

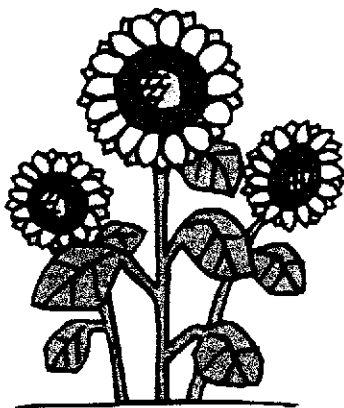

The parish council met in February after a break over Christmas due to there being very little business. At this meeting David Dyer was elected as Chairman and Sarah Harper was elected as Vice Chair. The council have met each month since.

It was agreed that the environment agency should be notified about ongoing concerns with surface road water near Crossways. This has been followed up with a site visit and a letter informing the parish council that Devon County Highways need to be contacted. This has been done in the past and when they visited they were unable to see the problem as it was dry. Flooding seems to occur after heavy rainfall. It is believed that someone else from highways is now involved following contact from other sources. The council will see if a solution is found and if not will take up the issue again if it is not resolved.

The vacancy for a councillor was advertised and interested people were invited to make their interests known. As a result Michael Kirby was invited to join the council.

In April members welcomed Michael to his first meeting where the necessary paperwork had to be completed. Plans for the AGM were discussed and it was agreed that due to the past low attendance by parishioners we would not invite a guest speaker. However it was decided that representatives from the organisations that receive a grant should be invited as this would be an opportunity to hear about their news and any current issues.

Devon County Highways have been informed of pot holes around the parish and their vehicle has been sighted carrying out improvements. The broken direction sign at Crossways has been reported and I assume that it has been taken away as it seemed to disappear a couple of days after I reported it. We await a replacement and hope that this does not take too long.

Chaos to Creation

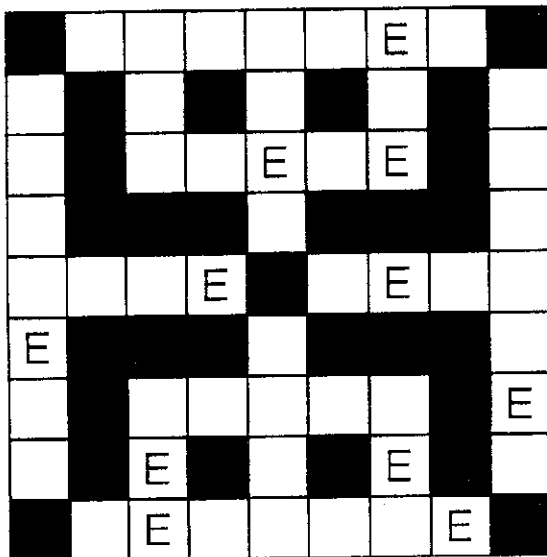
In Milton Schoolroom on Sat May 28th, 10.30 am until 4 pm approx.

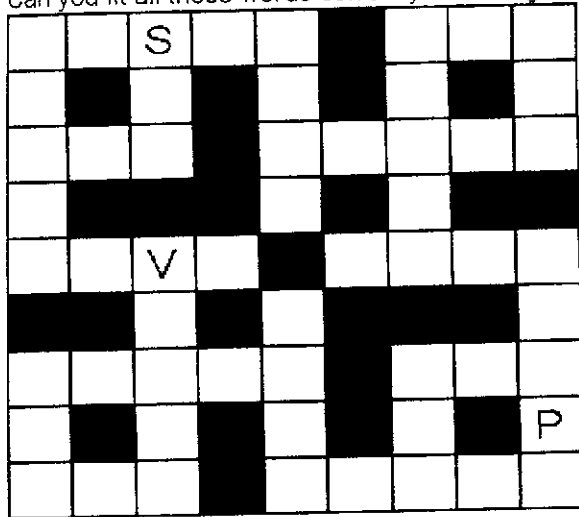

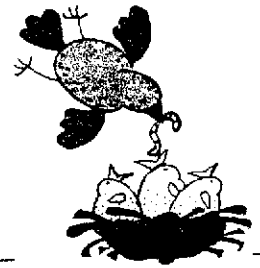

What's on in the Garden – Article submitted by Bill Wrighton

During the early spring the sunlight hours were as much as 25% down on the 30 year average monitored by the Ministry of Agriculture (ADAS) and even though temperatures were up the reduced light meant a slow start for young plants and seedlings but, as is nature's way, everything will be catching up now.



With the threat of frosts over, it should be safe to plant out bedding, runner beans, tomatoes etc. though it can be a good idea to keep some frost protection fleece around just in case. The fleece which was developed for covering carrots in fields will protect crops down to -2c whilst a few layers will give even more protection.

In the glasshouse

Tomatoes in the glasshouse should be well advanced now and removing the side shoots, tying up the leader and feeding with Tomorite or similar becomes a weekly ritual. There are many feeds available but I have always used one with added Magnesium probably because I lost a whole crop once due to a deficiency that left me with several hundred plants which had turned yellow overnight.

Tomatoes do require a cool growing environment and the glasshouse vents should be wide open most of the time only needing closing on cold nights. Around mid day a thorough shower over the foliage using a hose pipe or a can with a coarse rose will cool the plants and encourage cropping and do remember if the roots dry out when fruit is setting this can lead to splitting as they ripen. Sweet peppers are one of the easiest glasshouse crops needing little more than a water and feed to produce several peppers which in the case of varieties such as Redskin turn red, though they can be used green and peppers will



Cucumbers need a very hot and steamy atmosphere and I can remember growing them commercially in a shaded glasshouse whose vents were rarely opened and several times each day we would soak the slab paths which soon evaporated in the heat and made the place like a sauna. Needless to say we always picked the crop early in the morning before the sun got too hot.

Vegetable garden



Remember to keep a continuity of the fast maturing vegetables, lettuce, Summer cabbage etc. by sowing or planting just a few every 2 to 3 weeks and do keep up with the hoeing and weeding so the veg plants get the full benefit of all the available light, food and water.

Outdoor tomatoes may not ripen as early as indoor varieties but can bear heavy crops for very little effort and you can even get a variety called Tumbler which looks very attractive in hanging baskets or pots and produces ripe fruit over a long period.

There are several outdoor, bush, varieties the oldest one I can remember being Outdoor Girl. Lately my wife has fallen in love with Gardeners Delight which I train up as cordons in the glasshouse or pinch out the leader to encourage them to bush outdoors either planted in the ground or large pots, 10 ltr or more.

June should see you lifting early potatoes and picking broad beans a combination I love when served with Gammon. If you haven't already you should be planting runner beans now to produce the first crops in July but do bear in mind that they are greedy for both food and water, if your ground was not well prepared with manure you should feed every 6 to 8 weeks with Growmore or weekly with a liquid feed and never let the ground dry out, many people spray the foliage when they water to freshen the plants

Although celery is now mainly self blanching you can improve the results by placing loose straw between the plants to shade the stems, the conditions created do encourage slugs so put down a treatment first.

No rest for the gardener

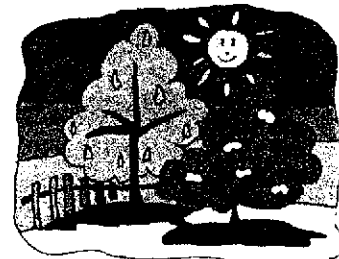
Lawns are growing rapidly and should be mown regularly the quality of a lawn is dependent on the care it is given especially the frequency of the cutting but also on the programme of feeding and top dressing, if you have a problem with moss this is usually due to the conditions being too wet and or alkaline and the latter can easily be remedied by the annual application of lime which will create conditions grass likes but moss does not.

The common diseases of roses are airborne, mildew, black spot, rust and in the Spring the plants are disease free until reinfested from the atmosphere, black spot is formed from the raindrops which carry it out of the air. Treatments available generally cannot cure the diseases but give the plants some protection so it is important to start spraying regularly before the problems arise. Some early flowering herbaceous if cut back as soon as flowering is finished will produce a 2nd late flush of flower, not so spectacular but still rewarding, particularly Delphiniums and Geraniums.

The easy way to deal with many common weeds is by the application of a weedkiller with a sprayer and the most effective chemical available is Glyphosate often known as Round-Up, which is taken in by the foliage and passes into the roots, a translocated herbicide, which after 2 to 3 weeks die and then the weed withers. This chemical is very safe being harmless to birds, insects and humans and as soon as it touches the ground it biodegrades, do remember it should only be sprayed onto the foliage of plants you wish to kill.

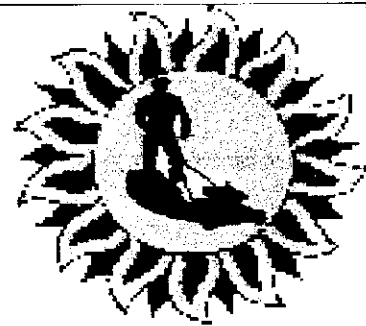
As long as the plants are established in pots it is not too late to plant new stock, in fact my company used to plant several thousand shrubs through the summer subject of course to sufficient water being available for a weekly soaking during dry spells

It is a good idea to select a few good looking plants every month so there is colour in the garden all year round not just in the Spring which is when most of us do our gardening

Recipes – Submitted by Rose Haynes

It's almost that time of year again, hot summer days, warm barmy evenings, out with the barbi. Try this for a delicious starter.

Sardines with Coriander and Lime BBQ Time - 20mins plus Marination Serves 4

Ingredients:

| 8 small Sardines, cleaned and gutted | 1 Lime, thinly sliced |
| Salt | 1 Green Chilli, thinly sliced |
| The grated Zest and Juice of 1 Lime | 100g 4oz Freshly chopped Coriander |
| Olive oil for brushing | |

Instructions

- Season the insides of the fish with salt then make 2-3 shallow diagonal cuts on both sides of each fish.
- In a small bowl, mix together the lime juice, zest and sliced chilli then rub this mixture into the fish, both inside and out.
- Place the fish in a shallow dish then scatter the coriander over the top and cover with the slices of lime. Refrigerate for one hour.
- Remove the fish from the dish and brush liberally with olive oil. Place oiled side down on an oiled hinged wire fish grill and cook over medium coals for 3-4 minutes.
- Brush the other side of the fish with olive oil, turn and continue to cook for a further 3-4 minutes. Serve immediately.

NB If you don't have a wire fish grill, use 2 long skewers to impale all the fish together, one skewer going through the fish just below the heads, the other going through the fish just above the tails.

You've tried Lemon Chicken, how about Duck!!!!

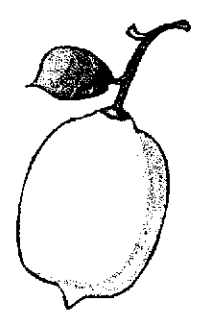
Lemon Duck BBQ Time -55mins plus marinating Serves 4

Ingredients:

| 4 Duck quarters | 2 tbsp Dark Soy Sauce |
| 4 Spring Onions, finely chopped | 1 teasp Sugar |
| 1 teasp Freshly grated Ginger | 1/2 teasp Finely grated Lemon Rind |
| 2 teasp Ground Turmeric | Salt and Black Pepper |

Instructions

- In a large bowl, mix together all the ingredients apart from the duck until well blended.
- Add the duck pieces and leave to marinate for at least 4 hours.
- Cook the duck over hot coals for 25 minutes on each side or until completely time. Serve hot.



Parish Councils Historical Minutes – submitted by Anne Binns

Although the minutes are a public record I decided it would be respectful to omit names of individuals mentioned.

4th Dec 1894

Chair taken at 6.40 PM by--- Chairman declares that the business of the meeting to be the election of parish councils and asks for nomination papers to be handed in. Ten nomination papers handed in and numbered accordingly. Opportunity allowed for putting questions to candidates. Withdrawal of candidates. Four withdrawals. Time allowed for further nomination papers to be handed in. One nomination paper handed in. Time allowed for questions to be put to candidate. The following candidates declared by chairman to be duly elected as parish councillors (*7 names listed*)

13th Dec 1894 (*First Parish Council Meeting*)

Mr..... is unanimously elected Chairman and takes the Chair accordingly.

Mr.... is unanimously elected Clerk and acts accordingly.

(This is the total content of the minutes for this meeting)

10th Jan 1895

The minutes of the last meeting are read and confirmed. Resolved that a stout iron box be had to keep all books and documents in. (*Does anyone know what happened to said iron box?*)

1st April 1895

The first annual Parish Council Meeting.

11th May 1895

A complaint has been received from Mr.... of the inconveniency of crossing the stream on the path leading from Whitebear to Milton Town. The Council decided to have a new footbridge fixed across the stream and that should be let by tender. The Clerk was ordered to send notices to the carpenters of the Parish to that effect.

18th May 1895

Mr--- tender for the footbridge was accepted at a cost of 30/-

12th Oct 1895

Proposed by Mr and seconded by Mr that a precept be served on the overseers for £3 to be paid by 12 December 1895. A complaint has been received from of the bad repair of the footbridge leading from Worden Cross to Milton Town.. The Council has decided that the path shall be put in good repair.

2nd Mar 1896

The Clerk was directed to write to Mr asking him to put the road that leads from Grawley to Gidcott Cross in good repair or grant the tenant of Grawley a footpath to Gidcott Cross.

2nd Feb 1897

Proposed by Mr, seconded by Mr that members of the Parish Council collect subscriptions for the purpose of putting a bell to the school board in commemoration of the Queen's long reign.

1st May 1897

That the members of the Parish Council collect subscriptions for hospitals for the Jubilee celebration.

6th Mar 1899

Resolved that a cheque be drawn payable to to meet current expenses. Clerk – for audit and stamps 5 shillings. Allowed to Clerk for attending audit 5 shillings.

10th Jun 1899

Proposed by, seconded by that a precept be issued on the overseers for the sum of £4 to be paid by the Treasurer by 29 November 1899.

16th April 1900

Proposed that a cheque be drawn for 10 shillings payable to for a new table to be placed in the Council room.

3rd July 1900

Proposed that a cheque be drawn for 7 shillings payable to for a new box for the custody of the Parish map.

21st Mar 1902

Proposed by, seconded by that the Clerk write to respecting a public footpath at Wheadbear (?) down leading to Buttermoor, Grawley and Shebbear and that the hedge which has been made across the said path be removed not later than 15 April 1902.

29th Apr 1902

Proposed and carried that we celebrate the Coronation of His Majesty the King.

Proposed and carried that a meat tea be provided for the Parish.

Proposed and carried that the money be raised by subscriptions, any deficiency to be made good by the rates.

17th Jun 1907

With reference to your application of the 30th ultimo I am directed by the Postmaster General to state for the information of the Milton Parish Council that the question of erecting a letterbox at Venn Green has been considered but it is regretted that the circumstances do not warrant compliance with the request.

11th Jan 1908

The letter received from the District Council respecting a District Nurse was read and considered. The Clerk was directed to write to the Parish Councils of Bradford, Cookbury and Thornbury to know what steps they are taking respecting the engagement of a District Nurse. If the Parish Councils at either of these places think it is advisable to engage one, the Council here will further consider the matter and perhaps join them. The Clerk was asked to write to the Secretary of Bradworthy Nursing Association to find out what the cost of the nurse would be yearly.

22 Mar 1909

In reply to your letter of the 27th ultimo I am directed by the Postmaster General to state for the information of Milton Damerel Parish Council that the question of establishing a letter box at Venn Green has been again considered but it is regretted that the number of letters likely to be posted is not sufficient to justify the provision of the desired box.

15th Apr 1909

Moved by, seconded by that a precept be served on the overseers for £6 to be paid to the Treasurer on the 16 June 1909.

18th May 1909

With reference to your letter of the 30 March I am directed by the Postmaster General to state for the information of Milton Damerel Parish Council that enquiry has again been made into the question of providing a letter box at Venn Green but it is found that the circumstances have not changed since the matter was last considered and it is regretted therefore that the request of the Council cannot be complied with

Citizens advice bureau news

Q."I am due to have a baby in May, I already have a 4 year-old and a one year-old. I have recently seen a leaflet about the Child Trust Fund in the supermarket. How can I find out if my children are eligible?"

Child Trust Fund is a new savings and investment account for children, set up by the government to ensure that all children have some money behind them to start adult life.

A. Child Trust Fund is only available for children born on or after 1st September 2002 who are living in the UK and are not subject to immigration control. Children who are eligible will receive a £250 voucher to start their own Child Trust Fund account. Family and friends will also be able to contribute up to £1,200 a year to the child's account. The money will belong to the child and can't be touched until they turn 18.

When your baby is born, you must apply for and be awarded Child Benefit before you can open a Child Trust Fund account. You will then automatically receive an information pack and voucher for £250 for your child, which you can use only to open a Child Trust Fund account. If you already claim Child Benefit for your one year-old then you should receive an information pack and voucher between January and May 2005 without having to claim it. Your one year-old will receive a slightly higher payment to take account of the fact that an account could not be opened for her/him earlier.

Some children will receive an extra £250 if they are part of a household receiving Child Tax Credit with a household income below a certain level. The Inland Revenue will make the payment automatically so there is no need to make a claim should this affect you. You will be able to choose where to open a Child trust Fund account for your child. When you receive your information pack you will get a list of account providers and the different types of accounts on offer. Community Self Help Plan

For some time now the Devon County Council Emergency Planning Services have been encouraging the parish council to have a local action plan that could be used in the event of an emergency that affects part or all of the parish. For example in the event of severe flood or loss of mains services (electricity or water) or even a major air or road accident.

Though the parish council recognise that we do not require an elaborate major plan we do think that it should be able to fulfil our local responsibility in the parish. We think our response could be met by bringing together information that would enable us to have a self help plan.

In particular to be able to help people who would regard themselves as vulnerable or isolated should an event occur. Without intruding into personal circumstances if anyone feels that they would like to be included in a list of people who's well being could be checked in an emergency situation, please can you let us know.

The parish council through its councillors will be known as the local emergency management team and will need information on how people could help. E.G Do you have equipment that may be used in an emergency such as:- a generator, Water pump, water tanks.

For short term accommodation the chapel rooms and parish hall could be used and a list of key holders and their contact details for these will be required.

The plan will be held by the parish clerk and will be known to all the councillors.

If you have any views, ideas, contributions or offers of help it would be very much appreciated. Please can you let the clerk or any of the councillors know.

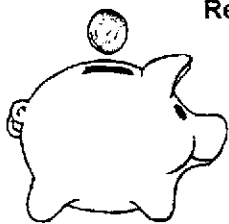
