Meetings of the Parish Council are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Thursday before the meeting. The draft minutes are posted to the website within 30days, but are not officially approved until the next meeting. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time.

<u>COVID 19</u>

Most restrictions have now been lifted but the Government still urges people to be cautious as the disease has not gone away, Torridge has one of the highest rates in England. The wearing of face masks is not compulsory but some shops are still insisting that shoppers wear one when inside their supermarkets. It is also a personal choice whether to wear one or not.

District Councillors

Our District Councillor Ken James attended our August Meeting, his report has been printed within the Minutes of the Parish Council meeting. Councillor Kit Hepple has not been able to attend due to pressures of work. Although not always available to attend meetings Regular updates are also received by email, both Councillors work in the background to support the Parish, they can be contacted anytime by all, for any help or advice that might be needed.

Devon County Councillor James Morrish

Councillor James Morrish attended our October meeting, details of his report are in the minutes of the meeting, these are available on-line. James has 'several hats' within Devon County Council, and works extremely hard on behalf of all the residents he represents.

<u>PFCSO Mark James</u> has been unable to attend any meetings this year due to his workload, but sends regular updates by email to the Parish Council, these reports are posted to the website.

Planning matters:

There have been a few planning applications over the past three months, one for the conversion of a storage barn, one for outline planning permission at Holsworthy Beacon for three dwellings, and outline Planning for One dwelling at 'Garden of Eagles', your Parish Councillors give great consideration to all applications received, their concerns and comments are reported in the minutes and passed on to Torridge planning department.

Although the application for the development at Town Farm has been approved for some time, there are little signs of any development starting.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application, they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21-day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

Parish Newsletter

The newsletter is in danger of not being published in the future. This is due to resignations, urgent help is required for compilation and general administration. Meetings are held four times a year. Community Defibrillator (AED):

The AED is checked regularly, but if at any time you see that there is any damage to the cabinet at either site, please inform the Clerk. If you would like a refresher on the use of the AED and basic life support, please let the Parish Clerk know, these are conducted free of charge.

Condition of the Roads in and around Milton Damerel:

The Parish Council receive numerous complaints regarding the poor state of the roads, the Parish Clerk always passes on the complaints to Devon Highways, copies are always sent to Councillor Morrish, who will substantiate our complaints.

The more people that go onto Devon County Council's website and reports potholes and poor road surfaces the better, the Parish Council encourages residents to do so as often as they can.

The Parish Footpaths have been looked after by Michael Jackson for ten years, he will be retiring in the New Year and is looking for one or two persons to take over:

Dear Friends

Christmas 2021 will be different from Christmas 2020, which for many was a very difficult time, separated from loved ones, and not been able to celebrate the festive season as they wished. The view seems to be that this Christmas is a time to "let our hair" down after months of the pandemic. I trust that the Christmas season will be a joyous one for you and your loved ones.

One of my favourite Christmas stories is Dr Seuss' "How the Grinch Stole Christmas". The Grinch was so fed up with the noisy and joyous celebration of the Whos down in Whoville that he

The Chapel & Covid-19 - It has been a great delight to re-open our premises from September this year, so the Toddler Group have been meeting regularly on Tuesday mornings, and, a service with All-age Worship, which includes Sunday School, has been occurring on 2nd Sunday of each month and will continue into the New Year.. The risk assessment remains in place and we will continue to follow and amend guidance as needed:

- a) providing adequate ventilation, thus, ensuring there is a supply of fresh air to indoor spaces where people are present,
- b) cleaning more often surfaces that are touched often, hand sanitisation or hand washing on arrival and departure,
- c) asking people who have Covid-19 symptoms or are unwell to stay away,

- e) encourage the wearing of face masks and social distancing

Rupert Kirkwood Retired Vet

For the last fifteen years I have been watching and photographing the wildlife of Southwest England from my kayak. I enjoy it so much I have clocked up over 27,000 miles in the process, including every inch of the coastline from Poole Harbour to Minehead.

In the upper estuaries I regularly see Kingfishers and have had the pleasure of watching families of otters playing on several occasions, always very early in the morning. I had a bit of a surprise when one of these otters actually turned out to be a beaver!

The open coast is the haunt of the fastest creature on the planet, the Peregrine Falcon. Last year a small bird flew inches past my ear in an effort to shake off its pursuer, and a second later a Peregrine scorched over the top of my head at incredible speed as it stooped, unsuccessfully, at its intended victim.

I see seals almost every trip along the coast. When in the water they are extremely inquisitive and will approach to within a few feet. However when they are resting on a rock they feel very vulnerable and I steer well clear of them because they need their rest. Disturbance from kayakers and paddleboarders is an increasing problem for the local seals. When conditions out at sea are flat calm, which isn't very often, I head offshore to see what I can find.

Offshore paddling is tremendously exciting because I just don't know what will appear above the surface next. The small fin of a Sunfish or the massive fin of a huge Basking Shark, a Giant Bluefin Tuna bursting out of the water, the small black fin of a porpoise or a load of splashing as a pod of dolphins swims past.

Best of all. I have had the thrill of seeing over twenty whales. Mostly Minke Whales, which are a modest thirty foot long, but also the amazingly charismatic Humpback Whale. I watched one engulfing schools of fish with a gigantic splash very close to my kayak near Penzance. An encounter I will never forget, and find hard to beat!

With this in mind we have moved the traditional Carol Service to Sunday afternoon.

It will follow in the usual traditions of Holy Trinity.

Notices will be put around the village and outside the church.

We look forward to our community coming together for this once a year joyous occasion.

Churches without a regular congregation are closing the doors – more so since Covid19 struck as they have no income and no congregation. Already a church in this area is earmarked for change. Holy Trinity is keeping its head above the parapet at the moment but without a congregation this situation could alter.

Since 1957 when it was founded as the Huddersfield South Methodist Radio Club, G3LQK by the Revd Arthur W Shepherd it became an international organisation in 1958 called WAMRAC - the World Association of Methodist Radio Clubs. It then changed its name in 1978 to reflect the growing ecumenical nature of its membership and became WACRAL.

This year the Holsworthy Amateur Radio Club secretary Mr Don Roomes asked if we would consider allowing his local group to broadcast from inside Holy Trinity Church, we were pleased to say 'yes' as it gave us an opportunity for 'something different' in church and a fundraising opportunity for the roof too.



The group set up their equipment early Saturday morning and were ready to broadcast by 10.00am. The weather that morning was pretty awful with rain and heavy mist which made broadcasting a bit more difficult for the club but soon we could hear the call sign (GB0MDC) as contact was made with

enthusiasts broadcasting from other areas of the UK. Don and his group, very proudly, made it clear to all that they were broadcasting from inside Holy Trinity Church, Milton Damerel, Devon. Contact was made with another Holy Trinity Church at Manchester and the furthest calls – though it was a difficult connection - was with Christ Salvador in Prague and Holy Spirit, Stare Mesto, both in CZECH REPUBLIC

There were connection to churches and chapels throughout the UK but the weather condition did have an effect on the clarity of the airwaves.

We had plenty of tea and coffee with cake and scones and the 'much-missed' raffle with really fantastic prizes (lots of interesting 'bottles') to keep everyone happy. Visitors and club members trickled through in the morning but by afternoon we had a goodly number of interested people milling about or just watching and listening to the club at work as they sat with their tea and enjoyed social connection once more.

Thank you for generous donations. We were able to add a further £158 to the roof fund.

We are very pleased that HARC asked to transmit from Holy Trinity, the club said it was the first time they had transmitted from a church and they enjoyed it so much they have booked to repeat the experience September 10th 2022.

Thank you to the Holsworthy Amateur Radio Club for your generosity to our parish church. We look forward to your return in 2022.

Harvest Festival is amongst the favourite church occasions and is in normal times well supported but attendance this year was greatly down - into single figures .After the service we enjoyed a cream tea together, there were plenty of scones to go round. Despite the small number we enjoyed a pleasant relaxed social afternoon.

It is not surprising that communal events are suffering but for many people it is a treat to get out of the house and do something traditional and in church we practise all we can to keep everyone safe.

The Christmas Tree Festival has been cancelled for another year as people have shown a reluctance to come to events in church despite all precautions being in place. From a roaring first event the number of people bringing in trees has diminished slightly so perhaps now that the event has been rested for two years you will all be full of ideas and raring to go again in 2022. Let's not lose another community event. School news:

Bradford, along with Black Torrington & Bridgerule have been building a link with The Discovery School in Kent and then extend this to include Olmoti Primary School in Kenya. Together, we are creating opportunities for the children to get involved with environmental and conservation projects, both in the UK and in Kenya. The work planned involves joint online assemblies, school council projects, as well as curriculum projects across the four schools. The Born Free Foundation is helping with these projects. So far the schools have connected for a joint assembly – the Bradford Children were stunned at seeing a school hall filled with 630 children!

Class two had a trip out to Bridge Mill to learn about Romans - The children became archaeologists for the day digging through layers of earth and discovering different items. They got a chance to look at the items that had been found and labelled them. They also had a lesson on how they would dye wool and how wool and linen were woven.

After lunch, they got to meet Richard who talked about being a Roman soldier. The children asked lots of good questions and got some great answers. They got to see the armour that romans would wear, got into two groups and became Roman soldiers learning some commands.

Many thanks go to Margaret, the Organist of the lovely Church of St Petroc in Hollacombe for showing us round. In the porch is a lintel dating from the 12th century and the church had various architectural additions in the 13th century followed by significant restoration in the 1880s. The tower is unusual having a saddle back roof, housing three bells which unfortunately have not been peeled since the 1930s due to safety reasons.

Christmas Scams: With Christmas now fast approaching, many of us will be using internet shopping which brings the added risks of being targeted by scammers. Rural North Devon might be a low crime area as far as traditional crimes are concerned but internet and telephone fraud know no boundaries and the police tell us that these types of fraud continue to increase at alarming rates and large sums of money are being lost across the South West. **Courier fraud** which we have mentioned in the past, tends to increase at this time of year, so please be on your guard and be aware of the possibility of a scam. This also applies to emails and phone calls purporting to be from delivery companies, drivers, and even your bank or credit card company.

The lead up to Christmas also tends to offer rich pickings with thefts from motor vehicles increasing when shopping has been left on show in car parks etc. Our local car parks in Holsworthy, Bideford and Barnstaple are not immune from this type of theft so please don't offer thieves' temptations. When leaving your vehicles please make sure that they are locked and that nothing is on show.

Scrap metals of all types are also being targeted, not just in Devon & Cornwall but across the country. If you have any such material, please keep it under lock and key until you are ready to dispose of it.

Green Eco Phone Scam. A number of residents across the Parish have already received phone calls from this company. Whilst there are a number a legitimately registered companies using Green Eco as part of their title operating in the 'green energy' field there is also a rogue element trying to elicit personal details and information. They have already been reported to the police so if you receive any such approach, please end the call and hang up.

MESSAGE FROM THE POLICE: During the last financial year, 2020-2021, Devon & Cornwall Police received a total of 246,629 emergency 999 calls, of which 15,183 were abandoned. When an emergency call is abandoned without speaking to the caller, operators in the contact centre spend time researching the phone number to try to ensure there is no risk to the caller and will return the call several times to check on the caller. We understand that accidents happen, but if you do call 999 by mistake, please stay on the line to tell us that everything is okay – otherwise valuable resources are taken away from answering other calls. **The police want to know that you are safe and it saves valuable time. Every second counts.**



As this will be the last newsletter for this year our PCSO, Mark, also joins with us in wishing everybody a very Happy Christmas, Safe and Peaceful New Year.

Keep your dog on a lead and under control.

If you are walking your dog, keep it under control and on its lead. Even the quietest of dogs can suddenly turn into a stock worrier, and if it does the farmer is allowed to shoot and ask questions afterwards. You could also be landed with a hefty bill for any damage done; just being chased and terrified could cause a ewe to abort her lamb.

I know most of our readers are country-wise and responsible owner's but we do have new parishioners who might not understand the ways of the countryside and are unaware of the "wolf" on the rug, all dogs have the basic instinct of the wolf and pretty little woolly things will often awaken it, so please when walking your dog, keep it on a lead.

A merry Christmas, Bob!" said Scrooge, with an earnestness that could not be mistaken, as he clapped him on the back. "A merrier Christmas Bob, my good fellow, than I have given you, for many a year! I'll raise your salary, and endeavour to assist your struggling family, and we will discuss your affairs this very afternoon, over a Christmas bowl of smoking bishop, Bob! Make up the fires, and buy another coal-scuttle before you dot another i, Bob Cratchit!"

Smoking Bishop.

Smoking bishop can be made ahead of time, strained, and reheated with great success.

One 750 ml bottle of port

3 oranges (Seville, if possible)

8 cloves

250ml water

Dark brown sugar to taste

Place the oranges on a tray and bake at 200°C for around 25 minutes until they have started to blacken and give off their delicious burnt aroma. Remove from the oven and allow to cool a little before slicing them up.

Next, pour the full bottle of port into a saucepan (very satisfying to do) along with the oranges and any orange juicy bits, as well as the cloves and water.

Bring to a bare simmer – don't let it boil! – and let it gently tick away at a scalding temperature (around 80°C) for around 20 minutes.

Add sugar to taste – if the oranges are very bitter and black, you might need quite a bit. If you don't want bits of orange pulp and clove floating about in the drink, strain into a clean pan before adding the sugar.

If, in the unlikely event, you do not have a mitre-shaped punch bowl, you can simply ladle straight from the saucepan into punch glasses or small mugs.

We Will Remember Them

Remembrance Sunday has come and gone. I really applaud the efforts made in Bude by the Town Council staff in their preparations for it. Shalder Hill, on which stands the war memorial, was superbly prepared to be a fitting tribute to the fallen.

This annual occasion gives each of us the opportunity to reflect on the immense sacrifices made by so many to ensure that we can live in a free society, able (within limits) to do what we want to do. Had those sacrifices not been made, the world would be a much uglier and repressive place, where individual liberties would be curtailed and we would have imposed upon us an all-powerful dictatorship.

I am sure every family has its own stories to tell about the horrors of war and the incredible efforts and sacrifices made by serving men and women to fight for our freedom. Every town and village memorial bears the names of the fallen.

And of course, there were many survivors who, too, made every effort to preserve our way of life.

In my own family, my parents played their own part. My mother left the west of Ireland to go to London to nurse the sick and wounded. My father was in the Royal Air Force.

As a teenager, his plane was shot down in 1940 in northern France. His squadron had the task of halting as best it could the relentless march by the German military from occupied Belgium into France. The crew of his Fairey Battle plane was instructed to attack the Luftwaffe headquarters at Chateau de Roumont. After the attack, they were fired on by fighters and forced to land. My father was the observer. The pilot helped his wounded crew – my father and the air gunner – from the aircraft, then set it alight. The pilot managed to evade capture and returned to his unit. Ten days later and at the age of 24, he was killed in action and was posthumously awarded the DFC. My father and his mate were captured and made prisoners of war at Stalag Kopernikus (near Warsaw). They remained in captivity until the end of the fighting.

On his return, my father was then hospitalised in Cambridge. This is where he met my mother who by that time was nursing in the same hospital. She nursed him, and they got married in Ireland in 1946. We must never forget the sacrifices of those who have laid down their lives for their country, and the many millions who assisted the war effort. Those sacrifices have continued down the decades. We owe so much to those who have volunteered to protect us and our country and our way of life.

Evelyn's Walk's

On Monday 11th October, we had the pleasure of repeating the route of the last walk that we enjoyed as an Inter Parish Walk in March 2020 before the first lockdown. I contacted Mike Stone who lives in Halwill & he very kindly agreed to lead the way. Until recently, he has been the P3 volunteer for the Parish of Halwill Junction & as such has ensured that the PROWs (Public Rights of Way) have been kept in good order. He introduced us to his replacement, Penny, who has very kindly agreed to step into his walking shoes.

We parked near the Church of St. Peter & St. James & walked down the lane to Horsebridge. There are in fact two old stone bridges which must need some careful negotiation by large modern vehicles. We turned left & walked up the hill & around a right hand bend before joining the footpath on the right hand side. This took us across a grassy field & we were watched with interest by a couple of ponies in an adjacent

paddock. One of them was an Appaloosa. You don't see very many of those. At the bottom of the hill, we crossed the route of the old railway & the River Carey. I was surprised that it wasn't muddier as we have had quite a lot of rain recently. It was a bit of a clamber up the other side but we enjoyed a breather whilst soaking up the glorious view in the morning sunshine. At the end of the track we joined the lane & followed the signs for Langaford Farm. We admired the dairy herd enjoying their breakfast in their barn & once again were delighted to discover that it wasn't as wet underfoot as we had anticipated for this time of year. From there we enjoyed walking across grassy fields towards the beautiful Church tower. Interestingly, it wasn't as prominent as in previous walks. I wasn't sure whether this was due to the trees having grown taller or whether there were just more leaves on the trees at this time of year.

I believe everyone enjoyed the walk which took us a couple of hours at a steady pace. It was great to have the opportunity to chatter to familiar people & some new ones. If you would like to join me on the next walk which will be on Monday 8th November setting off from Tetcott Village Hall at 10am, you are very welcome to join me. I would just ask you to contact me in advance if you would like any

information about the distance, terrain etc & also to ensure that there is sufficient parking.



On Monday 8th November, I led a walk from Tetcott Village Hall. This was never included on the programme of Inter Parish walks so I was very keen to introduce the route to anyone who wanted to join me. There were eleven of us in all which included four people that I hadn't walked with since before the start of the COVID pandemic. It was especially nice to see them after such a long time. We set off along the lane towards Luffincott. The sign said it was a 12% hill & it had been a conscious decision to walk down it as Gill & I had walked this route in the opposite direction previously. I had tried to kid her into believing that I had stopped to admire the view when in fact I had needed to catch my breath!! One of our group pointed out that a new road bridge had been built in 1931 to replace the original track which was still very evident amongst the trees on the left. We took a turning on the right which took us to Luffincott Barton. Along the way, one of our group pointed out where the Rectory had once stood until it burnt to the ground in 1911. Apparently, the Rev. Thomas Ward Brown took up the appointment as Rector at the turn of the 20th century. A local Historian wrote in 2015 that he had only slept in the Rectory for a couple of nights before he had a fright one night & decided to take lodgings in Clawton, never returning to the house. News of a ghostly presence spread & apparently people used to stay the night in the old Rectory in the hope of coming face to face with the ghost. It was claimed to be the ghost of the previous Rector, Rev. Franke Parker who had died in 1883. It was said that he had been buried 17' deep in an attempt to prevent him from reappearing. I wonder whether it was he who had caused the Rev. Brown to take fright in the night.

Next to Luffincott Barton is St. James' Church. It is a Grade I listed building & is maintained by The Churches Conservation Trust. It is well worth a visit in order to admire its simplicity but also a beautiful barrel vaulted roof, a 14th century font & beautiful stained glass windows. There is much to admire externally too. From here we followed the footpath which took us across the Tetcott Estate. We enjoyed a most glorious mixture of tranquil park land, woodland sporting autumnal colours & following the course of a stream. We even discovered a derelict cottage that used to be inhabited by a music teacher. We tried to imagine what it must have been like carrying shopping back home from Holsworthy. It would appear that it had a telephone line but I believe water would have come from a well & electricity from a generator. The footpath brought us to Tetcott Manor which we all admired. We enjoyed the walk past the Church, something to be visited another day, & across the park land to rejoin the road. It was only a short stroll back to our cars making a walk of approx. four miles. It took us two & a half hours but it definitely wasn't a walk to be hurried with so much of interest to take on board along the way.

The next walk will be on Monday 13th December. We will set off at 10am from Higher Larkworthy Farm with very kind permission from the Kirk family. I would be grateful if you could let me know in advance if you would like to join me so that I can tell you in advance about the route. Parking is also limited.

Poaching

Why is this important?



Poaching is the killing or taking of wild birds, mammals or fish without legal right or consent from the landowner. Poaching wild animals is a crime and can have a significant impact on protected species and conservation. It is often under reported and can be linked to organised crime.

What do you need to do?

Reduce poaching with simple crime prevention measures. Working together, land owners, rural businesses and members of the public should be vigilant reporting any suspicious activity to the police - noting vehicle details, descriptions and accurate location.

How can you prevent this?

- Landowners and managers, where possible, should secure gates and block unused entrances.
- Do not accept game from non-reputable sources, be aware of unhygienic and unsafe meat entering the food chain.
- Be visible consider the use of electronic surveillance such as trail cams and the use of signs showing the area is privately patrolled or monitored
- If you see or are aware of poachers on any land, notify the police using 999.
- Anyone able to offer information relating to poaching is asked to email 101@dc.police.uk, call 101 or Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 783 0137.
- Join Devon & Cornwall Alert, Watch schemes and local social media groups so that you can find out what is happening in your area

There were hardly any shows this year due to Covid but we hope this will change next year. All the ram lambs have now found new homes, except for Gilbert the Zwartble ram, who is unrelated to the rest of the flock, He's now our Tup for this coming years crop of lambs and we are looking forward to the scanner coming next month to see how well he's done his job and hopefully we get some more ewe lambs this time.

RASPBERRY AND WHITE CHOCOLATE CREME BRÛLÉE

Serves 8-10

1 × 450 g tub frozen rasphernies, thaved. 150 g white chocolate, broken into pieces 1 × 142 ml. tub darble cream 1 × 1Kg carton Ambrosia Devon Custard. 90 ml (6 tbsp.) demerara sugar.

1. Drain raspberries and spoon into a 1.5 litre (22pt) flameproof dish.

2. Place chocolate in a heatproof bowl and melt over a pan of simmering water. Allow chocolate to cool slightly. Whip cream, then beat together with custored and chocolate. Spoon over fmit and chill for several hours or overnight.

3. Just before serving, preheat grill. Spinkle sugar on top of mixture and grill until butobling and carametised.
