

Meetings of the Parish Council are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Friday before the meeting. The draft minutes are posted to the website within 30 days, but are not officially approved until the next meeting. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time.

District Councillors

Councillor Kit Hepple and Ken James have been unable to attend recent meetings, both send regular updates received by email, both Councillors work in the background to support the Parish, they can be contacted anytime by all, for any help or advice that might be needed. Details of how to contact them are in the Parish Website

Devon County Councillor James Morrish

Councillor James Morrish has been unable to attend recent meetings due to ill health and the pressure of work, James has 'several hats' within Devon County Council, and works hard on behalf of all the residents he represents. He can be contacted by email for any help or advice you might need.

Holsworthy Neighbourhood Policing team.

A recent communication from PC Frank Rogers has informed the Parish Council that due to pressure of work he will be unable to prepare 'crime statistics reports 'as PCSO Mark James provided on a regular basis.

Frank is hoping to instigate a '45-minute drop in' via Microsoft Teams, and will be in touch with the Parish Councils once the details are to hand, as this present time no session has been arranged.

Our new PCSO is Jessica McEldon.

Agendas are regularly sent to the police team, but to date no officer has been able to attend.

Planning matters:

Planning applications have been very sparce over the past three months, just one application for and extension At Northtown Farm, which was subsequently approved, the application for an orangery at Milton House was withdrawn.

Applications to erect new telegraph poles have been received from Airband, as a Parish Council we have no say In this matter as it's a Government edict to establish better broadband in all rural areas.

Your Parish Councillors give great consideration to all applications received, their concerns and comments are reported in the minutes and passed on to Torridge planning department.

Although the application for the development at Town Farm has been approved for some time, there is still no signs of any development starting.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application, they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21-day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

The Step Back in Time Fund:

For young people has a balance of £103.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas.

Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Annual Grants

Consideration for grant applications were given at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 23rd November 2022, grants were approved for MD Gardening and district gardening club, MD Parish Church, MD Parish Hall, MD Newsletter and North Devon CAB. Cheques for the successful applicants will be issued in September. The Parish Council will always consider applications throughout the year if necessary.

<u>Website</u>

Community Defibrillator (AED):

The AED's sited at Holsworthy Beacon and Sanders Garage are checked regularly, but if at any time you see that there is any damage to the cabinet at either site, please inform the Clerk.

If you would like a refresher on the use of the AED and basic life support (CPR), please let the Parish Clerk know, these are conducted free of charge.

Condition of the Roads in and around Milton Damerel:

The Parish Council receive numerous complaints regarding the poor state of the roads, the Parish Clerk regularly passes on the complaints to Devon Highways, copies are always sent to Councillor Morrish, who will substantiate our complaints.

The more people that go onto Devon County Council's website and reports potholes and poor road surfaces the better, the Parish Council encourages residents to do so as often as they can.

Parish Footpaths

The Parish Footpaths are now looked after by George and Wendy Preston. They report directly to the Parish Clerk if there are any problems. Whilst out walking the paths if you see a problem can you please report it to ensure we get it put right without too much delay.

The Parish Hall

The Parish Hall is being utilized a lot more now. There are great things planned for the future, keep an eye out for future events as your attendance is vital in keeping the Parish Hall a communal hub.

King Charles III coronation will be held on the 6th May 2023, communities are encouraged to have a celebration Sunday lunch or street parties on the 7th, with Monday the 8th being a Bank Holiday.

At this present time no definite plans have been made, but there will be celebrations, so keep an eye out for details.

<u>Airband</u>

You might have noticed that there has been a lot of Airband vehicles recently in the area, the Government has specified that all Rural areas must have better broadband reception, it is hoped that this will materialise in the not too distant future.

Chapel News – March 2023

Dear Friends

The Christian Church is moving towards the high point of the year – Easter Sunday, when we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus.

It is such an important time that Christians spend weeks preparing for it – the season of Lent. There are many questions to be faced in Lent; not least about ourselves, both our mortality and our character. What are we like? What is our purpose? What is life all about? Those are clearly pretty big questions and there are multiply answers, rather than one single definite solution. Christians of course follow Jesus towards his destiny, the cross on Good Friday. The central question as we move from Ash Wednesday, through the forty days of Lent; to Palm Sunday and Holy week (the last, and most important and cataclysmic week of Jesus' life), on to Easter Day itself is "Who is this Jesus?" What is he about? What does his journey teach us about God? And what does his trek teach us of ourselves?

Christians wish to claim that Jesus is the Son of God, revealed so wonderfully by his death on Good Friday. Jesus was arrested, subject to torture and vilification. He was abused mentally and physically; maybe even spiritually. How would he have felt that his nearest and dearest followers deserted him? Indeed, did he feel that God had left him too?

But that is not the end of the story. Death could not hold Jesus. The suffering love that he showed on the cross is vindicated. Nothing, neither in heaven nor upon the earth can defeat the way of love. Jesus' self-giving love is supreme. So we ponder a man of God; a person for whom love is most important; a love and life that cannot be squashed nor destroyed, giving the world some hope in the darkness.

"Who is this Jesus?" "Who is this King?" for Christians preach about the Kingdom of God and the way of Christ; indeed seek to show the virtues of that Kingdom in the way in which they live.

The question, "what sort of King is this?" may well emerge at the beginning of May. Many of us are going to be able to experience the Coronation of a Monarch for the first time as Charles III is crowned king on May 6th. After so many years it still seems odd to be singing "God, save the king!".

What sort of monarch is Charles going to be? Indeed, what sort of country do we want to live in? And how many of the values of the Kingdom of God do we want to see enacted in our own times? Compassion, care, understanding, honesty, truth, tolerance, kindness, generosity, but above all love.

Work with your damp ground.

To some people, a boggy or damp area in the garden is a problem, but it does not have to be. Such an area opens up unique planting opportunities, provided you can keep it damp over the summer.

Plants that enjoy boggy conditions range in size from the enormous, *Gunnera manicata to the more dainty and colourful members of the Primula family. Then there is another group of plants that, although do not naturally grow in wet conditions, tolerate damp feet. April and early May is the peak season for many of these plants to flower and the Stream Garden at Rosemoor always looks fabulous at this time.*



Ferns are perfect as an architectural backdrop for the more decorative plants. One of our favourites is *Matteuccia struthiopteris* AGM or the shuttlecock fern; allowed to form colonies along the stream, it thrives under the shade of deciduous such as *Betula* or *Acer*.

Camassia is a native to moist meadows in North America so is well suited to the damper areas of your garden. The erect stems of *Camassia leichtlinii* subsp. *suksdorfii* Caerulea Group support beautiful star-shaped flowers combining perfectly with the bright green of the fresh fern fronds. Add splashes of bright red, purple and orange in the form of drumstick and candelabra primulas then you have a winning combination.

Most people don't have room for *Gunnera* but, if you are looking for big leaves, *Rodgersia* will fit the bill. Those with bronze tinted leaves such as *Rodgersia pinnata* 'Superba' AGM complement blue irises and *Camassia* perfectly.

Our own British natives should not be overlooked when planting up a damp area. Caltha palustris (marsh marigold) and Cardamine pratensis (cuckoo flower) are two springing to mind that are sure to thrive.

So don't look at that wet border with suspicion, turn it into a boggy oasis of bold plants and colourful flowers.

A Timely Reminder. 2

It's that time of year again, Spring and the time of year when the fields around will have ewes with young lambs at foot and cows will soon be out with their calves.

Most of the residents of Milton Damerel don't need a reminder but if you are new to the area and new to country living you might not realise what damage your dog could do to farm livestock. Even the smallest of dogs can be a risk to ewes and lambs, maybe they only run around barking and "playing" but if the ewes are still in lamb the stress is likely to cause them to abort their lambs they are carrying or they could panic and collapse and die, your pet can be a killer.

Cows with calves are also a risk, the mother's are very protective, do not come between a cow and a calf, if you come to a field, stop, look and listen, if there are cattle in the field and there is no other route, keeping your dog on a short lead & under control, try to walk around the group, giving them a wide berth, if they start moving towards you and look threatening, the advice is to let go of your dog, it can run faster than you, with a bit of luck they will go after it rather than you, make a quiet and quick exit from the field then call your dog to you and put back on its lead, also be aware that cattle can jump gates, quite often you'll see a field gate with the top bars bent and buckled, very often that was caused by a cow or bull practising for the local "cross country event" Dr. advice is to make a quick departure from the area so as not to agitate them any longer.

Also, did you know that not picking up after your dog can be a death sentence to cows, dogs faeces can pass on Neospora, a single celled parasite of livestock and companion animals, it causes abortion in cattle and once infected they are infected for life, if a cow aborts its calf due to Neosporosis she will be culled as there is no cure. Please pick up after your dog and keep it and your cat wormed regularly.

Snowdrops and daffodils are now coming into bloom. These are sure signs that Spring is just around the corner. Let us hope that the beauty we see in nature will aid us through these worrying economic times. Here are a few of my observations of events in the legal and property world in recent days.

LIVE BIRTHS

The Office for National Statics has produced figures relating to birth characteristics in England and Wales for 2021. The most popular date of birth in 2021 was 23 September with 2,055 live births occurring. The second most popular date was 07 October with 2,011 live births. The least popular dates of birth between 2001 and 2021 was Boxing Day with 1,345 live births followed by Christmas Day with 1,416. 2021 was the first year that births registered outside of a marriage or civil partnership outnumbered births registered within a marriage or civil partnership. There were 624,828 live births in 2021, of which 320,713 were registered to women outside of a marriage or civil partnership. That equates to 51.3% of live births. In 2021, the average age of mothers who gave birth in England and Wales increased to 30.9 years, while the average age of fathers remained at 33.7 years.

LAUGHING GAS

The Psychoactive Substances Act bans the knowing or reckless supply of nitrous oxide (otherwise known as laughing gas) for inhalation. However, the British Com-

pressed Gases Association is calling for a ban on all direct consumer sales and asks MPs to tighten the law to cover those without an exemption found in possession of the gas. Consequently, Ministers are preparing to revise drug use misuse laws to allow people who are found with laughing gas to be prosecuted. Under the proposals, only those with a "legitimate reason" would be exempt. This would include chefs who use it in products including whipped cream or for freezing and chilling food.

ROGUE LANDLORDS

Birmingham City Council have recently brought a legal case which saw two defendants ordered to pay more than £83,000 in fines and costs. They had been found to be illegally renting out a tiny "unpleasant" and "dark" basement flat. A spokesman who spoke for the Council said that the Property "Was insufficient in size, had insufficient windows and low ceiling heights". He went on to say that the defendants had ignored a Standing Order instructing them to stop renting the flat out. He said "This is an important victory for the City and demonstrates how the City is dealing with rogue landlords."

FIRMS ON THE BRINK

There are growing fears that this year will see a wave of company collapses as the cost-of-living crisis continues. The number of firms on the brink of going bust jumped by 36% in the last 3 months of 2022 according to an insolvency firm. The numbers are expected to rise due to higher costs and consumers cutting back their spending. Up until now low interest rates and loans have helped firms – but all of that of course is coming to an end. A backlog in the insolvency courts due to Covid has delayed some company collapses – so it looks like the situation can only get worse.

KNOTWEED

A man recently bought a property in London for £700,000. He found on moving in that it was riddled with Japanese Knotweed. He therefore sued the Seller on the basis that the Seller had misrepresented the state of the property before purchase. It emerged in the court proceedings that the Seller had answered "No" to the question on a required Property Information Form that asked whether it had been affected by Knotweed. The new Buyer sued for £32,000 to cover the costs of investigating and excavating the plants, as well as diminution in the value of his home caused by the Knotweed. A Knotweed expert used for the case suggested that the canes were has high as 2 metres and at one stage might have been "overhanging the neighbouring garden."

CASH IS KING

The estate agents Jackson-Stops has revealed that buying a property in cash saves as much as 8% compared with using a mortgage. Cash buyers pay on average £260,401 based on last September's figures whereas buyers with mortgages paid £283,159. Cash buyers are therefore saving the most money in the South East namely £32,832. The average cash buyers spent £381,324 in the region compared with £414,156 among those with mortgages. Cash buyers are getting discounts, and mortgage rates are extremely volatile. As cash buyers are in the most advantageous position, sellers are more likely to give a reasonable discount for a quick sale, and for the certainty which cash provides. Many of the cash buyers are baby boomers having paid off their mortgage and then deciding to downsize and live retirement with fewer bills to pay.

WILLS AND LPAs

Now is the time to take stock and see whether you need to put your house in order. Principally you need a Will in place, particularly if you are in relationship outside of marriage or where you are in a second marriage and wish to benefit children of an earlier marriage. Lasting Powers of Attorney are also a vital tool as we get older. They enable you to nominate attorneys who can act for you in all relevant circumstances. Holsworthy Beacon Chapel Closes

Holsworthy Beacon Chapel has had a presence in the village since 1882 when it was built at a cost of £285 (including a grant of £15!). It was built to seat about 100 people. It replaced the original Chapel, which was built in 1838, when it became apparent that a larger building was required to accommodate the growing congregation. The building of the present Chapel was a very ambitious project, but was obviously embraced with great enthusiasm, faith, vision and excitement, the dedicated members helped in any way that they could to help to defray expenses. Most of the labouring work was done on a voluntary basis, including the fetching of stone, and travelling to Delabole with horses and wagon to collect slates for the roof. Apparently my great-grandfather



set off for Delabole through the night, fell asleep en route and the horse turned around and went home! The opening celebrations included providing a luncheon for 160 people and tea for 300, which was held at Brendon. There were only a few inhabitants in the village at that time, but many families would walk to Chapel from outlying farms and houses, often quite a distance, such was their commitment. At this time it was the very centre of the community and such an important meeting place. In these formative years the Chapel would often be nearly full on a Sunday evening. In 1920 the garage was built. It was in fact a stable and carriage house and was built to accommodate six horses and four carriages at a cost of £100. By 1930 there was just one preacher, Mr. John Vanstone, who used to travel 'John Wesley' style on horseback, and Mr. William Wicket with pony and jingle. Latterly, the carriage house was used to garage cars rather than stable horses. Eventually as cars became more popular, they were parked outside. Since 1966 it made an ideal room for Sunday School, meetings, suppers and funeral teas. The cemetery was added in 1950. Mr Edwin Routley generously gave the land, about a quarter of an acre, situated between the Chapel and garage. On the 10th May 1955, the new cemetery was officially opened and dedicated. Miss Clara Hole was the first person to be buried there. Holsworthy Beacon Chapel has been the spiritual home to so many over the decades. Where people have worshipped, praised, prayed and had fellowship together. Where children have been brought to Sunday School to hear about Jesus. Where there has been laughter and fun, where people have been married and buried, baptised and confirmed, have shared deep sadness and tremendous elation, where the holy sacrament has been administered, where people have been taught and challenged. Where Jesus has always had central place. It has a rich history and holds a myriad of special memories. It has played such a major part throughout the whole of my life and that of my husband Keith, our parents and my ancestors.

It is with enormous sadness that the existing members have made the decision to close the Chapel. However, an ageing congregation coupled with low numbers at our services, in addition to the responsibility of complying with all the rules and regulations, of maintaining the building, together with filling the offices and performing the duties essential in keeping the Chapel running, has become difficult.

Our final service was taken by Rev. Simon Leigh on the 4th September 2022. We think of the phenomenal changes, which have evolved through the 140 years since the inception of the Chapel, and how life has changed so radically in this period and then we reflect on the fundamental Christian faith and discipleship and we realise that our objectives and those of our ancestors are no different. Jesus is the one steadfast and unchanging anchor who can hold our lives together. He is always good, always loving, always all powerful. No matter how this world changes around us, he is always consistent "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever". *We'll praise Him for all that is past and trust Him for all that's to come*.

Rural North Devon continues to be one of the lowest crime areas in the country, which is why we seldom see police officers around the Parish. Whilst we can all be grateful that physical crimes are few and far between, we are all subject to the continual onslaught of scams which seem to permeate every aspect of our daily lives whether by phone or online. Whenever the police manage to shut down one scam another two seem to pop up. We hope that you won't be caught out as these become ever more sophisticated.

Investigative journalist Alexis Conran recently produced a short series of programmes for Channel 5 TV, covering phone scams and internet shopping, how easy it is to get caught unawares, and which also includes some very simple ways that we can protect ourselves. These were excellent programmes and if you missed them they can be found at 'My5' TV catch-up or by following this link:

Telephone number 159. If you get a call purporting to be from your bank and you are not sure whether it is genuine or not, then hang up and dial **159.** This is a relatively new service, started in 2021, which has been set up as a joint venture by Stop Scams UK and Global Cyber Alliance to try to combat fraud. Around 80% of

banks have joined the scheme and you can be sure that you will be transferred through to your bank. The main message to remember is that genuine calls from banks, credit card companies and even the police, will not contact you 'out of the blue' to ask you for personal information such as passwords and pin numbers.

Government Emergency Alerts – The Government is currently putting together a new system which will allow it to send out an "Emergency Alert" to all mobile phone users within a specific area. They are hoping to be able to launch it later this year. This system will be used to warn of an emergency in an area such as flooding, or severe risk of flooding. Only the Government and the emergency services will be able to send these messages which will be fed into the mobile phone networks at source. This means that they will go out to everybody with a smart phone or tablet, without any need for registration. It will also give you instructions if they would like you to take some sort of action. More information about this service can be found at **www.gov.uk/alerts** and you will be able to opt out of receiving messages by going onto the website **after** it has been launched.

Evelyn's Walk (9/1/2023)

I've just returned home after a bracing walk on Monday 9th January. The weather last night was very wet & windy!! Thankfully, it stopped raining & the wind had eased by the time we set off from Clawton Village Hall at 10am. Looking back at my records, we used to walk in Clawton annually in September. We have enjoyed sunshine & we have endured the heaviest rain. We have had to negotiate some seriously challenging stiles & now we have self-closing gates. We have had to negotiate "Amazon rainforest" (fields of Maize) & now we have lush grassy fields. It was lovely to repeat a route that we last walked as a group in September 2018 & share all sorts of memories of previous walks in Clawton.

From the Hall, we turned left down the hill & then joined the footpath on the right. It was a bit soggy underfoot but not too bad. It was well way-marked & brought us out at Higher Sellick. We continued to follow the footpath which took us across the fields to Hole Park. We joined the road that runs between North



Tamerton & Chasty. By turning right & right again, we followed the lane back towards our cars at the Hall. It was a bit muddy in places but hey it's January in Devon & perfectly passible with suitable footwear. I was pleased that the route was generally well marked, passable with minor trimming of brambles & the two wooden footbridges were in good order. Generally, we all agreed that we had enjoyed the walk & looked forward to more walks together in the months ahead.

Evelyn's Walk (13/2/23)

Several people questioned why we would want to walk in Bridgerule given that footpaths are noticeable by their absence. However, in my mind it is one of our local "best kept secrets" & I was keen to share it. On Monday 13th February, we met in the Village Hall car park. It was interesting having arrived early to guess who was going to join me on a walk; who was there to visit the Post Office; & who was attending a Zumba class. There were a couple of chaps with clipboards & I never quite fathomed out what their purpose was.

We were very fortunate to have the company of Alan Beat who lives in The Bridge Mill. He & his wife, Rosie, very kindly invited us to explore their smallholding which extends to sixteen acres. Alan led the way & pandered to my request when I asked if we could see the Mowhay. He's in the process of restoring it which is such an important project given that very few Moyhays are still in existence. Fundamentally, it's a traditional pole barn that would have been used to store hay for livestock. As the fodder was gradually used over the winter months, there was a clever winch mechanism enabling the roof to be lowered so that the fodder was less likely to be damaged by the elements. Alan then led us across their land that runs parallel



with the road towards the bridge. It gave us the opportunity to see the way that the river is gradually eroding the river banks. He showed us evidence of Ash dieback which has sadly resulted in the felling of several trees. Alan then led us to the rear of the Mill & we had to be careful where we trod so that we didn't squash the early flowering Crocuses. We were fascinated by the fact that Alan has renovated the ancient Mill during the thirty five years that he & Rosie have lived there. The water wheel is fed by the leat & can be seen in action when The Bridge Mill is open to the public. I see from their web site that it will be open on Sundays 14th & 28th May. Well worth putting the dates in your diary. We then strolled towards the beautiful ponds that Alan & Rosie have created. Given the passage of time, nature has performed its magic & you have no perception of the tonnes of spoil that emanated from the massive holes that were dug to create the ponds. It's an absolute haven for wildlife. We stood at the top of the hill in the sunshine & enjoyed magnificent panoramic views. It wasn't as tranquil as it had been last spring given that a housing development is being built in the village at the moment. Hopefully, tranquility will be restored once it is completed.

We were all reluctant to leave but on the other hand nobody wanted to miss the walk up the hill towards St. Bridget's Church. It's such a beautiful structure & I believe it dates back to Norman times. We looked across the way to the former Rectory, now known as Glebe House Cottages. Apparently, the incumbent would have walked along the BOAT (By-way Open to All Traffic), known locally as "Roly Poly", to the Church. It would certainly have been the most direct route. According to history, Father Kingdon was still serving the Parish as Vicar until the age of ninety eight. Something tells me that fresh air & exercise must have been good for him! I'm pleased to report that nobody went for a tumble but it's quite challenging & the name "Roly Poly" is very apt. It was a very pleasant stroll down hill past the School & football ground back towards our cars. We were shown a little path that I didn't know existed. It enabled us to see a route favoured by Hedgehogs. If it hadn't been pointed out to me, I'd have missed it. I think everyone felt that we had been most fortunate with the weather & our walk provided a most enjoyable start to the week.

Our next walk will be on Monday 13th March. We will set off from Clawton Village Hall at 10am with a view to walking in the Parishes of Pyworthy & Clawton. Everyone is most welcome. Please let me know if you would like any information.

Jim had grilled pork loin with rosti potatoes and veg and this was also an excellent meal. As ever we passed on the desserts but there is a traditional selection and what we saw being served looked good.

We were lucky enough to get a table at the window, in the summer the place gets extremely busy so if there are a few of you it is advisable to book beforehand even in the quieter months. There is also a large outside dining area for the warmer weather! The menu is extensive, starters are from around £7 and most main courses around £15. There is also a children's menu @ £8. If you pass on deserts in the summer, you can walk further into Westward Ho! to the Hockings Ice cream van on the seafront.
