





Inter Parish Walks

Ordinarily, I would be sharing the new programme of walks for the next ten months with you. However, with the best will in the world, nobody can describe our current situation as ordinary! Confirming that the current advice is that all organised walks are suspended until further notice. However, as individuals we are permitted to walk with one other person from another household and so that is what I have been doing.

Recently, my friend Gill Aston kindly showed me a lovely circular walk that started at the entrance to Leworthy Woods in Pyworthy. There is limited parking which made it a bit awkward as we had to drive there separately but we got there early and it was very quiet. We followed the track heading south east. If you look at a map, it confirms that the route took us past France. I wonder where that name originates from? The footpath took us across some beautiful frosty fields and involved a bridge that enabled us to cross the River Deer. We joined the road opposite the entrance to East Down. It was a strange feeling as I wasn't quite sure where we were but then I realised that we were on the Chasty - North Tamerton Road. We turned right towards North Tamerton and I started to recognise some of the places that we would have passed on our walks in Clawton. That didn't last long! Gill led the way down a track on the right hand side. It was very narrow and serves as the access to Forda Mill. We re-crossed the River Deer before accessing Affaland Moor. This part of

the route is officially classed as a BOAT (By-way open to all traffic). We stayed on the track that goes straight across the middle of the moor and met the North Tamerton - Pyworthy road. By turning right and right again towards Leworthy, we completed a loop of approx. four miles. It made a really nice circular walk on a frosty morning especially as this was new territory for me.

I will include an update on the Inter Parish walks in the next newsletter. In between whiles, I hope the weather will be kind which will encourage everyone to make the most of our beautiful countryside.

The Police have asked that we pass on the following guidance in respect of rural road safety, which is even more relevant at this time of year when roads are wet and possibly icy. Livestock can be a particular problem if they escape from fields and enclosures as they are unpredictable and are easily spooked.

- If you see livestock or other vulnerable road users please reduce your speed, be patient and pass slowly and wide, only when it is safe to do so.
- Drive responsibly, try to anticipate hazards and take notice of road signs.
- Ensure your vehicle is in a roadworthy condition.
- Where possible, livestock farmers should consider feeding stock away from roads and make regular checks to fencing and that gates are secure.

Please also remember that there is a legal requirement to report road traffic collisions which involve livestock, to the police. Also, farmers and the public who capture incidents on dashcams can upload certain traffic offences to "Op snap" at

https://operationssnap.devonandcornwall.police.uk/.

You can also report offences being committed via 999 or pass on information via 101 or their email 101@dc.police.uk.

Covid-19 Scams: There are a number of scams related to Covid-19 and booking your vaccinations, which are currently circulating. The NHS is not charging for this service so there is no reason to be divulging bank, credit card details or making payments to secure you 'jab' appointments. Any such requests are scams and should be referred to ActionFraud or suspicious emails can be forwarded to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Please keep your dog on a lead & under control.

Spring is on the way and it's that time of year again to remind people that there will soon be pregnant ewes and ewes with lambs out on the fields.

Please, if you are walking your dog, keep it under control and preferably on its lead. Even the quietest of dogs can suddenly turn into a stock worrier, and if it does the farmer is allowed to shoot and ask questions afterwards. You could also be landed with a hefty bill for any damage done; just being chased and terrified could cause a ewe to abort her lamb.

Remember, a field of cattle with their calves is not a walk in the park; cows are curious creatures, they could chase a dog if it's in the field, they would see it as a threat to their calf, if this happens let your dog's lead go, problem there is that your dog will look to you for protection so actually the best advice is don't enter the field with your dog and if your dog does get into a field with cows and calves remember it can probably out run them where as it is very unlikely that you can.

Parish Footpaths

The broken stile on FP12 has recently been replaced by a self-closing metal gate by DCC contractors. The replacement of damaged stiles by gates is part of DCC's current policy to enable greater access for all sections of the community. This path runs from the Gidcott to Shebbear Road across to the Henscott to Gidcott Chapel road, in a remote part of the Parish and its original purpose was probably as a short-cut for farm workers and to reach Gidcott Mill.



All of our footpaths are currently useable, although some areas are extremely muddy due to the heavy rainfall which continues to beset us.

Open Access Land



The Countryside & Rights of Way Act 2000 (the CRoW act) gives walkers the freedom to roam over Open Access Land without having to stick to Public Rights of Way. Such land will be signed with the symbol opposite and is marked on some O/S maps. Most of the Open Access Land in England is in areas at over 600 metres elevation and mainly comprises mountains, moors, heath, downland and coastal margin land. The farm land across the Parish **does not** fall into this category and is private land. The only way to legally access it is to use the designated footpaths or with specific permission from the landowners.

Holsworthy Walk and Talk

At the time of writing, we have not held any walks in 2021! Our New Year's Day walk was cancelled due to unsafe icy conditions and then came Lockdown No.3. Current Government Guidelines state that group activities of any sort are not permissible although we can meet one other person from outside our household/bubble for a socially distanced walk.

At the end of 2020, the Ramblers notified us that during 2021 they will be significantly changing the way in which 'Walking for Health' is administered and funded. 'Walking for Health' originally began in the 1980s when an Oxfordshire GP felt that many of his patients would benefit from a short weekly walk from his surgery. The health benefits were so pronounced that the concept was expanded into a UK wide initiative with the English walks funded initially by Natural England and subsequently by Ramblers in conjunction with Macmillan and more recently jointly with Sport England. From September 2021 Sport England will be withdrawing their support and Ramblers intend to continue with no external funding, instead asking each of their Groups to contribute an annual fee of £1,000.

As you can imagine this has exercised our thoughts rather a lot! We are, however, pleased to announce that the Committee and Walk Leaders have voted unanimously to continue as an independent group as from April 2021. Holsworthy Walk and Talk will continue uninterrupted and will work within the original ethos of being available to all.

Brilliant banana loaf



Preparation and cooking time

Prep: 15 mins Cook: 50 mins

Easy

Cuts into 8-10 slices

A cross between banana bread and a drizzle cake, this easy banana loaf recipe is a quick bake that can be frozen. It's great for using up overripe bananas, too.

Ingredients

140g butter, softened, plus extra for the tin

140g caster sugar

2 large eggs, beaten

140g self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

2 very ripe bananas, mashed

50g icing sugar

Handful of dried banana chips, for decoration

Method

STEP 1

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4.

STEP 2

Butter a 2lb loaf tin and line the base and sides with baking parchment.

STEP 3

Cream 140g softened butter and 140g caster sugar until light and fluffy, then slowly add 2 beaten large eggs with a little of the 140g flour.

STEP 4

Fold in the remaining flour, 1 tsp baking powder and 2 mashed bananas.

STEP 5

Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for about 50mins, or until cooked through. Check the loaf at 5-min intervals by testing it with a skewer (it should be able to be inserted and removed cleanly), as the time may vary depending on the shape of your loaf tin.

STEP 6

Cool in the tin for 10 mins, then remove to a wire rack.

STEP 7

Mix 50g icing sugar with 2-3 tsp water to make a runny icing.

STEP 8

Drizzle the icing across the top of the cake and decorate with a handful of banana chips.

Dalgona coffee



Preparation and cooking time

Prep: 8 mins Easy no cook

Our easy whipped coffee recipe is simple enough to make at home. This frothy drink, known as Dalgona coffee, might just be your new favourite caffeine kick.

Ingredients

3 tbsp instant coffee

2 tbsp <u>sugar</u>

400-500ml milk (we used whole milk)

Method

STEP 1

Whisk the coffee, sugar and 3 tbsp boiling water in a bowl for approximately 5 mins until the mixture is thick and fluffy with stiff peaks. This is easiest done using an electric whisk but can be done by hand.

STEP 2

For hot coffee, heat the milk and pour into two heatproof glasses. For cold coffee, pour the cold milk into two glasses. Divide the coffee mixture in half and spoon evenly on top of the glasses. Serve and stir thoroughly before drinking.



HEALTH AND WELFARE

Never have we been more concerned with health and welfare than we have in the last year or more as result of the pandemic. As a consequence, the Health and Welfare Lasting Power of Attorney has come into its own. Readers will know that I am a great fan of this Lasting Power of Attorney and of its sister LPA the Property and Financial Affairs LPA.

The Health and Welfare LPA is used by you the Donor to appoint an Attorney to make decisions about personal welfare. This can include health care and medical treatment decisions and might include decisions about:

- Where you should live and who you should live with
- Your day to day care, including diet and dress
- · Who you may have contact with
- Consenting to or revising medical examination and treatment on your behalf
- Arrangements needed for you to be given medical, dental or optical treatment
- Assessments for any provision of community care services
- Where you should take part in social activities, leisure activities, education or training
- Your personal correspondence and papers
- Rights of access to personal information about you
- Complaints about your care or treatment

One of my friends has been a welfare attorney for both her parents. This allowed her to ensure that they continued to live and die in their own home. My friend refused consent to her late father being given CPR, when he went into cardiac and respiratory failure. He had severe dementia and various cancers, and was obviously extremely frail. CPR was unlikely to have any chance of success. It would also involve significant

pain and injury to him, followed by an admission to hospital where he was likely to die. The paramedics came to his home. My friend as his Attorney refused consent to them to perform CPR so that he could die in the comfort of his own bed, and his own home surrounded by his family.

It is essential for the Donor to make a good choice of Attorney. It is also essential that the Attorney knows how to correctly go about the business of making decisions. I unhesitantly recommend this to readers together with the Financial Affairs LPA.
