A New King for the Country.

After the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II early in September her eldest son Charles was proclaimed King Charles III.

He was born on the 14th November 1948 at Buckingham Palace, the first child of the then Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, he was christened Charles Philip Arthur George. The eldest of four children, his siblings being Anne, The Princess Royal, Andrew, Duke of York and Edward, Earl of Essex. Charles is the longest serving heir apparent to the British throne and the oldest person to ascend to it.

He married Diana Spencer in 1981 in St. Paul's Cathedral, they had two sons William, Duke of Cambridge, now Prince of Wales the new heir apparent and Harry, Duke of Sussex. Their marriage was dissolved in 1996 and in 2005 he married Camilla Parker Bowles, who is now Queen Consort. King Charles had taken over some of the late Queen's duties as she had become frailer and had some mobility problems, he had a very good tutor in his Mother and I'm sure he will do his very best to emulate her.

It was with great sadness that we heard of the death of Queen Elizabeth II early in September.

In our last issue we celebrated her Platinum Jubilee and although she looked rather frail, I'm sure many of us thought that she would live forever, never knowing any other Monarch it was difficult to imagine the country without her. Many of the older generation in the Parish can remember her Coronation and the pomp and ceremony that entailed, the majority of us were children & enjoyed the celebrations that were held.

She was the epitome of what we expect of a Monarch, gracious and a smile that lit up her face & the room, I'm sure that it put many a person at their ease when meeting her, a very special lady.



When asked about her, many people have said she had a wicked sense of humour, I think the James Bond episode for the Olympics and the Paddington Bear Tea Party were proof of that.

I think we all know the declaration she made on her 21st birthday which she followed through out her life, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we belong." She devoted her life as Queen to her country.

I'm sure that in the future, history will say that she was one of the greatest Monarchs to have sat on the throne of England, a lady that was admired by many people all over the world. Rest in Peace Your Majesty, you served your country well.

Meetings of the Parish Council are usually held on the third Wednesday of each month. The agendas for all meetings are displayed on the notice boards and available on the Milton Damerel Website, no later than the Friday before the meeting. The draft minutes are posted to the website within 30 days, but are not officially approved until the next meeting. Members of the public and press are always welcome, time is set aside for comments but they may not take part in discussions at any other time.

<u>COVID 19</u>

Most restrictions have now been lifted but the Government still urges people to be cautious as it has not gone away. The wearing of face masks is not compulsory but some shops are requesting that shoppers wear one when inside their supermarkets. It is also a personal choice whether to wear one or not. It is hoped with the mass immunisation that this disease will continue to diminish its hold on the community.

District Councillors

Councillor Kit Hepple and Ken James have been unable to attend recent meetings, both send regular updates received by email, both Councillors work in the background to support the Parish, they can be contacted anytime by all, for any help or advice that might be needed. Details of how to contact them are on the Parish Website.

Devon County Councillor James Morrish

Councillor James Morrish has been unable to attend recent meetings due to ill health and the pressure of work, James has 'several hats' within Devon County Council, and works hard on behalf of all the residents he represents. He can be contacted by email for any help or advice you might need.

Holsworthy Neighbourhood Policing team.

A recent communication from PC Frank Rogers has informed the Parish Council that due to pressure of work he will be unable to prepare 'crime statistics reports 'as PCSO Mark James provided on a regular basis.

Frank is hoping to instigate a '45-minute drop in' via Microsoft Teams, and will be in touch with the Parish Councils once the details are to hand. For details of crime statistics follow the link <u>*Home/Police.uk(www.police.uk)*</u>, from there input the area or post code to receive information for your area.

Our new PCSO is Jessica McEldon.

Agendas are regularly sent to the police team, but to date no officer has been able to attend.

Planning matters:

New planning applications over the last three months, dwellings on the land adjoining Southview for permission for two dwellings has been approved, application for a Stable block and menage at Waldon View, has now been approved. Approval has also been given to applications from residents of Milton House and Waldon View.

Your Parish Councillors give great consideration to all applications received, their concerns and comments are reported in the minutes and passed on to Torridge planning department. Although the application for the development at Town Farm has been approved for some time, there is still no signs of any development starting.

Details for all planning applications are available on Torridge District Council website; applications to be considered by the Parish Council are stated on the Agenda for Parish Council Meetings. If residents have any objections or concerns regarding an application, they can convey them in writing either by post or email to Torridge District Council planning department, you can also inform any Councillor or the Parish clerk. As there is now a strict 21-day consultation period it is imperative that you get your comments to the relevant department as soon possible.

<u>The Step Back in Time Fund</u>: for young people has a balance of £103.02 Grants can be made from this fund to help young people of the Parish undertake special activities, such as volunteering at an event at home or overseas.

Applications in writing can be sent at any time to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, outlining the project for which the grant is requested.

Annual Grants

Cheques were issued in September to MD Gardening and district gardening club, MD Parish Church, MD Newsletter and North Devon CAB. These grants were approved at the meeting held in November 2021.

Grant applications for the financial year 2023-24 will be considered during the meeting to be held on the 23rd November. Although on the publication of the newsletter applications will be closed, the Parish Council will always consider applications throughout the year if necessary.

Website

If you have any events that you want advertised, please let me know or email to me in pdf format, the website Cannot be kept up-to-date if I do not get the relevant information.

Community Defibrillator (AED):

The AED's sited at Holsworthy Beacon and Sanders Garage are checked regularly, but if at any time you see that there is any damage to the cabinet at either site, please inform the Clerk.

If you would like a refresher on the use of the AED and basic life support (CPR), please let the Parish Clerk know, these are conducted free of charge.

Condition of the Roads in and around Milton Damerel:

The Parish Council receive numerous complaints regarding the poor state of the roads, the Parish Clerk regularly passes on the complaints to Devon Highways, copies are always sent to Councillor Morrish, who will substantiate our complaints.

The more people that go onto Devon County Council's website and reports potholes and poor road surfaces the better, the Parish Council encourages residents to do so as often as they can.

Parish Footpaths

The Parish Footpaths have been looked after by Michael Jackson for ten years, he has now handed over to George and Wendy Preston. The Parish Councillors, are very grateful to Michael for all his hard work over his tenure, as I am sure are the residents of Milton Damerel Parish.

<u>The Parish Hall</u>

The renovations of the Hall have at present come to a stop. The kitchen and hall have been vastly improved.

Congratulations all round for the extremely hard work put in by all involved.

It is hoped that grants will be forthcoming to renovate the toilets in the near future.

The Parish Hall has now got its own website for bookings and information.

There are currently record numbers of people with Type 2 diabetes, around 5 million in the UK, a number which has doubled since 1996. The Healthier Devon – Diabetes Prevention team work closely with people who

have been diagnosed with pre-diabetes, encouraging and supporting changes to their diet and incorporating exercise into their daily lives. Tree Planted in Commemoration of HM The Queen

At the start of our Café Worship on 18th September a Beech Tree was planted in the Graveyard, in honour of **HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee** and of her **Long Reign.** We had planned this event before her death on 8th September but were pleased to make it a 'double' commemoration - a thanksgiving for 70 glorious years as our Monarch and a thanksgiving for her life and service at the head of our Nation and the Commonwealth. One of Her Majesty's initiatives was the Queen's Green Canopy, 'Plant a tree for the Jubilee', to create a living legacy with over 1 million trees to be planted. The initiative had been extended, to allow people to plant trees as a memorial to Her Majesty.

Gareth Piper welcomed everyone and said a few words of introduction prior to planting of the tree, with the assistance of the young people. Part of Psalm 96 was read and a minute's silence held in remembrance, concluding with singing the National Anthem 'God Save the King'. We adjourned to the Schoolroom for coffee and our time of worship included a quiz about Her Majesty, a hymn and 2 Bible readings from the Thanksgiving Service held for the Platinum and concluding with prayers on the death of Her Majesty and for the new King.

We are attaching a couple of photos showing just how lovely the hall looked on the day.



Always room for improvement RHS Rosemoor

This is a good time of year to look at your garden with a critical eye, and ask yourself if it can be improved for winter interest. Have you got any colour? Is there much structure? Can you enjoy your garden in winter or is it just a dreary mass of browns and dark green? There are two main ways of introducing winter colour using plants: flowers and colourful stems. *Cornus* and *Salix* produce the best stem colour; from bright red *Cornus alba* 'Sibirica' AGM, to orange *C. sanguinea* 'Midwinter Fire' and the golden stems of *Salix alba* 'Golden Ness' AGM. These look fabulous planted with bulbs such as snowdrops, *Scilla* and *Narcissus*, with hellebores or with heathers (*Erica*).

Winter flowers quite often have a heady fragrance and so are best planted next to a well-used path. Cultivars of



Hamamelis, Viburnum x bodnantense and Daphne are the best candidates. Evergreens are perfect for screening, as a back drop to highlight other plants, as focal po

Evergreens are perfect for screening, as a back drop to highlight other plants, as focal points and as groundcover. They come in all shapes and sizes with every shade of green, gold and variegation.

Many evergreens have more than one attribute. For example, *Sarcoccoca* has small, glossy leaves and highly fragrant flowers around Christmas time. Mahonias tick all the boxes with interesting leaves and sprays of bright yellow flowers which are often highly perfumed. *Ilex aquifolium* 'Handsworth New Silver' AGM is an attractive purple stemmed alternative to our native common holly. It has deep green leaves with a creamy white margin and the added bonus of red berries.

Lights can add another dimension to the winter garden and this year we have an extended route for Glow with many exciting new lights and features. Use of sculpture is another way of introducing interest to a garden and our sculpture trail is better than ever, with pieces ranging from £25 upwards. Where did this year go to? Thankfully 2022 has been a much better year than recent years and most of us are now able to get on with our lives in the freedom we have known from birth, that which we took for granted. Once again - free from government restrictions - we are able meet together and enjoy community events without fear – and masks. We pray that it will continue for ever more. Looking back it has been a mixed year of joy and sadness and changes.

We had the joy of celebrating together the 70 years reign of our Queen Elizabeth II with a picnic party and games for children at the Parish Hall. Then the joy turned to sadness on September 8th as we learned of the death of our loyal Queen. A service of commemoration was held at Holy Trinity on September 11th.

CHOTA Day September 10th was cancelled . Prince Phillip was the 'Patron of the Amateur Radio Club' and 'Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth' was the leader of our faith. It was out of respect that it was cancelled, but we hope that HARC will stage it again in September 2023.

As we move forward our thoughts turn to our new King Charles III and the new Carolean era. The word Carolean was first used almost 400 years ago to refer to the reign of King Charles II in the 1664, during the first Carolean era (the reign of King Charles I was known as Caroline so is discounted). King Charles II gave to the people of Milton Damerel a wall plaster - as seen in our church- as thanks for the restoration of the monarchy, he also brought back Christmas which had been banned under Oliver Cromwell. We wait to see what changes there will be in the new 'Carolean' era.

Looking forward to 2023 and talking about changes;- there will be a major change in the Bradworthy and Holsworthy Benefices'. Mother Elizabeth left the Holsworthy Benefice in October so they are without a vicar now and after June, next year, Bradworthy Benefice will also be without a vicar as Rev'd Richard will be retiring. With 22 churches without a vicar in 2023 it will be a difficult time but we will do our best, with your support, to continue our services until we have a new incumbent. We have been here before so we pray that someone quickly sees the beauty of our area and the communities we live in and would like to spend his/her working life amongst us. In the meantime:- we rely on our wonderful community for support.



HOME SWEET HOME

Andrew Smith saw an advert for a property to rent in Cambridge and made application to be the tenant. His application was accepted, and he received the keys to the property in February 2020. Within 2 weeks of moving into the property, he listed it for sale on a fake estate agent company online. He even rented show-home furniture for viewings. One prospective buyer came very close to completing the purchase but was alerted by a good Samaritan neighbour of the true owner who told them that it was in fact rented and not for sale. The matter was reported to the police who discovered that many of Smith's documents he had provided to the letting agent were fraudulent. Smith was caught and arrested. He eventually pleaded guilty to fraud by false representation and entering into money laundering. For his efforts he was jailed to 2.5 years.

Back in 2015 the well-known author Max Hastings and his wife Penny had a not too dissimilar experience. There's was another example of property fraud. Their property was rented out to a person using a false identity who had an accomplice. The accomplice was a lady who changed her name to Penelope Hastings by Deed Poll and then secured a passport in that name. The buyer was a young woman who paid £1.35 million to the alleged seller. The money was last seen on its way to a bank in Dubai. Fortunately for the Hastings, the Land Registry did not register the sale as it suspected a fraud. That meant that the Hastings still maintained the legal ownership of the property, but the buyer lost her money.

The Land Registry has set up a service since 2013 for owners who suspect a scam of some kind. The Land Registry warns that the properties most vulnerable to fraud are usually empty, tenanted, or mortgage free. Those of higher risk of fraud include owners who do not live in the property because they live abroad, buy-to-let landlords, people in long-term hospital or residential care, or where a relationship has broken down.

It is possible to enter a restriction on the Land Registry title and for warnings to be given if anybody tries to access your details.

THE COST OF COVID

Many law firms like mine were very fortunate during the various covid lockdowns. We were able to work from home on a remote basis. We were able to have regular contacts with our clients including Skype and Zoom meetings. Special procedures were put in place for signing of Wills and so on.

Not so lucky were the high street shops and stores. Their losses were compounded by the actions of the insurers with regard to pay-outs for business interruption.

It is interesting then to see that Greggs has won a landmark ruling in its legal battle over a £150 million insurance claim triggered by the pandemic. On 17 October a High Court judge backed the majority of the bakery chain's claim for



business interruptions caused by the pandemic. Greggs claimed more than £150 million on its policy with Zurich. The company argued that it had suffered a number of business interruptions. Zurich saw it differently. The insurer argued that all of the chain's losses could be traced to a "single occurrence". That meant the bill for the insurer would be capped at £2.5 million rather than the £150 million claimed by Greggs. The judge held that there was more than a single occurrence of business interruption and expressed the hope that the "parties will be able to agree as to the number". The lawyers representing Greggs said the ruling had "wider implications for all businesses that purchased the resilience insurance policies".

My expectation is that this will not be the end of it. Given the amounts involved, I would expect the insurers to appeal to the Court of Appeal with the possibility of the case ending up in the Supreme Court. Time will tell.

Meanwhile, the recovery on the high street is still slow. Most of us will have seen a number of shops closed permanently. The latest hit to the high street is the news that Marks & Spencers are looking to cull a significant number of their high street stores – yet another nail in the high street coffin.

Foundation Stage Unit Update:

Since September, our FSU has been growing. We are now offering provision **daily** between **8.45am and 3.30pm**, which can be **morning, afternoon or whole day sessions**. The children can purchase a school dinner, if needed.

This half term we are investigating our theme of Celebrations. We have made our own fireworks in a bottle as well as created some colourful firework pictures and enjoyed moving our bodies as if we were fireworks! The children have also enjoyed reading our text The Scarecrows Wedding by Julia

Donaldson and creating their own scarecrow characters. Across our FSU, we are challenging ourselves to take part in the National Trusts '50 things to do before you're 11 and three quarters'. The children love exploring our outdoor space and have created 'wild' self-portraits, formed a nature band and made friends with lots of insects and bugs, as well as the cows in our neighbouring field! Alongside Bouncy

Babies, our Parent and Toddler group running every Monday morning between 10-12pm during term time, we have had visits from Jess Squire Dance and LJD coaching. The children loved listening to the music and moving their bodies to it as well as throwing, catching and kicking footballs and learning to play together, taking turns and showing great teamwork.

Bracken Class (KS2 class):

The children have settled back into their learning this term, thoroughly enjoying the topics we have been studying.

We have been learning about the Kingdom of Benin in our History learning (including some fantastic debating on whether artifacts should be returned to their country of origins!) The children were especially interested in how the Kingdom thrived and became a power in Africa and alongside European countries and how we know what it was like considering there is no formal 'written' evidence.

The children enjoyed visiting our DMAT Phizzy lab as

LOOKING BACK

From Holsworthy Post Wednesday September 7 2022 Looking Back 60 years ago September 8, 1962

A Fordson Major tractor was sliced in half by the force of a collision with a 3.8 Jaguar car on the main Holsworthy – Bideford road, near Cross Farm, Milton Damerel, but the tractor driver was unhurt. The car went on to hit a milk stand, scattering the churns some 20 or 30 yards. It then turned over on its roof and ended up at an angle across the road. The driver was seriously injured. A police spokesman said that if he had not been wearing a safety belt, he would almost certainly have died instantly. *Three decades of compulsory seatbelt use are being marked today as the government made a selection of historic THINK! adverts available online. The law requiring all drivers to wear their seatbelts came in to force 30 years ago today (31 January 2013) - on 31 January 1983.*

Car manufacturers have had to install seatbelts since 1965 but the law requiring drivers to wear them did not come in to force for another 18 years. In 1991 the law changed again making it a legal requirement for adults to wear seatbelts in the back of cars.

Holsworthy Fire Brigade, PC Howell of Milton Damerell, and other people of the parish rushed to the aid of Mr Godfrey Blight when a fire broke out in his farmhouse at Higher Grawley, Milton Damerell.

Evelyn's Walk 12/9/2022

On Monday 12th September, there was promise of a lovely day. Seven of us met at Lower Tamar Lakes car park with a view to walking along the Bude Aqueduct, the feeder arm of the Bude Canal. We commented on the big Sykes pumps situated in the car park. We surmised that water has had to be pumped from the lower lake to elsewhere due to the significant drop in water levels in recent months.

The sun was shining, the atmosphere was convivial & it was easy walking as the grass had been cut very recently & the route was very level. We enjoyed seeing the Peacocks at Virworthy Wharf. The males looked resplendent in their beautiful plumage. We all commented that it was unusual to see a white one. We noticed that several new gates had been installed since our last visit. I'm guessing that they would have been supplied by Devon County Council as this is one of their PROWs (Public Rights of Way).



However, maintenance of the footpath is undertaken by the volunteers from the Bude Canal Trust. They do an amazing job given the length of the route. We walked as far as the picnic bench near Moreton Mill & enjoyed a quick snack that we had brought with us. Once fortified, we retraced our steps back to our cars. I believe we walked approximately six miles in total. It made such a lovely start to the week ahead.

Evelyn's Walk 14/11/2022

Part of the pleasure of these walks is not knowing who is going to join me. Since all the restrictions ended, people don't have to let me know in advance & it's always a lovely surprise to see who comes on the day. On Monday 14th November, thirteen of us met at Higher Larkworthy Farm with kind permission of the Kirk family. It's very much a working farm & we were all very grateful to them for letting us park there. We followed the footpath that goes through Lower Larkworthy Farm. There were lots of new way markers once we passed the farm buildings which were most helpful in defining the route. It started off as guite a muddy track between the fields but everybody managed in either their walking boots or wellies. We then crossed a couple of grassy fields & we had to look quite hard in order to determine the route. However, we remembered that there was a post in the hedgerow that had been painted bright yellow. It wasn't immediately obvious but it helped guide us in the right direction once we went over the brow of the hill. Since we had gone that way last December, Devon County Council have done a lot of work near the river crossing. There was a wooden bridge previously but it has been replaced with a brand new one. It must have been quite a feat to remove the original one & get the new one put into position! Having crossed the River Carey, we slithered up the hill the other side & emerged onto the road at Henford. We turned left towards Ashwater & walked down hill initially. It goes without saying that it then went up hill. It was really quite steep & we stopped at strategic points to admire the views with glorious autumnal colours & catch our breath! At the top of the hill, we turned left along a track. This is not a public footpath but the Kirk family had kindly given us permission to return to our cars that way. We could have continued along the road towards Ashwater & then followed the Public Right of Way (PROW) on the left. This would have taken us back across the fields to Higher & Lower Larkworthy farms but it would obviously have been a longer walk. Our route involved re-crossing the River Carey via an old stone bridge. The beautiful lichen on the trees is a sure indication of the good air quality. We looked across the orchard towards the two Glamping pods at Higher Larkworthy Farm that blend in so well with the natural environment. Anybody who stays there couldn't wish for a more tranquil place or enjoy more stunning views of unspoiled countryside. Have a look at their web site if you know of anyone wanting to stay locally. I believe everyone enjoyed this walk which took us about 1.5 hours. All in all, it was a lovely route in good weather & convivial company. What a great way to start the week.

Evelyn's Walk 10/10/2022

On Monday 10th October, nine of us met by Halwill Parish Church. That's in Halwill Town NOT Junction. Pennie Channing is the relatively new P3 volunteer for Halwill & very kindly agreed to lead the walk. After all, she's far more familiar with the local PROWs (Public Rights of Way) than me. She had suggested a route describing it as "a lovely & interesting walk across varied terrain, but not too difficult." She was concerned whether we could manage a distance of 4.4 miles. I was prepared to lead a shorter route for anyone who was not keen to try the longer one. However, everyone was very game to try Pennie's route so we all set off following the footpath that starts



by the left hand side of the Church. It goes across the very lush green fields towards Langaford Farm & at one point, we could see where the railway line would have been. The cows all looked very content from their barn at the farm though it seemed far too nice a day to be indoors. It was a glorious autumnal morning with just a slight nip in the air. Instead of bearing left down the drive which would have joined the lane near Quoditch Cross, we followed the footpath. This was completely new territory for all of us apart from Pennie. The route took us along a narrow path & across more lush green fields. At one point, we had to negotiate a stile but everyone managed admirably. Pennie pointed out a multitude of deer tracks & a couple of tumuli which we would probably have missed if she hadn't have been with us. If you look at an OS map, the tumuli are in fact marked. We then entered Cookworthy Moor Plantation & followed a nice hard track all the way to the A3079. This is the road that runs between Dunsland Cross & Halwill Junction. Knowing what a busy road this is, I was somewhat concerned. However, it was only a short distance before we went through a gate on the right hand side & then walked along a bridle path which goes across the property known as Cookworthy Buddle. By this stage, I had completely lost my sense of direction but the path was very clearly marked. By bearing right, we walked along the route of the old railway line & passed Brendon. At one point, we all looked over the parapet of the stone bridge & into the railway cutting from a bygone era. From here it was only a very short distance back to the road in Halwill. It came out right by the telephone box. We were all most grateful to Pennie for showing us this lovely route. It was just as she described & made a great start to the week.



Beef Stew and Light Herby Dumplings

Preparation Time Less than 30 minutes Cooking Time over 2 hours

Serves

A little bit of patience will be rewarded with this rich beef stew with parsnip, butternut squash and fluffy dumplings.

Ingredients for Stew

spray oil, for frying

600g/1lb 5oz lean braising steak, all visible fat removed

- 1 litre/1¾ pints beef stock, made from 2 low-sodium cubes
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves crushed
- 2 celery sticks finely chopped
- 3 carrots, 1 finely chopped, rest cut into chunks
- 1 tbsp tomato purée
- 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 1 parsnip, cut into chunks
- 300g/10¹/₂oz butternut squash (about half a squash)

<u>Method</u>

Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4.



Ingredients for the dumplings

150g/5½oz self-raising flour
pinch salt and freshly ground black pepper
2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley or thyme (your preference)
1 egg yolk, lightly beaten
1 tsp olive oil

Preheat a casserole dish on the hob, then spray with oil. Add the beef in batches, cooking each batch until browned all over and spraying with more oil as needed. Transfer the beef to a plate using a slotted spoon and set aside. Add a little stock to the dish, turn the heat up to high, and deglaze by scrubbing off the cooked-on bits with a spatula.

Turn down the heat and spray the dish with more oil. Add the onion and cook until softened. Add the garlic and cook for 1-2 minutes. Add the celery and finely chopped carrot and cook for 3-4 minutes. Stir in the tomato purée and balsamic and cook for 2-3 minutes more. Return the meat to the pan and stir in the rest of the stock, then bring to the boil. Put the dish in the oven (without a lid) and cook for 1 hour.

Add the parsnip, butternut squash and carrot chunks, put the lid on the dish and cook for another 30 minutes.

For the dumplings, put the flour in a mixing bowl with the salt and pepper. Mix in the herbs. Add the egg and oil and mix, adding just enough cold water to bring it together as a dough (about 4 tbsp). Be careful not to add too much water as this will make the dumplings heavy. Knead the mixture a little.

Shape into eight golf-ball-sized pieces and put on top of the stew, pushing down a little to coat in the juices. Cover with the lid and return to the oven for 15 minutes, then remove the lid and cook for a further 15 minutes.

When the dumplings are golden-brown, lift them out of the stew into serving bowls and stir the stew (the squash will be very tender, which will thicken and flavour the sauce). Serve immediately.

Prep:15 mins



Ingredients

SILF I	Heat oven to 140C/120C fan/gas 1. Put all the ingredients (except the apricots, sultanas and sweets) in a large bowl. Stir everything well, then spread out onto two baking trays in an even layer. Put the tray in the oven for 40 mins.
STEP 2	Leave the granola to cool on the tray, then break it up into small chunks and stir in the sultanas and apricots.
STEP 3	Put the granola in a jar ready for breakfast. To make it suitable for magic reindeer, put a few spoonfuls into a small paper bag and mix in some sweets.
STEP 4	Tie with string or a ribbon and add a fun label for Father Christmas to find.



Courier fraud which we mentioned in previous issues, tends to increase at this time of year, so please be on your guard and be aware of the possibility of a scam. This also applies to emails and phone calls purporting to be from delivery companies and drivers and even your bank or credit card company.



If you have any doubts about a message, contact the organisation directly. Don't use the numbers or address in the message – use the details from their official website. Remember, your bank (or any other official source) will never ask you to supply personal information via email. If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk. Send us emails that feel suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam - we can check. Police are again warning residents about_a phone caller pretending to be a police officer. They will never contact people to ask for banking information or request that they withdraw money from an account to aid an investigation.




