### **New cutting beds at Rosemoor**

We are delighted to announce an exciting new venture at RHS Rosemoor – our very own cut flower beds! In a bid to enhance sustainability and celebrate the homegrown beauty of our gardens, we are embarking on a journey to grow our own cut flowers onsite.

Traditionally, The Garden Restaurant has sourced cut flowers from external suppliers. However, this year we are planning to change things. Our primary goal is to provide the restaurant with freshly cut, garden-grown blooms throughout the summer season. How? By cultivating a variety of flowers from seed here in our market garden area.

Why dedicated cut flower beds, you may ask? Well, for starters, having these beds in one central location makes it easier for our garden team to care for them. It streamlines the process, ensuring efficiency in both cultivation and harvesting.

And, while our main gardens boast an abundance of beautiful flowers, not all are suitable for cutting. By establishing dedicated beds, we are able to focus on varieties specifically chosen for their suitability as cut flowers. But it's not just about aesthetics. We're proud to follow organic principles in nurturing our flowers and, by eliminating the need for external sourcing, we are reducing our carbon footprint – locally grown, freshly picked with no travel. Our cut flower initiative also benefits biodiversity, attracting pollinators and enriching the environment in our gardens.

So, when you next visit, make sure you wander over to our market garden and cut flower beds. Come and see the beds in bloom, and perhaps you'll spot our flowers gracing your table in the restaurant.

The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Friday before the meeting. The draft minutes are posted to the website within 30 days, but are not officially approved until the next meeting. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time.

#### **District Councillors**

Councillor Kit Hepple has been unable to attend meetings but is always available if he is needed.

Councillor Ken James attends meetings on a regular basis and is a great help to the Parish Council, his continued support and advice is very much appreciated.

### **Hardship Fund**

Councillor Ken James has informed the Parish Council that funds are again available to anyone who is in need of financial help, the grants can cover various things such has problems paying Utility bills, council tax, replacement of household items, purchasing of food. ### **Devon County Councillor James Morrish**

Councillor James Morrish has been unable to attend recent meetings due to work commitments, James is a great help to the Parish Council, his support and advice is very much appreciated. James is available by email to all residents if they have any concerns, he is always willing to help.

### Holsworthy Neighborhood Policing team.

At the time of writing I am unable to confirm who our PCSO is but Sgt Donna Gutteridge sends regular updates and is available at the Holsworthy station. As soon as we find out the PCSO's name it will be published on the website,

#### **Bus Shelters**

It was reported at the Parish Open meeting that the bus shelter at Venn Green was very untidy with rubbish strewn inside, if at any time you use the shelter please report to a Councillor or the Clerk if it is need of a tidy up or clean, also encourage users to take their rubbish with them. Councillor Moyse recently tidied it up and also cleaned the glass panels of the other shelter, volunteers for this job are always welcome.

### **Planning matters:**

There has been very few Planning application received over the past three months, the Demolition of a Barn for the erection of one dwelling, which has been approved, part retrospective siting of three temporary static caravans for agricultural workers, this was refused permission, new kitchen extension, granted permission.

### **Town Farm**

It is apparent to all that some tidying up has been done on the site, with the fences being repaired and the entrance being cleared. No information regarding if or when the development would be started is forthcoming...

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. These are then discussed at the meeting and comments passed on to Torridge. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application, they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21-day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

### **Annual Precept**

Your might notice on your Council Tax information that the Parish Council's precept request has risen significantly from the previous year. The reasons being that we will be receiving a large invoice from Torridge District Council for the Parish Council Election . In addition the Parish Council requires an extra top up this year as the funds are lower than previous end of year accounts. This is due to the Parish Councillors approving extra grants for the Kings Coronation celebrations . Also the cost of cutting back hedges and verges to ensure the safety of all parishioners and visitors to the area.

### **End of year accounts**

These are in the process of being completed, with the internal independent Audit being completed in June.

All information regarding the accounts will be published on the website as soon as they are completed and approved by the Parish Councillors. This should be by the end of August.

### The Step Back in Time Fund:

For young people has a balance of £103.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas. Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

### **Community Defibrillator (AED):**

The AED's sited at Holsworthy Beacon and Sanders Garage are checked regularly, but if at any time you see that there is any damage to the cabinet at either site, please inform the Clerk.

If you would like a refresher on the use of the AED and basic life support (CPR), please let the Parish Clerk know, these updates are conducted free of charge.

### **Condition of the Roads in and around Milton Damerel:**

The Parish Council receive numerous complaints regarding the poor state of the roads, the Parish Clerk regularly passes on the complaints to Devon Highways, please notify me of any problems, copies are always sent to Councillor Morrish, who will substantiate our complaints.

The more people that go onto Devon County Council's website and reports potholes and poor road surfaces the better, the Parish Council , District and County Councillors encourages residents to do so as often as they can.

#### Parish Footpaths

The Parish Footpaths are now looked after by George and Wendy Preston, and they are doing a grand job, their report is printed elsewhere in the newsletter. They report directly to the Parish Clerk if there are any problems. Whilst out walking the paths if you see a problem can you please report it to ensure we get it put right without too much delay.

### **Parish Annual Open Meeting**

This was held on the 24<sup>th</sup> April, unfortunately it clashed with the Parochial Church AGM, the attendance of residents was very poor, which is disappointing as it is an opportunity to chat with your Parish and District Councillors, to ask questions, get information you might want and to answer any queries you might have.

Representatives from local organsiations attended, details of reports are in the minutes and published on the website.

### Parish Annual Meeting (AGM)

This was held on the 15<sup>th</sup> May, once again no residents attended, Councillor Stephen Moyse was elected as the Chair of the Parish Council with Councillor Richard Piper elected vice-chair, both decisions were unanimous.

### **Annual Grants**

The Grants for the financial year 2024-2025 will be considered at a later date. This is due to the uncertain financial position of the Parish Council due to the election costs.

As mentioned in Spring issue some decisions need to be made concerning the future of the hall. We plan to have an "Open Meeting" on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> June. This will be an opportunity to discuss the options for the future of the hall. There will be FREE tea, coffee & cake!

Come and discuss options with us. As a committee we need to know what it is that Parish residents want from the hall or if you want a hall at all. So get you thinking caps on! A full refurbishment, or a new build or even closing it and demolishing it all require funding of some sort. In order to apply for funding we need "hard evidence" of support from the community. IE letters, emails, suggestions of new activities etc. Even if you are not currently a regular user of the hall, it would be beneficial to all if you could call in and give your comments or forward them via email.

If we are unable to demonstrate sufficient support from the wider community then the hall will close as the maintenance costs in the future will be unsustainable. If that happens it will be increasingly difficult in a small community to restart it. Many members of the village have lots of memories of family celebrations in the hall. ### From The Archives

These letters are from a page from Farmer & Stockbreeder July 1946 following an appeal to the government for farm workers.. I presume the labour shortage referred to was the aftermath of the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War. My Mother was a new farmers wife and from a nursing background. I should imagine she was wondering what she was letting herself in for!

As I live on an isolated hill farm with husband and two boys where there is no help of any kind, I appreciate the lot of many farmers wives. It seems to me the only way of bringing about improvement is by setting up some kind of organization which would have the support of farmers wives throughout the country. I think collective action is needed to bring the benefits to working farmers wives that the various unions have obtained for their members.

It seems in these days no notice is taken of individual complaints and we must become organized to be heard. I wish you the best of luck in any effort you may be able to make to do something for the women on the farms. A.Nisbet. Argyllshire

Another letter.... I have four children and give one man his midday meal. The house has 12 rooms but no bathroom, gas or electricity, my kitchen range is dated 1882. I tend the garden and do all the housework and have not had a day off in 11 years. Am I deserving of more help. J.Revill

A third letter comes from a homeless couple who where the wife would gladly help in the house in return for somewhere to live. While her husband has a job in a nearby town.

Might this be a solution to some of the current rural housing problems?









### Evelyn's Walk (11/03/24)

On Monday 11th March, eight of us met in the car park next to Bridgerule Village Hall. We had a discussion about what would be the most appropriate footwear given that there are no footpaths in Bridgerule & whether to wear a coat. Unbelievably, it wasn't raining & it was very mild. Before setting off, we discussed how busy it was in the Village Hall. There was obviously a class taking place & the Post Office was open. We noticed the new building which wasn't evident twelve months ago & is intended to be a Community Shop. It looks as though building work is nearly finished but apparently more fund raising is required in order to complete the project. As we set off towards the bridge over the River Tamar, there was mention of the shops that used to exist in the village. We were fortunate to be in the presence of people who remembered the original Post Office, Sweet & Antiques shops & they pointed out where they used to be. We were amazed how well the river was dealing with the



volume of rain that we have experienced in recent months. However, there was evidence that it had flooded recently. We walked up the hill passing the School & Glebe House Cottages. Somebody remarked that the incumbent of St. Bridget's Church would have lived there when it was the Rectory. The chances are that Father Kingdon would have walked along the BOAT (By-way Open to All Traffic) in order to get to the Church. An alternative view was that he would have travelled with a pony & trap. In this case, he probably would have stayed on the lanes. It might have been further but less steep than the "Roly Poly". We admired the Church tower in the distance & enjoyed watching the young lambs playing in the sunshine as we negotiated the only PROW in Bridgerule. We were pleased that we had anticipated mud at the lowest point. We made a slight detour to visit the Church. The door was locked but we admired what we believe to be a stone stoup in the porch. We also discovered Father Kingdon's resting place & marvelled at the thought that he was still serving the Parish at the age of ninety eight! We then walked down the hill towards the village but took a detour through The Bridge Mill with very kind permission of Alan & Rosie Beat. We soaked up the sunshine as well as the peace & tranquility listening to Wrens & seeing Buzzards overhead. We saw a deer, a Snipe & I'm sure that we saw Willow Tits feeding in the courtyard. I have had a look at the web site & The Bridge Mill is open to the public on Sundays 26th May & 2nd June. It's well worth a visit especially when the water mill is operating. Proceeds go to charity. It was difficult to drag everyone away but we ventured back towards the car park by way of the Hedgehog Crossing which made everyone smile. What a lovely way to start the week.

### Evelyn's Walk (13/05/2024)

After several consecutive days without rain, it couldn't stay dry any longer. We met in the Village Hall car park in Chilsworthy on Monday 13th May wearing waterproofs. It was only drizzle but quite wetting. In spite of that, we set off in fine spirits towards The Green which had obviously been cut recently. Quite an achievement given how wet it's been this spring. We followed the BOAT (By-way Open to All Traffic) which reduced the distance that we needed to walk on the road heading towards the Chapel & Quarry Park. We followed the footpath on the left which took us along the edge of grassy fields. We all commented on the self-closing gate that has replaced the stile. It made the route so much easier especially as stiles can be a bit slippery when they get wet. The route was well marked & took us over the stream via a footbridge & through another self-closing gate. We then followed the footpath across more grassy fields towards the



road. This can be quite a busy road running between Chilsworthy & Bradworthy but in reality we only saw a couple of cars before we turned left in approx. 100m along the lane towards Burnards House. The hedge must have been shorter than when we walked this route in August last year as the Tumulus was immediately obvious in the adjacent field. If you look on an OS map, it is marked as Ugworthy Barrow. We walked along the lane which was looking very pretty with Bluebells & frothy Cow Parsley. We passed the entrance to Thorne Manor on our right & then joined the footpath on the left. It's actually the drive for Parnacott House which has an interesting history. There is lots of information on their web site. The footpath continues through the courtyard & along a track towards Parnacott Farm. This is notoriously wet given its close proximity to the route of the Bude Canal in times gone by. We took a wet but drier route along the footpath on the left. This took us across the fields towards School Lane in Chilsworthy. It was a joy to see the most beautiful Copper Beech tree & watch the lambs playing together before we returned to our cars. The route made a very nice circular route of approx. 3.75 miles. We didn't walk particularly fast & were back within two hours.

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
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



**Keyholder Registration Service:** We would like to remind everyone who uses this service of the need to confirm or update their details, every two years from the date of first registration. If you fail to do this then the database deletes your details automatically to comply with GDPR regulations.

If you are not aware of this scheme, it is a free service which the D & C Police have been running for overs ten years. It is a secure database of secondary keyholders for your property, whether business premises or private, so that the police know who to contact if there is an incident involving your premises and you are not available e.g. away on holiday etc. The advantages of this scheme which is completely free are:

- The ability to bring problems at your property quickly to the attention of a keyholder to ensure that your property receives attention in the shortest possible time.
- To allow the authorities to quickly notify you of any impending danger such as flooding, pollution etc to ensure your safety.
- Your information will be kept secure and will only be available to the emergency services to ensure the security of your personal details.
- Your information can be easily updated to make life simpler. You may wish to advise us if leaving your property

unoccupied for any length of time (holidays?).

You can indicate your preferences for emergency repairers – who we could call if we were unable to contact you. For further information and to register go to the Devon & Cornwall Police website and look under "keyholder".

**Livestock Worrying:** We are told that livestock worrying is 30% up on last year and that Devon and Cornwall holds the dubious accolade of being the area of highest incidence. Please remember that the green fields around us are not a public playground and that your pets should only be allowed to roam freely there with the express consent of the landowners. Even on public footpaths, pets should be on a leash because there may well be livestock in the field and your pet could run off the "play" if it spots other animals.

Livestock worrying is a criminal offence. It is also an offence if a dog is not on a lead or under close control in a field or enclosure of sheep. Dog owners are reminded that farmers have the right to take appropriate action to protect their livestock from attacks, and the owner of dogs witnessed chasing or attacking livestock could receive six months' imprisonment and/or a fine of up to£1,000.

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
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
